waiting for that "original inscription." The very idea of being original at this point scares me stiff, my mind running along "Martha" tracks very decidedly just now. "Casco" his author will be proud that he is in the Maine Author Collection.

No, I am not Maine born, but British born hence a lover of the sea & the coast in all their phases - & of course of Maine. The incident of the baby seal & the long-nosed collie is quite true. I saw snapshots of them together & learned all my facts while staying at Casco Bay. Unfortunately, the true story is that the baby died in spite of the care, because he was too young. Poetic license justified the making of Casco reach the age of six weeks before he lost his mother. The fact about the richness of cats' milk I gleaned at Boothbay fish hatchery - the trouble is it would take an untold number of cats to feed a baby seal!!
