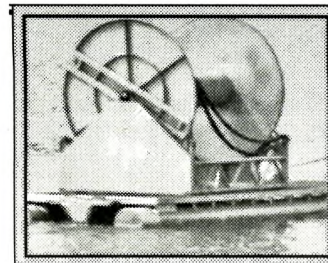

## Convenience store approved

BUCKSPORT — With a permit approved this week, construction will begin almost immediately on a Leadbetter Super Store convenience outlet on U.S. Route 1.

The store, which will include a kitchen providing a variety of quick-serve items, six gasoline pumps and a car wash should be ready to open by early spring, according to Jeff Leadbetter, one of the owners.

The store will be similar to other Leadbetter outlets in nearby communities although it will be about 500 square feet smaller than the one the brothers opened recently on Broadway in Bangor.

While running about a month behind schedule, the plan is to get the foundations in place before the frost sets in and continue the construction work throughout the winter, Leadbetter said.

The Leadbetters plan to remove the now-antiquated automatic touchless system from their current carwash on State Route 46, and replace it with an additional self-service vehicle wash bay.

Six Shell-branded gasoline pumps on three fuel islands under a protective canopy will be served by a 15,000-gallon underground tank. The compartmentalized tank will store gasoline, but diesel fuel won't be offered.

The carwash will be on a heated cement pad for winter use.

The lot will provide parking for 33 vehicles, including several spaces for those with handicap plates.

The store will operate from 6 a.m. to 10 p.m. although the closing hour may be reduced in the winter.

The Leadbetters already have the other permits they require.

## Catholics can expand their Silver Lake cemetery

BUCKSPORT — It took hours of talking at two meetings, plus a site visit, but local Catholics finally got the right to expand their cemetery on the Silver Lake Road.

On Tuesday, the Planning Board finally allowed the effort to continue to provided a church-consecrated burial ground for future generations of Catholics.

The expansion effort had been

stymied by several factors:

- The cemetery is a non-confirming use in what now is a strictly regulated shoreland zone, even though it was established more than 75 years ago on land provided by the long-defunct St. Regis Paper Co.

- Officials of the church had allowed a section of the property to be clear-cut in preparation for adding additional grave plots but without the

required local permit. While they had agreed to make amends and replant some of the trees and other vegetation, a couple of residential neighbors complained about the loss of their privacy.

- One of the boundaries of the St. Vincent de Paul Church-owned graveyard is 'fuzzy' as a result of conflicting layouts and surveys that date back decades.

To answer the issue, the church hired a Brewer engineering firm to relocate the road to the back of the steeply sloped cemetery to make certain the access remains on church land no matter which property description prevails. They also retained a landscape firm to provide buffering vegetation.

After hours of detailed review and much shuffling of paper and two

split votes on procural issues the board on Tuesday finally and unanimously decided the plans adequately protect the lake.

They also backed a 50 by 50 foot gravel lot for up to four vehicles to help the infirm and elderly access the upper portions of the cemeteries for funerals and visits to graves.

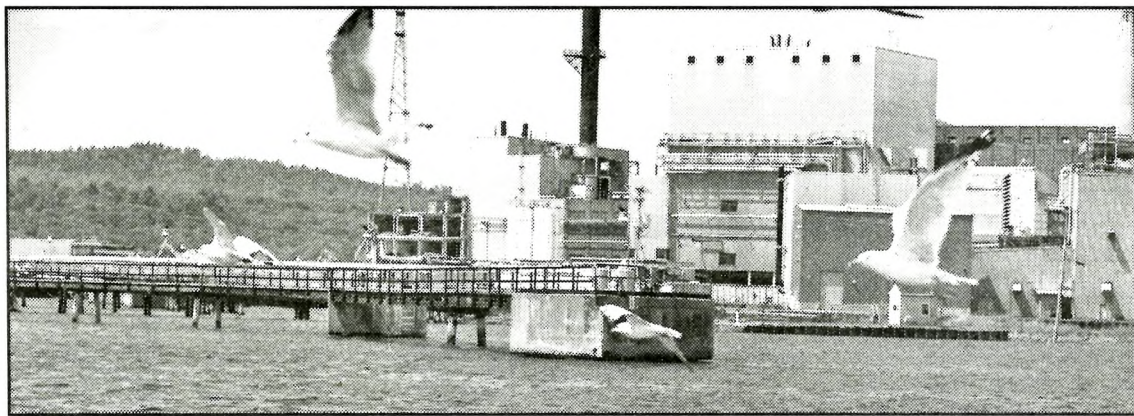
*The Model T, as Henry Ford liked to say, was available in any color the owner wanted — as long as that color was black!*

THE POOL'S got some holes in it! The leaks in the municipal pool became more obvious as the swimming season came to a close. Now that the pool has been drained, town officials will have to decide what to do to get it back into swimmable condition by next summer. Some of the most-recent sealing of the pool off Broadway has failed and chunks of broken-off asphalt were found lying near some of the drains when the pool was emptied, according to Tim Emery, the town's recreation director. The pool - built in 1954 - was completely redone in 1990 and again in 2000, and now may need to be resurfaced yet again, Emery said. He said the mayor's been informed, and a plan to remedy the problems will be developed this winter.

*Meanwhile, the town also is continuing to have problems with keeping ice in the municipal rink. The Miles Lane rink has undergone repeated frequent thawing-and-freezing cycles during recent winters*

SOLD! — The former offices on Main Street that once housed the electricity operations of the Verso Paper Co. and its former partners in the power generating business has been sold to William Nichols, the owner of the Brewer-based plumbing firm. Nichols also bought a mobile home on a tiny lot at 117 Main Street from Wayne Reum for \$12,500. Both were private personal real estate investments by Nichols,

according to an employee at his plumbing company.

## Morrison challenges incumbents

BUCKSPORT — James R. Morrison took it down to the wire, but last Friday he made it official: he's going to seek to oust one of the two incumbent town councilors seeking re-election.

Morrison, of 4 Morrison Lane, long has been critical of some of the actions taken by the current council. He now faces Mayor David G. Keene and Councilor Robert G. Carmichael Jr.

The top two vote-getters on the Nov. 8 ballot will win the two three-year seats that will be available.

Morrison had gathered the requisite number of signatures but waited until the Friday deadline to turn them in to gain a listing on the ballot.

Morrison ran unsuccessfully once before, but has remained a regular at council and council subcommittee meetings. He often has shared his thoughts during the public comment portions of the meetings.

Running unopposed for a three-year seat on the RSU 25 School Board is Peter Clair. Clair holds one of the four Bucksport seats on the eight-member panel, with Orland

having two seats and Prospect and Verona Island each having one. School Board votes are cast on a weighted basis, the percentage attributed to each member being based on the population of the community they represent.

A fourth potential council candidate, Bruce A. Clement Sr. of 198 Russell Hill Road, took out nomination papers but chose not to turn them in to the town clerk before the deadline Friday (9/2). Clement, too, ran unsuccessfully for the council once before.



# Two arrested, but district attorney's office ends case

## Sale of drugs may have been involved

BUCKSPORT — Two men were arrested and taken to jail after an alleged assault and robbery at a Franklin Street residence on Aug. 31, but the district attorney's office later declined to prosecute the case so the pair were released.

The Bucksport Enterprise is withholding the names of the two who were arrested because it appears the Hancock County district attorney's office has declined to prosecute them.

Matthew J. Foster, the district attorney, did not return repeated telephone calls to explain why the case was declined by his office.

Local police declined to specify the items that were said to have been taken. However, there are some indications a quantity of drugs may have been involved.

Both mens' names are listed in the official log of Bucksport arrests, a record required to be maintained of every arrest made by a law enforcement agency.

One of those arrested, a 29-year-old Bucksport man was picked up in Bucksport and the other, a 28-year-old Orrington man, was arrested in that town by Penobscot County authorities.

Both were taken to the Hancock County jail in Ellsworth. Each later was released.

The allegation was lodged in Bucksport about 9:30 p.m. on Aug. 21 by a man who claimed to have been beaten with a weapon.

Some \$200 and other items were said to have been taken from the alleged victim and from the residence.

That provided a \$2,500 boost to the playground project.

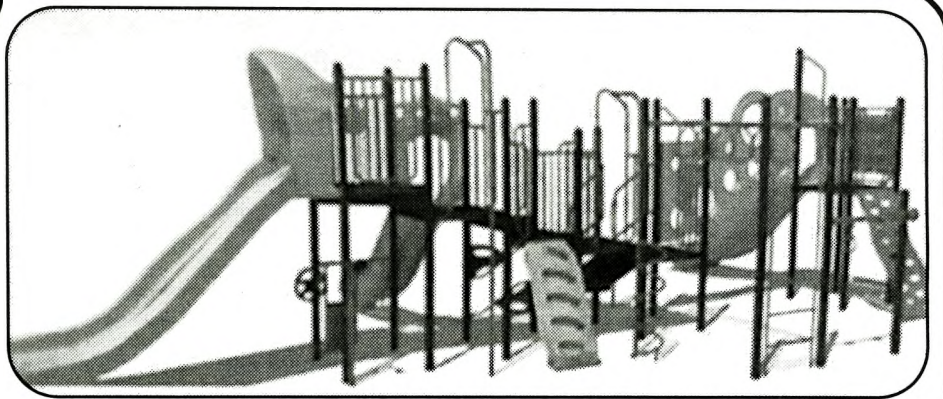
Town Clerk **Connie Brown** and **Mike Malenfant**, the manager of the Orland Community Center where the playground gear will be installed, accepted the check.

# EDITORIAL

## A painful process



The Bucksport Planning Board always seems to do the right thing, but getting there often is tortuous, lengthy and, too often, overly expensive for those appearing before the panel.

It's good the area's Catholics can continue to use their traditional burial ground for generations to come, that an industrial park property owner now has the access he needs to prosper and a convenience store with gas pumps and a carwash will open on U.S. Route 1 in the spring. The Planning Board made all three happen this week. But it took over six hours at three meetings just to decide the graveyard proposal.

There's a better, simpler and more efficient way to reach the same right conclusions. Rather than seven laymen spending hours poring over engineering documents and raising issues that aren't always within the scope of the board's authority, the town - and the applicants - would be better served by having the panel's staff person handle the mechanics of the initial review.

Let the staff person highlight whether an application is complete, and then pinpoint the issues that truly deserve the board's attention. Any member always can add to the list if she or he believes something's been missed. However, in the meantime, time and a separate vote won't be wasted on whether adding a licensed massage therapist to an existing tanning salon's services will have an impact on the shellfish in the bay simply because the salon is in a shoreland zone. (*Yes, that actually happened here.*)

Study how the other planning boards in the area do it, and then truly make Bucksport "certified business-friendly."

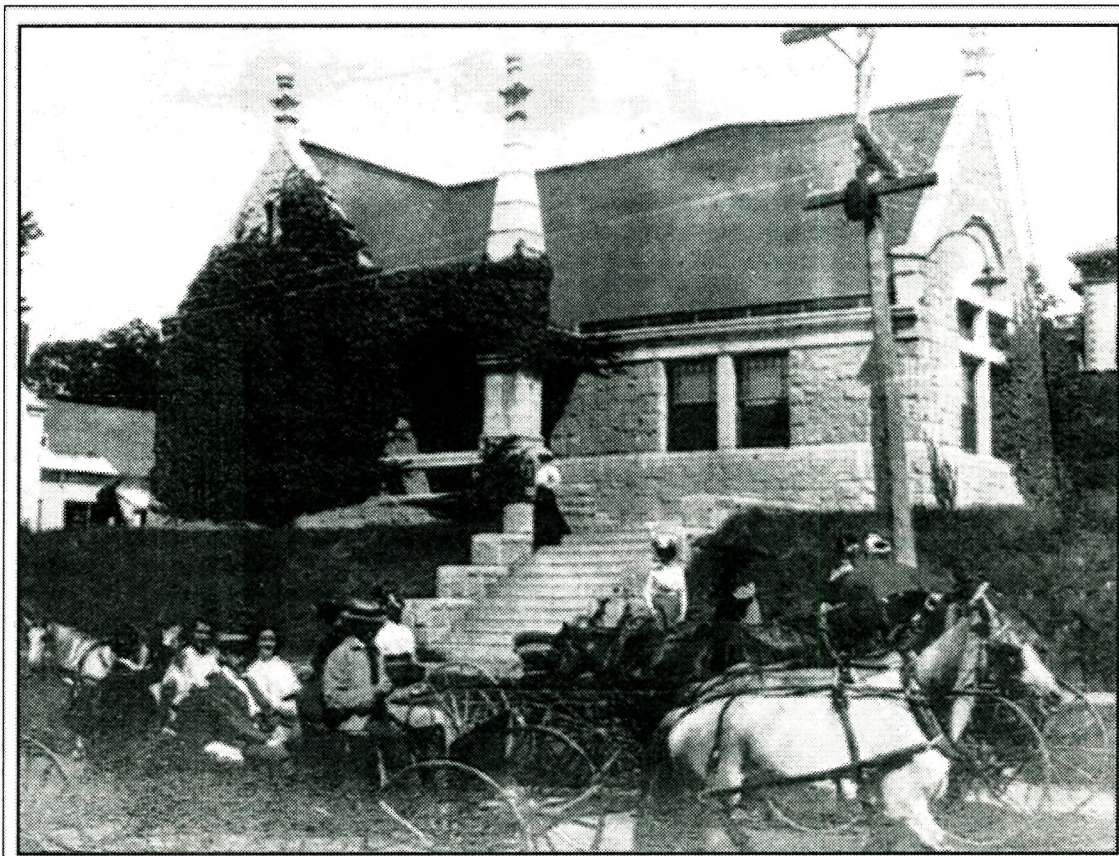

However, the approval came after many more questions. Some board members questioned why the small parking area would be gravel while the access road would be grassed. Others wondered who would regularly check that the planned drainage areas were working properly in future years. And there were questions about who would oversee the re-planting of the area disturbed by the clear-cutting of trees and underbrush.

Jeffrey Hammond, the town's code enforcement officer, noted he would be responsible that all areas within 100 feet of the shore of Silver Lake were replanted properly. He said he would work with the cemetery manager and the landscape installer.

And the engineer hired by the church to design the grading and drainage flow areas said a layman can quickly be taught how to best monitor the system for signs of erosion or excessive stormwater runoff.

The church's expansion was considered critical to many Catholics, for without the extra lots at the rear of the graveyard, the cemetery was all but out of burial plots. Most of those which remain available already have been reserved by local families.

Without the expansion, Catholics would have to go out-of-town to find consecrated burial grounds, causing access issues for those who want to visit the graves of friends and family members.

The cemetery on the Silver Lake Road has about a half dozen interments each year.

The engineer moved the proposed access road

to the back of the property and specified that it be grassed rather than graveled or paved to reduce runoff and make it less visible to passersby.

There will be a thin narrow lot between the cemetery and the nearest homes. That property was retained by the paper company and its several successors, presumably to provide access to the mill-owned land behind the cemetery.

That lot now may belong to the American Iron & Steel (AIM) affiliate that purchased the mill and now is salvaging all the metal on the River Road site. The same AIM affiliate also owns the water rights and dam at the man-made Silver Lake, as well as the rights to most of the water that flows through the watershed from Toddy Pond and Alamoosook Lake in Orland to Silver Lake and then on to the mill.

The church's engineer showed a diagram on where an earthen and rock berm will be built to "thin" or slow the flow of runoff of water from the site as well as trap any erosion or other sedimentation to keep it from flowing into the lake across the road.

The immediate neighbors, Paul Bires and his son, cited their concern about the lack of a proper documented survey of the church land. They also said they were worried about developing additional burial lots on the steeply sloped cemetery.

The engineer responded that he and his fellow engineers are certain that the relocated access road definitely is on church-owned land no matter how the conflicting data about the sideline is decided.

# Board backs industrial park access request

BUCKSPORT — A request for a second access to a septage processing business in the town's industrial park went nowhere in 2013, but on Tuesday a new owner got the deal done.

The owner of the Evergreen Recycling asked for - and got - Planning Board approval to add a second entrance top the site in the Buckstown Heritage park off State Route 46.

The second entrance will

make it easier for the new owner's larger trucks to enter and leave the property. It also will open more of the site for storage and provide better maneuverability for the drivers, the new owner said.

Earlier, the previous owner obtained a curb cut permit for the second entrance from the town's public works director, but that permit was rescinded after the code enforcement officer

said there were code issues.

On Tuesday, the code officer, Jeffrey Hammond, said the new owner has remedied the previously unresolved issues.

The former owner sought to address the issue in a Planning Board filing in 2013, but declined to provide additional information and withdrew his request.

The board dismissed that application without prejudice, meaning it could be re-filed.

# Town Council to sign three three-year labor contracts

BUCKSPORT — The Town Council tonight (9/8) is expected to sign three three-year contracts with the union representing Bucksport's firefighters, police and public works employees.

The contracts with Local No. 340 of the Teamsters Union provide increases of 2 percent the first year and 1.5 percent in each of the next two years.

The unionized workers have

been without a contract since July 1.

The pacts already have been discussed by the councilors in detail in a closed session so they are not expected to generate much discussion at tonight's meeting.

ELLSWORTH — After three weeks of pre-season training and countless other miles run during the summer, the high school cross country season started at Ellsworth, where it has started for well over the past 30 years.

As in the past few years, the weather was warm but reasonable for the ten teams that ran on Saturday. with 73, and Daniel finished just ahead of the middle of the pack in 30th place. His time was a full minute and 15 seconds ahead of last year's time, and he now owns the sixth fastest Buck time on the new course.

Tasha Clement raced last in the girls' varsity run. It would be her last time racing the course, something she commented on while previewing the course. 68 girls would toe the line at the terrain. Tasha completed the course in 22:58, finishing in 23rd place and just under 2 minutes faster than last year's time.

The Bucks will race at home on Saturday at the Golden Bucks Invitational, starting at 11 a.m. It'll be the only time the Bucks compete at home this year as the Hancock County competition

will be at George Stevens Academy in Blue Hill.

The Bucks team still is seeking more runners. If a few more sign up, the Bucks will have two full teams to score at meets as the season progresses.

### Verona Island launching ramp fixes unlikely

VERONA ISLAND — The Bucksport's town manager's efforts - backed by town councilors - to encourage the state to significantly improve the Verona Island boat launch ramp have drawn all of the enthusiasm of one hand clapping.

A state official, Thomas Linscott, responded that the least-costly upgrade considered back in 2003 raised both financial and major environmental concerns because it would require filling in a lot of mud flat area.

The addition of iron pilings and an abutment could cost \$250,000 to \$300,000, and could be difficult given the strong currents and the potential for spring ice flow damage.

It also would require a crane to remove and install the piles each year, Linscott said.

The issue will be discussed again in Bucksport tonight (9/8) at 6 p.m. at the Town Offices.

The accident took place on the North Searsport Road about 5:30 p.m. The vehicle was a 2010 Toyota.

The pick-up hit a utility pole and rolled over several times, coming to rest upright.

John Moriarty 59, of Bangor, Brad Pomeroy, 35, of Searsport and Adam Littlefield 31, of Winterport were thrown-

from the vehicle.

Moriarty apparently was the driver.

Moriarty and Pomeroy died at the scene, while Littlefield was taken to the Eastern Maine Medical Center in Bangor for treatment of multiple critical injuries.

A dog also was thrown from the truck, but it survived with a very minor injury. It was being held at the Bucksport animal shelter, awaiting retrieval by a family member of one of those who had been in the truck.

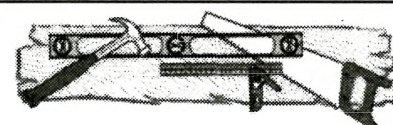

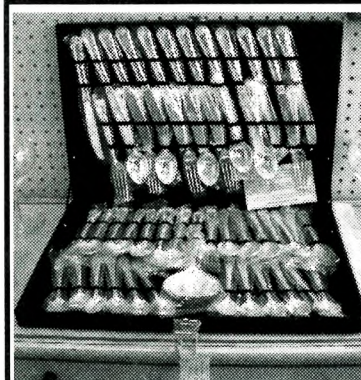
