

## Warrant

To E. M. Crowell, a Constable, in the Town of Orrington,

Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Orrington, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House in said town on Monday, the thirteenth day of March next at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To act on the report of the Treasurer, Selectmen and Overseers of Poor.

Art. 4. To act on the report of the Board of Health.

Art. 5. To act on the report of the Superintendent of Schools.

Art. 6. To fix the compensation of the following town officers for the ensuing year: Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of Poor, Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Road Commissioners, Sealer of Weights and Measures and any others that may be deemed necessary.

Art. 7. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 8. To grant and raise money for the support of schools, books and supplies, repair of school property, tuition, support of poor, mothers' aid, repair of roads and bridges and pay of snow bills, patrol maintenance, pay of town officers, miscellaneous expenses and any other town charges.

Orrington I

Art. 9. To see if the town will grant and raise a sum of money for memorial purposes.

Art. 10. To see if the town will vote "yes" or" no" on the question of appropriation and raise money necessary to entitle the town to State-aid as provided in Section 19 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 11. To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$533.00 for the improvement of the section of State-aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of the ways, highways and bridges, the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provision of Section 18 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Art. 12. To see if the town will grant and raise the sum of \$500.00 for the repair of the road to Brewer Lake, or to see what sum it will raise for same, if any.

Art. 13. To see if the town will vote to buy a road machine, and and raise money for the same.

Art. 14. "By request." To see if the town will vote to purchase one or more snow-plows from the Northern Trailer Co., and raise money for the same.

Art. 15. To see if the town will accept the sum of \$50.00, the income from the same to be used for the perpetual care of the Joseph B. Ryder burial lot in Oak Hill Cemetery.

Art. 16. To see if the town will accept the sum of \$50.00, the income from the same to be used for the perpetual care of the Alfred Baker burial lot in Oak Hill Cemetery.

Art. 17. To see if the town will accept the sum of \$50.00, the income from the sume to be used for the perpetual care of the Joseph D. Baker burial lot in Oak Hill Cemetery.

Art. 18. (By request). To see what action, if any, the town will take in regard to the schoolhouse and lot at Snow's Corner.

Art. 19. To see if the town will accept the sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000.00) same to be held in trust forever, the principal to be invested carefully and re-invested by successive Boards of Selectmen, and the income from the same to be annually used to help the worthy poor of the town, or for any other object of Public Charity which the inhabitants of the town may decide upon at the annual meeting of the town.

This amount, with above conditions, is bequeathed to the town of Orrington by Elhanan W. Burns.

Art. 20. To see if the town will accept the sum of four thousand dollars, (\$4,000.00), to be used in the erection and equipment of a suitable building for a library and gymnasium for the school at East Orrington Village.

The above amount, with conditions, was bequeathed to the town of Orrington by Elhanan W. Burns.

Art. 21. To see if the town will accept the residue of the estate of said Elhanan W. Burns, real, personal and mixed, a reasonable portion of the same, unless all should be required, to be used for the purchase of books for the library and apparatus for the gymnasium in said Burns Memorial Building, and the balance if there be one to be invested and the income annually used and the principal, if necessary, for additional books and apparatus.

Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to instruct its Treasurer to loan the credit of the town, if necessary, to defray town charges, not to exceed \$4,000.00.

Art. 23. To see if the town will instruct the Selectmen in regard to the Hampden and Orrington Ferry.

Art. 24. To see if the town will vote to raise or appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to be used jointly, on the 50-50 plan, with the State Highway Commission in repairs on the Dow Road.

Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to raise or appropriate a sum of money for repairs on the Town Hall and town stable.

Art. 26. To see what action the town will take in regard to the care and letting of the Town Hall and stable.

Art. 27. To see what action the town will take relative to paying \$75.00 per year for each pupil in High School.

Art. 28. To see if the town will accept the list of jurors as revised by the Selectmen and Treasurer.

Art. 29. To see if the town will accept the sum of \$50.00, the income from the same to be used for the perpetual care of the Marcellus Hoben burial lot in Pine Hill Cemetery.

Art. 30. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the repair of the Brewer Lake Road or Club House Road, so called.

Art. 31. To see if the town will vote to raise or appropriate a sum of money for the repair of the Thayer Road, from the corner near George L. Byard's to the Bucksport town line, providing Frank Betts will furnish the gravel for same.

The Selectmen will be in session, for the purpose of revising the list of voters, at the Town Hall at nine o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.

## **Report of Superintendent of Schools**

#### To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of the Town of Orrington:

It gives me pleasure to submit to you my fourth annual report of the condition and progress of the Public Schools of Orrington for the municipal year ending February 15, 1922. It is my hope that this report will be of assistance to you in making proper preparation for the school system for the ensuing year.

#### REPAIRS

The walls and ceilings of the Pierce and Snow's Corner buildings were painted last year, and the seats varnished. The underpinning at Pierce's was repaired. The Snow's Corner building had new steps. A wire fence was built around the Nickerson school lot. The Orrington Corner building was papered and painted, the blackboards painted and seats varnished. The outbuildings at Center and East Orrington have been repaired. The shed and toilets at King were repaired last year.

#### **REPAIRS RECOMMENDED FOR 1922**

The sheds at King, Pond, Center and Orrington Corner are in bad condition. New sheds will soon have to be built at King and Pond. The sheds at Orrington Corner and Center can be repaired. New sheds should be built according to the State plan and the toilet connected with the school room by a covered passageway.

The banking boards need to be repaired. A new flag pole is needed at Snow's Corner. The lighting at the Nickerson School should be changed, and the toilet connected with the school room by a covered passageway.

#### HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS

At the beginning of the year there were 47 pupils in High School. Forty at Bangor High School, five at Brewer High School, and two at East Maine Conference Seminary. Eleven pupils completed the elementary work last spring. Eighteen pupils will be ready for High School next fall. Most of the pupils in High School do creditable work. The tuition at Bangor High School is \$75.00 per year. Last year the town paid \$60.00 per year for each pupil in High School. We would suggest that the town pay the full tuition of pupils in High School next year. This amount not to exceed \$75.00.

Education is the debt that maturity owes to youth. We have the interest of the boys and girls of Orrington at heart and wish to give them a chance to develop into useful, self-supporting citizens.

#### HEALTH CRUSADE

At the beginning of the winter term the Modern Health Crusade was introduced into the schools and the pupils are doing good work with it. The Health Crusade is under the direction of the Maine Public Health Association. The idea is to promote healthy habit by a series of chores or duties. The health of a child should come before his education. During the spring term it may be possible to have the services of Miss Smith, the Penobscot County Red Cross Nurse.

#### TEACHERS

Ten teachers were employed last year. On the whole the work accomplished was very satisfactory. Edna Burrill taught two terms at East Orrington, and Grace Lord one term. Nettie Swazey taught one term at Orrington Center, and Gladys Stickney two terms. Frequent changes in the teaching force tend to lessen the efficacy of the work. The teachers at Pond, King, Pierce's, and Snow's Corner have been in these positions two years.

The number of visits by parents and citizens have been very small during the year. This is to be regretted since such visits are usually productive of better work on the part of both pupil and teacher.

#### TIME FOR CHILDREN TO ENTER SCHOOL

One great difficulty in our school work comes in the first grade. The children enter school from five to seven years of age. Because of this difference in their ages, the children of six and seven years of age develop much more rapidly than those who are five years of age. A child should not be retarded in his progress neither should he be driven beyond his physical or mental endurance. Many of the children who enter at five years have to spend two years in the same grade. During the second year they are not far enough advanced to do second grade work, and can do better work than the children who have just entered school. It is not possible to keep these repeaters busy, consequently they form the habit of being idle. So much depends on the start a child has. If he has developed enough mentally to derive some benefit from his work he will always have an interest in school and make good progress. There are four or five pupils in the Orrington schools, between the ages of fifteen and sixteen, who are doing almost nothing in school. The new State Law compels children to attend school until sixteen years of age unless they have passed sixth grade. These pupils would do better work if they had had the right start and had not been promoted each year regardless of whether they were qualified or not. When a child's school life begins it does not end until he leaves school to go to work. Between the ages of five and six years a child should spend as much time in the open air as possible in order to grow strong and rugged. I appeal to the parents to give this matter serious thought.

#### CONCLUSION

In closing I wish to thank the Superintending School Committee, other town officers, citizens and teachers for the courteous treatment accorded me during the year, and for their evident desire to advance the educational interests of Orrington.
