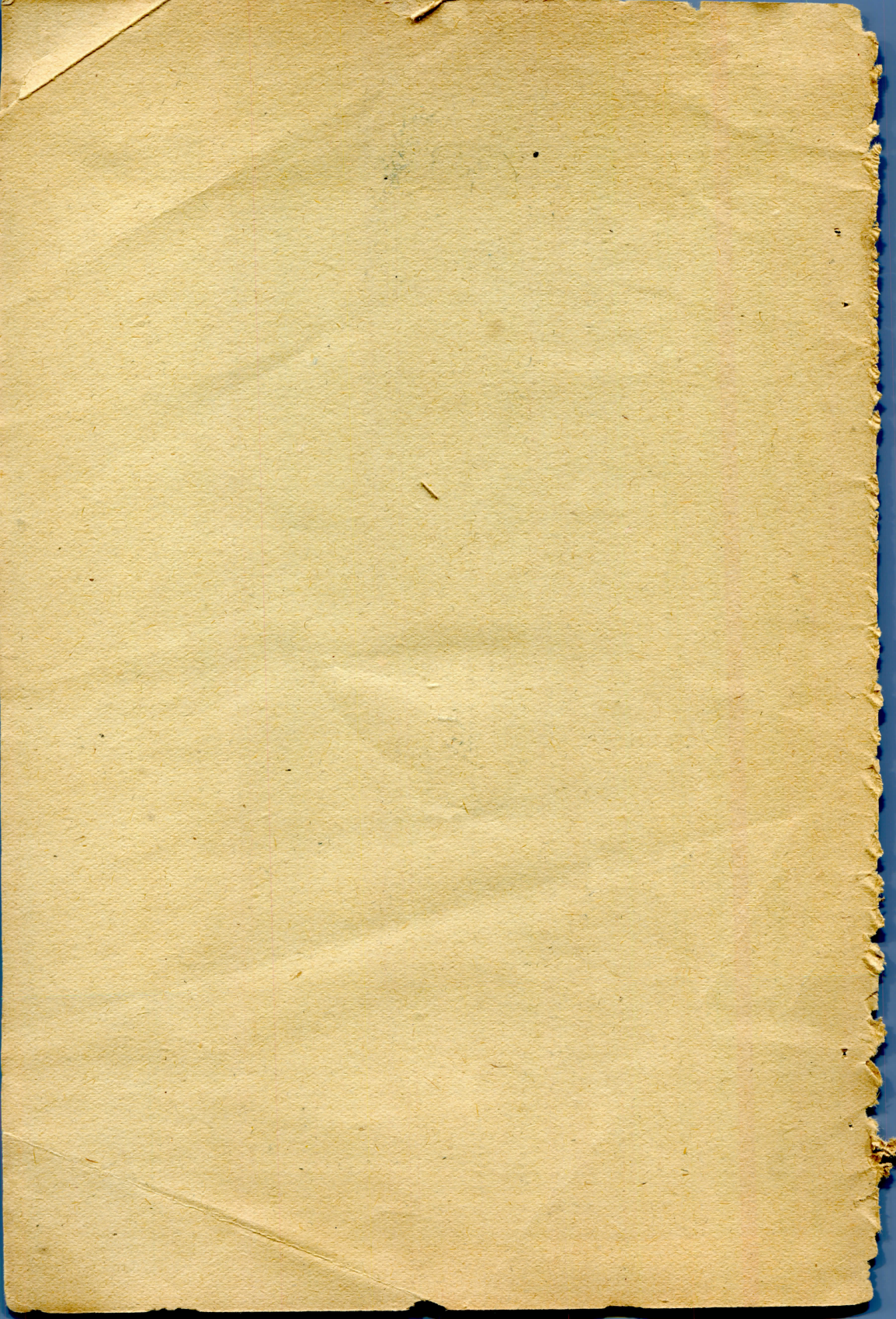

Thirty weeks' school as required by law has been maintained. Whole number of pupils in town by census Apr. 1, 1918, 47. Whole number attending school, 28.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

The school buildings of Westport are better than the average to be found in country towns; better supplied with books, equipment and school libraries than is usually found outside cities and villages.

Notwithstanding influenza epidemic and other unusual conditions, the school year of thirty weeks has been a profitable one for all who had the privilege of attending school.

Before the close of the spring term, the Superintending School Committee recognizing the excellence of the two teachers employed, and the shortage in teachers, which was becoming acute in some sections, took measures whereby their services were secured for the entire year, by voting to raise wages two dollars per week each, to date from beginning of spring term, provided they agree to remain through entire year.

Sometime last summer the Center schoolhouse was entered and the upper panels of one of the rear inside doors completely broken out. Breaking and entering is considered a very serious offense, often resulting in very severe punishment for the offender. The Committee unfortunately has been unable to find out who the author of this mischief was and they will be glad to secure any information leading to his discovery and punishment.

The growing smallness in number of pupils, owing to so many families having moved from town, is greatly to be deplored, but it is hoped that with the coming of spring many will return to the farms, and an accordingly increased attendance in schools be noted.

The change in the personnel of the Superintending School Committee, owing to two members having resigned and gone from town, fortunately, has made but slight, if

any difference in the work, as the new members were not new to school work, and are equally as interested and efficient as were those who resigned.

The year 1918 has been unusual in many ways. High wages, high cost of living, shortages of flour, meats sugar, and labor, the "greatest war the world has ever known" causing America to take her place among the nations of the earth as a world power, influenza sweeping the world, and many minor incidents has caused the past year to be a memorable one in history.

Amid all these changes in the outside world these island schools have gone steadily on, with perhaps the least interruption or loss of any town in Maine.

To myself the year has been a short and pleasant one, and my visits to Westport without any unpleasant incident to mar them.

I wish to thank the children, the people and especially the school committee for the kindness and courtesy I have invariably met with, and the interest all have shown in school work.

## WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

### STATE OF MAINE

TO THOMAS F. KNIGHT, a constable of the town of Westport in the County of Lincoln.

GREETING:—

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Westport qualified by law to vote in town affairs to assemble at Town Hall in said town on Monday the 31<sup>st</sup> day of March 1919 at 12 o'clock in the afternoon then and there to act on the following articles, namely:

Art. 1. To choose a moderator for said meeting

Art. 2. To attend to and act upon the report of the supintendent of schools and town accounts of the selectmen, assessors, overseers of the poor and treasurer.

Art. 3. To choose all necessary officers for the year ensuing.

Art. 4. To see if the town will grant and raise such sums of money as may be necessary to maintain and support the schools and the poor and repairs of highways, ferry, bridges and town buildings, for the year ensuing.

Art. 5. To see what sum of money the town will raise to pay officers, interest, abatements and insurance for the year ensuing.

Art. 6. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for snow bills, tuitions, State and County tax, contingent expenses, school books, supplies, equipment for the year ensuing.



Art. 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the salary of Supt. of schools for the year ensuing.

Art. 8. To see if the town will vote yes or no on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid as provided in section 18 of Chapter 25 of the Public Laws of 1916.

Art. 9. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00, for the improvement of section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State highway commission in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provision of Section 18 of Chap. 25 of the Public laws of 1916.

Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of State Aid highways during the ensuing year within the limits of the town under the provisions of Section 18 of the Public Laws of 1913.

Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen and treasurer to hire, in anticipation of taxes such sums of money as may be necessary, the year ensuing.

Art. 12. To see if the town will vote to raise money and what sum for the pay of a man to run the ferry.

Art. 13. To see what action the town will take in regard to the rent and janitor service of town hall.

Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will raise to support of a Motor Express connecting the lower end of the island with the trains at Wiscasset.

Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will raise to cut bushes on the highway.



Art. 16. To see if the town will accept the list of jurors as drawn by the town officers.

Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to abate the tax of Mrs. Philena T. Kahail, also the poll tax of Elmer Greenleaf being a discharged soldier of the United States army.

Art. 18. To see what action the town will take in regards to fire wardens for year ensuing.
