Teacher, Miss Mabel P. Heal, wages, \$15.00 per week.

IN GENERAL

One of the most successful of the young teachers was selected to teach the North school, (none of the more experienced teachers being willing to accept the salary offered) and a most profitable term ensued, the same teacher returned for fall, but resigned at the close of the term and another was obtained for the winter term, which opened well, illness prevented a final visit, but I have every reason to think that the work accomplished was satisfactory. By an oversight because of that illness the work lost last year by this school was not made up and will have to be done next term.

The work at Center school under the care of an experienced, trained teacher, was all that could be desired. The pupils in this school are considerably in advance of their grades, it being one of the most advanced and interesting small schools in the Union.

That the children growing up in town is its best asset seems to be generally understood and accepted, as the town is very considerate and generous to its schools, but the older pupils do not profit so much as could be desired, many leaving school as soon as they reach the compulsory age, fifteen years.

The Center school building is in need of such extensive repairs that it was decided to take advantage of the extension of time in which the state requires the toilets

to be fixed, and defer the work until it should be decided by the town whether the building should be properly repaired or disposed of and a smaller one built. The present building is badly in need of shingling and painting as well as many minor repairs. It is an immense building to house the small school it now contains, costly to heat and keep in repair. A building a third or a quarter of its size would be ample for our needs and would not cost a great deal more than the proper repairs on this large building. So little money was appropriated for school repairs last year that only the most temporary patching of the roof could be done but the shingles are in such shape that a good job of patching was impossible. It is the poorest kind of economy to permit a building of the size and quality of the Center school to go to pieces for want of proper repairs and this building should be either properly repaired or disposed of.

As the new school law permits the use of school funds for school maintenance, books, supplies and tuition (but not for repairs) it has been thought best to combine the four town appropriations, for schools, books, supplies and tuition into one appropriation therefor the following appropriations are recommended:

Town Warrant

*To Horace Jones, a constable of the Town of Westport,
in the County of Lincoln,*

GREETING:—

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Westport, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Town Hall, in said town, on Monday, the tenth day of March, A. D. 1924, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, namely:

ARTICLE 1—To choose a Moderator for said meeting.

ART. 2—To attend to and act upon the report of the Superintendent of Schools, and town accounts of the Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of the Poor and Treasurer.

ART. 3—To choose all necessary officers for the year ensuing.

ART. 4—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of schools.

ART. 5—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the poor, and the repairs of highways, ferry, bridges and town buildings for the year ensuing.

ART. 6—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay officers, interest, abatements and insurance for the ensuing year.

ART. 7—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for snow bills, state and county tax and contingent expenses for the year ensuing.

ART. 8—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the salary of Superintendent of Schools for the year ensuing.

ART. 9—To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid as provided in Section 18 of Chapter 25 of the Public Laws of 1916.

ART. 10—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 for the improvement of section of State Aid Road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the above being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provision of Section 18 of Chapter 25 of the Public Laws of 1916.

ART. 11—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of State Aid Highways during the ensuing year within the limits of the town, under the provisions of Section 18 of the Public Laws of 1913.

ART. 12—To see if the town will vote to raise money, and what sum, for the pay of a man to run the ferry.

ART. 13—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to cut bushes on the highway.

ART. 14—To see what action the town will take in regards to the Center school building, raise money for same, or do or act, anything considered necessary regarding the matter.

ART. 15—To see what action the town will take in regards to sanitary toilets at the Center schoolhouse as called for in Chapter 33 of the Revised Statutes, and raise money for, or do or act, anything in regards to same.

ART. 16.—To see what action the town will take in regards to flags and halyards for the school buildings and raise money for same.

ART. 17.—To see if the town will vote to designate a depository for the safe keeping of its funds.

ART. 18.—To see what action the town will take in regards to the rent and janitor service of Town Hall.

ART. 19.—To see what action the town will take in regard to fire wardens for the year ensuing.

ART. 20.—To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to hire, in anticipation of taxes, such sums of money as may be necessary for the year ensuing.

ART. 21.—To vote and act upon all other business which may legally come before the meeting.

The Selectmen will be in session at nine-thirty in the forenoon to revise the voting list.
