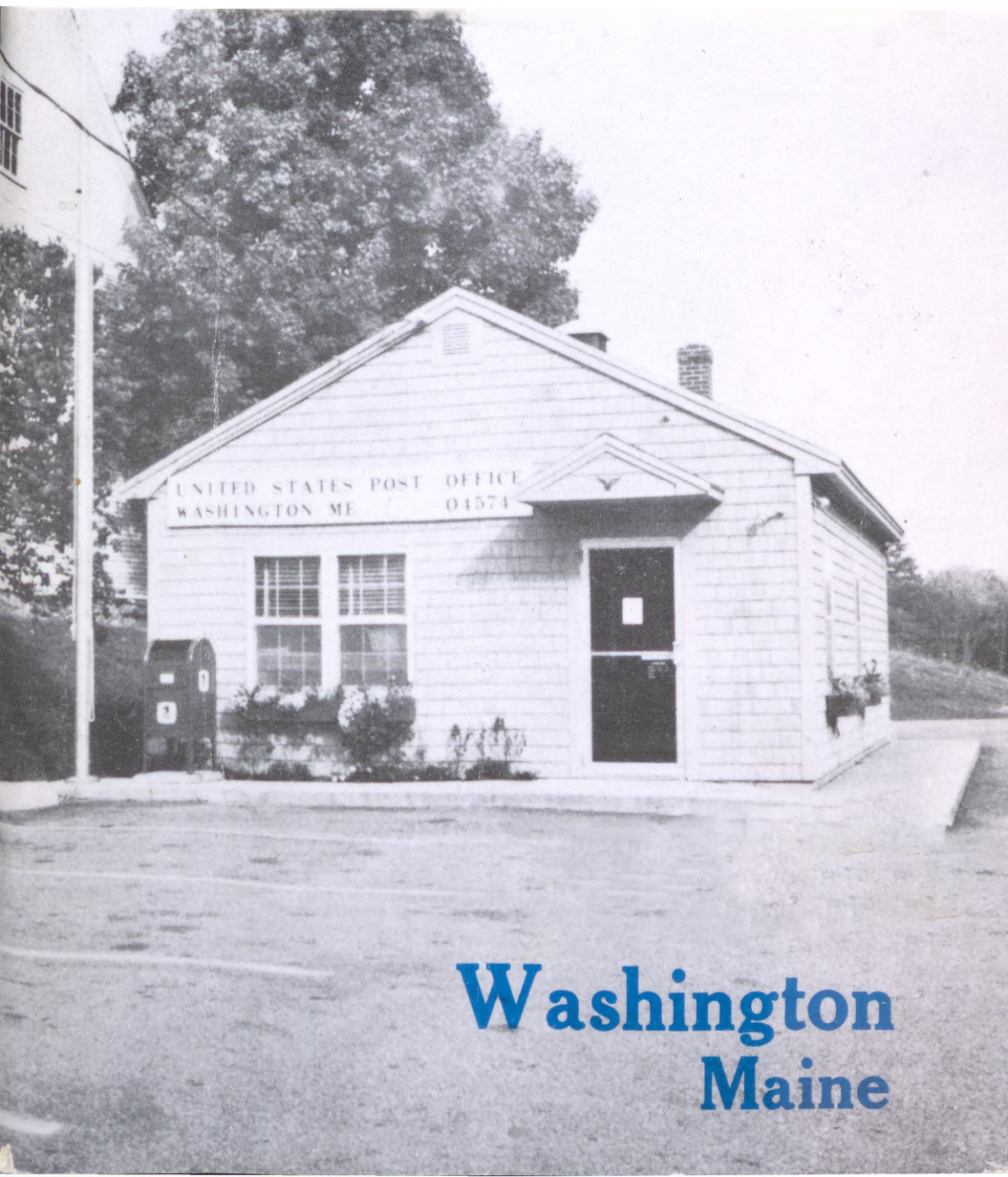

Selectmen's Message

In 1979 I mentioned that Washington is a growing community. The 1980 Census population count is 958. This is about a 28% increase in the last ten years. The 1980 State Valuation set by the State Tax Assessor is \$15,600,000.

Of concern to all taxpayers is the Highway Funding Proposals being considered by the Maine State Legislature. Bills being presented include a proposal to return all or most of State Aid summer road maintenance to towns. We already have the winter maintenance. They project Washington will have over 13 miles returned for summer and winter maintenance. A block-type grant is also proposed, but the amount is far below the amount needed to maintain these roads. I feel if this law is passed as now proposed, it could be a heavy burden for the taxpayers of Washington, not to mention the responsibility involved. If you, too, are concerned, I urge you to call your legislators listed in the front of this Town Report.

Even in this high inflationary period we managed to close most accounts with a balance forward. Our recommendations for the 1981 budget has a total far less than 1980. However, it worries me that the voters give a 5% discount for taxes when by the law the Assessors cannot assess over 5% of the commitment for Overlay. If every taxpayer decided to take their discount, we could "come up short" at the end of the year as we would not be taking in as much as we are spending. Washington is one of the few towns who still offers a discount for prompt payment of taxes. I agree with this idea. But, should we really give away more than we're collecting? Perhaps a smaller discount would be more advisable.

May I take this opportunity to thank all who have assisted me in many, many ways during the year.

Road Commissioner's Report

After an early spring, washouts were filled and roads graded. Work was started on the Skidmore Bridge. The old planks and beams were removed and sand blasting was done on the steel beams. We painted and replaced wood beams and plank. Also planks on the Bump Hill Bridge were replaced.

Grading was done by a power grader in the spring and calcium placed on improved roads. Fall grading was done by the truck-drawn grader.

Culverts were placed on the Mountain, Dorman, Med-o-Lark and Prescott roads. Gravel was put on Prescott, County, Mountain, Fitch, Nelson Ridge, Sprague, Skidmore, and Dorman Roads.

Some ditching was done on Crystal Lake, Fitch, and Skidmore Roads. Road patching was done at three different times during the year. Brush cutting was done on the Mountain and County Roads, the rest of the town roads being mowed with a tractor. This account needs to be increased to control bushes coming back on the roads that have been cut.

Tarring money was spent on Leigher and Bump Hill Roads.

In 1981, I foresee culverts needing to be replaced on Mountain and several other roads.

Resurfacing roads with gravel needs to be done on several of the roads that have been improved. Retarring town roads needs to be increased more to keep them in good condition.

Mid-Coast Regional Planning Commission

The Eastern Mid-Coast Planning Commission is a voluntary association of towns, cities and counties serving 32 communities in Knox and Waldo Counties. Each member may appoint two voting representatives to the Commission. A five member Executive Committee, elected from these representatives, meets approximately monthly to direct the activities of the Commission.

The paid staff of the Commission includes a Planning Director, Planner, and Secretary/Administrative Assistant. Commission offices are located at 10 Summer Street, Rockport, and are open from 8:00 A.M. to 4:00 P.M. (tel. 236-8408). The annual budget for 1979-80 was \$46,777,000.00 about 17% from local membership payments.

During 1980, the Commission has been working on a two-year contract with the Department of Environmental Protection under the "208" Areawide Water Quality Management Program. This Program will study solid waste, septage, and related water quality problems. The EMCPC has assisted Owl's Head, St. George and Vinalhaven under the Coastal Zone Management Program to amend their Shoreland Zoning Ordinances. We are assisting Matinicus in obtaining a more economical electric generation system.

The Commission is preparing a Transit Development Plan for public transportation and will be cooperating with the Maine Department of Transportation to review Annual Operations Plans for publicly assisted transportation in Knox and Waldo Counties. The Commission has a 19 member Transportation Committee. We have worked closely with the directors of the Coastal Bus Service to provide public bus service in Camden, Rockport, and Rockland.

Local assistance requested by the towns has included preparation of ordinances and maps, and review of subdivision proposals. Monthly newsletters are sent to area towns and occasional meetings are held on topics of interest to the public.

The Commission has proposed revisions of the DEP solid waste regulations to provide incentives for municipal recycling and reduce costs. These are still under review by the DEP.

The Commission cooperates closely with the Eastern Maine Development District on matters affecting economic development and is currently reviewing economic development proposals for Waldo

County. We are a sponsor of the Time and Tide Resource Conservation and Development District and have been involved with projects of mutual interest.

TITLE 36 SECTION 706 MRSA:

Before making an assessment, the Assessors may give seasonable notice in writing to all persons liable to taxation in the municipality to furnish to the Assessors TRUE AND PERFECT LISTS of all their estates, not by law exempt from taxation, of which they were possessed on the first day of April of the same year.

The notice to owners may be by mail directed to the **last known address** of the taxpayer or by any other method that provides reasonable notice to the taxpayer.

If any person after such notice does not furnish such list, he is thereby barred of his right to make application to the Assessors or the County Commissioners for any abatement of his taxes, unless he furnishes such list with his application and satisfies them that he was UNABLE to furnish it at the time appointed.

The Assessors may require the person furnishing the list to make oath to its truth. They may also require him to answer, in writing, all proper inquiries as to the nature, situation, and value of his property, liable to be taxed in the State. The Assessors are not bound to accept such list and answers as final.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS

“Present market cost” refers to the cost to the owner at today’s market prices PLUS FREIGHT, regardless of the original invoice cost.

Boats are taxable in the municipality in which the owner is a resident, or in the municipality in which the boat is situated, if the owner is a non-resident of the State of Maine.

- (2) Was a legal resident of this State when entering military service; or
- (3) Has notified in writing the assessors of the municipality in which he resides of his claim for exemption and furnished proof of his entitlement on or before April 1 (such notification once made need not be repeated in subsequent years);
- (4) Has reached the age of 62 years; or
- (5) Is receiving a pension or compensation from the United States Government for total disability, either service or non-service connected, as a veteran.

VETERANS' In order for a widow of a veteran, or a member of the armed forces who died while in service during a war time **WIDOWS** period, to be exempt from taxation up to \$4,000 of full valuation in the place of legal residence, she must:

- (1) Be a legal resident of the State of Maine;
- (2) Be the survivor of a veteran who was a legal resident of this State when he entered military service; or
- (3) Have notified in writing the assessors of the municipality in which she resides of the claim for exemption and furnished proof of entitlement on or before April 1 (such notification once made need not be repeated in subsequent years);
- (4) Be unremarried (the divorced wife of a veteran or the remarried widow of a veteran is not eligible for exemption);
- (5) Be herself receiving, regardless of her age, a pension or compensation as a widow of a veteran from the United States Government; or
- (6) Be a widow of a veteran who would be entitled to such exemption if living.

NOTE: When a qualified veteran dies intestate leaving property and is survived by a widow and a minor child or children, they are jointly entitled only to a single exemption of up to \$4,000 of full valuation.

Time & Tide Conservation & Development Report

What is Time & Tide RC&D? We are a people's program. We are sponsored in part by the counties and directed by local people. We are a base for people to come together to plan and carry out projects relating to natural resources. We help people improve their use and care of natural resources.

Your Time & Tide RC&D was selected as the outstanding RC&D in New England for 1980. This was due partly to the volunteer service of the local people and the work that was carried out in the RC&D area by the people.

Examples of completed projects are: Rockland recreation area, Southport ball field, Warren tennis courts, Wiscasset High School athletic field and parking area, Camden-Rockport High School athletic facilities, Owl's Head resource inventory, Rockport Elementary School ball field, firewood buying booklet, forestry-adult education program, Rockland shore erosion, and Waldo Regional Vocational Center fire pond and wildlife area.

The "Program of Action" has been supplemented and brought up to date. Supplement #5 gives a good overview of the Time & Tide RC&D activities. Copies of this booklet were sent to all selectmen/council members, and they are available at the Time & Tide RC&D office, Route #1, Waldoboro, if you are interested.

Some of the projects currently active in the area include: Bath recreation areas, Wiscasset Primary School drainage and erosion control, Oyster River Bog, Boothbay Harbor recreation facilities, Boothbay recreation area development, Waldoboro Town Forest, Camden Hospital nature trail, Damariscotta school nature trail, Dresden ball field, Lincolnville recreation development, Wiscasset recreation center planning, St. George ball field, Belfast drainage and erosion control at the City Park, Camden Snow Bowl, flood plain management study survey on the Medomak and St. George Rivers, Georgetown waterfront, Searsmont community plan, along with many more.

The Time & Tide RC&D has a committee involved in each of the following topics: Forest, Soils & Land Use, Energy, Information, and Recreation and Tourism. The committees have been active and are unique in that anyone interested may serve on one or more com-

mittees. Presently there are over 250 people on committee mailing lists. These are local citizens from Brunswick to Belfast.

The Time & Tide RC&D Council purchased a 35-minute color film, "Land Use - A Moral Dilemma," which can be shown to groups in the Mid Coast area on request.

Civil Emergency Preparedness

Members of the Board of Selectpersons:

Ladies and Gentlemen:

It is with pleasure that I submit this activities report of your Civil Emergency Preparedness Program.

Our parent organization changes with the times and we are now one of several organizations under the umbrella of the Federal Emergency Management Agency. These organizations are gradually strengthening their capabilities for a more effective and coordinated approach to their responsibilities.

Your director has participated in most of the monthly training sessions at the county EOC, covering such subjects as warning, crisis relocation, congregate care facilities, shelter, Maine Yankee Emergency Evacuation Plan, continuity of government, feeding, communications and others.

He also participated in the annual state wide emergency exercise Multi-Ex-80 in September.

A completely new Emergency Operations Plan has been written and awaits proper signatures. This plan is intended to serve as guidelines for our municipal officials in case of a serious emergency.

On behalf of our staff, I would express our sincere appreciation to our municipal officials and their employees, to the county staff and all who have encouraged and supported the program this year.

Kennebec Valley Humane Society

Services of the Kennebec Valley Humane Society provided to the community of Washington:

1) The Connor Animal Shelter (state inspected and approved) is open 7 days a week to serve the public's needs. To maintain its high standards, veterinarians examine all animals admitted to the shelter. Towns served by the Society are entitled to a key to the shelter so that the animal control officer(s) has access at all times.

2) To prevent the problems involved with abandonment of pets, the Connor Shelter imposes no financial barrier to individuals admitting animals to the shelter. This applies only to areas serviced by the Society.

3) Every effort is made to return lost pets to their owners (lost & found service), and to give healthy, placeable animals a second chance at life (adoption program). To help control the area's pet population problem, spaying is required of all female cats and dogs adopted from the shelter.

4) Stray or wild injured animals may be taken to the Pine Tree Veterinary Hospital for medical care. The Society assumes expenses unless the owner is located.

5) Stray animals who need to be held for a 10 day rabies observation may be confined at the Pine Tree Veterinary Hospital. The Society assumes expenses unless the owner is located.

6) When warranted, low-cost rabies vaccination clinics are held in association with area veterinarians.

7) Interest-free spay/neuter loans are available to anyone who wishes to alter their cat or dog. Spaying/neutering helps control the pet population, as well as financially benefiting the owner and the town in licensing dogs.

8) Free euthanasia of newborn litters of cats and dogs is available when they are brought to the shelter before their eyes open. Newborns are not counted as animals admitted to the shelter, so there is no expense to the town.

9) Non-injuring traps suitable for cats and similarly sized animals are available for loan. A deposit is required for private citizens, but the town's animal control officer(s) may sign out a trap without the formality of a deposit. It is advantageous to catch stray cats before they breed and increase the burden to the town.

10) The Society cooperates with towns who impose an “impoundment fee” to owners reclaiming roaming dogs.

11) Educational programs for school or adult groups, along with shelter tours, are available upon request. A public well-informed about the large and costly pet animal problem is essential in reducing the problem.

COMMENTS

Town of Washington
January 1, 1980 to December 31, 1980

An audit has been completed of the financial records of the Town of Washington for the municipal year ended December 31, 1980. The audit included an examination of the records maintained by the various officers of the Town. The examination included a review of cash transactions and an analysis of available funds and expenditures. The results are incorporated in the following text, exhibits and schedules.

ASSETS . . . The cash balance of \$54,198.33 was reconciled with the statement furnished by the Camden National Bank, Camden, Maine, and count of cash on hand.

Taxes receivable of \$33,232.16 consisted of uncollected current year's accounts of \$30,847.09 and unpaid prior years' accounts of \$2,385.07 dating from 1967.

Transactions affecting tax liens and tax acquired property were reviewed. Unpaid accounts were reconciled with the balances shown on the records of the Selectmen.

RESERVES . . . Departmental accounts reflect an unexpended balance of \$45,910.33 being carried forward to the 1981 municipal year in accordance with legal requirements and/or as customary.

SURPLUS . . . The unappropriated surplus of \$49,906.59 at the year's end displayed an increase of \$6,533.12 as compared with the preceding year. An analysis of this increase is shown on Exhibit E.

CASH RESERVE FUND . . . The community building fund with accumulated interest totaled \$1,523.31.

TRUST AND SPECIAL FUNDS . . . The total amount of trust and special fund principals was \$31,215.47 and undistributed income amounted to \$19,637.89. The total principals and income are invested as follows:

SCOPE OF AUDIT . . . The system of internal control was reviewed as pertained to the handling of cash and other matters of financial concern.

An analysis was made of receipts and deposits as well as expenditures and negotiated checks. Vouchers, payrolls and cancelled checks were examined for a selected period.

Excise tax collections were verified with the copies of the receipts retained by the Collector.

In our opinion, subject to the foregoing comments, the accompanying balance sheet and supporting information fairly present the financial position of the Town at December 31, 1980, and result of its operations for the year then ended.

The meeting to act on the remaining articles in the Warrant will reconvene at 7:00 P.M.

ARTICLE 1: To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

ARTICLE 2: To elect all necessary Town Officers by Secret Ballot (with exclusion of Tax Collector).

ARTICLE 3: To choose a Tax Collector.

ARTICLE 4: To authorize the Selectmen to appoint all necessary Town Officers.

ARTICLE 30: To see if the Town will vote to give the snowmobile refund to the Washington Summer Little League.

ARTICLE 31: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sign municipal Quit Claim deeds to property that the Town does not claim as tax acquired property, but on which there are old undischarged liens, which have been paid but not discharged. The purpose of this article is to clear title to property only.

ARTICLE 32: To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to secure temporary Tax Anticipation Loans.

ARTICLE 33: To see if the Town will vote to fix a date when taxes will be due and payable, and fix a rate of interest to be charged on unpaid taxes after this date.

ARTICLE 34: To see if the Town will allow a discount on taxes, and if affirmative vote, to fix a rate and date, and take from surplus the amount to cover discounts.

ARTICLE 35: To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of the Workmen's Compensation Law 31, Revised Statutes of 1954 as amended, and take said sum if necessary to procure an Industrial Accident Insurance Policy from Administration.

ARTICLE 36: To see if the Town will vote to pay state wages for compensation to pay trucks, labor and equipment on public roads for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 37: To see if the Town will vote to hire the Road Commissioner to sand the Town Roads at State Wages with a guaranteed minimum salary of \$5,000.00 for all labor and equipment. Any amount earned over the \$5,000.00 to be paid to Road Commissioner; or to see what action the town will take in regards to sanding Town Roads.

ARTICLE 38: To see what action the Town will take in regards to Plowing the Town Roads.

ARTICLE 39: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell and dispose of property acquired by Tax Liens or other processes on such terms as the Town may decide and execute Quit Claim deeds for same.

ARTICLE 40: To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to procure liability insurance to cover the constable and take necessary amount from Administration.

ARTICLE 41: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to take from surplus the amount of \$20,000.00 to be applied to the school assessment.

ARTICLE 42: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to transfer by deed, title to the Old Town Hall or office, so called, and the land on which it stands to which the town has title located on the north side of Rt. 105 in the Town of Washington to the Washington Historical Society, Inc. in order that the Society may take title to and repair said building.

Any request for an exception to this prohibition shall be submitted in writing to the Selectmen and brought to the whole Town of Washington acting as the body politic, to be voted on by all bona fide voters present in a town meeting.
