NOTES

Average Wage: The weighted average computed by multiplying each rate by the number of workers receiving that rate then dividing by the total number of workers in the trade.

Median Wage: Literally, the middle rate; that is no more than half the workers in a trade earn less and no more than half the workers earn in excess of this figure.

TECHNICAL NOTES

Rates shown in this publication should not be confused with rates issued with any determination under the Minimum Wage Rate on Construction Projects Law. There are two major differences between this data and the determined rates. The industry groups differ significantly. For this publication, the Standard Industrial Classification (SIC) system Major Industry Groups are used. Prevailing wage determinations, on the other hand, cross SIC groups. Also, no rate is set for a trade having less than 10 workers statewide, but data is shown here for trades with fewer than 10 workers if it was judged to be usable and its publication does not violate confidentiality restrictions.

Maine Construction Wage Rates 1986

The Maine Construction Wage Survey is conducted annually under the Prevailing Wage Rate on Construction Projects Law. The major purpose of the survey is to provide accurate hourly wage rates by trade for State-funded construction projects. The 1986 survey had an initial mailing of 1,395 construction firms. Data from 746 respondents was used to produce the 1987 wage determinations and, subsequently, this publication. There were 380 unused reports having fewer than five employees during the survey period. The remaining 67 received, but not used, were out of business or no longer operating in the State of Maine. The data shown is based on 13,596 workers or about 46% of the estimated 29,900 employed in the Construction Industry Division in September 1986.

The industry-wide average hourly wage for 1986 was \$8.70. This is 8.6% higher than the 1985 average of \$8.01. The overall higher average wage is due to an increase in the average hourly rates in approximately two-thirds of the occupations.
