For Linda's Institute project she worked with her 26-year-old son to advocate for a community living option for him and two other young adults with disabilities who are living in nursing homes in eastern Maine. Linda and her son have designed a fully accessible home with the assistance of an architect, development board and advisory committee. Linda's work has attracted media attention at the local, state and national level, which has furthered fund-raising efforts to support construction of this home. The house will feature built-in ceiling lifts that will allow for easy transfer to and from a wheelchair, wiring for computer access and adapted doors that will allow residents to enter and exit unassisted. Their dream—which Linda is determined to make a reality—is to build a home that provides the opportunity for these young men to achieve greater independence and respect, and participate more fully in their community.
