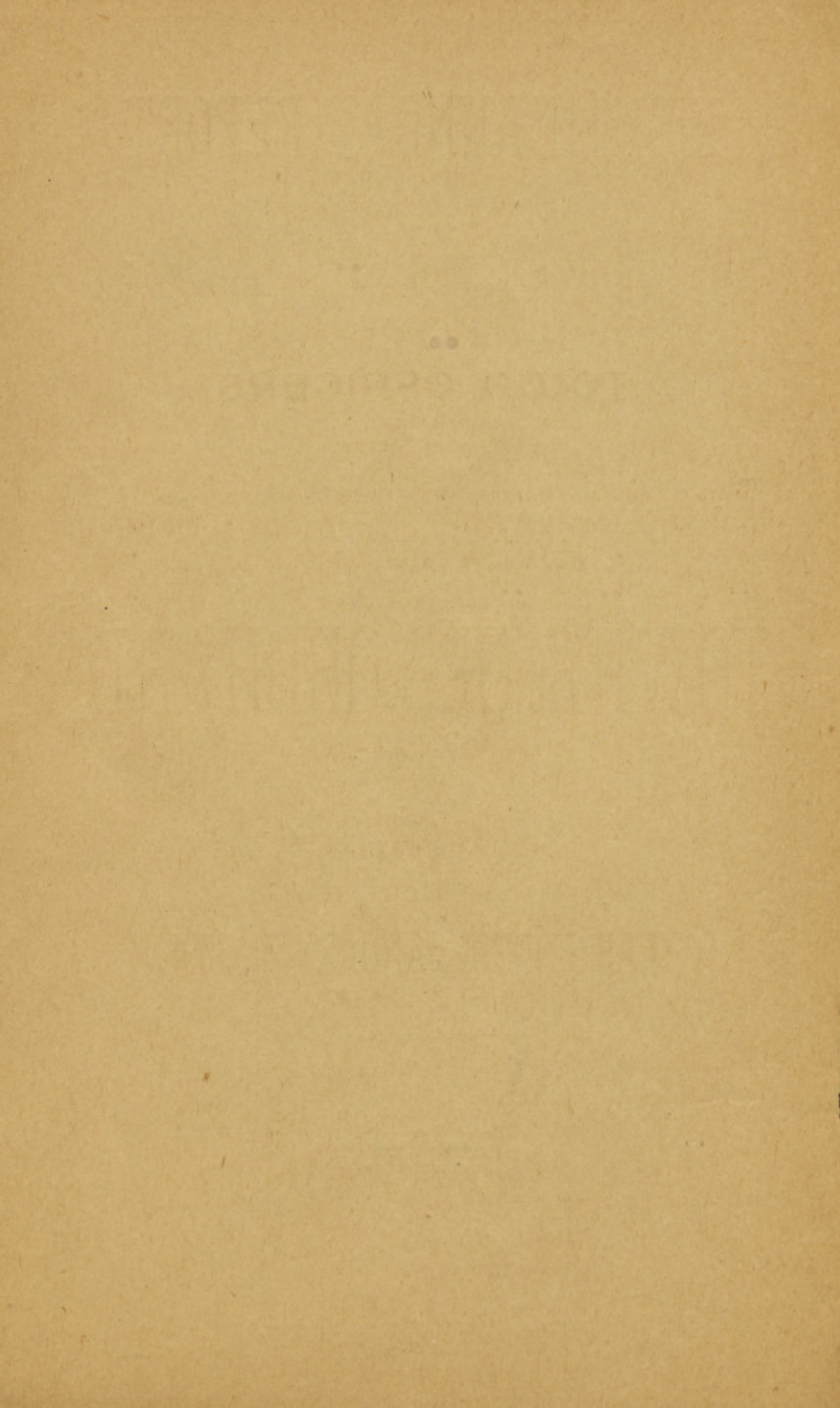

## SUPERVISOR'S REPORT.

---

The following report is respectfully submitted by the Supervisor of Schools :

For the financial condition of the schools you are referred to the Auditor's report.

During the first part of the fiscal year the schools were under the supervision of the Rev. Mr. Mitchell, therefore this report can only show the condition of the schools during the fall and winter terms.

The High school, as during the past four years, was under the management of Mr. Harry R. Fling till the close of the spring term, which closed the high school year, and I have reason to believe that the school under his instruction maintained its previous high standard. The school during the fall and winter terms has been under the management of Miss Ida B. Newhall. Miss Newhall entered upon her task as principal of the school under the natural prejudice against a female principal, the school having been in the hands of a male teacher from its beginning. I think this has in a large measure worn away, and what was a spirit of insubordination on the part of a few of the larger boys has disappeared, and now a high standard of discipline is maintained and without recourse to arbitrary measures. The interest of the scholars is well maintained and the instruction fully equal to schools of this grade.

The Grammar school during the spring and fall terms, as heretofore, was under the charge of Miss Rosa G. Fling, and I cannot say more than that under her management the school was thoroughly satisfactory. The winter term is under the charge of Mrs. Anna Fisk. Mrs. Fisk has against her management the prejudice resulting from a change of teachers. She is hard working and has the interest of the school at heart.

The Primary school is in charge of Miss Eva Jordan. This is Miss Jordan's first school and she has in addition to her inexperience the most unsuitable and illy-arranged school room to be imagined. Miss Jordan's school lacks method and discipline, and although she is a very hard worker and thoroughly interested in her school the results are very unsatisfactory. With more experience, less zeal and better advantages she may have better success.

We are sorry to see our schools fall in the least from their former high standard. It shows that too great care cannot be exercised in the selection of teachers. Some more suitable place must be provided for the small school, but this I leave for your consideration at the annual town meeting.

*To P. C. Harley, Constable of the Town of Old Orchard, in  
the County of York, Greeting:*

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Old Orchard, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Porter's Hall in said Town, on Monday, the second day of March, A. D., 1891, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act upon the following articles. to wit:

1st—To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

2nd—To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

3rd—To hear and act upon the report of the town officers and all standing and special committees.

4th—To see what action the town will take in relation to pay of town officers.

5th—To see what action the town will take, and what sum of money they will appropriate for building county roads and bridges.

6th—To see what sum of money the town will raise, 1st, for common schools; 2nd, free high school; 3rd, making and repairing highways and bridges; 4th, support of poor; 5th, pay of town officers; 6th, maintaining street lights and electric lights; 7th, contingent expenses; 8th, sanitary expenses.

7th—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay collector's commissions, abatements and discounts.

8th—To see what compensation the town will vote to pay the Collector for collecting taxes for all moneys actually collected.

9th—To see if the town will vote when the taxes shall be committed to the Collector for collection, and what discount shall be allowed on both town and special, if paid within a given date, and charge interest thereon thereafter.

10th—To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to hire money in anticipation of taxes and not exceed the same.

11th—To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to issue town notes, to pay those which fall due the present year.

12th—To see if the town will authorize the school agent to employ the school teachers.

13th—To see if the town will authorize the assessors to make such abatements as they think reasonable.

14th—To see if the town will vote to set out and replace such shade trees as the Selectmen deem expedient, not to exceed the sum of 5 per cent. of the amount appropriated for highways.

15th—To see if the town will vote to accept a street as petition by John Traynor and others, beginning at a hub on the northeast side of Grand Avenue, near land owned by said John Traynor, thence southeasterly to high water mark, said way to be 30 feet wide in each and every part.

16th—To see what action the town will take in relation to buying a lot and building a primary school house thereon.

17th—To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to procure a loan not exceeding \$1,000 for the purpose named in article 16.

18th—To see if the town will encourage the establishment of a shoe manufactory or other manufactory, by exempting the same from taxation for a period of years, and appoint a committee of correspondence to investigate the subject, which investigation shall be free of expense to the town.

19th—To see what action the town will take and what sum of money the town will raise to maintain police force; construct and maintain sidewalks; to maintain fire department; for hydrant rental; for interest on debt incurred in fire department.
