

# WARRANT.

To JOSIAH D. HINDS, a Constable of the Town of Orrington, in the County of Penobscot, GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Orrington, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House in said town on Monday, the twelfth day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

First-To choose a Moderator to preside.

Second—To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

Third-To act on the report of the Selectmen.

Fourth—To act on the report of the Superintendent of Schools.

Fifth-To act on the report of the Board of Health.

Sixth—To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year, including a Road Commissioner and Superintendent of Schools.

Seventh—To grant and raise money for the support of schools, the poor, the repair of roads and bridges and repair of school houses and to defray all other town charges.

Eighth—To see if the town will support one or more High Schools and raise money for the same.

Ninth—(By petition)—To see if the town will put new seats in the school house in School District No. 6 and raise money for the same.

Tenth—To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to settle with Dr. Tibbetts for injuries to his horse, on account of obstructions in the road from snow, etc., about April 1st, 1898, for which he claims damages. Eleventh—To see if the town will instruct the Selectmen regarding the letting and care of Town House.

Twelfth—To see if the town will vote to fence the Town House lot and raise money for the same.

Thirteenth—To see if the town will buy the hearse from the present owners and raise money for the same.

Fourteenth—To see if the town will vote to increase the pay of the Town Treasurer.

Fifteenth-To fix the compensation of the Collector of Taxes.

Sixteenth—To see if the town will take any action in regard to stopping the leak around the belfry on the Town House.

The Selectmen will be in session for the purpose of revising the list of voters at nine o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.

# REPORT

# Superintendent of Schools.

In presenting my report as Superintendent of Schools, it is a pleasure to be able to say that, considering them altogether, our schools have been successful ones.

The best time to criticise teachers is while they are at work and the best place to discuss the merits of each school is before it, which I have endeavored to do and although I shall mention each school separately, do not form a decided opinion of a teacher's ability or of the character of the school from these brief remarks, but resolve the coming year to learn the merits and faults of schools and teachers by *personal observation* rather than from careless remarks of children or neighbors or from words of recommendation by Superintendent. Our teachers have all been well qualified. A little carelessness in government was noticed in a few schools, but generally the discipline of the schools has been commendable, a good degree of order having been secured, through respect and love rather than through fear.

The few suggestions given to the teachers have been accepted as helps instead of criticisms and all relations between teachers, scholars and superintendent have been very pleasant.

No contagious diseases have entered the schools during the year, and in most schools the attendance has been regular. We also notice few instances of tardiness, which is commendable.

#### DISTRICT No. 1.

This school has been, during this year, under Miss Mildred F. Eldridge, whose earnest efforts for the advancement of each and every scholar have been crowned with success. A fine dictionary has been presented to this school through the kindness of parents and friends.

#### DISTRICT No. 2.

Ralph L. Kendall began his work as a teacher in this school. He succeeded in winning the respect and love of his pupils, many of whom did excellent work in their studies.

In the fall, Mr. Charles C. Phillips, a graduate of Bowdoin, taught here, *his* first school. His work was faithful and the progress was marked.

WINTER TERM—Mr. Kendall returned with vigor to the work. This school is a large one and a firm hand is needed to maintain discipline. This was successfully accomplished and good results obtained.

#### DISTRICT No. 3.

SUMMER TERM—Miss Lydia J. Kelso. Good methods, love for the scholars and careful instruction to all made this a profitable school.

FALL TERM—Miss Kelso began this term but left at the end of the second week for a position in Bangor. Miss Alice M. Dodge finished the school with satisfactory results. WINTER TERM — Miss Josephine King taught a good school. The order was excellent and the instruction thorough.

#### DISTRICT No. 4.

Mrs. Bernice M. Smith, a teacher of experience, began the spring term, and the work was going on well, when an unfortunate accident prevented her from completing the term's work. The school was finished by Rev. O. F. Smith with as good results as could be reasonably expected from a school thus interrupted.

FALL AND WINTER TERMS—John H. Quimby. He proved himself competent to maintain order and to instruct in this large school. His work was very satisfactory to both parents and superintendent.

#### DISTRICT No. 5.

SUMMER AND FALL TERMS—Ethel G. Quinn. These schools were profitable ones, for teacher and scholars worked faithfully. We find some of the best pupils in town in these small schools.

WINTER TERM—Lois P. Hatch. Miss Hatch is a teacher of experience, who gives her attention to the practical as well as to the technical work in all branches. This was a good school.

#### DISTRICT No. 6.

SPRING TERM-John H. Quimby.

FALL TERM-Harry S. Baker.

WINTER TERM - Wilbert A. Libby.

In the summer and fall this school is very small as the older scholars attend the Free High School. The poor attendance of many of the scholars hinders the work in this school to a great extent. The school room is a hindrance to the teacher and scholars since no instructor can do as good work in this room as in one properly arranged. I urge the matter of reseating this room during the coming school year.

#### DISTRICT No. 7.

In the spring the primary scholars were taught by Mrs. Jennie S. George in the church vestry, the school building being occupied by Free High School. Mrs. George conducted both grades in the fall and her ability as a teacher is unquestionable. This was a very satisfactory school. Vocal music was taught with success. Would there were more teachers who would give this subject their attention for a short time daily.

WINTER TERM—Orville C. Voter. Mr. Voter came to us highly recommended, being a graduate of Farmington Normal School. Special work was done in geometry and algebra while nature work received careful attention.

#### DISTRICT No. 8.

Miss Lois P. Hatch taught summer and fall schools here. This is a wide-awake school. All of the scholars seem to realize the object for which they attend and profit accordingly.

Miss Susie L. Hincks taught the winter school. All branches pursued showed careful attention and advancement in all grades could be perceived. A new clock adorns the wall in this room, an evidence of interest and zeal shown by the friends of this school.

#### DISTRICT No. 9.

SUMMER AND FALL TERMS-Beulah C. Bates.

WINTER TERM-Nellie Rogers.

This small school is a working body and we find no more marked improvement in town than here.

#### CORNER DISTRICT.

Miss Nellie Appleton, in the spring, put forth her best efforts for advancement in this school. The teaching was enthusiastic, practical and thorough and all attending school must have been profited.

The Free High School was held here in the fall and the primary scholars were transported to District No. 3.

Mr. Charles C. Phillips, in the winter, continued his work as a teacher in this school. Special advancement was made in history, reading and algebra. The school at my last visit was in good order and all seemed to have improved during the term.

#### FREE HIGH SCHOOL.

These schools were successful ones. The work of both terms was "onward and upward." All scholars attending were of advanced grade. We regret exceedingly that all High School scholars in town did not avail themselves of the privileges thus given them of pursuing the higher branches.

Mr. J. O. Whitcomb, a member of the senior class of the U. of M., taught the spring term at East Orrington, and Mr. D. H. Perkins, a classmate of Mr. Whitcomb's, taught the fall term at Orrington Corner. The instruction in both schools was along the same lines—critical and practical—and both schools were well disciplined.

In closing I wish to call your attention to a few of the school rooms in town that need repairs during the coming year. A new ceiling is needed in District No. 1, a new stove in District No. 5, and extensive repairs in District No. 6, including new seats. Some of the school rooms need paint and a few chimneys need attention. Many of these repairs are necessary for preservation of school property, and as the money paid for cleaning must now come from repair fund, I urge respectfully a larger appropriation for that purpose for year 1900.

I feel very grateful to the teachers for their pleasant acquiescence to all demands upon them and to all the friends who, by their good wishes and helpful words, have aided me through this, my first year of work in this capacity. Hoping my many mistakes may be pardoned, and that my inexperience may be an excuse for some, I am

# REPORT OF BOARD OF HEALTH.

Considerable has been done in a quiet way to disseminate information in regard to contagious diseases and the best way to prevent their spread. In about every case the people of this town are willing to assist in every way possible the Board of Health in its efforts to restrict the spread of such diseases.

Only a few cases of contagious disease have appeared during the past year and in each case it has been confined to the house where it originated and no deaths have occurred as a result of such diseases.

The State Board of Health is doing a grand work, and through the local boards, the results of such work is being seen and felt in every community of our State.

With new and better methods of prevention, each year being more successful, by the greater willingness on the part of the people to adopt the same, also by better and safer means of disinfection, we may confidently hope that the time is not far distant when a deadly epidemic of any contagious disease will be a thing of the past.
