PLOWING UNDER GREEN CLOPS FOR MANURE. A correspondent of the Now York Cribune, residing in the West, relates e ollowing interesting experiment:

We have plowed under crops of cloer for crops of wheat at various times, eccived more benefit from the first rop turned under green, than from oth crops turned under when dry. I refer the green crop of cover to any other dressing for wheat. In the sumher of 1849 we rolled down and plowed under one acre of octs, when in the milky state, for manure for wheat. On his we sowed two bushels of broom orn seed, and harrowed well. When he broom corn attained an average neight of five feet, and as thick on the ground as it could possibly grow to advantage-perhaps ten tuns or more to the acre-we plowed that under, toc, and sowed wheat. On adjoining land in the same field we cut the oats when ripe, fifty but hels per sere, and hauled all cif ex e t the stubble. This we at the same time as the other.
