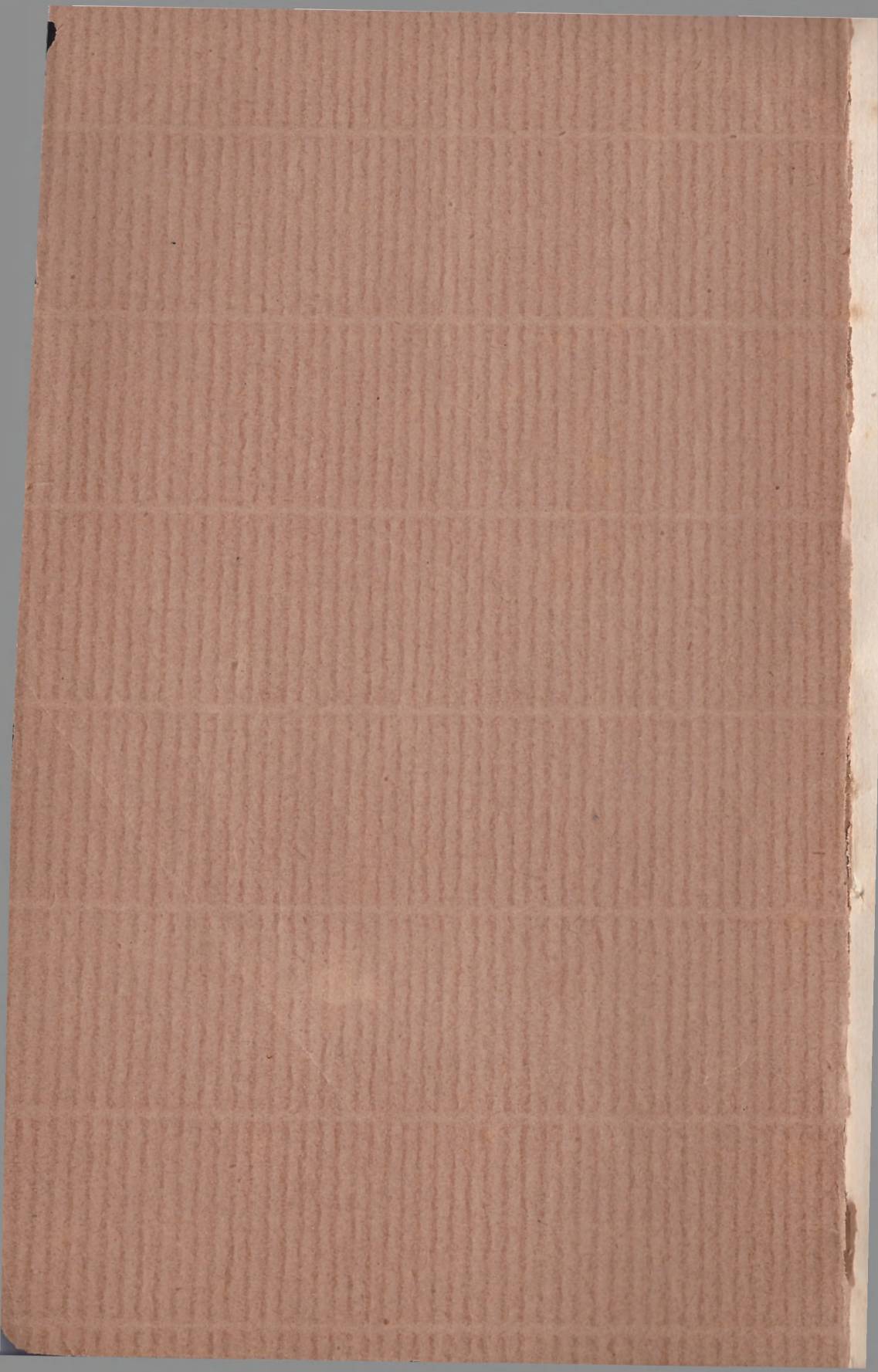

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Warrant for Town Meeting.

*To Elbridge L. Waterhouse, a Constable in the Town of
Scarboro:*

GREETING :

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Scarboro, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House, in said Town of Scarboro, on the second (2) day of March A. D., 1896, at ten (10) o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act upon the following articles :

1st. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

2nd. To choose a Clerk, Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of the Poor, and all other necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

3rd. To see if the town will grant and raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance and support of schools, the poor, repairs on roads and bridges, and to defray all other town charges.

4th. To see if the town will accept of the report of the several town officers.

5th. To see if the town will vote to establish a close time for the digging of clams from the first day of July, 1896, to the first day of September, 1896 (by request).

6th. To see what action the town will take in regard to breaking roads the next winter.

7th. To see what compensation the town will vote the Collector for his services for the ensuing year.

8th. To see if the town will vote to support a free high school for the ensuing year, to be held in the Town Hall, and raise money for the same.

9th. To see if the town will vote a sum of money for the purpose of decorating soldiers' graves.

10th. To see if the town will vote to adopt the Road Commissioner system, and if so, to choose one or more Road Commissioners for the ensuing year.

11th. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$160 08 to meet the deficiency in school book account.

12th. To see if the town will accept the road from Spurwink Road to Higgins' Beach, as laid by the Selectmen upon application of Charles L. Robinson and 49 others, and raise a sum of money for the same.

13th. To see if the town will vote to accept the road from Isaac Holmes' to a point near Tristram Meserve's, as laid by the Selectmen upon application of Fred P. Briggs and 13 others and raise a sum of money for the same.

14th. To see if the town will vote a sum of money to make wider the road in front of the West Point House at Prout's Neck (by request of non resident owners).

15th. To see if the town will vote a sum of money to be expended on Jose Hill.

16th. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the old road through William Merrill's pasture leading to Seavey's Landing.

17th. To see if the town will accept Granite street as laid down on Baker's plan, said street commencing in front of Aaron Merrills' and running to the sea wall, a distance of about three hundred feet, (by request).

18th. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on all taxes paid before a given time, and charge interest on all taxes remaining unpaid after a given time.

19th. To see what compensation the town will vote the Treasurer for his services for the ensuing year.

20th. To see what compensation the town will vote the Supervisor of Schools for his services for the ensuing year.

21st. To see if the town will vote to buy a gravel pit near Jose Hill known as the Jose orchard.

22nd. To see if the town will accept the list of Jurors as revised by the Selectmen, Treasurer and Town Clerk.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be at the Town Hall, on Saturday, the twenty - ninth (29) day of February, A. D., 1896, from nine (9) o'clock in the A. M., until four o'clock P. M., for correcting the check list, and also on the morning of the day of election at nine (9) o'clock, A. M., for the same purpose.

ROADS AND BRIDGES.

In submitting the following report of the amount of money expended in roads and bridges, we would call attention to the fact that very little money had been expended on our larger bridges for the years 1893 and 1894, and we found that a number of them were in an unsafe and dangerous condition. Many of them we were obliged to new plank, and some to furnish both new timber and plank, and others were either wholly or partially rebuilt.

The storm in the early spring did much damage to our culverts and smaller bridges and many of them were entirely rebuilt, and in the place of the old log watercourses we have substituted stone pipe, the wisdom of this departure a few years experience will prove.

At the present writing we think that we can confidently state that all of our large bridges are in good condition, there are a few small ones that will have to be repaired another season.

REPORT

OF THE

Supervisor of Schools.

SCARBORO, Me., Feb. 18, 1896.

Fellow Citizens:

In compliance with the rules and regulations of this town I herewith submit my report of the public schools of Scarboro for the school year last past.

The object of this report is to present to the public as fully as possible, in the brief space allotted, an account of the management of the educational affairs of this town, showing the progress and the needs of the schools. The statistical table, as given at the end of this report has been carefully compiled from the records kept by the several teachers, and a careful review of these, and comparison of those printed in former reports will give you some idea of the progress of the schools in this town.

I will first call your attention to the financial condition of the public schools of Scarboro.

APPROPRIATIONS.

By a careful examination of the report as given by the municipal officers, you will see that there is unexpended, or a surplus, of over six hundred dollars.

By a careful examination of the reports of the expenditures of the High School as given by the municipal officers you will see that there is a balance unexpended of over one hundred dollars.

Your school board recommend that you appropriate for the coming year the same amount as that of last year for the schools.

ATTENDANCE.

The census of 1895 shows the number of those entitled to draw school money to be 538, an increase of 12 over last year. The attendance during the year has been very good. The work of our truant officer, Mr. W. W. Ormsby should be commended, as he has been very successful, drawing many delinquent scholars into the schools.

REPAIRS.

The necessary repairs on the school buildings have been made throughout the year. At the commencement of the year the school rooms were thoroughly cleansed, the ceilings of many of the school houses were whitened and other necessary repairs made. Two or three of our school houses are very old and do not have many conveniences. It is almost useless to expend a great amount of money upon them, as in time these buildings will have to be replaced with new ones or some action taken regarding them.

SUPPLIES.

In the purchase of supplies it has been my object to buy where I could the cheapest, and for the interest of all concerned. Your school board at the commencement of the year made a contract for a complete list of new books, which will take effect next year. The new books will be a great advantage to the students.

WORK AND DISCIPLINE OF SCHOOLS.

Whenever I have visited the schools during the year I have found orderly schools, with few exceptions, teachers and scholars apparently earnest in their work. In examinations the thorough work of teachers and students showed to great advantage.

HIGH SCHOOL.

The first term of the school year was under the management of Mr. George N. Stoddard. Mr. Stoddard was a faithful and conscientious teacher. The results of Mr. Stoddard's work while connected with the school will long be remembered by those students who had the good fortune of receiving the benefit of his labor. Mr. Stoddard was called to the principalship of the Freeport High School at the close of the spring term. The last two terms of the High School have been under the instruction of Mr. James G. Morrill, who came highly recommended by the faculty of Bates College. Mr. Morrill is a painstaking teacher and a good disciplinarian. Next year the High School will be a large school, as I have given many certificates of admission, and there are many well prepared to enter the school.

The State recognizing the vast importance of education has enacted wise laws for its advancement and protection. So our public schools stand with open doors to all who may enter, to the children of both rich and poor, with a view that the coming generation may share the equality of edu-

cation, the equality of opportunity, equality of happiness. Not only are the men of today affected by our public school, but the men of a quarter of a century hence. The debt which the people owe to the public school can never be paid, for the influences of education are indispensable to popular government.

In conclusion I wish to thank all of the teachers for their hearty support and their friendly relations with me.

I wish to thank the members of the school board for their endorsement of my course regarding education, for their encouragement and advice at all times. I wish also to extend my thanks to the people of Scarboro for their courtesy and aid while in the discharge of my duties.
