WARRANT.

To JOSIAH D. HINDS, a Constable of the town of Orrington, in the County of Penobscot: GREETING.

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Orrington, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House in said Town, on Monday, the thirteenth day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

First. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Second. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.

Third. To act on the report of the Selectmen.

Fourth. To act on the report of the Supervisor of Schools.

Fifth. To act on the report of the Board of Health.

Sixth. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year, including Commissioners and Auctioneer.

Seventh. To determine what way the town will adopt for the repairs of its highways the ensuing year, and establish the price of labor thereon.

Eighth. To grant and raise money for the support of Schools, the Poor, the repair of Roads and Bridges, and defray all other town charges for the ensuing year.

Ninth. To determine in what way the town will choose its Highway Surveyors and School Agents for the ensuing year.

Tenth. To see if the Town will instruct the Selectmen in regard to letting, and care of Town House.

Eleventh. To fix the compensation of the Collector of Taxes for 1893.

Twelfth. (By request.) To see if the town will build a permanent stage in their Town Hall, across the East end, 11 1-2 feet wide, and 3 feet high, and raise money for the same.

Thirteenth. (By petition.) To see what action the town will take on the claim of David Godfrey.

Fourteenth. To see if the Town will furnish the wire and staples for a fence on the north side of the road, from the gate leading to the trotting park down to the corner near the Depot, Mr. Brooks furnishing posts, and building the fence with top rail.

Fifteenth. (By petition of O. J. Kendall and 12 others.) To see if the Town will instruct the Selectmen to let the Town Hall for private dancing assemblies.

Sixteenth. To see if the Town will accept of the road as laid out by the Selectmen, on petition of the Union Ice Co., leading from the County road near Charles Stickney's dwelling house, westerly across the Bangor and Bucksport Railroad, to land of said Ice Co., and raise money for damages, and building the same.

The Selectmen will be in session for the purpose of revising the list of voters at nine o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.

Annual Report

OF THE

SUPERVISOR OF SCHOOLS.

District No. 1.

Summer term, Miss Ida M. Daggett, of Etna, teacher. This was a successful term.

Fall term, Miss M. A. Pendleton, of Orrington, teacher. This school was closed after four weeks of unsuccessful labor.

Winter term, Miss Ida M. Daggett, teacher. Although this was a term of more than fourteen weeks, the interest of both teacher and scholars was maintained to the close. The scholars were orderly and studious. Miss Daggett has had instruction in one of our State Normal Schools.

District No. 2.

Summer term. This school, under the efficient management of Miss Lena H. Smith, of Orrington, made good progress. The instruction was thorough the order good.

Fall and Winter terms were taught by Miss Louise A. Snow, of Orland, a teacher of large experience, and well qualified for the work. Both terms were very successful.

District No. 3.

Summer and Fall terms, Miss May L. Genn, of Orrington, teacher. Although this was Miss Genn's first attempt, she acquitted herself with much credit. Good work was done. The improvement in reading deserves special mention.

The Winter term, by Lena H. Smith, of Orrington, was a pleasant and profitable school. Miss Smith won the love and respect of her pupils, and led them upward and onward.

District No. 4.

Summer term, Miss Emma Stanley, of Brewer, teacher. Miss Stanley brought to this school experience and ability, supplemented by instruction in a Normal school, and labored hard to create an interest; but her efforts were not appreciated. Some improvement was made.

Fall term, Miss Edith A. Bartlett, of Brewer, teacher. Very little hard work was done in this school this term. There was a lack of energy on the part of the teacher, and application on the part of most of the scholars. The few who worked received their reward.

Winter term, Miss Ida B. Eldridge, of Bucksport, teacher. The most hearty goodfellowship seemed to prevail on the part of both teacher and scholars. Only eleven scholars were present at the closing examination, the smaller scholars and girls not being able to wade through the snow. The few scholars there were orderly and studious. The classes in Arithmetic did good work. There appears to be a lack of interest in this district on the part of parents, and of ambition on the part of the scholars. Too much of the time that should be spent in the school is idled away at the stores.

District No. 5.

The fall and winter terms were in charge of Miss Alice M. Dodge, of Orrington. In the summer term, fair improvement was made. The winter term was interrupted by sickness, and closed unexpectedly without examination, on account of the illness of the teacher.

District No. 6.

Summer term, Miss Nellie E. Appleton, of Orrington, teacher. Fair improvement by the little ones under her care was made. This was Miss Appleton's first attempt; and although well qualified for the work of an instructor of youth, a lack of confidence and self-reliance detracts from her usefulness as a teacher. It is to be hoped these faults may be overcome by larger experience. Miss Appleton is a student of the Castine Normal school.

Fall term, Miss Julia C. Smith, of Orrington, met with her usual success in this school. Her untiring and well-directed efforts were appreciated and seconded by parents and pupils.—Result, a good school.

Winter term, Miss Lizzie M. Nickerson, of Orrington, teacher. This was Miss Nickerson's fourth term in this district. A number of young men who had not attended school before for several years were present this term, adding much to the interest of the school. Good work was done. Miss Nickerson is a student of the Castine Normal school.

District No. 7.

Summer term, Miss Maud J. Nickerson, of Orrington, teacher. Miss Nickerson is a strict disciplinarian and thorough teacher. The scholars and

parents co-operating, a profitable term was the result. Miss Lena Smith, of Orrington, continued the same thorough mode of instruction and strict discipline, (though with less apparent effort) in the fall term that characterized the summer school. This was a successful school.

Winter term, Marion L. Webster, of Stockton Springs, teacher. At the commencement the discipline was rather lax, and when the teacher, acting on the advice of the Supervisor, changed the seating of the school, and attempted to grasp the reins of government with a firmer hand, a spirit of rebellion was displayed by some of the scholars, which instead of being checked by the parents, was rather encouraged. Some scholars were removed by their parents, to the advantage, I think, of those who remained. At the closing examination the scholars were orderly and studious, prompt and correct in recitation. The instruction was thorough, clear cut, and critical. Miss Webster is a graduate of Bucksport Seminary, and a student at Castine Normal School.

District No. 8.

Summer and Winter terms. Miss Mabel W. Perkins, of Orrington, taught two very successful terms in this district. Miss Perkins is a student at Castine Normal School, and thoroughly in love with her work.

District No. 9.

The Summer and Winter terms in this district were in charge of Miss Julia C. Smith, of Orrington. As usual, Miss Smith imparted her enthusiasm to her pupils, and each labored diligently for the best good of the school; the classes in Analysis and Algebra are the best in town.

District No. 10.

Summer and Winter terms, Miss Lois A. Leathers, of Orrington, teacher. Miss Leathers succeeded as well as could be expected with the six or seven little ones under her charge.

Corner District.

Summer term, Miss Lizzie M. Leavitt, of Bradley, teacher. This was a successful term. The examination was creditable to both teacher and scholars; order fairly good. Miss Leavitt has had the advantage of Normal instruction.

Fall and Winter terms, Mr. Horace M. Day, of Orrington, teacher. Mr. Day is a strict disciplinarian, and an energetic, working teacher. Creditable improvement was made. A large class in book-keeping received thorough practical instruction. The order was good. The instruction in some branches was not so critical as it should be.

A number of our scholars are attending higher institutions of learning in other towns, which increases the per cent of our scholars who are attending school, yet there are too many of our scholars who do not avail themselves of opportunities offered for acquiring an education.

There has been a change in the grammar used, at an expense of \$33.16, 110 being exchanged. \$14.55 has been expended for new books. It will be necessary to buy a few books next year, to replace those worn out. \$15 will be sufficient for that purpose. The care and distribution of text books adds much to the labor and expense of supervision.

The schools this year have not been a complete success. The failures, or partial failures, were caused in some cases by unfortunate selection of teachers, in other cases by lack of interest on the part of parents, shown in allowing their children to be absent or tardy without sufficient excuse, or in removing their children from school because of some fault, real or imaginary, in teacher or school.

Of the 21 teachers employed this year five were beginners. Of the twenty-nine school terms, nine were taught by experienced teachers from other towns, twelve by experienced teachers of this town, and eight by teachers of this town having no experience previous to this year; three of the unexperienced teachers taught two consecutive terms, thus having their efforts endorsed by the district where they taught.

This town ought to raise and educate at least, enough competent teachers to supply our home demand. We have the material. All that is required is preparation for the work, thorough, exact, critical preparation, only to be obtained by hard untiring effort, supplimented by experience in teaching.

Not only must the more solid and practical sciences be thoroughly mastered, but, the time having come when there is a demand for the lighter and more graceful branches, which elevate and refine the mind, the coming teacher must be prepared to lead her charge along these more flowery paths. I must not overlook the fact that we have sent out from this town a number of teachers to other states and neighboring towns, who have met with large success as teachers. Still there is room for more—"Room on top."

In accordance with the recommendation of President Harrison, Columbus Day was celebrated in all our schools in session at that date, and in some districts where the schools were closed, by appropriate exercises. The programs, consisting of raising and saluting the National flag, singing patriotic songs, reading, recitations, &c., were appropriate and well rendered.

And now the flag floats over every habitable school house in town, save one, silently teaching our children and youth the important lesson of patriotism. May it ever admonish us and ours that the liberty it represents and the blessings it guarantees can only be enjoyed by a virtuous and intelligent people.
