Swimming pool panel will meet with town officials

BUCKSPORT — Despite last week's decision to hire a Boston firm to design, prepare bidding documents, and oversee construction of a new or renovated swimming pool, the decision on which option will be selected hasn't been made yet.

Town Manager Susan M. Lessard confirmed that yesterday, and said she plans a meeting with a blue ribbon panel of residents and councilors studying those choices before proceeding.

'She also said the \$60,000 she recommended be spent to hire BHA, Inc., a Boston-based

planning, civil engineering and surveying firm, could prove to be a lesser amount if less consulting work is needed.

Three firms bid for the work, one - CES Engineering in Brewer - at \$69,900 and the third - Arcadia Designworks in Portland - at \$69,000 to \$71,000.

Lessard plans to meet with the head of the Ellsworth YMCA; David Keene, who has headed up the local pool review committee; and others to discuss recent findings at the town pool.

The goal remains having a usable pool by the next swimming season.

Bonds up to council

New members to be consulted

BUCKSPORT — While Bucksport voters have endorsed spending up to \$3 million in borrowed money over the next three years to improve the town's roads, it will be up to the Town Council to decide what will be done where and how the projects will be financed.

The structuring of the proposed sale of municipal bonds is crucial, for the entire roadbuilding program has the potential to raise the average real estate taxpayers' bill by roughly \$100-a-year for each of the next ten years.

That estimated extra million to the tax rate will be in addition to diverting some of the

interest the town earns on its bank investments to pay the interest on the originally planned ten-year bonds.

The bond options will be discussed at the first council meeting in January when two new councilors - Kathy Downes and Edward Rankin Jr., take office. At the last session, James Morrison joined the council, filling a vacancy, so three of the seven councilors will be new to the deliberations.

In an interview yesterday (11/26), Town Manager Susan M. Lessard said she considers the \$3 million figure "the upper limit." The actual sum spent on the roads could be less," she said.

IN THE WORKS . . . Weekly tidbits gleaned from the news

LIGHTS OUT . . . STILL — Despite repeated complaints about the late-night darkness on the Penobscot Narrows Bridge, the key lighting has been out since about the first of September.

Several explanations have been offered but no assurance when full lighting will be returned.

SAVING WATER — The Town Council was so impressed with the projected savings from installing new toilets and a urinal at the Town Office building, they've asked the town manager to research what it would cost to upgrade the plumbing in other town-owned buildings.

Luke Chiavelli, the town's code enforcement officer, has suggested the water consumption at the town offices could be cut in half. However, no dollar figures were offered on how money would be saved, either at the town offices or at any of the other buildings. Complicating things is the fact that some new toilets were installed earlier this year at the public restrooms on the waterfront, and these, too, might become candidates for

replacements.

COOLING DOWN — The town fathers were so impressed with the water situation they moved on to take up the idea of replacing all of the thermostats in other Town office buildings with automatic ones which would lower the heat at the end of each business day and bring it back up shortly before the employees arrived each morning.

The new gear was suggested, in part, by the town's move to three-day weekends at the building, which would allow for automatically lowered heat levels on Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays. While an employee could override the thermo-

stat in the area in which he or she were working, the temperature would revert to the previous preset level after a period of time.

SUN POWER — The town soon should have a full year of electric bills to calculate the savings on energy it has achieved by allowing a private firm to install solar panels atop the Town Garage on Central Street.

While theoretically the town gets a credit for the energy produced there on its power bills for most of its buildings, the total so far has failed to yield enough to offset the power consumed at the garage on a year-round basis.

MOVED — The **Bucksport Bay**

The chamber was unable to raise the more than \$100,000 it was seeking to buy and renovate the Grange building.

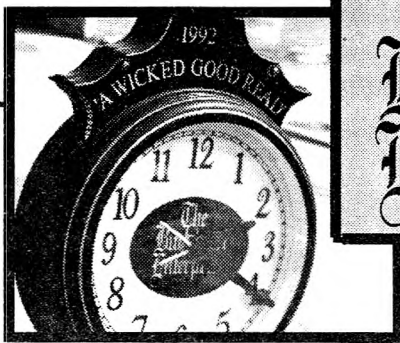
Time out!

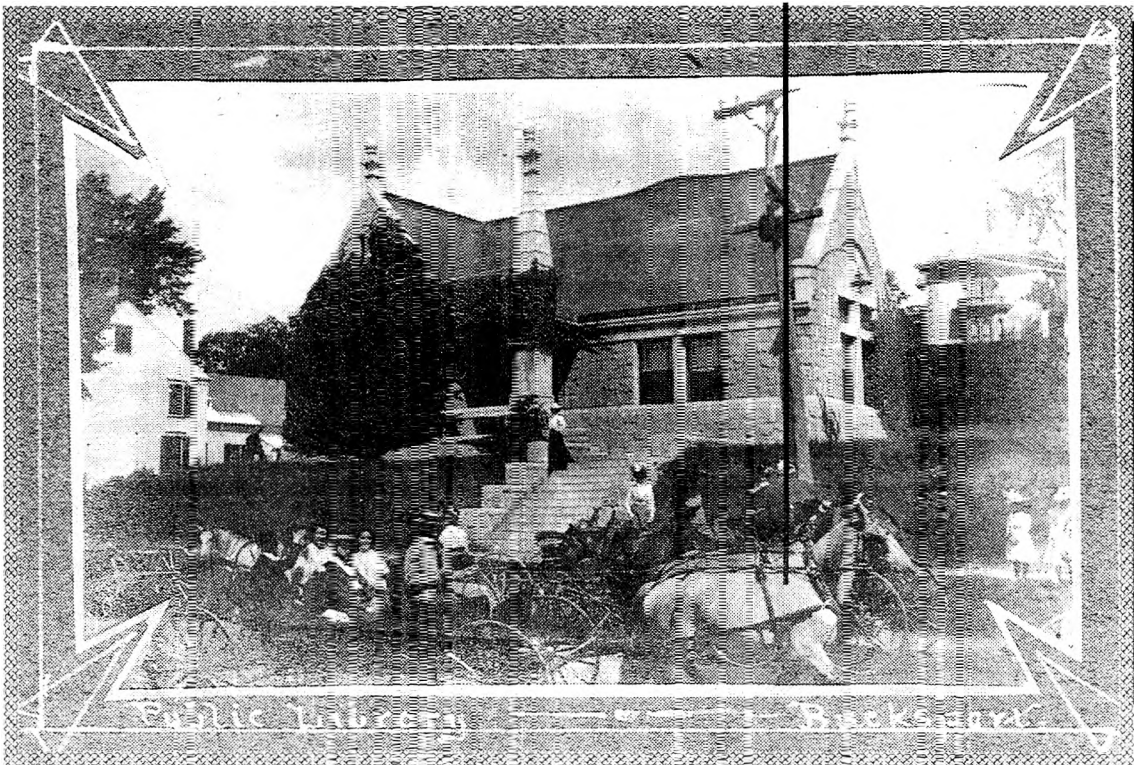

When I was growing up, there were paper mills all across rural Maine. They provided good-paying jobs, and a skilled workforce, and gave families the foundation they could rely on for a bright future.

When a changing economy shuttered so many mills, thousands of hardworking Maine people were left without a way to provide for their families.

Faced with uncertainty and economic instability, Maine people could have focused on their own families first and just ignored the needs of their neighbors.

But we know that is not the Maine way.

In 2003, in the wake of several mill closures, Solidarity Harvest was founded. Every year since then, unions, farmers, faith communities, volunteer organizations, and businesses have gotten together every year to provide locally-grown food to laid-off workers and families who have hit hard times.

Last year more than 400 people — including some past recipients of meals — and 50 organizations volunteered their time and resources to Solidarity Harvest to distribute 1,300 meals to families in Maine.

This month, I was proud to join volunteers for "Sort Week" to help Solidarity Harvest assemble food baskets to be delivered to recipients before Thanksgiving Day.

Maine farms and the farmers who run them are a cornerstone of our state's economy, producing a variety of high-quality crops that contribute substantially to our way of life.

There is no reason for anyone to go hungry in Maine when we have healthy food grown by our neighbors right at our fingertips.

The baskets distributed by Solidarity Harvest combine fresh vegetables along with apples, home-

made apple cider and bread and a turkey with all the fixings — all provided by Maine community members, farms, and businesses.

Solidarity Harvest is just one of the many charitable organizations helping Maine people in need during this holiday season.

From Solidarity Harvest to Stuff the Bus, which is led by Chuck Igo and provides food to Preble Street Kitchen, I urge all of you to see how you and your family might lend a helping hand this holiday season.

Looking out for one another is at the heart of our state, just as bringing people together to celebrate life's blessings has been at the heart of the Thanksgiving holiday since its creation.

On October 3, 1863 President Abraham Lincoln declared a National day of Thanksgiving.

"In the midst of a civil war of unequalled magnitude and severity...peace has been preserved with all nations, order has been maintained, the laws have been respected and obeyed, and harmony has prevailed everywhere..." he said. "No human counsel hath devised, nor hath any mortal hand worked out these great things. They are...gracious gifts... It has seemed to me fit and proper that they should be solemnly, reverently, and gratefully acknowledged as with one heart and one voice by the whole American people. I do, therefore, invite my fellow-citizens in every part of the United States, and also those who are at sea and those who are sojourning in foreign lands," he said, "to set apart and observe the last Thursday of November next as a Day of Thanksgiving."

As we gather to give thanks this Thanksgiving, let us remember the gracious gifts we have received and let us extend our hands to welcome others to our tables, to our homes, and to our hearts. That is the Maine way.

This month the company got the last of the state permits it required to move ahead.

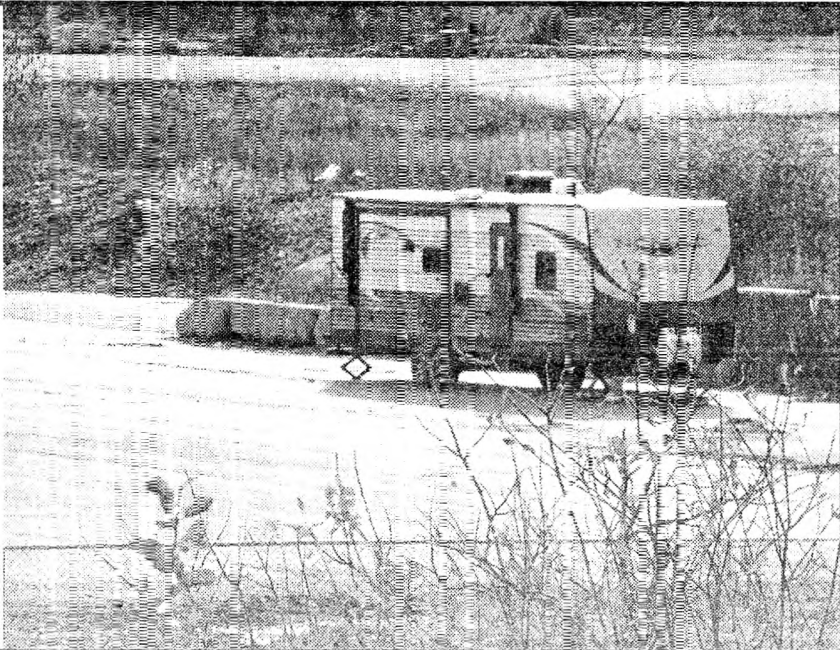

great-grandchildren; a sister, Alice Clair of Bar Harbor; a sister-in-law, Loraine Clair of Orrington; and many nieces and nephews.

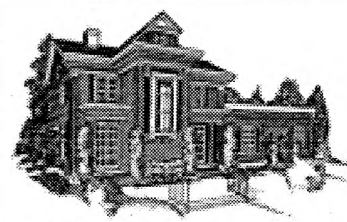

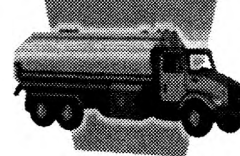

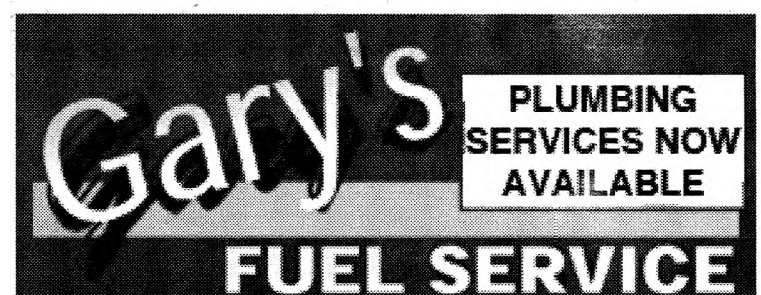

PORTLAND — Some things apparently just aren't meant to be. The Golden Bucks returned home on Saturday evening lugging a prestigious runner-up Class D football state championship plaque for their school's trophy case. However, they left behind their dream of winning it all there on the turf of Fitzpatrick Stadium.

Their many fans shared their disappointment as the previously undefeated Bucks succumbed slowly to Lisbon 28-8.

While the Bucks dug deep and sought to again power their way to glory, Lisbon proved too fast, too agile to be contained as had so many of the Bucks' opponents this season. It was Lisbon's first state title since 2006.

Bucksport, which last won a state title in 2004, and has come close several times since, was thwarted once again. Their record for the season: 9-1.

Bucksport stomped one team after another, save for a game against Foxcroft Academy. In that one the Golden Bucks dug down to achieve a come-from-behind victory by scoring 21 unanswered points in the fourth quarter, one of the most exciting seven minutes of Golden Bucks football.

Bucksport actually gained more yardage than Lisbon, 299-264, the Bucks' Jaxon Gross rushed for 192 yards - and the team's only TD - on 31 carries.

In the end, on Saturday Lisbon played the better game, especially in the air, and they made fewer mistakes.

Still, the Bucks had no cause for a pity party. They played a memorable season. They earned the respect of their coaches - men who are not easily impressed - and their fans. They also came away from it with a lifetime of memories and left an enviable legacy for future Golden Bucks. A defeat - even a tough and agonizing one - only makes any future victory in life more meaningful.

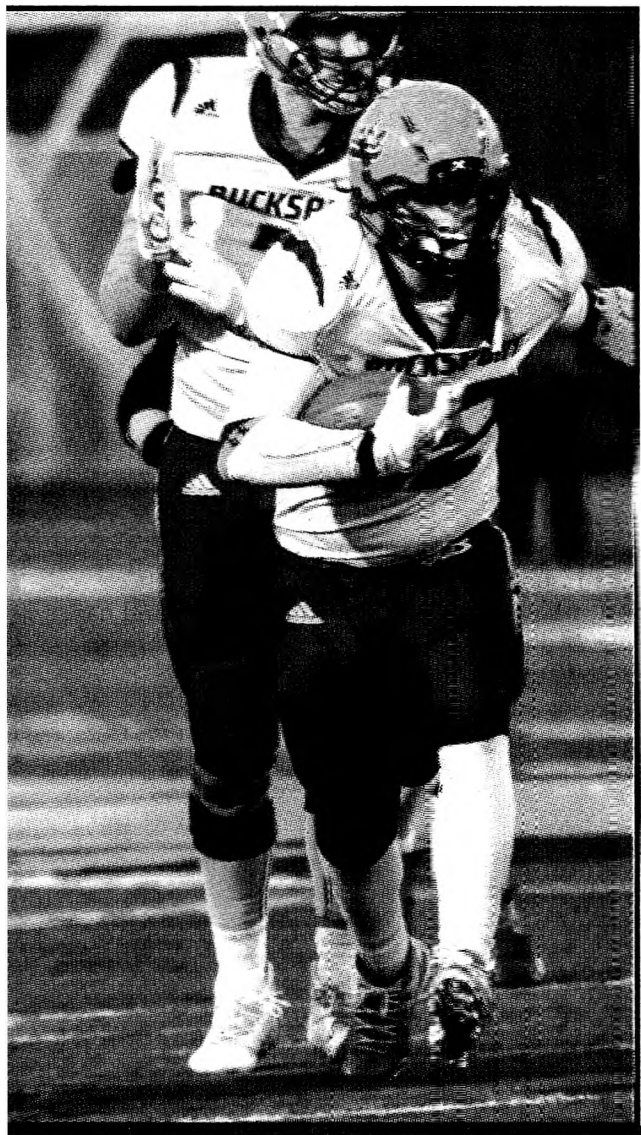

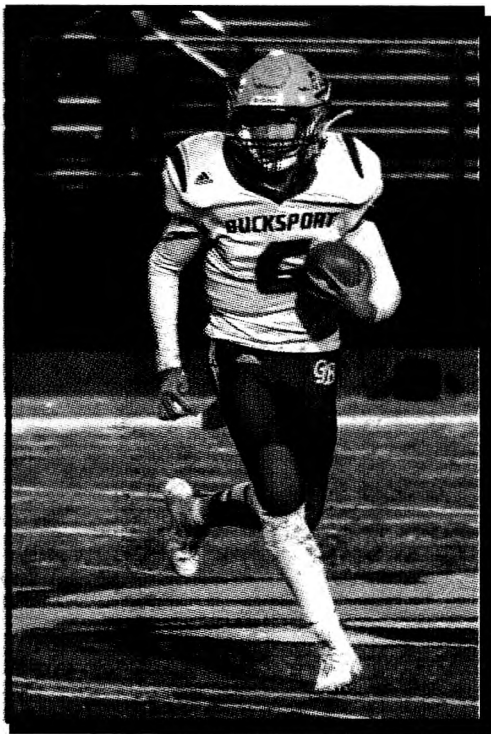

Coming soon: Four downtown murals

BUCKSPORT — Main Street Bucksport has been given Maine Expansion Arts Fund money from the Maine Community Foundation to underwrite four large murals in downtown Bucksport.

Main Street Bucksport first commissioned a mural that was unveiled at the 2018 Bucksport Arts Festival beside the local branch of the Camden National Bank. That mural, across the road to the marina from the

Lighthouse Arts and Education Center was done by an Ellsworth artist.

Next year, local artists can submit applications to a jury consisting of Bucksport-based arts educators and downtown business owners. The murals are to be in place by next summer.

Preference will be given to Bucksport-based artists and all of the money will be paid to the artists for their work.

The locations still are to be

determined.

Owners of downtown properties interested in having a mural can contact Main Street Bucksport.

More downtown public art was one of the goals set by the Bucksport Heart and Soul program and the ADAPT comprehensive development plan prepared by a Saratoga Springs, NY consulting firm using nearly \$300,000 in federal cash.

Fiberight passes key trash test, firm reports

HAMPDEN — The Municipal Review Committee (MRC) and Coastal Resources of Maine have stopped picking up part of the tab because the new Fiberight plant here has been slow in getting up to speed in processing municipal rubbish.

Until Nov. 1, the two agencies had been making payments

to participating communities - including Bucksport - to truck their excess trash to other sites, including landfills because of the repeated delays.

Bucksport has long since severed its trash handling arrangement with the Penobscot Energy Recycling Co. plant in Orrington. The town still uses

the PERC operation for processing old tires. Orland built a new recycling center, and continues to use the PERC plant.

However, the Hampden plant has passed a required performance test. As a result, the MRC members' waste is being mingled with recyclable materials and then processed in Hampden.

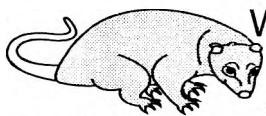

Captain John Smith, one of the founders of Jamestown, Virginia, recorded about 50 Powhatan Indian words. William Strachey, a writer, recorded about 500 words. They spelled the words based on their sounds. The language of the Powhatan is no longer spoken, but people are studying the language. And, some words we use today, such as "raccoon," have come from this language!
