"The Pier" What's its future?

PAST



Though the bicentennial made most Americans momentarily aware of their heritage, Old Orchard Beach seems constantly fascinated by its faded past.

Citizens of all ages are eager "Golden years" historians and can point out former sites of grand hotels--wooden dinosaurs whose size forced them to extinction.

The pier is one of Old Orchard's last links with the past. It's also the last link of an 1800 ft. chain that once stretched past the breakers.

Nostalgic residents enjoy reminding tourists about the days when the pier was long enough to bridge the Saco town line.

Today it's different. Today's pier is 485 feet of seaworn stump, constantly in need of repair and looking like a rickety legged centipede that's been chopped in half.

It's been burned by electrical fire and beaten by waves.

After the fire of 1969, a state engineer declared it unsafe. An inspection had discovered broken and decayed pilings, dummy pilings, and other dangers. Safety requirements were to be met before the pier could re-open.

The pier re-opened that summer and again a February storm in 1972 devoured half of what was left.

The pier is one of OOB's most popular spots despite the beating it has taken. Though town merchants and citizens would like to see it rebuilt, no one wants to see Old Orchard without it.

"I wouldn't want to see it come down unless a new one was built in its place," said Bon Air owner Evan Crosby.

Brunswick Hotel owner Fran Garneau agrees. "I'd like to see it more modern, but it's better than no pier at all," he said.

Waverly Motel owner Norman Guerette would like to see the pier rebuilt to include a new marina and dance hall. Guerette said a longer pier would provide an ideal spot for rental of space

to fishermen.

Town Councilman Richard Marshall says the pier is an eyesore. "Of course it's definitely an eyesore. I think it's a crime Duffy (Pier Corporation President) doesn't spend some money to fix it up," he said.

Barnacle encrusted pier pilings also create a safety hazard, according to Lifeguard Captain Mark Gagne.

But Gagne says danger signs have been posted, and it's the responsibility of the swimmers to keep away from the pier.

"I'd like to see ... everyone would like to see a nice new steel pier, but even if we had one there would still be people getting hurt on the steel pilings," he said.

Gagne has talked to the Town Manager concerning the hazards of fallen pilings still submerged four years after the 1972 storm.

Since the old pilings lie across the Saco line, Saco City administrator John Dexter, Jr. has been notified, said Gagne, and the pilings should be removed this Fall.

There are no plans for rebuilding, according to Pier Corp. Manager Rocco Aceto, due to an estimated cost of \$5 million.

However, Aceto says the pier would be rebuilt to its present 485 foot length should it shrink further.

Aceto also said the Pier Corporation regularly replaces planking, with pilings and capping timbers being replaced when needed.

Aceto does have plans for the future.

He would like to see the pier evolve from a game and gift shop area to an arts and crafts center catering to businesses like the leather and silver shops.

The Pier Corporation has "Titanic-like" faith in the pier's ability to withstand disaster.

Said Rocco Aceto, "I would assume that as long as you maintain it, the property lasts."

ROAD & SIDEWALK ADVISORY COMMISSION

We have received and investigated many complaints regarding the Traffic Ordinance. Most of the complaints dealt with parking. For the Benefit of citizens unaware of section 5-131, 5-132, 5-134 and 5-135 of the Traffic Ordinance, we would like the people to be informed.

Section 5-131 "Obstruction in public streets" Any vehicle of any kind or description parked upon a public street of the Town of Old Orchard Beach at a place, in a manner, or for length of time prohibited by an ordinance of said town, is hereby declared to be an obstruction in such street and a menace to the safe and proper regulation of traffic.

Section 5-132 "Authority to remove" Any vehicle parked in a manner as described in section 131 maybe removed by, or under the direction of, or at the request of, any police officer of said town of Old Orchard. Such police officer may use such force as may be necessary to enter such vehicle and cause the same to be placed in a condition to be moved, without liability to him or the town for necessary and reasonable damage thereto or its contents or equipment and may employ any reputable person, engaged in the business of towing

ing or storing vehicles, such purpose. Notwithstanding any language herein contained, the removal and storage of a vehicle pursuant to this ordinance and the payment of the charges specified herein, shall in no way relieve or prevent prosecution of the violation of any provision of the ordinances of said town of Old Orchard Beach.

Section 5-134 "Release of vehicle" Before the owner of the such vehicle, or his representative, may remove it from the possession of the person towing or storing it, he shall (1) furnish satisfactory evidence of his identity and of his ownership of said vehicle to the officer in charge at the Old Orchard Beach Police Department, and to the person having possession of the said vehicle (2) pay the amount of the parking fine attached to the vehicle (3) pay to the person having possession of said vehicle reasonable charges for the towing and storing of said vehicle. (4) sign a receipt for the said vehicle.

Section 5-135 "Charges" The town council shall establish a schedule of charges for towing and storage, and only those persons agreeing to such schedule shall be called to remove and store the vehicle

This carousel may look very familiar to OOB residents and long-time visitors. It is a featured attraction of the King Reid Show which will set up its tents at Scarborough Fair this week for the Fair opening on the 24th of July. There will be many new features at this year's event, but for the nostalgic minded, just a look at this magnificent merry-go-round is an extra added attraction.

SCARBOROUGH DOWNS

Scarborough-Maine's most prestigious dairy show will be hosted at Scarborough Fair this year on opening day, July 24, at 10:00 a.m. An estimated 600 animals will compete in this, the 36th annual show, the singular most important event in dairying in the state, as Ayrshire, Brown Swiss, Guernsey, Holstein, Jersey and Milking Shorthorns will compete for top honors in their breeds.

Clem Dunning, livestock Superintendent, is well aware of the problem which he has set for himself in competing with his 1975 performance. As anyone who was there can verify, the livestock shows were some of the best ever seen in the state. Dunning, whose past as a retired member of the extension service serves him well in his present

capacity, passes all of the accolades on to his staff. "They were great last year, and I know they will again this year present fine shows. Last year's total of 300 goats will be a hard act to follow, but Betty Weir is on top of the situation, and I am confident in promising tight competition in all fields this year.

One fair favorite, the horse and oxen pulling will be again supervised by Les Barden from nearby Rochester, New Hampshire. Barden too is optimistic about the bicentennial edition of the fair and says, "We featured some of the finest pulling contests in Maine right here at Scarborough last summer. With the continued high premiums in effect this season, I'm sure it will be even more exciting for our fair-going friends here in the Pine Tree State."

Drew Miller, supervisor of the fine arts division, has added a new twist to fair art with the introduction of a photography contest. The art show again will be focused on the student or the younger artist in keeping with the policy which was established last year.

One of last year's most colorful attractions was the flower show, directed by Clee Miller, who promises, with the addition of a number of Grange exhibits, a much bigger and better one than last year.

There will be a tractor skill driving and safety competitions this year supervised by Sam Hoyt of Gorham. Mini-tractor pulling will also be a feature, as the mechanical "oxen" compete against each other.

This year's featured Midway, always a cause for excitement, is the King Reid Show, one of the most respected names

in Midways in the east. One of the show's magnificent rides, "Carol's Carousel" is reminiscent of the one destroyed in Old Orchard. According to Harry Koch, owner of the show, it is the largest and oldest merry-go-round on tour in the East. The carousel, featuring hand-carved horses, dragon chariots and an ornate band organ, is a fantastic treat for children of all ages, as Koch points out, "about 35 percent of the riders are adults."

The Fair which runs from July 24 until the 31st will also feature, Horse shows, Miniature Light Harness Racing, a complete 4-H program, Needlework and Crafts Shows, Children's Field Days, Drum and Bugle Corps/Drill Team competitions, and a favorite of all, Farmer Brown's Barnyard. It's all there just a few miles away in Scarborough.



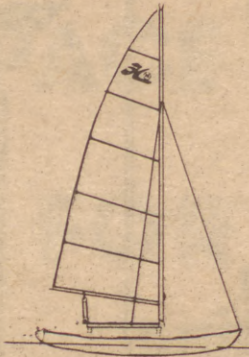

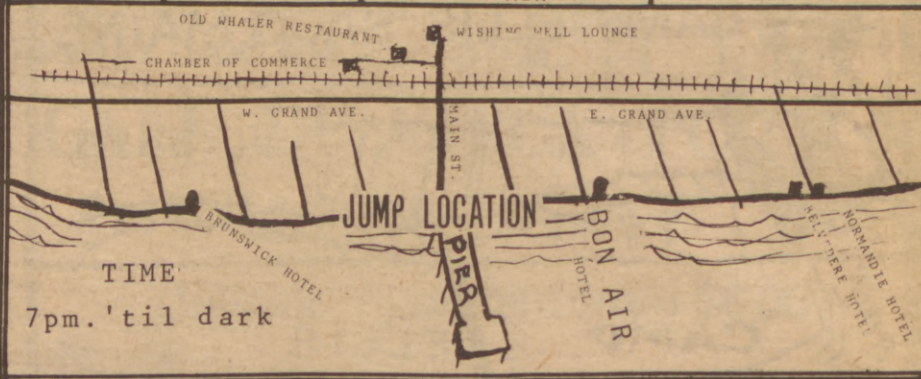

Milestone Request is Denied

Milestone's money problems won't be solved by Old Orchard, according to town manager Chris Kent.

"We feel paving their parking lot and the cost to the town of their location is donation enough to Milestone's cause," he said.

Milestone Director Bill Mullen has also appealed to Biddeford, Saco, and the York County Commissioners for funding help. So far he's received no definite pledges of assistance.

Though Milestone receives 75% funding from the state, Mullen says collecting payment from private patients is sometimes impossible.

Though Milestone's attorney sends collection letters to private patients with outstanding debts, court action is difficult because Milestone patients' records are private, and can't be used in court.

According to Mullen, even Title 20 funds from the state fail to cover a patient who may have previously earned \$25,000 a year, but due to drinking, has lost his job and is destitute.

Milestone eligibility is determined by wage and tax statements that may be obsolete, he said.

Mullen says other alcoholic rehabilitation centers within the state can be totally funded by the state only if they receive private patients.

Mullen wants Milestone to continue admitting private patients even though payment is not guaranteed.

If Milestone can't get aid from York County, Mullen says a bank loan is probable, but adds this would be only a temporary solution.

Meanwhile, Milestone's board of directors is working on a long term solution to funding problems.
