

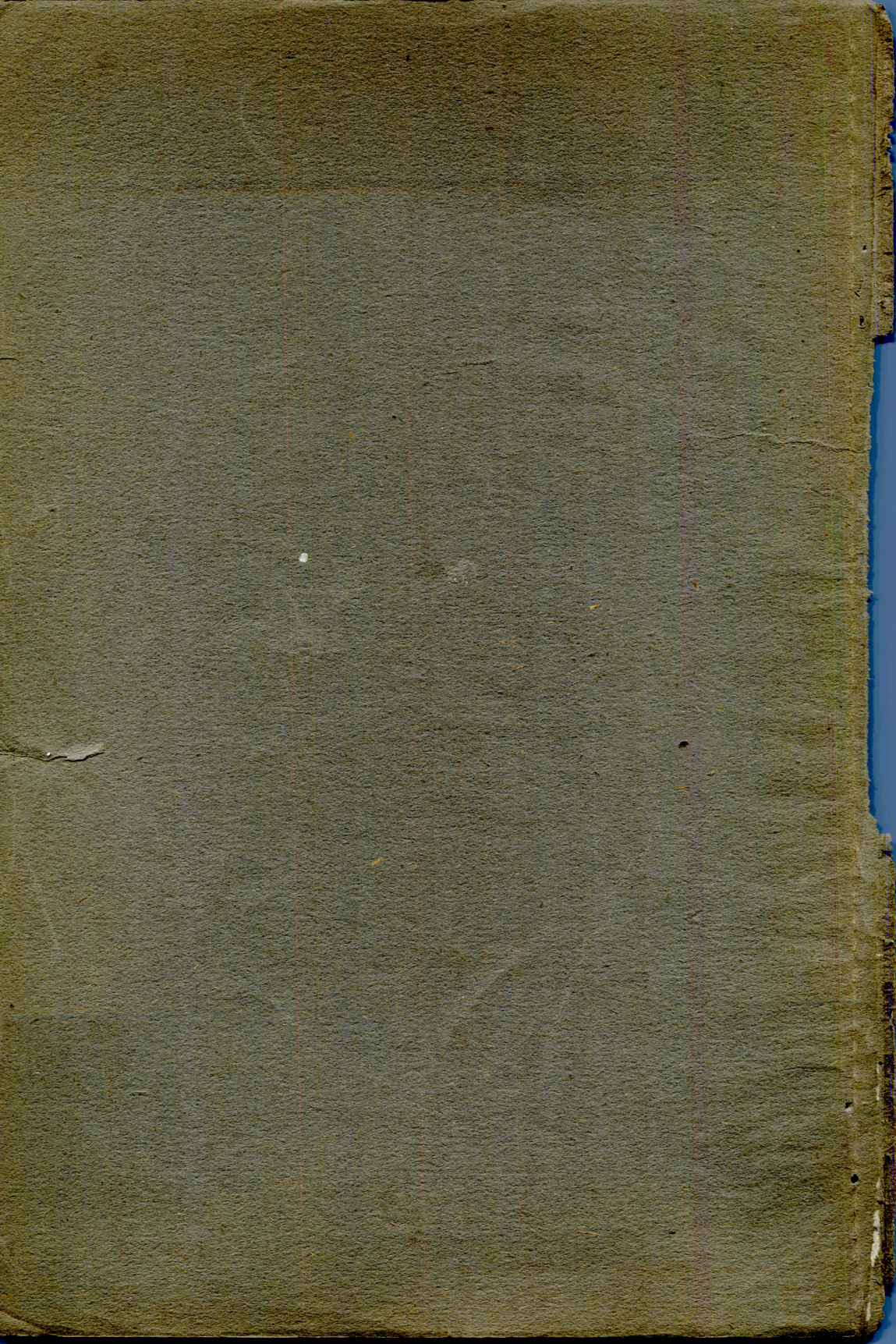

The North School has one week to be made up in the spring term. The weather conditions being so severe the latter part of the winter term made it necessary to close the school prematurely.

The Center School made up the week lost last winter on the last spring term, as can be seen in another part of report.

The loss of Mrs. Roode as teacher at North School is a cause for regret, as her work there has been excellent and much appreciated. It will be difficult to fill her place acceptably.

Aside from this unavoidable change the school year has been one of continued advancement for those who attended regularly. Unfortunately some have been irregular, which caused a low aggregate attendance, and as a part of the state money is computed upon the attendance, each day's absence is an actual money loss to the town. The absentee not only loses himself but robs those who are regular in attendance.

It is particularly urged that parents keep this fact in mind and see to it that their children attend every day it is possible for them to do so, as a recourse to the

services of the Attendance Officer is extremely unpleasant for all concerned.

There are five pupils in the eighth grade at the North School who with constant attendance and conscientious application to their studies should be able to graduate at the close of the coming spring term.

The toilets at the North School have been fixed and connected with the main building as required by law and the Center School must be attended to this year. The roof of this latter school building must be made tight this year and the building should be painted. This will be a large expense for a very small school and the question has been considered by the committee of disposing of this large building and providing a small modern one in its stead but on the whole it has seemed most advisable to recommend that a good quality of slate surfaced roofing be put on the building this year and to defer the painting until next year. Appropriation should be made for clearing the junipers away from around the Center School as they are at present a fire danger to the property.

Westport has been extremely fortunate during the past few years, when there has been such a scarcity of teachers in other places, to secure the services of good teachers for both schools. This has in large measure been due to the fact that the people of the town have been willing to tax themselves so that we have been able to pay relatively good wages to our teachers and it is earnestly hoped that we may be able to continue to do so in order that we may be able to maintain for our schools as high a standard as possible.

Town Warrant

*To Horace Jones, a Constable of the Town of Westport in
the County of Lincoln.*

GREETING:—

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Westport, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Town Hall in said town, on Monday, the nineteenth day of March, A. D., 1923, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, namely:

ARTICLE 1—To choose a Moderator for said meeting.

ART. 2—To attend to and act upon the report of the Superintendent of Schools and town accounts of the Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of the Poor and Treasurer.

ART. 3—To choose all necessary officers for the year ensuing.

ART. 4—To see if the town will grant and raise such sums of money as may be necessary to maintain and support schools, pay tuitions, school books, supplies and equipment for the year ensuing.

ART. 5—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the poor, and the repairs of highways, ferry, bridges, and town buildings for the year ensuing.

ART. 6—To see what sum of money the town will raise to pay officers, interest, abatements, and insurance for the year ensuing.

ART. 7—To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for snow bills, state and county tax, and contingent expenses for the year ensuing.

ART. 8—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the salary of Superintendent of Schools for the year ensuing.

ART. 9—To see if the town will vote “yes” or “no” on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid as provided in Section 18 of Chapter 25 of the Public Laws of 1916.

ART. 10—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 for the improvement of section of State Aid Road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the above being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provision of Section 18 of Chapter 25 of the Public Laws of 1916.

ART. 11—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of State Aid Highways during the ensuing year within the limits of the town, under the provisions of Section 18 of the Public Laws of 1913.

ART. 12—To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to hire, in anticipation of taxes, such sums of money as may be necessary, for the year ensuing.

ART. 13—To see if the town will vote to raise money and what sum, for the pay of a man to run the ferry.

ART. 14—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to cut bushes on highway.

ART. 15—To see if the town will vote to purchase of Jacob R. Colby a suitable plot or piece of land to serve as a playground for the pupils of the North School, raise money for the same, or do or act, any-

thing considered necessary regarding the matter. Also to hear report of committee.

ART. 16—To see what action the town will take in regard to the rent and janitor service of Town Hall.

ART. 17—To see what action the town will take in relation to the care and preservation of its records and documents and raise money for such a purpose if considered necessary.

ART. 18—To see if the town will vote to raise money to improve places in and on the public highway such as Oak Hill and Icy Corner, so called, also a section of town road difficult of passing at times between Hilton's Mill Pond and Greenleaf's Gate, and such other places in the public roads as may be considered as calling for special attention, and direct in what manner such money shall be expended.

ART. 19—To see what action the town will take in regard to fire wardens for the year ensuing.

ART. 20—To see what action the town will take in regards to sanitary toilets at the Center Schoolhouse as called for in Chapter 33 of the Revised Statutes, and raise money for, or do or act, anything in regards to same.

ART. 21—To see what action the town will take in regards to flags and halyards for the school buildings and raise money for same.

ART. 22—To vote and act upon all other business which may legally come before the meeting.

The selectmen will be in session at nine-thirty o'clock in the forenoon to revise the voting list.
