
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## More Family History Research from the Web

It's hard to believe that summer is almost over...time to gear up for all that family research you've been meaning to do! In this edition, I hope to show you a few websites that are very useful and interesting as well! Number One on this list is **GenealogyinTime** Magazine which originates in Canada. Their newsletter, entirely free, offers new ideas, record updates worldwide, guides and checklists and "an independent voice". Their search engine is outstanding, and very easy to use; for example: I was looking for details on the death of a young person who was the victim of a cave-in which took place in Maine. I spent a lot of time in major databases, and still had not discovered the precise date or place of the accident. Once I plugged the name into their search engine, I was instantly given references to articles in the local papers that answered our patron's initial question. You can't do much better than that! www.genealogyintime.com . Another good site to know about is the one created by Stephen P. Morse called "One-Step Webpages". This is literally a one-stop toolkit for accessing many webpages, covering the Census, immigration, vital records, foreign alphabets, calendars, DNA, the holocaust, etc. Mr. Morse has provided numerous portals to genealogical data, and made each easier and quicker to use. Take a look and see: http:// stevemorse.org . The third selection on my list is AncestralFindings.com which is very informative, and emphasizes free searches. Sign up for their weekly newsletter, and receive lots of tips, surname background, offers for free lookups, and lists of

free databases. Based in Batavia. OH, take a look at www.AncestralFindings.com! Canadian genealogy is alive and well on Maple Stars and Stripes, which is set up primarily to offer podcasts. In its description the site was "created as a way to share tips and tricks that might make it easier to research your French-Canadian family here in America as well as trace them back in Quebec". You may subscribe to their blog, view their shows, read and print Shownotes and search their archives. Offerings that I found particularly interesting include "Tracking Your 'Nomadic' French-Canadian Ancestors", "The Drouin Collection-Microfilmed and Digitized", "French-Canadian Given Names", and "The Dreaded 'Dit' Name".
