Miss Adalena F. Lyster who for several years wrote under the pen-name Saturnia was born in Cape Elizabeth, now South Portland, March 27, 1857. She has always lived on the Lyster homestead which has been in the family for eight generations; ever since it was ~~inhabited~~ occupied by white men.

She is the daughter of Greeley H. and Mary Quinby Lyster; and is a direct descendant on her father's side of Mr. William Lyster of Cape Cod and Edward Small, one of Portland's first settlers. And in her mo-
