She has published volumes of verse and prose and has written serials for adults and children.

Being greatly interested in natural history, she made a special study of the history of the Pine Tree State and the legends of Maine Indians.

The juvenile peace society PEACE MAKERS was originated and organized by Miss Douglas.

She had no training in writing and says "All my poems and stories are the result of inspiration."

Dear Friend: A few years ago I suggested to Mr. Lunnack that it would be well to have collected in the State Library poetry (published or not) written by Maine poets, and he gave me permission to collect the same. The errand a few was widely published in Maine papers and much verse came to me, which I will try to send to you soon. He told me that when I purchased a book needed the library would pay for this.
