


The Footprints of the 4th

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Belgrade Lakes Sailing Program



elgrade Lakes Sailing Program returns for its fourth season of ${f D}$ beginner and intermediate sailing classes at the Center for all Seasons on Great Pond. The Great Pond Yacht Club has partnered with SailMaine, Maine's premier, nonprofit sailing organization, to offer six weeks of sailing instruction for ages 8-17, including a new class this year for adults and kids. Grandparents and parents are welcome!

The program runs from July 10 through August 18th. The morning program (10:30am-1:30pm) is for beginners aged 8-12 and uses single-handed Optimist dinghies. Students will learn boat rigging, knot tying and basic sailing. The afternoon class (2:00 pm-5:00 pm) is for sailors aged 12-17 and for those who can handle a larger boat (generally sailors at least 100 lbs). The afternoon class is taught in double-handed 420 dinghies with two sailers per boat.

Classes are \$175 per student for a one week 1/2 day class. Financial aid is available. Signing up for multiple week classes is a great way to get your sailor to more advanced levels of sailing. 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The Luckiest Boy

Grammie's Mittens

Before I tell you about my wonderful grandmother Alice Johnson, I need to fill you in on some background.

As a youngster, meaning more or less the age span from 5 to 10 years, during the 1950's, the winter activities in Belgrade Lakes were probably not any different than those of any small New England village. Somewhere in town or perhaps on the outskirts, a hill was claimed and named the "sliding place." In our little village that many of you know from walking the street in the summer, a rather nondescript little hill exists behind what was then my parent's house. It is the house directly across from the lime green house, about midway through town. At any rate, when conditions were good after a snow storm, we few kids in the village would improve a sliding track down over this gentle grade that ran all the way to the Mill Stream. To make this a "fast track" we would snowshoe up and down the hill until we had a track perhaps 4 feet wide. Just at dusk, about 4:00 p.m. in those cold months, we used my mother's sprinkler can and lugged water from the kitchen sink spigot out to the track and sprinkled it on. During the cold night an ice track was created by mother nature. Most days after school, we kids would have wonderful gatherings which we called "sliding parties."

The track was fast for us little munchkins aboard the Flexible Flyer sleds and aluminum discs, even an old time bob sled that could take as many as 5 or 6 kids at once. Sometimes a big chunk of waxed paper worked well too. The one rule that mother enforced was no going out on the Mill Stream ice. Sometimes we were going so fast that we had to purposely tip over just before leaving land for the iced over stream. No ice travel was permitted until the fathers had checked the ice thickness and given the okay. If the thumbs up came we not only slid out onto the stream but in later years had skating parties too, with bonfires right on the ice. Some years the conditions were right to skate all the way out through the narrows and onto Great Pond, though most usually that was not the case. When the dam is open the stream is never safe to skate on.

As you can imagine, kids got wet from the ice and snow and cold hands were a problem. Some kids came with no mittens, and that's where Grammie J. showed her colors. While my mother made hot donuts for us sliders, Gram would call in any kid without mittens. She would instruct them to lay their hand on the table over a piece of felt cloth, then briskly trace around the perimeter of the little hand and send them back out. Within fifteen minutes she would cut out 4 "hands" and sew up 2 mittens that would more than do in a pinch. She'd then yell from the back porch for that child, who left with warm mittens to make a few more sled runs before heading home with warm hands. That was Grammie Johnson, who lived her adult life on School Street in the Lakes. My grandfather Ernest built the house in the early part of the 20th century where they raised 3 boys, Clifford, Albert and Walter. Grampa J. died in 1952 while tending a trap line down in lower Long Pond, actually Ingraham Stream. Grammie spent a lot of time at our house after his death and wintered many more years with Uncle Al and Aunt Lydia Johnson in Boca Raton, Florida where she died in 1959. Thank you Gram for your generosity to all, and for your good humor. I remember that you liked to steal my biscuits at the supper table!





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

The Dams Keeper Report

s of this writing both Great Pond, Long Pond, Salmon/McGrath as well as most of our ponds are still holding their own thanks to those afternoon scattered thunderstorms.

Great Pond is now 2.28" above full pond with Gate 1 opened just 5" or so. to offer a little bit of current in the stream and to make room for those afternoon showers. Long Pond is currently at 1.68" above full with both gates opened 12", again to make room for the forecasted precipitation. Salmon/McGrath is currently right at full pond.

Although at times, the recent showers have appeared to be a real deluge but in fact, for the past few days, we only received .54" of rain in the rain gauge at the Wings Mill dam. And for the next 7 days, NOAA is forecasting more showers but only .56" of rain. Scattered showers are always preferred and result in a lot less phosphorus run off into our ponds than the gulley washers!

Unfortunately for the dam operators, some of those "showers" wind up being a great deal more and can bring the ponds up in a hurry. Just one quarter inch of rain will bring Long Pond up three quarters of an inch and Great Pond up a half inch, which isn't a lot but you can see the effect.

Enjoy this beautiful summer, weather and your vacation!

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


The 4th in Augusta: Festivities Along the Kennebec

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
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


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

Conservation Too -

ast week I'd introduced to you a couple alandowners, Lush Lawn Lenny and Unruly Ursula. They have very different attitudes about how to care for their property. This week I'd like you to meet a "Dudley Do-right" of conservation - Soil Health Sherman. He works with landowners and property managers around the lakes to help them keep rain runoff and stormwater from eroding the soil and depositing erosion and phosphorus into the streams and ponds.

We've discussed stormwater runoff before. "Stormwater" is just that – the rainfall or melting snow that then runs across the landscape in liq-

uid form. Soil Health Sherman has some great advice for people living around the lakes and streams. Sherman can be a bit of a "know it all" but he tries to focus on the basics. The ditch next to your driveway will have a lot of water in it during and soon

after a rainstorm. The culvert beneath your driveway will run full. While that stormwater flow is just nature doing what nature does, nature sometimes does more than usual. We need to prepare for those cases. Sherman can help!

Sherman will provide advice on how to manage that stormwater. In some cases he can even help his crew of workers to help construct, or reconstruct waterways and runoff corridors. He helped Unruly Ursula to design gravel "filtration

steps" so she could get to the water's edge without creating an eroded pathway. And then he helped her install rainbarrels and rain gardens to collect runoff from her roof and parking area. They slowed it down and allowed it to seep into the ground rather than run across her property to the water. Unfortunately Lush Lawn Lenny didn't take the same advice. During a recent heavy rainstorm he lost "control" of the stormwater runoff.

One inch of rain on a single square foot of pavement, sidewalk or roof = 0.6234 gallons of water.

During that big rainstorm recently, Lush Lawn Larry's property flooded from his house, driveway, parking and lawn areas. Those impervious areas channel to the lowest point and cascaded into the lake from a concentrated runoff area. An impervious surface doesn't soak up the rain but

carries it off to another location. For every inch of rain that falls on those surfaces, your property needs to deal with ten's of thousands of gallons of water. Depending upon how your structures are designed, that concentration of water can do a lot of damage. Now consider your property. How much impervious surface do you have? And how is the runoff managed?

What can a property owner do in order to mitigate the damage? Soil Health Sherman had helped Unruly Ursula plan for it! The stormwater was directed into vegetated areas or rain gardens. She'd installed filtration steps. The water from her parking sheeted off the edges and into areas that did not erode the soils.

Take the opportunity now to use some of those BMP's [Best Management Practices]. Sherman, or someone like him can help you focus on how to manage your yard and property. Control the water runoff. Look for places that have been damaged in past storms. It will happen again unless you do something.

A good buffer planting, if well established, does a good job of intercepting water runoff and filtering it before it gets to the lake. The objective is to filter it so it doesn't concentrate and transport soil, chemicals, or other toxics into the water.

Remember, there is a lot to do in order to protect water quality.



Head of Falls, A Novel by Earl H. Smith

fter the two "Dam" novels which brought much hilarity to the Belgrade Dam area residents, we now have an historic novel about Waterville Lebanese immigrants in the good old 1950s, prejudice and all. Remember Elvis Presley and the black and white TV your neighbor had before your family finally bought one?

Seems like yesterday. The popular music, dance steps, high school nervousness, first dates: all this in Waterville with Colby College in the mix. Earl Smith portrays his very sensitive story through the eyes of a teenage girl who has no trouble flaunting custom. She is quite the free spirit and the reader can not help but root for her.


Angela Jamal somehow learns to play classical piano without having an instrument to practice on everyday. The public school music teacher discriminates against the Canadian French (Canucks) and the Lebanese students. This occurs in selection of leads for the musical productions as well as the use of the pianos in the school.

Despite an abusive, drunk father, Angela often finds refuge next door at her best friend's home Margaux Mathieu (polio shriveled leg) and at her piano teacher's home Mr. M.(Lebanese name too long for most). She is nicknamed helping her to catch up. Fortunately, her courses are switched back to college Angel by her caring piano teacher...it is a wonder that no one else endeared her this way before her teenage years? The two girls trek around Waterville to places like The Opera House, various churches, the wire bridge which is on the context to the Waterville scenes we were being so intimately immersed in. I book cover, etc.

A murder mystery is within this teenage trauma story involving the drunken father who spends too much time and money at the local dive. The two girls confront the bartender and somehow force local police to investigate Angela's drunken father's death more thoroughly.

Since most of us have enjoyed many occasions at The Opera House, it is wonderful to read about the musical production held there by the Waterville High School students. Our Angela becomes prominent at the last minute, much to the surprise of everyone.

Her love of Beethoven and Mr. M's fine piano teaching is beautifully



described along with the comfort of a warm escape from a terrifying father. The coziness of Mr. M's small apartment with upright piano and cuddly cat is quite the contrast to Angela's home where the curtains blow in the winter cold. Her brother escapes by signing up for the military and her mother copes by working and attending mass daily.

The cardboard keyboard certainly plays an important role in the story of learning music. Mr. M. explains her talent: she has an ear for music. She practices so much that her homework suffers. Angel loves music. When her courses are changed to boring subjects, Angela decides to buckle down and do her homework with friends

prep, even though her family can not afford the expense of college.

The repeated yearly flashbacks of news bulletins was helpful to bringing must admit I had to google the meteorite that hit a woman in Alabama. Remember that one? She was fine, only minor injury to her hip.
