

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Introduction

The Occupational Employment Statistics (OES) survey produces occupational employment and wage estimates on a semi-annual basis for the nation, each of the 50 states, and most metropolitan statistical areas (MSA). Areas that are not part of an MSA are covered in Balance of State areas.

Estimates are coded into the U.S. Office of Management and Budget's **Standard Occupational Classification (SOC)** system, consisting of 821 detailed occupations, 449 broad occupations, 96 minor groups, and 23 major groups. While not all 821 detailed occupations are represented in Maine, this report contains over 600 occupational entries at the statewide level.

The May 2003 OES estimates are based on data collected during the May 2003, November 2002, 2001, and 2000 surveys, plus a subset of certainty units collected in 1999. Employment estimates are benchmarked to the average employment of May 2003 and November 2002. Wage estimates are updated to the May 2003 reference quarter using the Employment Cost Index (ECI) for each ECI occupational group.

Explanation of the Tables

Tables for Maine (statewide), the metropolitan statistical areas (MSAs) of Bangor, Lewiston-Auburn, and Portland; the cross-state primary metropolitan statistical area (PMSA) of Portsmouth-Rochester NH-ME, and two balance of state areas are provided. Occupations are sorted by occupational code, arranged by job function within the 23 major occupational groups. An alphabetical listing is provided at the end of this publication.

The Northeast and Southwest Balance of State areas represent an extension to the official Occupational Employment Statistics data series. They are useful for estimating occupational employment or wage rates in areas that fall outside the boundaries of metropolitan statistical areas.

The following column headers are used in the tables:

- SOC Code the Standard Occupational Classification code which identifies each occupation.
- Estimated Employment this represents estimated employment in the occupation for the survey reference period.
- Mean (Average) weighted average; estimated total wages for an occupation divided by its weighted employment.
- 10th Percentile 10 percent of all employees in this occupation earn less and 90 percent earn more.
- 25th Percentile 25 percent of all employees in this occupation earn less and 75 percent earn more.

- 50th Percentile also called the median, or mid-point; one-half of the employees in this occupation earn less than this amount and one-half earn more.
- 75th Percentile 75 percent of all employees in this occupation earn less and 25 percent earn more.
- 90th Percentile- 90 percent of all employees in this occupation earn less and 10 percent earn more.
- % Relative Error of Mean Wage the percentage in which the true mean wage might differ from the published mean. For example, a relative error of 3.8 would indicate that the actual mean wage could vary from the published mean wage by up to 3.8 percent, higher or lower, at a 68 percent confidence level.
- % Relative Error of Employment the percentage in which the true employment might differ from the published employment estimate. For example, a relative error of 11.3 would indicate that the actual employment could vary from the published employment estimate by up to 11.3 percent, higher or lower, at a 68 percent confidence level.

Sample

The sampling frame for the May 2003 OES survey was the 2nd Quarter 2002 Employment, Wages, and Contributions (ES-202) Report covered by the Maine Employment Security Law. Owners of unincorporated firms (sole proprietorships and partnerships) and those who are self-employed were excluded. Data on occupational employment and wages are collected from employers of every size in all areas of the state and in all industry divisions. The May 2003 sample consisted of 1,404 units (after adjusting for out-of-business units) representing 53,607 workers. Of these, we received usable responses from 1,086 units (77.35 percent) representing 44,656 workers (83.30 percent).

Wage Collection

Wages for the OES survey are straight-time, gross pay, exclusive of premium pay. **Included** are base rate, cost-of-living allowances, longevity pay, guaranteed pay, hazardous-duty pay, incentive pay including commissions and production bonuses, tips, and on-call pay. **Excluded** are back pay, jury duty pay, overtime pay, severance pay, shift differentials, nonproduction bonuses, profit sharing, attendance, holiday and year-end bonuses, and tuition reimbursements.

The OES survey collects wage data in 12 intervals. Employers report the number of employees in an occupation per each wage range. The wage intervals are as follows:

Data Limitations

The wage ranges used in the OES program are open-ended at both the lower and upper spectrum, the lowest range being less than \$6.75 per hour and the highest range being \$70.00 and over per hour. The lowest range has a low boundary equal to the minimum wage, which was \$6.25 in Maine as of January 1, 2003. The highest wage range is open-ended, which presents certain limitations in calculating wage rates above \$70.00 per hour. Enhancements to the wage estimation procedures allow for mean wage calculations up to \$101.44 per hour (\$211,000 per year), however percentile wage calculations are limited to \$70.00 per hour (\$145,600 per year).

There are several possible reasons why certain data elements do not appear in the tables:

- Data for percentile values over \$70.00 per hour or mean values over \$101.44 per hour are not provided.
- Some employment estimates have relative errors greater than 50 percent. This suggests that the estimate is not reliable, and thus "na" has been inserted in the employment estimate and the relative error fields, meaning "not available."
- Data that do not meet statistical validity or publication standards are not provided.
