TAKEN FROM MASTER SHEETS OF WAR DEPARTMENT

The list of men who have been drafted in this district arrived in Houlton Friday, and the work of getting the names ready for publication was started at once.

The following list gives the names of the men who have been drafted in this district, out of which 214 men will be taken. This number it is to be understood takes in the southern Acrostook district only.

As fast as any of the 214 men are exempted or disqualified for any reason the next name on the list will be taken and so on until the quota of 214 men has been filled for the first draft.

The Counties of Cumberland, Kennebec and Oxford will not supply any men for the first draft, as their quota has been filled by enlistments in the National Guard and different branches of the service.

The number to be taken from the state is 1821. 474 from the county, 220 from the northern district and 214 from the southern.

CALL FOR EXAMINATION

As soon as quotas are assigned to each State and each board, each board will call upon persons whose cards are in its jurisdiction instructing them to present themselves for examination. This call will be post-

ed at the office of the local board and the papers will be requested to print it. A notice will also be mailed to you, but the posting of the list at the office of the board will be deemed sufficient notice to charge you with the duty of presenting yourself. The law therefore makes it your duty to inform yourself when you are called. The mailing is for your convenience, but if the letter never reaches you you can not make that an excuse.

Watch the lists at the office of your board and see when you are called for examination.

PHYSICAL EXAMINATION

You must report for physical examination on the day named in your call.

If you are found physically disqualified the board will give you a certificate which will explain to you what your further duties are.

If you are found physically qualified and file a claim for exemption within seven days after your call you will be given 10 days after filing your claim of exemption to file proof in support of your claim of exemption.

If you are found physically qualified and file no claim for exemption, or if you do not appear for physical examination, your name will be posted to the district board as one who was called for military service and was not exempted or discharged. On the eighth day after call, or within two days thereafter, copies of the list of persons so posted to the district boards will be given to the press with a request for publication, will be posted in a place at the office of the local board accessible to the public view, and notice will be mailed to you at the address on your registration card.

Therefore watch the notices posted in the office of the board about ten days after the day you were called and make arrangements for the prompt receipt of mail.

Seven Days to File Claims of

Exemption or Discharge

(a) No claim of discharge on account of the industry in which you are engaged can be decided by a local board.

(b) Whether you file a claim of exemption or not, you must present yourself for physical examination on the day named in the notice.

From the day notice that you are called is mailed and posted you have seven days in which you may file a claim of exemption or discharge. The form for filing this claim is simple.

If you wish to file such a claim—

(a) Go to the board and get Form 119 for exemption or Form 121 for discharge. If the board has not the printed forms ask to consult the form pamphlet and copy the form shown there.

(b) Fill out the proper form and file it with the board.

(c) Do this within seven days of the posting and mailing of notice to you to present yourself.

The following are the only grounds for exemption:

1. That you are an officer, legislative, executive, or judicial of the United States, a State or Territory, or the District of Columbia.

2. That you are a regular or duly ordained minister of religion.

3. That you were on May 18, 1917, a student preparing for the ministry in any recognized theological or divinity school.

4. That you are in the military or naval service of the United States.

5. That you are a subject of Germany, whether you have taken out papers or not.

6. That you are a resident alien who has not taken out first papers. In addition to claims for exemption claims for discharge may be made on any of the following grounds, which are the only grounds for discharge by a local board.

1. That you are a county or municipal officer.

2. That you are a customhouse clerk.

3. That you are employed by the United States in the transmission of mails.

4. That you are an artificer or workman employed in an armory, arsenal, or navy yard of the United States.

5. That you are employed in the service of the United States (under certain conditions). See paragraph (c) of section 20, Regulations.

6. That you are a licensed pilot regularly employed in the pursuit of your vocation.

7. That you are a mariner actually employed in the sea service of any citizen or merchant within the United States.

8. That you are a married man with a wife or child dependent on you for support.

9. That you have a widowed mother dependent on your labor for support.

10. That you have aged or infirm parents dependent upon your labor for support.

11. That you are the father of a motherless child under 16 dependent upon your labor for support.

12. That you are a brother or orphan child or children under dependent on your labor for support.

13. That you are a member of a well-recognized religious organization organized and existing May 18, 1917, and whose teaching creed or principles forbids members to participate in war or whose religious convictions are against war or participation in accordance with the principles of said religious organization.

These are the only grounds for exemption or discharge by a local board. Another person can file a claim on your behalf, but must use forms in filing the claim.

AWAIT REPORTS OF SELECTION BOARD

Reports of the first selection boards to fill their quotas for the selective draft army will be first definite information of the probable percentage of exemptions to be expected from the ten million registrars on physical reasons or for other causes.

All available statistics indicate a probable rejection of every four for physical causes. In particular localities will vary greatly but the average for the whole country is expected to be between 20 per cent. There is no reliable data as to dependence, however, or as to how many must be excused under trial exemptions.

It appears probable that local results will be better out in some districts.

Reasoning of some officials correct the lowest rejection exemption rates will be expected in well-to-do communities such as the suburbs of cities where men of considerable incomes make their homes.

Sons of such men, it is said, have had better food, care and better surroundings than the factory hands of by towns and they should be in better physical condition.

As a class such young

could hardly be regarded as in-military committee.

Each board will summon for physical examination double the number of men in the district quota. If more are needed, the authorities will keep on calling until the quota is filled.

But Few Errors Shown

The final list shows only a few errors in the unofficial report of the drawing already transmitted throughout the country by the press. Including all the adjustments found necessary in correcting the official list to make up for numbers that were read upside down or were misread, and also all errors in transcription in the rush of the drawing and the haste to get the figures to the wires, there are less than two score variations between the lists compiled by the Associated Press and the master sheet.

The master sheets are accompanied by the rules and regulations prescribed by the President for determining the order in which the persons whose registration cards are within the jurisdiction of the respective local exemption boards are liable to be called for military service by these boards. These rules and regulations may be modified at any time by the

President should it be considered necessary. The master sheets proper, consist of 11 sheets containing the numbers drawn in the lottery in the order in which the 10,500 numbers were drawn, take the form of a schedule prepared by Provost Marshal General Crowder, which is to control and determine the exact order in which the persons whose registration cards are in the possession of the respective local boards and which have been given a "serial number" are liable for military service by the local board.
