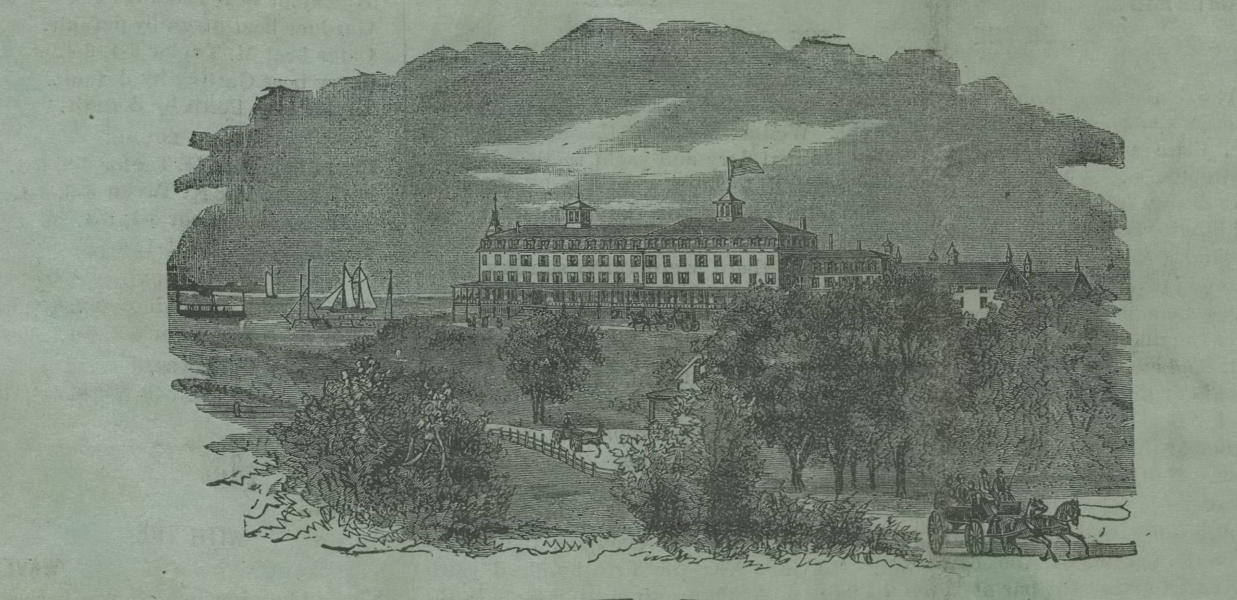

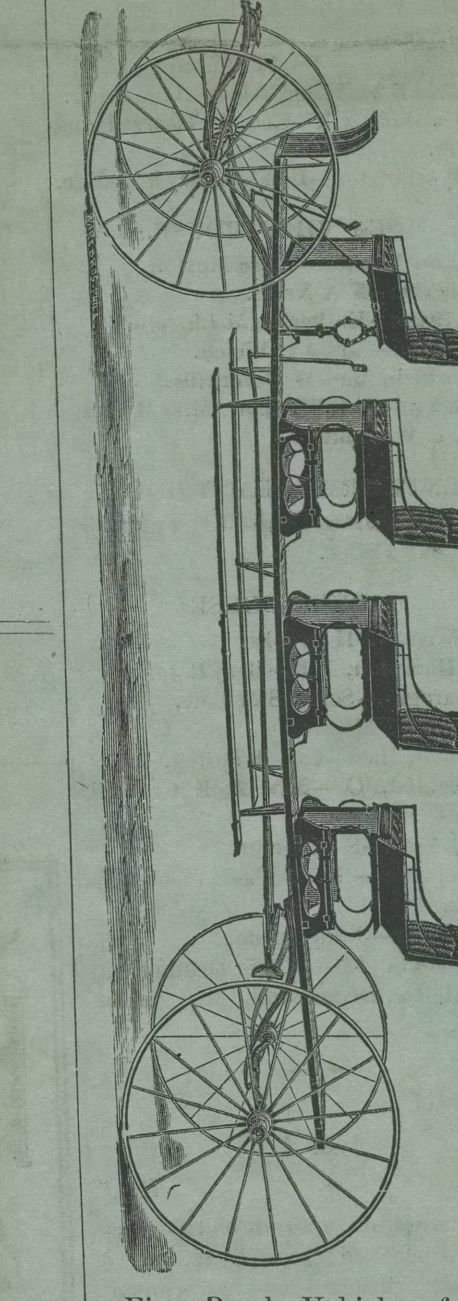

and Mr. Brewer capsized soon after the start amid the laughter of the spectators. The race lasted only about a minute but the spectators were well repaid for their long wait.
