FINANCE ADVISORY COMMITTEE ACTIVATED

The newly formed Finance Advisory Committee met Tuesday evening at 7:30 PM June 8 with Jack Barstow, Louis DeAnglis, and Joseph Zaitlin in attendance.

Joseph Zaitlin was elected chairman of the group while Jack Barstow was elected secretary.

Zaitlin was to see Thomas Lee Jr. and Clayton Harding concerning their status with the group.

All agreed that all areas of the Finance Committee would be in a positive manner with the attitude of providing continuity and good business practices for the town.

Town Manager Chris Kent spoke on the purpose of the group, "Essentially it is a Capital Improvement Program which this committee would schedule the acquisitions over \$1000 for a period of six years and continually updating."

He continued, "Inventory forms and requests would be asked of the department heads for only capital items on a yearly basis for a six year period" This means that interviews with the department heads will be scheduled so all capital improvements can be justified and discussed thoroughly with an input from all interested parties.

The Finance Committee can then either recommend or not recommend the capital improvements to the Town Council.

The Committee may avoid the "crisis approach" to situations and purchasing which has happened in the past.

The Town Manager assured the Committee of unlimited assistance from his office.

The next meeting is scheduled for June 22 at 7:30 PM at Loranger School.

Discussion was held concerning one vacancy on the committee. Anyone who is interested is invited to get in contact with the Town Manager, any one on the committee, or any Town Council member.

All members agreed that the job classification forms are too long and too personal. All groups are encouraged strongly to return the forms.

The forms may be changed in the future, to make them cleared and less personal.

The Town Manager named areas which he feels the Citizens Cost Saving Committee might consider A) Centralized Purchasing B) Coat Control C) Department of Public Works D) Fire Department E) Job descriptions F) Pay schedules G) All Areas of crisis situations (not necessarily in order of importance).

Expressed very strongly was the fact that the committee is not to be one of 'head hunting'. Efficiency and maximization of present personnel was the emphasis of the group. All persons are cordially invited to attend.

For the next meeting which is to be June 29 th at 7:00 PM at Loranger School the Department of Public Works is to be invited.

The present foreman plus representatives of the different classifications (heavy equipment operators, light equipment operators, laborers, and truck drivers) are invited to share with the committee the areas they feel could be improved and make to run more efficiently.

They are to be scheduled in half hour periods so that each area is well represented.

The findings and recommendations are to be forwarded to the Town Council so that the Council and Town Manager would be more aware in the hiring of the Superintendent of Public Works/ Town Engineer.

Concerning the position of Superintendent of Public Works/ Town Engineer, it is quite obvious that a full time Super is necessary. Two basic reasons for this position would be: first, to eliminate the cost overruns which amounted to approximately \$50,000 this past year alone and second, to institute some efficient and effective programs such as work programs, maintenance schedules, inhouse professional engineering expertise, equipment replacement programs, and up to date inventories. As for an ordinance change for the installation of this position, that is absurd and not necessary. The Town Manager is still Director of Public Works; the Super would bring the professional administrative touch as well as the engineering finesse (though obviously limited). It is a welcomed addition to the Town.

The Town Manager has been known to umpire a few ballgames in his life. Just last Monday he was seen at the Girl's Softball League game behind home plate (without a mask). Kent was a nine letter man in his high school days in addition to his All State status. He knows something about baseball--cynics!

What about the flags on O.O. St? Is anything going to be done or shall the press publish all the names of those who are not putting them up? Can't we get together on this?

That Girl's Softball field is a beaut. It will be even better when they finish it. The Sue Powers Memorial Field as it is called is a great example of citizen's power. A great "thank you" must go to the dedicated parents who spent their time for this project. From what I hear the project isn't finished perhaps the local merchants can get involved.

School's out. Take care to slow down while driving on our local roads. It seems that Portland Ave., Atlantic Ave., Washington Ave., East and West Grand Aves., and Union Ave tend to be drag strips with quite a few people around. This is a message relayed to me by some concerned citizens. Could we either patrol these more often or set up speed traps? We do not need any more accidents. Life's too dear.

ASPHALT BUNGLE

The Town Council's descision to give the Milestone Foundation a manicure (paving the driveway and cutting trees) would seem at first to be a laudible act of generosity.

Look again and you'll notice your tax dollars being abused again. The total cost of the pruning and paving will be \$600, to be paid by the town. It looks like the council has created a real tar baby--with the tax payers being stuck.

Milestone is definately a worthy organization, and it's parking lot probably needs paving, but funds for this should come from another area.

Milestone, though a non-profit organization, charges it's patients a fee for treatment of alchohllism. The foundation also receives Title 20 funds from the state for those patients who are financially eligible for such help.

Since Milestone is able to pay its staff of doctors, nurses, bookeeper and a director, it should also be able to manage a seperate fund for maintenance or appeal to the state for such a fund.

It seems unfair that the town should help maintain an organization that is really set up to maintain itself.

By voting to pave Milestone's parking lot, the council has also set a precedent for other organizations who might feel the need for paving and tree removal.

The Addage, "If they can do it so can we," could open this town's tax drain even wider.

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MARY'S MORSELS

Well, summer is just about here and fishing boats are appearing on the ocean. I remember one summer, fishermen were catching bluefish by the dozens. Bluefish is delicious, it is a lot like mackerel in texture and taste. I have found the best way to cook bluefish, rather than fry it bake it with vegetables. The following recipe is excellent for bluefish, haddock or mackerel. It is economical and you have a complete meal all in one pan. In the summer weeks to follow I will feature many sea food recipes.

BAKED FISH WITH VEGETABLES (Psari Plaki)

2 lbs. fish fillet
3-4 med size diced pot.
1 large chopped onion
1 can tomatoes(16 oz)
1 tbsp. chopped parsley
2 cups diced celery
2 cups diced carrots
3 tbsp. olive oil
Salt and pepper
Place in large saucepan, onions, parsley, celery, potatoes, carrots, olive oil, salt and pepper and simmer for about 10 minutes. Add your crushed tomatoes and about 3 cups water and let cook for a few minutes. Then pour all these vegetables into a large deep baking pan and bake in oven 350° till vegetables are almost done, now place your fish into this mixture and bake till fish is cooked.

Here is a request for Baked Macaroni with meat sauce, Greek style. In Greek it is called 'Pastitsio' and is a delicious meat to make for any gathering. Serve it with a green salad and I am sure you will get compliments from your family or guests. (I hope you enjoy it Virginia)

BAKED MACARONI WITH MEAT SAUCE

1 lb. elbow macaroni
2 lbs. ground beef
1½ cups grated Romano ch.
1 can tomato paste
2-3 chopped onions
3 eggs
½ lb. butter, melted
salt and pepper
Boil macaroni in water, drain and return it to the same pan. Saute meat with onions, add tomato paste mixed with a little water to thin it out. Cook till meat is done. Pour ½ of the butter over the macaroni and most of the grated cheese (save



some for topping). Add the eggs slightly beaten, salt and pepper to taste and mix macaroni carefully to blend ingredients. Spread half the macaroni in bottom of baking pan 10x15 and cover entirely with the meat sauce. Spread rest of macaroni on top. Cover with cream sauce. The recipe is.

CREAM SAUCE

1 qt. milk dash of salt
2 eggs 4-5 tbsp.corn
½ remain- starch
ing butter

Blend in a saucepan, the milk, butter and corn starch stirring continuously cook over low heat until thickened. Add salt and remove from heat. When slightly cooled add the beaten eggs and mix well. Now spread the cream sauce over the macaroni and sprinkle the rest of the grated cheese. Bake in a moderate oven, about 325° for 40 minutes. Let cool for a few minutes then cut in squares and serve.

This recipe will serve 6 people and there may even be some leftover. You can cut the recipe in half if you wish. It takes a little time to prepare it but I am sure you will know that it was worth while.
