

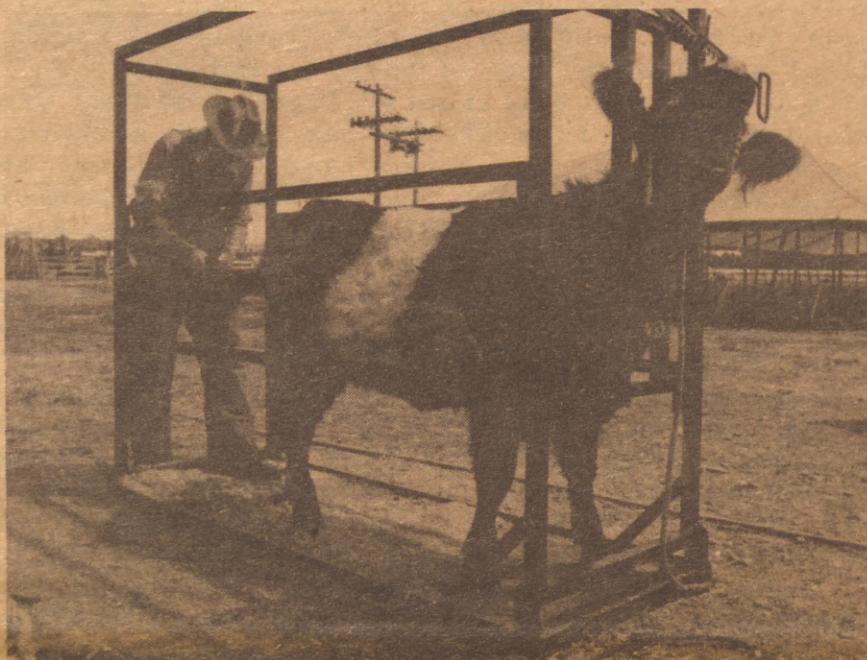

SCARBOROUGH - Scarborough Fair officials have braced themselves for today's expected record crowds at the Scarborough Downs complex as the exposition celebrates "Family Day" at the Fair offers patrons greatly reduced gate admission and discounted ticket prices for rides on the mammoth King Reid Shows Midways. The first of two "Family Days" was

held on Tuesday of this week.

Dairy cattle judging and 4-H working steer judging continues at the Fair today while the 4-H Horse Show is the feature on the Horse Show Ring. Throughout the day and evening horse pulling competition will continue in the 2,900, 3,000 and 3,100 pound classes.

Guest star in the Tent Pavilion Theater for performances at 7 and 9 p.m. this evening will be "Hee Haw" star Sunday Sharpe. Harness racing continues at Scarborough Fair this evening with post time set for 7:30 p.m. Tomorrow livestock judging moves into the 4-H Beef Heifer categories as well as naming Champions in the Female Dairy Judging and Female Over All Breeds in Sheep Judging.

FRIDAY, JULY 30, 1976

SCARBOROUGH - The Scarborough Fair, being held at Scarborough Downs, heads into its final two days on Friday, with a packed schedule of livestock judging events and horse pulling contests slated Friday. Fair officials are expecting thousands of visitors to Friday and Saturday's closing programs.

Throughout the morning and afternoon judging will be held in the 4-H Baby Beef and Baby Heifer divisions. Judging in the sheep show will end Friday with the naming of a Champion Female Over All Breeds, as well as Champion Female Dairy Judging. Horse pulling comes to a climax Friday in the

Scarborough - The final day of the 1976 edition of the Scarborough Fair is underway with a program of major events scheduled from opening right up to closing at midnight tonight.

Today has been designated Scarborough Firemen's Muster Day and Miss Rodeo Maine Day, with both events expected to draw record crowds.

In addition today the Scarborough Fair will present the Scarborough Horse Show Appaloosa Classes, the 4-H Market Lamb Show, a Tractor Driving Contest, 4-H sheep judging and children's field day rabbit and pig scrambles.

Some twenty fire companies are expected to take part in the Scarborough Firemen's Muster which leads off with a huge parade at 10 Saturday morning and moves to various phases at one this afternoon. There will also be drum and bugle corps and drill teams competition and judging this afternoon.

Quest for the Miss Rodeo Maine title will begin this afternoon with horsemanship competition progress to the Miss Rodeo Maine Fashion Show at 7 pm with the final selection of Miss Rodeo Maine for 1976 to be made in the Winner's Circle at 10:30 tonight.

3,000 pound class this afternoon and Free-For-All contest beginning at 7 pm.

Country music fans will be treated to a performance by "Good Ole Nashville Music" star, Patsy Sledd. Patsy will appear in the Tent Pavilion Theater at 7 and 9 pm. on Friday.

Saturday the fair winds up its 1976 season with the day-long Scarborough Firemen's Muster with participation by twenty fire companies. A huge Firemen's Muster Parade takes place at ten in the morning with Muster events beginning at 1 pm. Saturday night's Tent Pavilion star is Fer-

KING REID SHOWS

SCARBOROUGH- The young at heart, from toddlers to senior citizens, are having the time of their lives this week, enjoying the myriad attractions of one of the nation's largest midways, the King Reid Shows, now appearing at the Scarborough Fair. This is the giant midway's first appearance in southern Maine and comes to Scarborough directly from Lycoming Fair in Pennsylvania. The centerpiece of the Midway is a completely restored antique carousel with 56 hand-carved horses and ornate dragon chariots. Named "Carol's Carousel", in honor of show owner Harry F. Koch's wife Carol, the ride is the largest of its kind touring North America. The priceless merry-go-round is a joy to thousands of senior citizens who ride again and again recalling the days of their youth when such carousels were featured attractions in amusement parks at the turn of the century. Today's youngsters and their grandparents have just as much fun on the "jumping horses" of Carol's Carousel as do their grandparents. Up and down the brilliantly lighted midway are heard shrieks of excitement as thrill seekers ride the Flying Bobs, the Scrambler, the Zipper, the Giant Wheel, the Adult Bumper Cars, the Darkride, and other amusement spectaculars that are featured on the Monarch of Midways. For children, the King Reid Shows provide a complete and beautiful Kiddieland of gentle-action rides to please young guests. Midway devotees have an opportunity to take a prize home as a souvenir of their visit to the fair by trying their skill at several challenging games that add to the excitement of the midway. Other attractions vie for the crowd's attention, as "talkers" on bally platforms in front of tented theaters describe the wonders of entertainment to be seen within. The aroma of onions, peppers, hot dogs, popcorn and pizzas fill the air as fair patrons munch and march along the King Reid midway. The small fry, during a visit to the carnical kingdom, most always opt for the pink, perennial delicacy, cotton candy. The King Reid Shows will be playing at the Scarborough Fair, Scarborough Downs, through Saturday July 31st. Midway rides will be reduced fifty percent, Thursday, July 29th, up to 6 PM, during Coca-Cola Family Day. Coupons good for savings of fair general admission and on King Reid Midway rides may be obtained free at participating Coca-Cola retailers.

ROAD & SIDEWALK ADVISORY COMMISSION

Our congratulations to Biddeford on its beautiful bicentennial crosswalks. Saco has always taken pride in its crosswalks. Old Orchard? We will let the taxpayers decide.

Traffic-Ordinance Part 3
Section 5-101. "crosswalk" shall mean: (1) that portion of a roadway ordinarily included within the prolongation or continuation of the lateral lines of sidewalks at intersections where two or more streets intersect and only some of the crosswalks at such intersection are marked for pedestrian traffic, the word crosswalk as used in this ordinance shall include only such marked crosswalks at any such intersections. (2) Any portion of a roadway distinctly indicated for pedestrian crossing by lines or other markings on the surface.

Section 5-139 "Crosswalks and intersections not to be blocked". No driver shall enter an intersection or a marked crosswalk unless there is sufficient space on the other side of the intersection

or crosswalk to accommodate the vehicle he is operating without obstructing the passage of other vehicles or pedestrians notwithstanding any traffic control signal indication to proceed.

Section 5-157 "Pedestrians have right of way" where traffic control signals are not in place or in operation, the driver of a vehicle shall yield the right of way slowing down or stopping if need be to so yield, to a pedestrian crossing, the roadway within any unmarked crosswalk at an intersection, except as otherwise provided herein.

Section 5-164 "Regulatory powers". (1) The Town Council shall have authority to designate and maintain, by appropriate devices, marks, or lines upon the surface of the roadway, crosswalks at intersections where in its opinion there is a particular danger to pedestrian crossing the roadway, and at such other places as he may deem necessary.

EDITORIAL

In a police dispute article in last week's Biddeford-Saco Journal, Police Chief Lumb publicly placed the 1975 police budget at \$190,000. He said the police department spent \$186,000 that year.

Figures from the Town Treasurer's office reveal the 1975 budget was actually \$185,835.90 with police spending, \$186,851.45. According to these figures, police went over their budget, not under.

The 1976 budget is \$189,765.00 plus \$38,320.00 from Federal Revenue Sharing (which people seem to forget to add) bringing the total 76' budget to \$228,085.00 an increase of \$41,233.55 over 1975.

Court time profits for police officers have been showing up on the weekly payroll.

Police officer Cameron received time and a half pay for court time to the amount of \$110 during the week of 7/18 to 7/24. He also received his regular salary of \$183.

Why should a salaried police officer receive time and a half pay simply as a reward for making arrests?

Fire Chief Smith last week filled in for his vacationing Deputy Chief Roy. Smith was paid his own Chief's salary plus compensation for taking the deputy's job. Smith's total pay that week was \$470.

The town also gave Roy vacation pay.
Does this town have money to burn?

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BIKE SAFETY IS A MUST

In recent years there has been a big rise in the bucycle business. Unfortunately, there has also been an increase in the number of bicyclists killed or injured.

In Old Orchard, there are a great number of bicycle owners, most of them children. Before allowing any child to go out on a bicycle, he or she should know the 'rules of the road'.

Most people forget how important it is that bicycles be equipped with all the safety features for night riding. Mounting the high attention orange flag on a 4-6 foot pole behind the seat is highly recommended. Not only should motorists be able to easily see the bicycle, but they should be able to see the rider as well. Cyclists should wear reflective or light colored clothing during hours of darkness.

A cardinal rule for safe bicycle riding is "see and be seen".

Many accidents are the result of the bicycle being either too small or too big for the child. Parents and children often do not give adequate thought to matching the size of the bicycle to the size of the child. While limited adjustments may be made by raising and lowering the seat and handlebars, the bike should also be a size that fits the rider.

When a bike is too large for a child, it will sway from side to side in see-saw fashion as the child pedals. When it is too small, the rider may bump his knees against the handle bars and steering may be difficult.

When the rider sits in the saddle with the ball of one foot on the low pedal, and grasps the handlebars as though riding, the following should be noted:

1. The leg with foot on the low pedal is bent slightly at the knee when

- the ball of the foot is pressing on the pedal.
2. The seat is parallel to the ground.
3. The upper part of the body is inclined slightly forward.
4. The handlebar grips are at right angles to the handlebar stem.

Remember, riding a bicycle isn't the time for clowning around or showing off for friends. Keep alert and always watch your surroundings. Motorists should also drive more carefully when they spot a bicyclist in the area.

Children love bicycle riding as do many adults. It is a fun and very healthy activity. When the 'rules of the road' are fully observed, it makes for many more years of joyful cycling.

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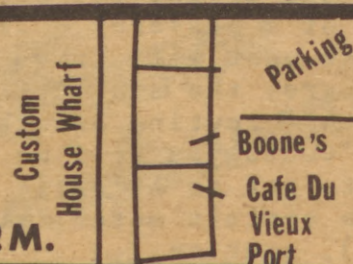

ROAD & ADVISORY

Staples Street-No vehicle shall be parked on the Northeasterly side (left side facing Ocean) of Staples Street from Saco Avenue to Boston and Maine railroad, no vehicle shall be parked on Staples Street from the Boston And Maine railroad to the Sea Wall.

Surfside Avenue- No vehicle shall be parked on the Southeasterly side of Surfside Avenue (side facing towards Ocean).

Traynor Street- No vehicle shall be parked on Traynor Street.

Union Avenue-No vehicle shall be parked on the Northeasterly side (left facing Ocean) of Union Avenue from Central Avenue to number 82 Union Avenue.

Veterans Square- The area known as Vetran's square or that area which runs from Old Orchard street to Imperial Street No vehicle shall be parked on Veteran's Square from 5:30p.m. through 6:00a.m. Commencing June 1 through September 15 of each year.

Walnut Street- No vehicle shall be parked on the Northeasterly side (left side facing Ocean) of Walnut Street from East Grand Avenue to the Sea Wall.

Washington Avenue- No vehicle shall be parked on the Northwesterly side (right side going towards Union Avenue) of Washington Avenue from Saco Avenue to Union Avenue Loading and Unloading only will be allowed at designated bussiness locations.

Wesley Avenue- No vehicle shall be parked on Wesley Avenue.

W. Grand Avenue-No parking on either side of West Grand Avenue from Old Orchard Street to Camp Comfort Avenue. Parking is allowed beyond Camp Comfort Avenue. Loading and unloading only will be permitted on West Grand Avenue at the Palace Fruit, Melmar, Truman's and Seaside House Restaurant signs will be erected and define such areas.

SIDEWALK COMMISSION

York Street-No vehicle shall be allowed to be parked on the Southwesterly side of York Street (right side facing Ocean)

Sea Wall or Bulkhead: No vehicle shall be parked at the Sea Wall or the Bulkhead at the end of any public way in the Town of Old Orchard Beach.

Emergency Space: On any street where space is designated for emergency use, no vehicle shall be stopped or parked in such space except in those vehicles for which such space is specifically designated.

Taxicab Stands: No taxicab or public vehicle shall stand in any street, except those in such places where permission to do so has been granted by the municipal officers. Such spaces shall be plainly designated by suitable signs and markings and no other vehicle shall be allowed to stand or to be parked in them.

Yellow Curbs-No vehicle shall be stopped or parked in any street next to a yellow curb.

Evergreen Avenue was amended July 14, 1976 to read parking on both sides.

B Street Extension- No vehicle shall be parked on the Easterly side of B Street Extension.
