As remarked in former Report, the expenditures will vary from year to year according to size of family, purchases, &c., and the receipts according to the success of crops, stock sold, &c.

No stock has been sold, but the growth of oxen and the growth and increase of young stock may well be considered, and would be counted from \$150 to \$200, and the surplus of hay \$100. Some articles are less than in former Reports.

The Overseer has fed the stock—using the coarse fodder without waste, and making judicious feeding and care supply the place of provender—the stock appearing in equally good condition as heretofore.

The wet season was very unfavorable to putting in seed, especially on this farm, as farmers similarly situated well understand.

We express ourselves as entirely satisfied with the appearance out-doors and in, and the general management.

The Owen case between Paris and Topsham is still unsettled.

The Julia Brown case between Rumford and Sumner is still unsettled.

Miss Hannah A. Bates has been a town charge since January 13, 1868, at \$2,00 per week. This will be eventually paid by Sumner.

ROADS AND BRIDGES.

In addition to the usual amount of highway tax, (\$4,000,) the town raised \$1,000 to meet the cash bills for the repair of roads and bridges.

No more of this sum has been used than was deemed absolutely necessary, and no more than we would have been compelled to draw from the treasury, even if no appropriation had been made.

There has been the usual repairs to bridges, repairing roads, bills for breaking roads, building new road near T. C. Cushman's and the new road near Charles Stevens',—this latter, however, has been built principally with highway tax.

Had we sufficient room, we would give the record of expenditures in detail; as it is, we can only give the aggregate of cash bills paid up to this date,—\$863,61.

Act of Feb. 25, 1867, in relation to Collection of Taxes. "Cities by a vote of their city councils, and towns and plantations, by a vote at their annual meetings, may determine at what time the taxes assessed by said cities, towns and plantations shall be payable and may order that interest on the same shall be collected from the time said taxes become due."

We recommend the following appropriations:

To meet indebtedness,	\$8,000.00
Current expences of Town,	2,000.00
To pay cash bills repairs of roads and bridges	1,000.00

CONCLUSION.

We have endeavered to give the standing of the Town as definitely as possible. The exhibit of Notes issued, paid and unpaid, is believed to be substantially correct. The amount of accumulated interest is paid, therefore no inducement for holders of notes to let their interest remain in the Treasury. The largest notes outstanding have been paid during the year—one of \$6,000.00, one of \$4,000.00, and two of \$1,000.00 each.

It will be necessary to authorize the hiring of sufficient sums to meet demands. The credit of the Town is now sufficiently good to obtain all needed sums at six per cent. It may be advisable to authorize the *Treasurer* to hire all needed sums, or the Treasurer with the Sclectmen, and that all monies be paid from the Treasury,

thus obviating the necessity of keeping two Records of the finances. We will say in this connection that the Treasurer's Records are very neatly and correctly kept.

We have given the account with each School District, and reference to the same will save a good deal of trouble and inquiry.—
There is a copy for each District, of the Revised School Laws in our possession, which will be delivered to District Clerks at the annual meeting.

Believing that a record of "Paris in the war" would meet the approbation of our townsmen, and at the solicitation of many, it is herewith presented, being as full and complete as we could render it—requiring considerable labor in its preparation.

These men, our own townsmen, that shared in the struggle to sustain the national life, suffering the privations of the camp—the fatigues of the march and the conflict, should receive an honorable mention and a home record.

The record also of the galant dead attest their presence on many a battle-field, and while they are fondly remembered in many a home circle, their services and sacrifices as they pass into history will be honored and appreciated by every lover of his country.

REPORT OF SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

TO THE CITIZENS OF THE TOWN OF PARIS:

In accordance with the laws of the State we herewith present to you our "report of the condition of the schools for the past year, the proficiency made by the pupils, and the success attending the modes of instruction and government of the teachers."

The education of the young is a subject that should excite the highest interest and the deepest solicitude in your minds: and it is with feelings of the most profound pleasure that we present to you the accompanying report, for we feel that the present state of our schools, though they are not yet elevated to the desired standard, is a subject of congratulation for us all. And while this is so, let us resolve, that the end of another year shall find the common schools of the Town of Paris, the standard, at least throughout the County of Oxford. In order to do this, we must each one of us take a personal interest in the matter, and see that we spare no effort that will conduce to the success of our schools.

Let each and every agent see that he procures teachers of assured ability, for the money expended in too many of our schools is simply thrown away from the carelessness, or want of interest shown by the teacher. And here we would say that the coming year we intend to raise the standard of requirements of the teachers, and do not intend that any one shall obtain a certificate, unless we feel convinced that he or she will keep a profitable school.

Feeling that some changes were desirable in the text-books used in our schools, your committee after long and patient investigation have made such changes as they deemed necessary, and, as they believe, with good results already perceptible. The list of text-books now in use is as follows:

The Progressive Series of Readers and Spellers. Greenleaf's Series in Mathematics. Cornell's new Series in Geography.

Quackenbos' Grammars.

Josiah S. Hobbs having resigned his position as member of the School Committee just before the commencement of the winter schools your Committee, in accordance with law, filled the vacancy temporarily by the selection of Silas P. Maxim.

The following is our report:

DISTRICT No. 1.—BOLSTER DISTRICT.

THOMAS BRIGGS, Agent.

Summer Term, taught by Martha F. Brooks. No register returned. Length of school 55 days. Wages \$2.00 per week. Board given. This was a fair school, though not first class. Some of the scholars took advantage of a slight want of energy on the part of the teacher, and thus made her task harder than it would have been if she had been prompt and decided in the beginning.

Winter Term, taught by Nellie Howe. School not yet closed. This is a very forward school and one that requires untiring effort and steady perseverance on the part of the teacher to make it profitable. This task Miss Howe has accomplished faithfully and successfully, and has succeeded in arousing in the minds of her scholars a desire for higher and more extended improvement than it is usual to find in our common Schools. We award to her high praise as a teacher.

DISTRICT No. 2.—South Paris.

F. C. Buck, Agent.

Primary Department.—Summer Term, taught by Miss Mary T. Stone. Length of school 50 days. Wages, including board, \$6.00 per week. Number of scholars registered 66; average number, 49.

Winter Term, also taught by Miss Stone. Length of school 50 days. Wages, including board, \$7.50 per week. Number of scholars registered 52; average number, 42.

This was Miss Stone's first effort at public teaching and was eminently a successful one. Good order, prompt attention, and rapid improvement were among the chief characteristics of the school. We may regard Miss Stone as a valuable acquisition to our corps of teachers.

Intermediate Department.—Summer Term, taught by Miss S. M. Morse. Length of school, 50 days. Wages, including board, \$7.00 per week; Number of scholars registered, 50; average number, 39.

Miss Morse had taught this school the preceding winter, and by her knowledge of the school and its requirements thus obtained was well situated to have made this a very profitable term. But a little laxity of discipline showed itself and somewhat injured the success of the school. However, most of the scholars made good progress, and some deserve great credit, especially the classes in Geography.

Winter Term, taught by Miss Helen M. Hutchins. Length of school, 50 days. Wages, \$4.50; board, \$3.50. Number of scholars registered, 55; average number 45.

Miss Hutchins is an experienced teacher and kept good order, and might have had a very profitable school but for a little indiscretion in punishing some of the scholars. By this she gained the ill-will of some of the parents and caused them to withdraw their children from the school, thereby greatly lessening the general interest, and injuring the success of the school.

Grammar Department.—Summer Term, taught by Elvira B. Hamlin. Length of school, 50 days. Wages, \$4.50; board, \$3.50 per week. Number of scholars registered, 37; average number 32.

Miss Hamlin came to us highly reccommended as an efficient and successful teacher, but the examination at the close of the term showed some want of thoroughness in her system of teaching.

Winter Term, taught by W. H. Bolster. Length of school, 50 days. Wages, \$40 per month; board \$2,50 per week. Number of scholars registered, 53; average number 50.

It is seldom that this district has been able to procure a teacher for this department, who could at the same time secure the goodwill and regard of the scholars, and keep a profitable and successful school, that this term deserves especial mention.

Mr. Bolster evidently exerted himself to the utmost to keep a good school, and in succeeding finely, has reaped a practical reward in establishing for himself an excellent reputation as a teacher, for this was his first school.

And here we would say that this district owes much of its success for the past year to the personal efforts of the able and efficient

agent—Mr. F. C. Buck—who has maintained a constant supervision over the interests of the schools, and has rescued their fine school-house from its threatened destruction.

DISTRICT No. 3.—WEEBER DISTRICT.

H. R. WEBBER, Agent.

Summer Term, taught by Viola N. Webber. No register returned.

Miss Webber was very successful in this school. Good order was maintained and the improvement of the scholars was very noticeable.

Winter Term, taught by Miss Rose McKenney.

Miss McKenney has a way of her own of winning the regard of her scholars and inciting them to study. Some might prefer more strictness in preserving order, still her schools are always successful and really profitable.

DISTRICT NO. 4.—BISCO DISTRICT.

JOHN WHITMAN, Agent.

Summer Term, taught by Miss Nellie F. King. Length of school, 44 days. Wages, \$1.75; board, \$1.50 per week. Number of scholars registered, 21; average number 14.

This was a fair school. It was Miss King's first effort, and, though there was some slight deficiency in the order, which can easily be remedied in another school, we will give her the credit of being a good teacher.

Winter Term, taught by Albert Pottle. No Register returned. This, for the first effort of a teacher, was a remarkably good school. Thoroughness, promptness, and good order marked the whole term.

DISTRICT No. 5.—PORTER DISTRICT.

A. T. DUNHAM, Agent.

Summer School, taught by Fannie A. Bradbury. Length of school, 44 days. Wages, \$1.50; board, \$1.45 per week. Number of scholars registered, 28; average number 18. This was Miss

Bradbury's first school, yet she applied herself to the work, and gave, we think, good satisfaction.

Winter School, taught by Otis B. Rawson. Not yet closed. Mr. Rawson has taught several terms in this district. It will be seen that the parents appreciate his services. Mr. Rawson is a good scholar, and a good teacher. He moves very quietly among his scholars and has the respect of all.

DISTRICT No. 6.-WEST PARIS.

H. G. Brow, Agent.

Summer School, taught by Miss M. H. Rawson. Length of school, 45 days. Wages, \$4.75; board, \$2.75 per week. Number of scholars registered, 72; average number, 52.

Miss Rawson is an experienced teacher, having taught ten schools before, but she did not succeed as well as some of less experience. She lacked the one element essential to a good school—the faculty of gaining the good-will and respect of her scholars.

Winter School, (West End), taught by A. E. Herrick. Length of school, 42 days. Wages, \$30.00 per month; board, \$3.00 per week.

This was one of the successful schools of the town. The experience, energy and ability of the teacher, rendered the school deservedly popular with its patrons, and highly satisfactory to the committee.

East End, taught by Seth Benson. Length of school, 30 days. Wages, \$30 per month; board, \$2.00 per week.

Punctuality, order and progress were prominent elements in the school.

But seven marks of tardiness during the term. A private school now in session attests the interest of the district and their appreciation of the teacher's services. This is Mr. Benson's seventeenth term.

DISTRICT No. 7.—HALL DISTRICT.

ABIJAH C. HALL, Agent.

Summer School, taught by Mary E. Bowker. Length of school 44 days. Wages \$2.00, board \$1.23 per week. Number of scholars registered, 21; average number, 14.

This was not so successful a school as some it was our privilege to visit. More experience may, perhaps, enable Miss Bowker to preserve better order, and throw a little more energy into her manner in the school room.

Winter School, taught by Miss Lorette Andrews. Length of school 44 days. Wages \$4.00, board \$1.95. Number of scholars registered, 23; average number, 21.

Miss Andrews sustained her reputation as a good teacher, though ill health interfered somewhat with the school. This is one of the easiest schools to govern in town. The scholars all seem well disposed.

DISTRICT No. 8.—KING DISTRICT.

CHARLES H. DURELL, Agent.

Summer School, taught by Miss S. A. Chase. Length of school 44 days. Wages \$2.00, board given. Number of scholars registered, 22; average number, 17.

This was Miss Chase's first effort at public teaching, and was a success. By success we mean that it was fully up to the average of our schools. The teacher and scholars seemed to work together in harmony to advance the interests of the school.

The Winter Term was begun by J. F. King, who taught 23 days. Finding at the end of that time that he and the parents of the scholars could not work harmoniously together. he voluntarily left the school. Julius A. Durell then commenced the school, which is now in progress, and has the appearance of being very successful.

DISTRICT No. 9.—Paris Hill.

Grammar Department.—Summer School, taught by Miss Annie C. Holmes. Length of School 50 days. Wages \$2.50; board \$3.00 per week. Number of scholars registered, 33; average number, 21.

An experienced teacher, and a very good school.

Winter School, taught by E. T. Brown. Length of school 40 days. Wages \$36 per month; board \$3.50 per week. Number of scholars registered, 41; average number, 31.

It is not often that a young teacher succeeds so well in his own district. Instruction thorough and systematic, recitations prompt and accurate; in fine, a pleasant and profitable school.

Primary Department.—Summer School, taught by Percis Childs. Length of school 50 days. Wages \$2.00; board \$3.00 per week.

An average school, somewhat deficient in order.

Winter School, taught by Miss Lizzie H. Marble. Length of school 40 days. Wages \$5.50, including board. Number of scholars registered, 34; average number, 26.

This is much the harder department, and requires judgment and discretion to manage it successfully. Miss Marble spared no effort to promote the interest of the school, securing the good will of the scholars and the approbation of the District. It will be no disparagement of the teacher to say, that experience and a will, will secure better order with less effort.

DISTRICT No. 10.—PARTRIDGE DISTRICT.

Summer School, taught by Miss Lizzie H. Marble. Length of school 40 days. Wages \$2.25; board \$1.50 per week. Number of scholars registered, 26; average number 19.

This was Miss Marble's first school. She did very well indeed. One scholar was expelled. It caused a little trouble at first but the school closed in good order.

Winter School, taught by George C. Ryerson. Length of school 40 days. Wages \$29 per month; board \$2.90 per week. Number of scholars registered, 28; average number, 23.

This school was very satisfactory to the District. Good progress was made in the several classes.

DISTRICT No. 11.—STEARNS DISTRICT.

Summer School, taught by Miss Eliza A. Swift. Length of school 43 days. Wages \$2.00; board \$1.20 per week. Number of scholars registered, 24; average number, 17.

Winter School. This term was commenced under the instruction of George D. Willis, but on account of ill health he was obliged to leave. Hannibal H. Houghton then commenced the school, which is still in progress. It appeared well when visited by the Committee. Mr. Houghton goes into the work with his whole heart, and according to report, his labors are appreciated.

DISTRICT No. 12.—HARBOR DISTRICT.

Summer School; taught by Miss Josie Child. No register returned.

Miss Child is one of our first class teachers. She is well adapted to the work. Miss Child has the peculiar faculty of making the school room a pleasant home for the scholar. Order good. Scholars made very good progress.

Winter School, taught by Charles B. Benson. Length of school 59 days. Wages \$35 per month, including board.

Mr. Benson is a good teacher. At our last visit we were highly pleased with the recitations. The reading was very good, and the scholars acquitted themselves well in the various branches they had been pursuing. It seemed to be a marked point with the teacher that the scholars should thoroughly understand all they passed over, especially in Arithmetic. Order was good.

DISTRICT No. 13.—Tubbs District.

This is a small District, and they have but one term of school a year. The school is now in progress. The examination of the teacher was highly satisfactory, and reports from the District indicate that the school gives satisfaction to the inhabitants.

DISTRICT No. 14.—Mountain District. Julius A. King, Agent.

Winter School, taught by Miss H. A. B. Cushman. Length of school 44 days. Wages \$5.00; board \$1.75. Number of scholars registered, 38; average number, 30.

As Miss Cushman has taught twenty-one terms, we conclude that she has arrived at years of discretion, at least her works indicate experience and ability. The instruction was such as the wants of the District demanded,—thoroughness in first principles,—the basis of sound education. This was the teacher's first school, and we take pleasure in giving it honorable mention. The large average attendance indicates the interest of the District, and the co-operation of all to sustain the school.
