Warrant for Town Meeting.

To John H. Leavitt, a Constable in the Town of Scarboro.

GREETING :

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said town of Scarboro, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House, in said Town of Scarboro, on Monday, the fifth (5) day of March, A. D., 1900, at ten (10) o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act upon the following articles :

1st. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

2d. To choose a Clerk, Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of the Poor, Road Commissioner (or Road Commissioners), Superintendent of Schools, Treasurer, and all other necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

3d. To see if the town will grant and raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance and support of schools, the poor, repairs on roads and bridges, and to defray all other town charges.

4th. To see if the town will accept the reports of the several town officers.

5th. To see what compensation the town will vote the Collector for the ensuing year.

6th. To see if the town will vote to charge interest on taxes remaining unpaid after a given time.

7th. To see if the town will vote to prohibit smoking in the Town Hall during the annual meeting. On petition of E. C. Milliken and others.

8th. To see what compensation the town will vote the several town officers for the year ensuing. On petition of E. C. Milliken and others.

9th. To see if the town will vote to make the annual appropriations and do the miscellaneous business of the annual meeting before the election of officers for the ensuing year. On petition of E. C. Milliken and others.

10th. To see if the town will vote to instruct its Municipal officers to be governed by the Statute Law of the State of Maine in all matters pertaining to tax deeds. On petition of E. C. Milliken and others.

11th. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250.00) to straighten the road from near the railroad crossing of Hans Peter Nelson, to a point near the house of Patrick Leonard heirs. On petition of B. S. Larrabee and others.

12th. To see if the town will vote to raise one hundred and sixty-five dollars (\$165.00) for necessary repairs on the schoolhouse at Dunstan Corner, and put modern seats into the same. On petition of M. E. Moulton and others.

13th. To see if the town will vote to maintain a free high school for the ensuing year, and raise money for the same.

14th. To see if the town will vote a sum of money for the purpose of decorating soldiers' graves.

15th. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the purpose of erecting a row of sheds across the back of the Town House lot. By request.

16th. To see if the town will vote to buy a gravel pit on Jose Hill of Edwin B. Carter. By request.

17th. To see if the town will vote to buy a gravel pit near Beech Ridge schoolhouse. By request.

18th. To see what action the town will take in regard to refunding the town debt. On petition of E. C. Milliken and others.

19th. To see what action the town will take in regard to breaking roads, and raise money for same.

20th. To see what action the town will take in regard to building new schoolhouse at Black Point.

21st. To see what disposition the town will make of the thirteen hundred dollars (\$1,300.00) raised for the new Black Point schoolhouse, in case they do not build the same.

22d. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of one hundred and eighty-one dollars and seventy-three cents (\$181.73) to meet deficiency in school book account for year 1899.

23d. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to buy school books the present year.

24th. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to meet deficiency in schoolhouse accounts.

25th. To see if the town will vote to accept the list of jurors as prepared by the Selectmen, Treasurer and Town Clerk.

26th. To see if the town will vote to buy a gravel pit at Black Point of John A. Harmon.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be at the Town House on Saturday the third (3) day of March, A. D., 1900, from nine (9) o'clock, A. M., to four (4) o'clock P. M., for the purpose of correcting the check list.

School Report.

To the Citizens of Scarborough: —

Another school year has passed and in accordance with the law, and an established custom, the following report of the condition, progress and needs of our schools are submitted for your perusal.

At the beginning of this year, we, as a school committee, deemed it advisable, after consulting Buxton school board and receiving no satisfaction whatever, to continue in the same ruts as in the past and unite with them, but to have no voice in the matter whatever only to pay one-half or two-thirds of the expenses of the Union School; we consulted the parents, and, with but one exception, they were perfectly willing for us as a school board to transport their scholars to Broad Turn school, so we engaged Mr. George H. Moulton, a trustworthy person, to transport them and we find that the parents are more than satisfied with the results they have obtained. It has been the building up of one school where the number before was too few to awake an interest; with the number from Union School it has revived that life, which in the past was dormant, and, with the faithful teacher that we have had, it ranks among the best in town; by this trial we find that if a few more of the smaller schools could be united or the scholars transported to some larger school, it would be to the advantage

of the town, and the scholars would receive those good results which they do not receive now, with having only one in a class. But in thinking this subject over there arises a great many obstacles; a few will say it will overcrowd other schools but we can master this obstacle by saying that one of our best schools had an attendance this last summer of forty-seven. There is not an intelligent voter in town, but what, after careful thought, would vote to transport three of our schools to the nearest school, and after this step is taken we will be able to have our schools graded as other schools are. We hear remarks that our common schools are backward but we strive to make the best of what money is raised to support these schools. The teachers' wages have been reduced to such an extent that if they should decrease to any less all of our good teachers will leave our town and go where they can receive fair compensation for their labors, so, as intelligent voters, strive to raise twenty-two hundred dollars for our common schools and give our children thirty-six weeks' school a year the same as our bordering towns do, and we as a people will rejoice when we observe our children reaping their harvests; although with twenty-nine weeks' school we observe some of our children entering other High Schools and Academies besides our own, with good records, so it does not seem possible that we are on the decline.

Our common schools with but two exceptions have received twenty-nine weeks' school; we could have continued longer with extra good results if our appropriation had not failed.

At no time in the past has the education of our children claimed the attention of the citizens of Scarborough so generally as at the present time. In examining the different registers we find that seventy visits have been made by citizens during the year, and on inquiry, nearly all those were made on the last day of school. We are pleased to observe that the parents are interested in the rhetorical exercises, but we would be more than pleased to have the parents manifest their interest during the whole year.

Your committee employed the same teachers throughout the year, as far as circumstances under their control would allow, and a marked improvement is manifested in nearly all of our schools, which can be attributed to the employment of good, efficient, tested teachers.

REPAIRS.

The town raised one hundred and fifty dollars for repairs, insurance etc., which was a very small amount, and your committee endeavored every way possible to keep within bounds but that was impossible. There should be three hundred dollars voted for the ensuing year.

BOOK ACCOUNT.

There is a deficiency in the book accounts which amount should be raised, also an amount to purchase books for the coming year.

FREE HIGH SCHOOL.

The High School during the spring term was under the instruction of Clarence Proctor, who came to us with excellent recommendations and who labored earnestly for the welfare of the school.

The Fall and Winter terms have been under the instruction of Percy Fowler Parsons, a graduate of Harvard, who came to us with the highest recommendations.

Mr. Parsons has labored earnestly for the school, and we think that he has met with untold success, as the scholars appear to be interested in their books and work with zeal to

procure good lessons, and submit willingly to the rules and requirements of the school. Mr. Parsons is a good disciplinarian, and should be retained for the next year.

In conclusion, we have performed most conscientiously our duties, having for our motto to build up our schools; perhaps we have erred in a few cases, as no one can expect to have everything perfect.

That we have been criticised we doubt not, as our Great Ruler, though perfect, was condemned by his fellow men. But having faithfully performed our duties, we are content, and hope some little good has thereby been accomplished.

I extend my sincere thanks to the parents and teachers, also to the members of the school committee for their assistance and hearty co-operation during the past year.
