Teacher for 32 weeks, Miss Mabel P. Heal; salary, \$15.00 a week.

## IN GENERAL

A school year of 32 weeks has been maintained with very satisfactory results.

Miss Eleanor A. Hathorn resigned her position at the North School to accept a position in Woolwich. The School Committee was very fortunate in securing Mr. Ordway Lewis for the fall and winter terms. We trust he may remain for the next spring term.

Miss Mabel Heal's work, as a teacher in the Center School, is so well known that no other than words of commendation could be said. This school does not meet the necessary requirements in attendance. Miss Heal has shown her efficiency and interest in the town at large by proposing to instruct last year's grammar school graduates in the regular freshman work of Wiscasset Academy. Three pupils have studied, daily, with Miss Heal since school opened in September. As there are only four pupils in this school who are studying the elementary school subjects, the added work has been appreciated by parents and pupils of this new course.

An example of the increased cost of maintaining a public school system may be seen by comparing the cost of a single item of expenditure in the common school account the past year and the cost fifteen years ago; \$42.15 for books; \$35.52 for supplies this year. The same comparison would show similar results in the case of teachers' salaries and materials for repairs.

At the grammar school graduation and field day exercises held at the town hall last June an attractive

program was presented. Five pupils received certificates of graduation. Refreshments were sold, netting a sum sufficient to purchase a map of Asia for the Center School and a map of Maine for the North School. The \$8.70 expended for the maps was paid to the town treasurer and diminishes the supply account to that extent (to \$26.82).

The gradual decrease of attendance in the Center School makes it difficult to suggest any budget for this year. We trust that an appropriation sufficient to cover all necessary expenses will be granted.

The interest and cooperation of teachers and pupils has been excellent. The support of the school board and good will of the citizens has been appreciated.

## Warrant for Town Meeting

*To Horace Jones, a constable of the Town of Westport, in  
the County of Lincoln,*

GREETING:—

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Westport, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Town Hall in said town on Monday, the twelfth day of March, A. D. 1928, at eleven o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, namely:—

ARTICLE 1—To choose a Moderator for said meeting.

ART. 2—To attend to and act upon the report of the Superintendent of Schools, and town accounts of the Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of the Poor and Treasurer.

ART. 3—To choose all necessary officers for the year ensuing.

ART. 4—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of Schools.

ART. 5—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the poor, and the repairs of highways, ferry, bridges and town buildings for the year ensuing.

ART. 6—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay officers, interest, abatements and insurance for the year ensuing.

ART. 7—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for snow bills, state and county tax, and contingent expenses for the year ensuing.

ART. 8—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the salary of Superintendent of Schools for the year ensuing.

ART. 9—To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid as provided in Section 18 of Chapter 25 of the Public Laws of 1916.

ART. 10—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 for the improvement of section of State Aid Road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the above being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provision of Section 18 of Chapter 25 of the Public Laws of 1916.

ART. 11—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of State Aid Highways during the ensuing year, within the limits of the town, under the provisions of Section 18 of the Public Laws of 1913.

ART. 12—To see if the town will vote to raise money, and what sum, for the pay of a man to run the ferry.

ART. 13—To see what action the town will take in regards to flags and halyards for the school buildings, and raise money for same.

ART. 14—To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for advertising our natural resources,



advantages and attractions, under the provisions of Chapter 4, Section 59 of the Revised Statutes of Maine, the same to be expended by the Maine Development Association.

ART. 15—To see what action the town will take in regards to keeping the Center School open, or do or act, anything considered necessary.

ART. 16—To see what action the town will take in relation to the deficit of \$459.15 in the Lincoln County Trust Co.

ART. 17—To see what action the town will take in relation to the collection and preservation of its records, raise money for the purpose, or do or act, anything considered necessary in the matter.

ART. 18—To see what action the town will take in regards to cutting bushes on Third Class and State Aid Highway, and raise money for same.

ART. 19—To see if the town will vote to have a survey made for bridge, and raise money for same.

ART. 20—To see what action the town will take in regards to the Harriman's Point Road, or do or act, anything considered necessary.

ART. 21—To see what action the town will take in regards to rent and janitor service of Town Hall.

ART. 22—To see what action the town will take in regards to fire wardens for the year ensuing.

ART. 23—To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to hire, in anticipation of

taxes, such sums of money as may be necessary for the year ensuing.

ART. 24—To vote and act upon all other business which may legally come before the meeting.

The Selectmen will be in session at ten-thirty in the forenoon to revise the voting list.
