

Stafford B.H. to Mar 27 1865

General

I have the honor of acknowledging
the receipt of your telegram received yesterday
saying that the "Lewiston Light Infantry" to be
recognised - Will General Jackson know it
and yourself resign? I confess General does
not comprehend you meaning - I presume
for the sake of argument that the Govem thinks
and decides that the "L L Infantry" is still in
the State of Maine On that point I beg leave to
differ and will state my reason - The L L
Infantry as such and under its own name
offers its services to the State of Maine for 2 years
its services were accepted. It was permitted to
go into the U.S. service under the officer then
holding commission - All of the men who
went out in the company for 3 months were
bona fide members of the company having
been properly professed. These men submitted
to the usual test of the investigating commis-
sioner and under this recommendation
were elected members of the company -
Special Order No 67 Head Quarter Adjutant
General Office Augusta Aug 31 1861 orders into
camp 10 companies all of which compone-
nt were in the first Mass Regt to serve out the
residue of the two years for which the number of
said companies were originally enlisted -

At the time Capt. Stern & Lieut. Broutta and
myself resign'd - Capt. Jackson having previously
resigned. This resignation was accepted - but
Broutta was subsequently commissioned Captain
and private Bullets to Rankin Line. They
are still its officers and the officers of the L.
Infantry. Those who joined the company at
Portsmouth who were not in the first Mass. did
so under authority from the Governm. granted
in the same Order above referred to. and as
such were equally members of the L. Infantry
The Legislature one year ago virtually acknowledged
the position I have taken when they refused to
pass the Military Bill submitted to them. on
the ground that all of the military men and
the old companies were absent from the State
and you yourself endorsed the same
opinion the winter to me when you intimated
to pay to me the 1000 due the company at
Lewiston for the service of its clerk - I know
that the Governm. is the commandant in chief
and as such is the proper person to consider
the less or doubtful questions but I do hope
for the credit of a State that has done so much
for the military that you will not carry
into execution what is contained in your
dispatch. Why is the matter allowed to rest
till the late day - and now more than 23 months
of our 24 have expired - and is a few weeks

we hope to be in our own land State - a
proposition comes up for us to resign - How is
it with the friends of the "Auburn Artillery," "Portsmouth"
"Bullock's Blue," "Norway L Infantry," and other old
organizations? Do the friends of those companies wish
I have the fact that they are now in the field
now? I do not believe they do, and I cannot
believe any true friend of the ~~Ld~~ Infantry wishes
it to be so or regards to them - If there is another
company needed in ~~Federal~~. why not organize
one. My wish to gain credit and popularity
by stirring to elevate thoughts on the downfall
of the ~~Ld~~ Infantry? If one wish to join their co
let them come out here, and they will find a
good chance to run the country - General
I fear that this is your selfish design in
the matter. Something is to be made out
of the old organizations, and particularly its
officer and here you rigour - I do not for
a moment accuse you of any such design
but you are in many ways to pull the
nuts from the fire -

I have written this after
conferring with Capt Thowles - He fully
endorses my views. Genl Jackson I have not
seen but am satisfied from conversation
had with him previously that he would
concur - Genl Jackson has already
resigned. He cannot do so again -

I resign me over and another resignation
would be foolish - Capt Knowles decline
resigning - Genl I have written the
above with the best of motives - The good
of the service and particularly that of
the L I Infantry I have at heart - and
believe my ideas, as expressed, the more
conducive to the best interest of both
