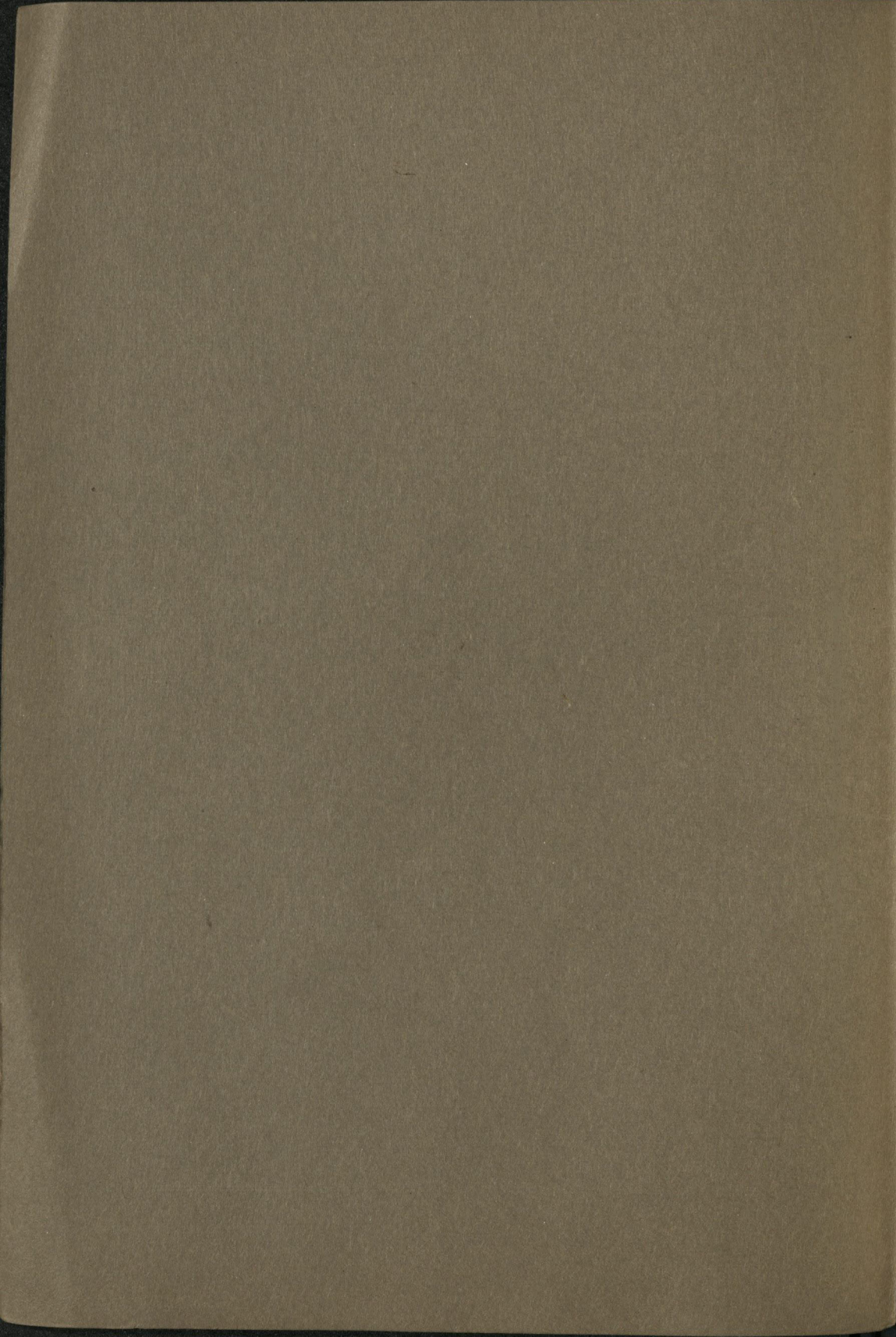

# WARRANT

---

To E. M. Crowell, a Constable in the Town of Orrington,  
Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Orrington, qualified by law to vote in town affairs to assemble at the town house in said town, on Monday, the eighth day of March, next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To act on report of selectmen.
- Art. 4. To act on report of superintendent of schools.
- Art. 5. To act on report of board of health.
- Art. 6. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year including one or more road commissioners and fix their compensation.
- Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to elect its selectmen, assessors and overseers of poor, one for one year, one for two years, and one for three years, and one for three years each thereafter.
- Art. 8. To grant and raise money for support of schools, the poor, mothers' aid, the repair of roads and bridges, for patrol maintenance, the repair of school houses and to defray all other town charges.
- Art. 9. To see if the town will vote a sum of money for Memorial purposes,

Art. 10. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State aid, as provided in Section 19, of Chapter 25, of the revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 11. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$553.00 for the improvement of the section of State Aid Road as outlined in the report of State Highway Commission in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of the ways, highways and bridges, the above amount being the maximum amount which the town is allowed to raise, under the provision of Section 18, of Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 12. To see if the town will instruct its treasurer, to loan the credit of the town to defray town charges not to exceed \$4,000.00 if necessary.

Art. 13. (By request) To see if the town will vote to expend \$200.00 of the regular Road Fund in carting gravel on the road leading from East Orrington to So. Brewer.

Art. 14. (By request). To see if the town will vote to instruct its road commissioner to expend \$350.00 of the regular Road Fund on the the road from the end of the New Road, so-called, to the Red Bridge.

Art. 15. By Petition of William H. Phillips and twelve others; To see if the town will vote to appropriate \$500.00 for the purpose of graveling the road known as the Club House road from the main highway to the town landing.

Art. 16. To see if the town will grant and raise the sum of three hundred dollars, for repairs of the road at So. Orrington, between the corner near Geo. R. Stubbs' residence and the Bucksport line.

Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the old Pott-  
ery road from the new Brooks road to the Penobscot river.

Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen  
to appoint one or more men to cut and burn bushes, useless trees,  
shrubs, weeds etc. growing between the road limit and the wrought  
part of any highway in town, and to set aside 5% of the money  
raised for ways and bridges for said purpose as required by law.

Art. 19. "By request" To see if the town will vote to raise  
\$150.00 for turnpiking and graveling the road from the Dow road to  
East Orrington school house.

Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to buy or build one or more  
snow rollers and raise money for same.

Art. 21. To see what action the town will take in relation to the  
maintenance of the Corner, Pond, and Center schools.

Art. 22. (By request) To see if the town will vote to turnpike  
and gravel the Hinks road from the foot of Fowles hill to the Bog  
bridge and raise money for the same not to exceed \$200.00.

Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to raise or appropriate a sum  
of money on the 50-50 plan not to exceed \$200.00 to turnpike and  
gravel the Pond road from the hill north of Chas. Seavey's to the  
East Orrington road.

Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$150.00  
from James T. Wiswell the income to be used for the perpetual care  
of the Eben and James T. Wiswell, lots in North Orrington Cemetary.

Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Francis A. Snow, the income to be used for the perpetual care of her lot in North Orrington Cemetary.

Art. 26. To see what action the town will take in regard to the letting and care of town hall.

## Superintendent of Schools' Report

---

*To the Superintending School Committee and the Citizens of the town of Orrington:*

I have the honor to herewith submit for your consideration my second annual report of the condition and progress of the public schools of Orrington for the municipal year ending February 16, 1920.

I would respectfully call your attention to the financial statements for the year just ending which will be found at the end of this report.

### REPAIRS

The Snow's Corner, Pond, Pierces and Nickerson buildings are in good condition. This year the walls and ceiling at the Nickerson building have been papered.

New hyloplate blackboards have been placed in the Pond, Pierces, Snow's Corner, Nickerson, Center, East Orrington and South Orrington buildings. Some of the buildings will need new boards next year.

The interior of the buildings at the Center, King, East Orrington, and South Orrington are very much in need of repair. The walls should be papered or painted and the ceilings whitened. Some new floors are needed.

If the Corner school is to be opened next year the lighting should be changed, and the room should have fresh paint and paper.

All the toilets are in bad condition. I believe a greater amount of moral—more than physical—disease is contracted from these buildings in their present condition.

### HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS

During the past Fall term we have had twenty-seven pupils in Bangor High School, and four at E. M. C. Seminary. We have three pupils in Brewer High School, one at Bar Harbor High School

and one at Augusta High School. The bills from these towns had not come in when the books were closed. Fourteen pupils passed the State examination last Spring. Twelve of these are attending High School.

### COURSE OF STUDY

We are using the new State Course of Study which is of great help to the teachers. The pupils in the lower grades have made marked progress in reading. The teachers seem to be able to do much better work with the New Education system. Nearly all the schools now have Firman's Lessons in English which is proving very satisfactory. By taking the books from one school to another we are able to keep all the classes well supplied with supplementary readers.

### MUSIC

Special instruction in Music should be given in all our schools at least once a week. With this help the teachers would be able to carry on the work each day. It might be possible to obtain the services of the Music Teacher in the Brewer or Bucksport schools for one day each week. A new victrola was purchased by the League at the King School last year. Six of the schools now have victrolas.

### TEACHERS

We have been fortunate in having very good instruction in all our schools the past year. I believe that it would be well to keep as many of these teachers as possible. In order to do this we must advance the wages now paid. I feel that it would be very poor economy to do otherwise. We have been severley hampered in attendance this Fall because of the prevalence of contagious diseases. For the year ending July 1, 1919 we were able to maintain 33 weeks of school.

## CO-OPERATION

This is an opportune time to bring to the attention of the parents the necessity of co-operating with the teacher. I find—in most cases—the children who do the best work in school are children whose parents are most loyal to the teacher. We invite honest criticism. If any thing is wrong I feel sure that a teacher, who is approached in a nice way, will be only too glad to adjust it. I find almost no visits from parents in any of the schools this year. A visit from the parent is an inspiration to both the pupil and the teacher. The average parent is in touch with the school only from the view point of the child.

I would strongly appeal to the parents to see that the children attend school regularly. I am convinced that regular attendance is the most important factor in making an efficient school system. Without it any teacher is powerless.

We have high ideals for the schools of Orrington, but we cannot attain these without the frank co-operation of parents and citizens. Think on these things.

## CONCLUSION

In closing, I wish to thank the teachers for their faithful work, the parents for their co-operation, and the town officials and school board for their sympathetic support.
