

School Report

To the Superintending School Committee of Carmel:

In accordance with the requirements of the law I hereby submit my first annual report.

Number of schools maintained	8
Number of teachers employed	8
Number of pupils enrolled (common schools)	137

The schools have been retarded a great deal by being closed on account of epidemics, but the interest has been good, the teachers have been very faithful, and good results have been attained.

The seats in many of the schoolhouses are of an obsolete pattern and should be replaced with modern seats adjusted to the pupils.

Several schoolhouses are in need of repairs and one at least should be replaced with a new building, while another needs renovating.

The outbuilding at the village school has been decidedly improved, while the outbuildings at Damascus, Philbrick, Five and North Carmel need remodeling.

The schools are quite well supplied with text books, but the geographies should be exchanged as soon as conditions will permit.

Through the efforts of the Parent Teachers' Association and the co-operation on the part of some of the teachers, it has been possible to place the complete sets of roller maps in three of the schools, while a fund has also been started to place a set in one more school.

As no uniform course of study had ever been adopted for the schools of the town, it seemed best to adopt the State course, and as soon as copies of the same can be secured they will be placed in the hands of each teacher, which will greatly simplify the work of grading and insure uniformity in the work of the school.

A greater interest is needed on the part of the parents and more regularity in the attendance of the pupils.

A comparison of the average attendance of the town with other towns in the County shows the percentage of attendance to be far below what it should be.

The problem of conveyance is another matter that should be considered and some plan adopted to secure a moderate and uniform price.

A B-class high school has been established in accordance with the vote at the last annual meeting, and we are glad to report that the school is a success.

A freshman class consisting of twenty pupils from Carmel and six tuition scholars now makes up the school, which is a much larger number than was estimated.

Under the principalship of Miss Julia J. Tibbetts the pupils have made good progress and have shown a marked improvement in all that pertains to scholarship both in the schoolroom and the street.

Very few of the number now attending could avail themselves of a high school training if a high school were not maintained in their home town.

Scientific apparatus and equipment have recently been installed, which will add greatly to the interest and efficiency of the work.

The school deserves your earnest support, and we trust that the citizens of Carmel will do their duty in the matter and strengthen the work which has been so well begun.

Estimates

The S. S. Com. submit the following estimates for the ensuing year: Common Schools \$2,300; High School \$300; new schoolhouse at Hinckley Hill \$1,200; apparatus and appliances \$50; text books and supplies \$175; repairs of schoolhouses and outbuildings \$50.

Report of the Principal of the High School

The work accomplished by the school has been such as to justify the effort made by the townspeople to maintain this institution and despite the breaks in school work a good freshman year course is in force and will be completed by the close of the school year.

The interest manifested by the pupils to make this school a success is most excellent, and I think fully repays the tax-payers of this community.

In closing, may I remind you that this institution is in need of reference books, furniture, pictures and various other equipments and that any gifts to the school are fully appreciated.
