In consequence of the November storm, the expenses were about \$800.00, which is the reason that the expenditures for highways is so large. Two thousand dollars of the bonds become due this year, but owing to the hardness of the times, the good financial standing of the town

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and the fact that a portion of the bonds can lay back for a year,
we recommend that only one thousand be paid this year.We therefore recommend for debt and interest,

Warrant for Town Meeting.

To John Black, Constable of the town of Paris, in the County of Oxford, Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Paris, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the town house in said town, on Monday, the fourth day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles. viz:

ART. 1.-To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

- ART. 2.—To choose all other necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
- ART. 3.—To see if the town will accept the report of the Selectmen and Superintending School Committee.
- Art 4.—To see if the town will grant and raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance and support of schools and the poor, and the repair of roads and bridges, and to defray all other necessary town charges for the year ensuing.
- Art 5.—To see what sum of money the town will grant and raise towards paying the town debt.
- ART. 6.—To see if the town will vote to discontinue so much of the Inman road, so called, as lies between the Hebron road and the road from Ichabod Thomas's to Newell Thomas's.
- ART. 7.-To see if the town will vote to have a liquor agent.
- ART. 8.—To see if the town will vote to abate any portion of the tax on the Snow's Falls Factory company.
- ART. 9.—To see if the town will vote a discount on all taxes p aid before the first of October.

- ART. 10.—To see if the town will vote to allow J. A. Deering and David Sanborn to draw their proportion of School money from District No. 2 in Paris, and expend the same in Oxford.
- ART. 11.—To see if the town will vote to allow John Whitney to draw his proportion of school money from District No. 1 in Paris, and expend the same in Oxford.
- ART. 12.—To see if the town will vote to allow B. R. Dow to draw his proportion of school money from District No. 16 in Paris, and expend the same in Woodstock.
- ART. 13.—To see what action the town will take in relation to Francis Muzzy's claim for damages.
- ART. 14.—To see if the town will vote to tax dogs.

REPORT OF S. S. COMMITTEE.

DISTRICT NO. I.

JOHN P. PENLEY, Agent.—Summer term taught by Corinna O. Davis. Whole number of scholars in attendance, 24; average attendance, 19; wages of teacher, \$3.75 per week; length of term 11 weeks. The aim of Miss Davis was that of a true teacher her order was good and her methods of instruction thorough.

Winter term taught by same teacher. Wages, \$5.00 per week : length of school, 8 weeks : whole No. of scholars, 25; average No. 18. The efforts of the teacher were none the less zealous, but not so well directed as in the previous term.

A spring term is now in session—Annie C. Bent, teacher. Miss Bent possesses the tact necessary for a successful teacher, and is having a very prosperous term.

DISTRICT NO. II.

GEO. A. WILSON, Agent.—This district expends its money in three terms, as follows: a summer term of 10 weeks; a free high school of 11 weeks, in the fall, and a winter term of 12 weeks. The school is divided into three departments, viz: High School, Intermediate or Grammar, and Primary Department. R. J. Everett, A. B., has been Principal of the High School, the past year. He is a thorough disciplinarian; governing his school with ease, and is increasing in popularity with parents and pupils.

The Intermediate school has been taught during the past year by Abbie C. Morse; the Primary school by Anna B. Crommett. Both teachers have not only maintained their previous high rank as instructors, but each term are acquitting themselves with still higher honors.

Wages of High School teacher, —; Intermediate, \$10.00 per week; Primary, \$9. Whole No. in attendance, summer term, 147, average, 117; fall term, 163, average, 141; winter term, 126, average, 111. The school was graded, three years ago, and the District is unanimous in the praise of a graded school.

DISTRICT NO. III.

LEANDER S. SWAN, Agent.—Summer term of seven weeks, taught by Hattie S. Fobes. Whole No. of scholars 19; average No. 17; wages of teacher \$3.00 per week. This was Miss Fobes third term in this district. She is thoroughly alive to the interests of her pupils. Number three is fortunate in securing the services of such a thorough, practical teacher.

Fall term, taught by the same teacher. Whole No. of scholars 21; average 18; wages \$3.50 per week; length of term 7 weeks.

Miss Fobes in now teaching the winter term (her fifth term in this district). She has not only sustained her former reputation, but the District and Committee pronounce this her most successful term.

DISTRICT NO. IV.

JAMES F. PENLEY, Agent.—Summer-term taught by Stella L. Willis. Whole No. of scholars, 11; average No., 9; wages of teacher, \$3.00 per week; length of school, 8 weeks. Miss Willis although comparatively a beginner in teaching, met with such success as to place her among our first teachers.

Winter term taught by Henry D. Hammond. Whole No. of scholars, 20; average No., 14; wages of teacher, \$22 per month; length of school 10 weeks. Mr. Hammond is one of our finest young men. His success in this, his first school, would have done credit to teachers of a larger experience.

DISTRICT NO. V.

J. B. PORTER, Agent.—Summer term taught by Miss Annie Porter. Number of scholars, 15; average attendance, 12; wages \$3.50 per week. Miss Porter is an earnest worker in the schoolroom, but her efforts were not as well directed as we could have desired. The school appeared well when visited.

Winter term taught by Herman A. Fuller. Number of scholars, 32; average, 27; wages of teacher, \$37.00 per month. This term is still in progress. Mr. Fuller is a popular teacher, and is meeting with his usual success.

DISTRICT NO. VI.

ANDREW J. HILL, Agent.—Summer term taught by Miss Addie I. Hammond. Number attending school, 39; average 33; wages of teacher, \$4 50 per week. This was Miss Hammond's second term in this district. She met with her usual success.

Winter term taught by Herman A. Fuller. Number of scholars in attendance, 54; average, 48; wages of teacher \$44 per month. Mr. Fuller is one who is in love with his work. The fact of Mr. Fuller and Miss Hammond being employed the second year, is a proof that the parents, in this district, appreciate their efforts as practical and efficient teachers.

DISTRICT NO. VII.

JOHN S. BARROWS, Agent.—Summer term taught by Georgia M. Chase. Whole No. of scholars 11; average No. 8; wages of teacher \$2.00 per week; length of term 6 weeks. This was Miss Chase's first effort. Although the school was small, she succeeded in keeping up a good interest to the very close of the term. The last examination showed that the scholars had received a thorough and patient drill.

Winter term taught by Laura L. Gerrish. Longth of school 8 weeks; whole No. of scholars 11; average attendance 7; wages \$5.00 per week. This was Miss Gerrish's second term in this district. She possesses energy and tact. The school made good advancement.

DISTRICT NO. VIII.

- J. K. CLIFFORD, Agent.—Summer term taught by Miss B. A. Ripley. Length of term 8 weeks; number of pupils in attendance, 16; average attendance 14; wages of teacher, \$3 per week.

Winter term taught by same teacher. Length of term 10 weeks; number of pupils in attendance 19; average attendance 17; wages \$5 per week. These were profitable terms of school. Miss Ripley is one of our best teachers.

DISTRICT NO. IX.

J. K. HAMMOND, Agent.—Summer term taught by Miss S. E. Ripley. Length of term 11 weeks; whole number of scholars 26; average attendance 22; wages of teacher \$6.00 per week. Miss Ripley succeeded in awakening an interest in this school, which made it a very profitable term. She is a teacher of experience, and her good reputation was fully sustained.

Primary department taught by Ada M. Morton. Length of term 11 weeks; whole number of scholars 25; average attendance 21; wages of teacher \$6.00 per week. Miss Morton had the love and confidence of her scholars, and gave entire satisfaction.

There was a fall term of 7 weeks taught by Addie I. Hammond. whole number of scholars 40; average 32; wages 86 per week. Miss Hammond failed in order, and the term was rendered less profitable on that account.

Winter term taught by W. S. Hoyt. Length of term 11 weeks; whole number of scholars 42; average 38; wages of teacher \$37.50 per month. This was one of the best schools in town. Recitations were conducted without the aid of books, and were thorough and practical. Ability, energy and tact on the part of the teacher, and punctuality on the part of the scholars, made the term interesting and profitable.

Primary department taught by Miss Hattie Hubbard. Length of term 11 weeks, whole number of scholars 21; average 18; wages of teacher \$5.00 per week. Miss Hubbard, has an excellent faculty of instructing small scholars. She has a practical idea of teaching, and one could not fail to be interested in visiting her school. We advise the next agent to secure her services for the summer school.

DISTRICT NO. X.

H. LAPHAN, Agent.—Summer term commenced by Nellie E. Dean, who taught 4 weeks, and on account of sickness among the scholars, the school closed, and was finished in the fall by Clara E. Garland, who taught 6 weeks; number of scholars, 26; average, —. Miss Dean's school, when visited, was progressing finely. Miss Garland's school was not visited, no notice being

given by the agent. We understand she gave general satisfaction. Winter term taught by V. A. Greenleaf. Length of term, 12

weeks; number of scholars, 24; average, 18; wages of teacher, \$17 per month. This was Mr. Greenleaf's first school. His manner in the school room is easy, and his instruction systematic.— The school made good advancement.

DISTRICT NO. XI.

There was but one term in this district, the past year, and by uniting with District No. 20, the scholars have the benefit of ten weeks' term, under the instruction of C. B. Benson, esq. Mr. Benson is a thorough, practical teacher, and the pupils under his instruction have to understand principles. His principal recitations are conducted without the use of text books. Our teachers are confined too much to their use. The school is still in progress.

DISTRICT NO. XII.

JOSEPH F. CHILD, Agent.—Summer term taught by Mr. H. H. Bryant. Number of scholars registered, 34; average, 29; wages of teacher, \$18 per month.

Winter term taught by same. Number of scholars registered, 37; average, 33; wages, \$40 per month. This district has been highly favored in securing the services of Mr. Bryant the past year. By his enthusiasm he has awakened an interest in this school which has resulted in profitable terms. The scholars acquitted themselves with credit at the examination. Order very good.

DISTRICT NO. XIII.

CLINTON SHAW, Agent.—In this District there has been but one term of school, during the past year—a winter term of 9 weeks, taught by Emma E. Shurtleff. Whole No. of scholars in attendance, 7; average, 6; wages of teacher, \$4.00 per week. Although this is one of the smallest schools in town, it was one of the most successful. Miss Shurtleff is a teacher of experience, and is a good acquisition to our corps of teachers.

ADRIAN MAXIM, Agent.—Summer term taught by Mrs. Ida M. Maxim. Length of term, 8 weeks; number of scholars, 7; average attendance, 6; wages, \$2.00 per week. This school appeared well when visited—teacher and scholars seemed interested.

Winter term taught by Miss Princess Record. Length of term, 7½ weeks; number of scholars, 10; average, 10; wages of teacher, \$3.25 perweek. The school was not visited, so we are unable to give any further statistics.

DISTRICT NO. XV.

JAMES MERRILL, Agent.—Summer term taught by Annie C. Bent. Length of term 8 weeks; number of scholars in attendance 14; average 12; wages of teacher \$2.75 per week. This was Miss Bent's first school. She possesses the elements of a good teacher viz: ability and tact. The school was profitable.

Winter term taught by W. W. Andrews. Length of term 11 weeks; number of scholars in attendance, 22; average 18; wages of teacher \$33.60 per month. This school made good progress, the scholars and teacher seemed to work together.

DISTRICT NO. XVI.

HORATIO BRADFORD, Agent.—Summer term taught by Miss Mattie Wilson. Length of term, 12 weeks; number of scholars, 18; average, 17; wages of teacher, \$2.75.
