Bowdoin 'ship-shape' again

CASTINE—The Maine Maritime Academy's schooner *Bowdoin*, the official vessel of the State of Maine, is back making the rounds, and will visit Boothbay Harbor on Thursday and Friday, Sept. 26-27.

The ship will arrive at the Boothbay Harbor Oceanside Golf Resort at 35 Atlantic Avenue, and will be open to the public free from 4 to 6 p.m. on Sept. 26; and from 9 to 10:30 a.m. on Sept. 27.

The ship, used by the late Donald M. MacMillan to explore the Arctic, has been completely renovated at The Shipyard in Boothbay Harbor over an eight-month period.

The academy's flagship, it is at the core of the vessel operations and technology program.

The *Bowdoin* enjoys a long history of seafaring education

and Arctic exploration. The ship has made 28 trips to the Arctic, 25 of them before 1954 under the command of MacMillan.

MacMillan sold *Bowdoin* to the U.S. Navy for use in World War II during the Greenland Patrol. After the war, MacMillan bought the ship back and continued to sail her for nine more years around Greenland. After his retirement the boat belonged to the Schooner *Bowdoin* Association until 1988 when the academy purchased it. The vessel now has been designated a National Historic Landmark.

The public can follow the schooner *Bowdoin* on Facebook at Arctic Schooner *Bowdoin*.

Bowdoin's captain, William McLean, earned a bachelor of science degree in vessel operations and technology at the academy in 2012.

A time to pause

Here we go again. Tonight (9/12) the Town Council will vote on filling the vacancy in its midst. This time, the item is listed right there on the agenda so all can know, attend or watch on cable what the councilors intend to do to correct their mistake at the last session. That's when

EDITORIAL they appointed James R. Morrison, the runner-up in the last election, to the slot only to find a 3-1 vote was one shy of getting the job done.

It's good to see the council reviewing some Town Charter changes that seek to correct what, at best, are ambiguous rules on how such appointments are to be made. The changes, which are subject to voter approval in a referendum vote on Nov. 5, also clarify when a person elected to serve out an unexpired term gets to take office.

All of the eight candidates running for the two three-year and one two-term terms available on the council will be watching tonight's actions closely. The public should, too, for it's important to see if the councilors can work together for the common good and not get caught up on petty or personality matters.

Let the healing begin.

Good deed

Not everything on the councilor's platter is bitter; some of the items are downright pleasant reminders of a community at work.

A Bucksport High School class - the Class of 2018 to be exact - raised a significant amount of cash, \$1,600 and now wants to use it toward adding a very nice flagpole to the varsity soccer field on Miles Lane. (That's the only playing field without a proper national flag and pole, a necessary backdrop for the national anthem.)

They're asking the town to kick in some cash toward the \$3,500 project. Once the stars-and-stripes begin to wave, think of the symbol of the national and community coming together for a good cause.

The council has to be involved because the site is owned by the town, and while private money is still welcome, some public cash would underline a shared commitment. The gesture, the flag and the spirit behind it all properly reside with everyone.

Thanks, Class of 2018!

We're sure the Town Council will come through. Perhaps, their RSU 25 counterparts in Orland, Prospect and Verona Island will, too.

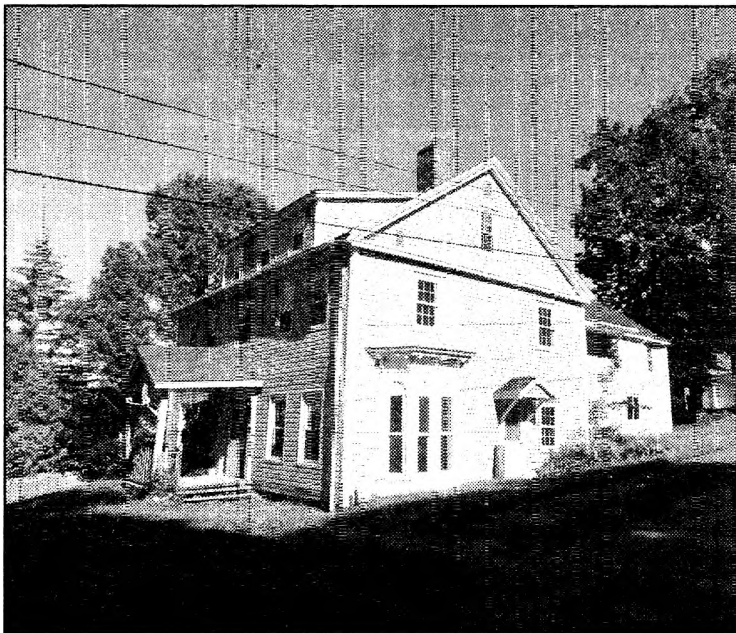

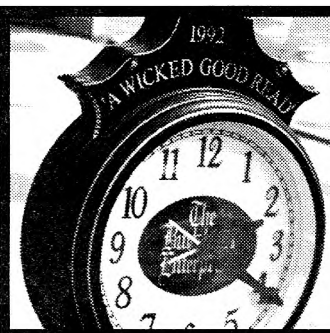

Arthur James Adams, 1928 - 2019

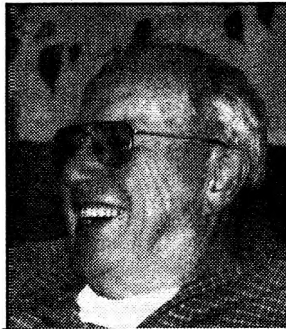
BUCKSPORT — Arthur James Adams passed away on Sept. 5 with his children by his side.

— Council candidates

The council tonight is expected to recommend changes in the Town Charter that would clarify what happens when a council vacancy occurs. Those changes require voter approval.

Carmichael and Morrison now are engaged in an especially hotly contested battle, for both are committed to keep the other from being seated.

Morrison has noted Carmichael repeatedly had said in recent weeks he would not continue on the council, only to reverse himself after the last council meeting. Morrison also contends that if his interpretation of the charter prevails, to elect Carmichael would force Carmichael to give up his current three-year seat, causing another vacancy on the council.

The councilors have been briefed on the legal opinions Town Manager Susan M. Lessard is relying on. One opinion is that the newly elected person to the two-year post would not take office until January, as is the case with the other newly elected people. The other says a candidate, in this case, Carmichael, legally can run for a different term. The key is that such a winner cannot be seated until he or she relinquishes their current term, which Carmichael will do in January.

The dispute could surface at tonight's council meeting at 7 p.m., or they may simply opt to pick a new candidate to serve out the vacancy caused by the early departure of Councilor David W. Kee.

At the last session, the councilors voted 3-1 to appoint Morrison to that vacancy and then congratulated him, only to have to rescind the appointment because Morrison's level of support fell one vote shy of that required by the Town Charter. (Councilors Paul R. Gauvin and Carmichael were absent that night.)

—Three-year terms

While council contests are not unusual, this year's ballot will offer some clear choices and those new to holding elective office. Those seeking office cover a broad range of those long familiar with the ins and outs of town government here, including the personalities involved, and those who favor a fresh look at how things are to be done in the future.

Three of the seven seats on the council are up for grabs, which could provide a swing in the direction of the council's actions, especially since the candidates run the gamut from those long familiar with the ins-and-outs of Bucksport town government and those who are comparatively new to the process.

Clain running unopposed

BUCKSPORT — Peter W. Clain, of 16 Mast Hill Road made last week's deadline so he will be unopposed on the ballot for re-election to the RSU 25 School Board.

The only candidate who took out papers but did not return them was Joseph N.L. York of 262 Jacob Buck Pond Road, a former town councilor who briefly considered running for the two-year opening on the council.

Candidates' night planned

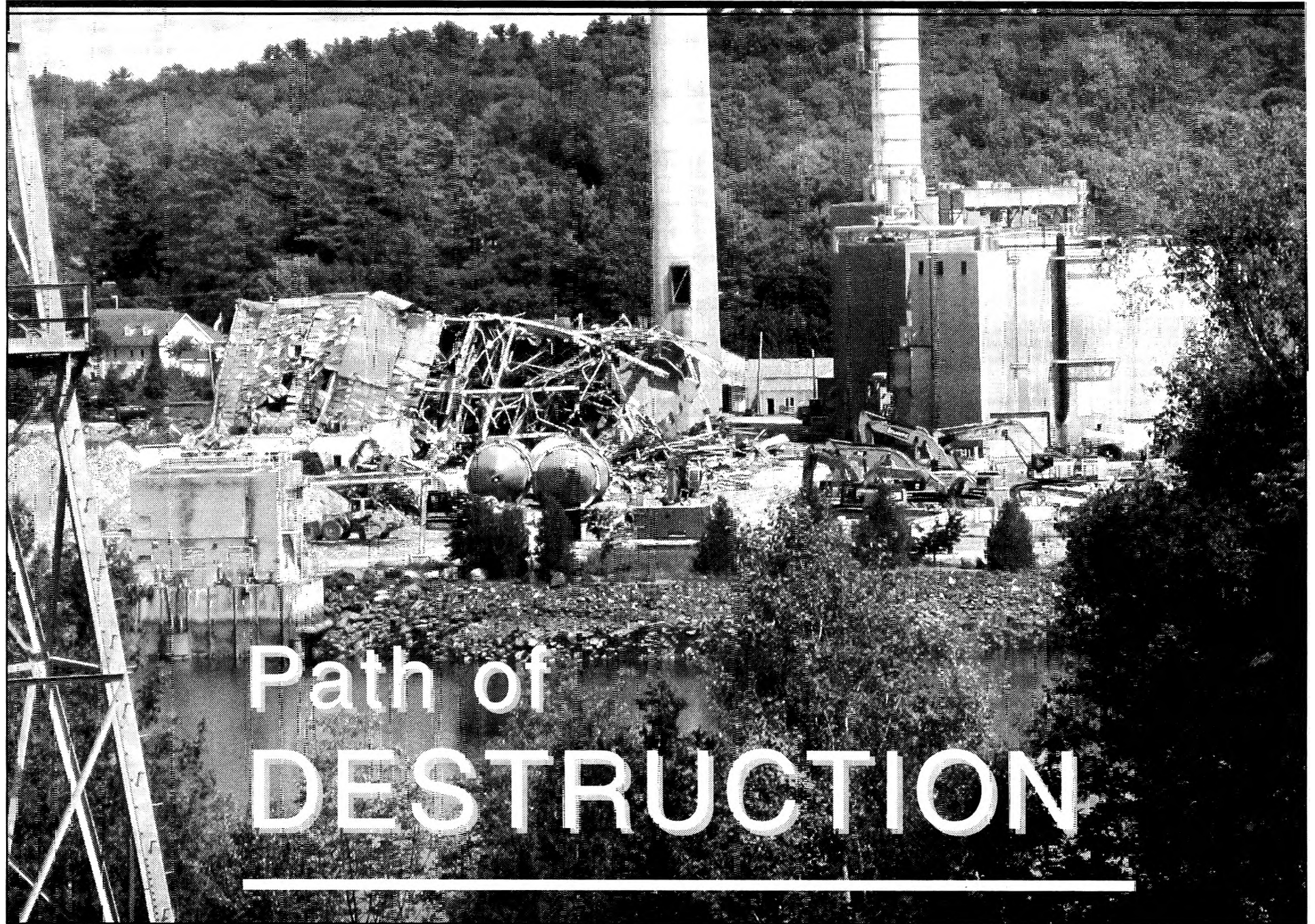

WITHOUT WARNING, at least publicly, the huge, multi-story building that housed the power generating headquarters at the paper mill was brought crashing down early last Thursday (9/5) afternoon. Much of that dust settled along the Prospect shore, despite the demolition crew's efforts to wet the debris with water.

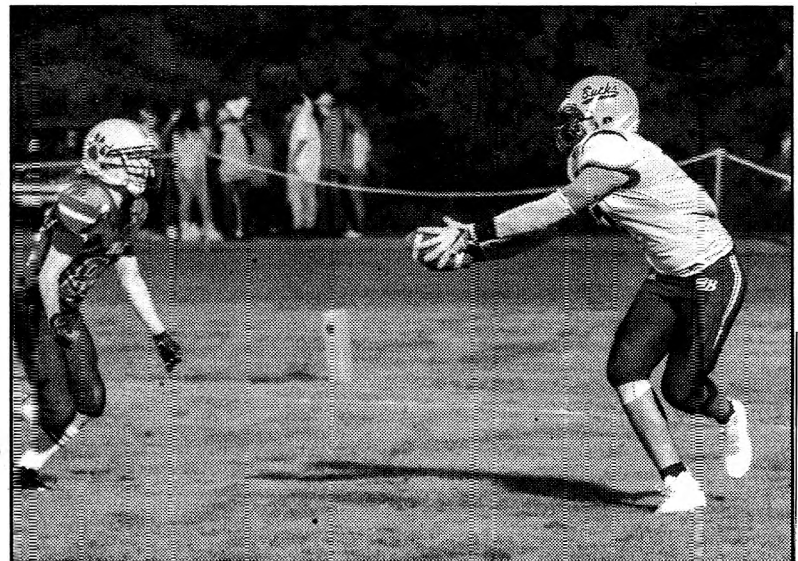
The cloud of pulverized dust is seen clearly in the photo on Page 1 by Amanda Curry, who photographed the scene from Fort Knox in Prospect.

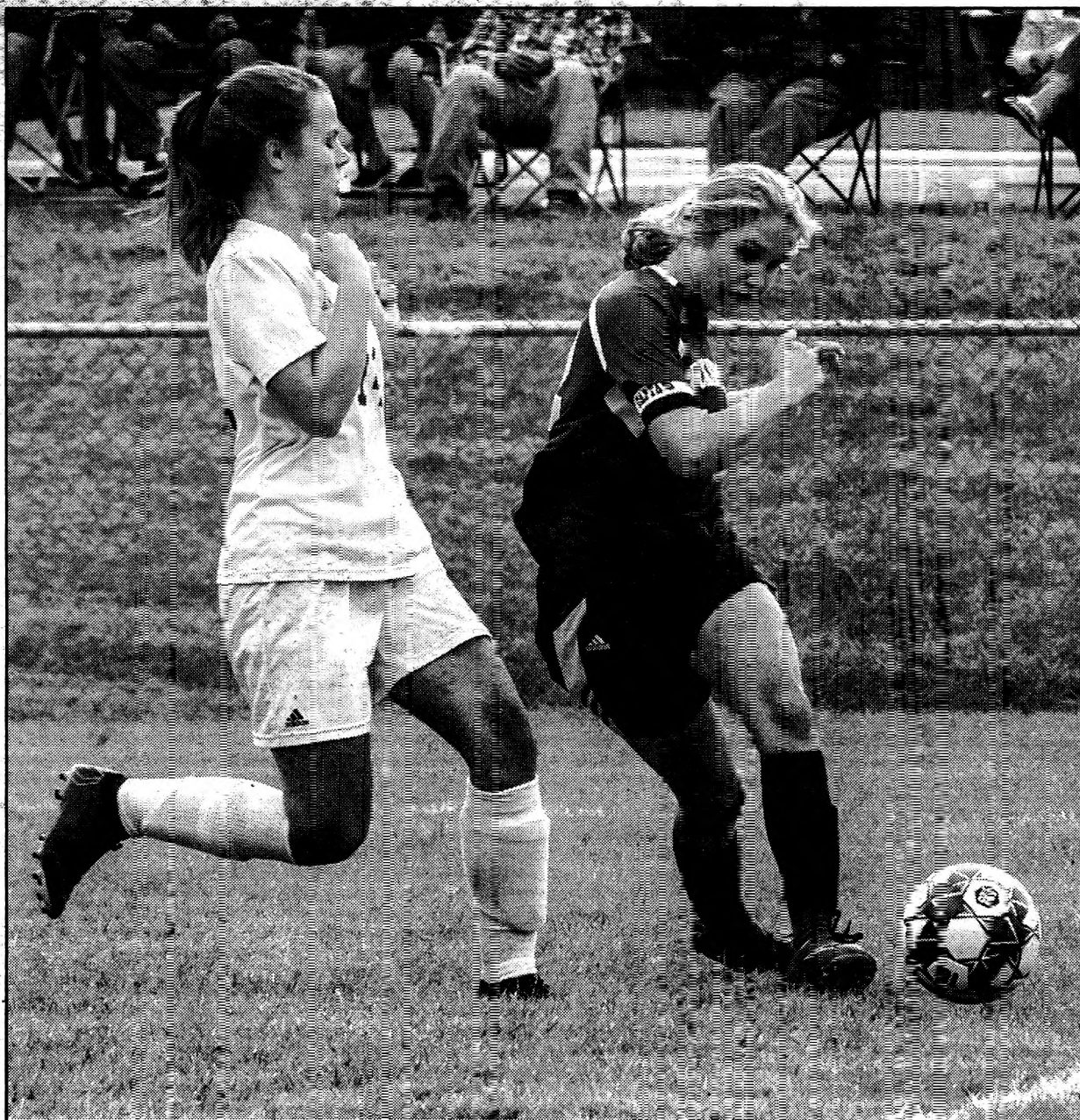

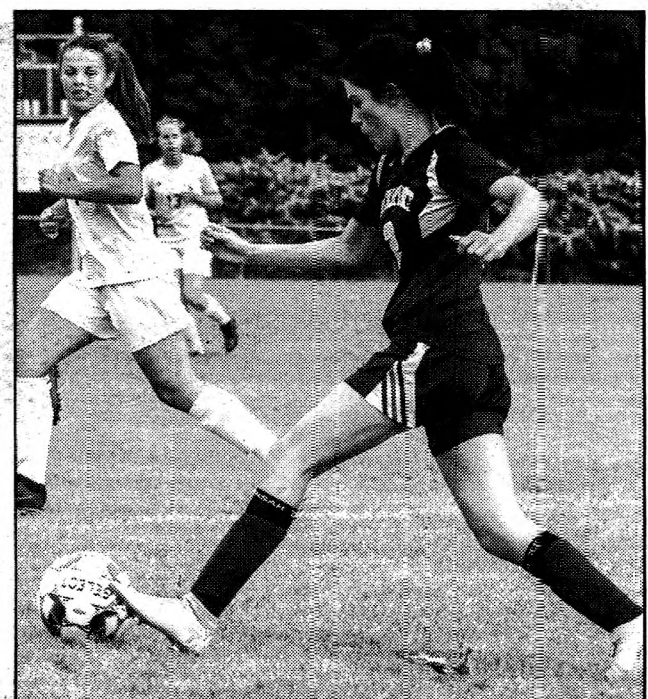

The latest schedule called for the stack to be removed in mid-October.

The paper mill on River Road closed in December of 2014.

Lessard said a town-sponsored public event might provide a tangible sign of closure for many whose lives and their families' lives have been so intertwined with papermaking since the mill first opened in 1931.

She favors the Fort Knox site because it offers parking and a fine view of the mill without endangering anyone gathered there.

The shorter of the two stacks which remain will continue to be used by the power generation plant, which provides electricity to the power grid.

Lessard said she plans for a public event "will bring closure" to the four generations of producing quality paper in Bucksport.

She said town officials were not aware that the large building that remained at the mill was to be demolished last Thursday (9/5), just as they were not given advance notice of the earlier razing of one of the three smokestacks a few weeks ago.

Area residents have complained to The Bucksport Enterprise that they believe they should be alerted, both to not be startled by the foundation-rattling concussions, but also to take preventative steps so to not breathe the inevitable large clouds of dust that go into the air and eventually settle on one or both sides of the Penobscot River.

The dust problems have occurred throughout the lengthy demolition, especially when the work is done on windy days.

One Fort Knox employee reported that the demolition of the large building last week sounded like an explosion, a fear that did not subside until she spotted the cloud of dust rising from the site and floating above the river toward the Prospect shore.

The demolition crew reportedly tried to dampen the dust with water, but that was only partially successful.

At other times, like yesterday (9/11), the stone dust from the pulverized material that's been spread across the mill site also has contributed to large amounts of airborne material flowing off the site.

The company will make its pitch at a Town Council subcommittee meeting tonight (9/12) at 6 p.m. at the Town Offices.

It's not clear how much the town is profiting from a similar solar array installed atop the nearby Highway Garage on Central Street. That system, installed by another company which is reaping the tax credits before it sells the system to the town when the credits run out, went on line in November.



Three seriously injured in Orland

ORLAND — A serious highway accident here early Saturday required all three ambulances from the Bucksport Fire Department. Because it was a weekend a separate crew was scrambled for each of them extremely quickly.

Three people were injured in the two-vehicle accident, two of them seriously.

Police are continuing to investigate why a 17-year-old Bucksport girl drove across the center line of U.S. Route 1 (Acadia Highway) and struck the van head-on.

Injured were the driver of the van, Danny Jones of Florida, and his passenger, Linda Starkweather, 65, of New York.

Also hurt was the 17-year-old, and all three were taken from the scene by ambulance.

The name of the teenager was not immediately released by the investigating sheriff's deputies.

The accident almost became even more serious when a motorist failed to heed the warnings of an accident ahead and drove straight through the accident scene.

While nobody was hurt in that encounter, public safety officials issued a reminder that drivers must use caution under those circumstances.

The accident occurred about 6:30 a.m., just about sunrise.
