Knox County Postmasters met at South Thomaston Masonic Hall Wednesday evening, Dec. 12 with 25 postmasters and guests in attendance. Host Postmaster David Pollock had arranged for a lobster supper which was pronounced tops by all present. District Operations Manager H. C. Mayo and Mrs. Mayo were special invited guests from Portland. Mr. Mayo spoke briefly bringing the seasons greetings from his office and answered question proposed by the postmasters. Supt. of Transportation Louis A. White of Portland also had been invited but owing to the press of business was unable to be present.

Postmaster O. V. Drew of Vinalhaven gave a report on the regional conference meeting he attended last week in Boston and everyone had a glad hand for Postmaster James Connellan of Rockland who made his first appearance at the meeting since his accident last summer. Postmaster Connellan has resumed his duties at the Rockland Post Office and will make the arrangements for the next meeting which will be held in Rockland and will be the annual meeting with election of officers.

Shafter Death Not Recorded As Traffic Fatality

Capt. John deWinter, director of the Division of Traffic and Safety of the Maine State Police, ruled Wednesday that the Nov. 23 death of David Shafter, 81, of Rockland, would not be classed as a traffic fatality.

The ruling, which reversed the previous official tabulation, was made known in a letter to Rockland Police Chief Bernard Thompson received Thursday from deWinter.

The letter was in answer to one written by Chief Thompson supplying deWinter with the details of Shafter's death certificate which stated that immediate cause of death was due to arteriosclerosis with a brain concussion and a right leg fracture as injuries contributing to the death.

The injuries were received by Shafter when he was struck on Union street Sept. 3 by a car operated by Joel Winchenbaugh, 20, of 62 Cedar street, police reported. Winchenbaugh was cleared of any negligence in the accident.

Deborah Hary performed a ballet dance as part of the program.

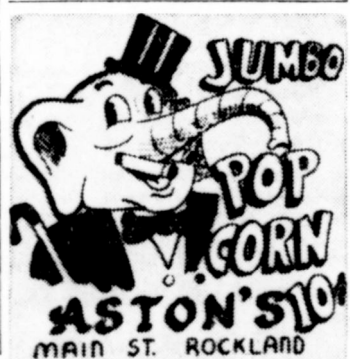
Test Borings Being Taken On New Hospital Site

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National Sea Products To Open Shipyard For General Repair And Building; Year Around Fishing Operations A Possibility

The news Thursday morning of the sale of the Birds Eye shore plants and fleet to National Sea Products, Ltd., of Halifax was received throughout the city.

The announced re-opening of the shipyard and fillet plant and the sending of the fleet to sea in the spring by the new owners served to revive spirits which had been sagging a little since General Foods announced the closing of the local operation Oct. 3.

Roy Wittick, who has served several years as general manager of the Rockland operations for General Foods, will remain with the Canadian firm until Oct. 1. He will be on loan from Birds Eye to assist the owners in becoming settled in Rockland.

He said Thursday that the former shipyard, closed for several years except for repairs to company owned trawlers, will be opened for general building and repairs. The lack of repair facilities for larger boats since the yard was closed has forced owners to send craft as far away as Portland for haul out and general repairs.

Ludwig Genevick, assistant to Wittick, will attempt to revive the business the firm once had in construction of small steel tugs for paper companies. Also, the repair and marine railway business

of boat owners will be sought.

Present employees will be retained by the new company, Wittick observed, as he noted that the compulsory retirement at age 65 ruling enforced by General Foods has been removed.

James Braccio will remain as marine superintendent of the fleet and Tweed Graham as manager of the fillet plant.

The Canadian owners will make every attempt to obtain American citizens to manage the operations they plan, it was announced Friday.

While plans now call for resumption of fishing March 1, it is possible that an earlier start may be made if re-organization progresses more rapidly than anticipated.

Both W. Stanley Lee, National Sea Products general manager, and Clarence J. Morrow, corporation president, stressed Wednesday that the Rockland plant will carry on a general fish business. All species of fish will be caught and processed as is the case in their seven plants in Nova Scotia. Also, they will buy from operators of independently owned fishing boats, a thing which Birds Eye has not done for several years.

Capt. Henry Gallant, president of the Maine Fishermen's Association which held labor contracts with Birds Eye for both trawler

crews and shore plant workers, said Friday that the Association would open discussions with the new owners after Christmas.

He said that he believed amiable agreements could be reached which would benefit all concerned.

Thursday, City Manager Lloyd Allen, Chamber of Commerce President Clinton B. Gifford and Editor and Publisher John M. Richardson of The Courier-Gazette called upon Mr. Lee and Mr. Morrow to welcome the new firm to the city.

Mr. Allen expressed his pleasure over the sale of Birds Eye to a firm as well established in the fish business as National Sea Products.

Mr. Gifford noted that the coming of the well established firm to the city could have a marked effect on the economic structure of the area.

Mr. Richardson commented in his editorial column in this edition of The Courier-Gazette.

There is every evidence that the new owners will work toward a year around operation, shifting the trawlers and packing lines in the fillet plant from one specie of fish to another from season to season. In past years, Birds Eye has been closed down for approximately three months from just before Christmas.

NEW COUNCILMEN TO BE SWORN IN MONDAY; SEVERAL BOARD APPOINTMENTS ARE SCHEDULED

The Rockland City Council will meet in an annual organizational session Monday evening to seat three newly elected councilmen, name a chairman and appoint 12 persons to fill various municipal board positions.

Frederick E. Tripp will be sworn in as councilman by the Rockland City Clerk, Gerald U. Margeson for a three year term and Richard A. French for a one year term. Henry Marsh, re-elected this month, will start a new three year term.

French was elected to complete the term of Council D. Robert McCarty who resigned, while Tripp was elected as a three year member of the council. He replaces the late Dr. Edwin L. Scarlett.

Several boards throughout the municipal governmental system have vacancies with several other board members up for re-appointment.

One appointment must be made to the Community Building Board of Control. The three year term of the late Dr. Scarlett expires this month.

A three year appointment must be made for the Board of Zoning Appeals as the term of chairman Christy Adams expires this month.

Two Coast Guard Craft Aid Youth On Hospital Trip

Two Rockland based Coast Guard vessels teamed up Friday morning to furnish transportation to a disabled North Haven youth in his trip to Knox County General Hospital.

The 40 foot utility boat, on a routine trip to Brown's Head light-house to bring the keeper to shore, was ordered to put in at a North Haven harbor and pick up Elmer Hopkins, 24, of North Haven, whose leg was in a cast as a result of a motorcycle accident several weeks ago.

With Hopkins on a stretcher the 40 foot craft brought him out to the 110 foot Snomish which was unable to dock. The larger craft transported the youth to the hospital while the 40 footer went about its business.

At the hospital, Hopkins had his cast changed.

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Municipal Court

Charles Wall, 26, of 684 1/2 Main street and Einar A. Kangas, 40, of St. George and Rockland, both pleaded guilty to charges of breaking, entry and larceny at a Rockland Municipal Court hearing held Thursday morning.

Both were bound over for grand jury action in the February term of Knox County Superior Court after probable cause was found against them by Judge Alfred M. Strout. They were held under \$2000 bond each.

The two were apprehended by Rockland police Wednesday evening and arrested on the charge. They allegedly broke into the home of Maynard Gardner at 83 1/2 Main street about 4:30 p. m. Wednesday, taking numerous carpenter tools and an army overcoat. Padlocks on three doors were smashed in the break.

Police charged that the men stole a hacksaw, pinch bar, hand saw, hand plane, nail hammer, a bit stock with a screwdriver attachment and the coat. Value of the articles was placed at about \$35 total.

The men were spotted by a neighbor who notified the tenant. The police were then called.

Kangas was placed on probation for one year and received a five months jail sentence only last week, Dec. 5, after pleading guilty to information at a special Superior Court hearing charging him with uttering a forged instrument.

He had passed two bad checks in a Rockland supermarket last year.

John F. Clark, 41, of Rockland pleaded guilty to a third offense drunken driving charge and another charge of driving an improperly registered vehicle at the same session of court.

He received a \$300 fine and \$6 court costs and three months in jail on the drunken driving charge and an additional three months should the fine not be paid.

On the improper registration charge he was fined \$10 or 10 days. Clark was arrested by deputies of the Sheriff's Patrol on Route 105 in Camden Thursday. He had previously been convicted of drunken driving Sept. 8, 1947 at Presque Isle and on July 4, 1955 at Kennebunk.

Robert McMahon was found guilty of failing to report an accident on a charge brought by Rockland police and fined \$10 which he paid. He entered a plea of not guilty to the charge.

Police testified that McMahon was involved in an accident with a car operated by Larry A. Jones of Waldoboro on Camden street Dec. 2. The accident was reported to state police until the following afternoon.

Extensive damage was reported to both vehicles.

EDITORIAL

THE GOOSE HANGS HIGH

It is gracious reading indeed, the information that the Birds Eye interests in this city have been taken over lock, stock and barrel by so great a concern as our Canadian neighbor, National Sea Products, Ltd. Many doubts had prevailed since the Birds Eye shut-down, engendered by the very size of the property involved and the great sum of money necessary to operate the plant.

No question can exist as to the ability of the new owners or their intention to operate along the most modern lines, for they are that kind of a concern. The fears that have harassed Knox County business men that the great plant might lay unproductive for many months are at an end and we as a community should consider ourselves fortunate in the present course of events, and it now rests with us as a community to give our new neighbors a warm welcome and the best of co-operation.

At this time a word is most appropriate as to the high principles on which Birds Eye has operated since its inception, and the public should fully appreciate the efforts of the concern to secure a proper successor and to avoid having the property fall into the hands of those desirous of a quick profit rather than sustained production as is the case with the new owners.

To National Sea Products we extend our warmest welcome and our pledge to co-operate in all ways within our power to be of assistance to the great organization.

THIS CANNOT BE PERMITTED

Rockland's Community Christmas Lighting Project is on the brink of collapse due to the lack of effort on the part of a handful of workers who failed to make the solicitation for funds allotted to them.

A matter of \$500 remains to be collected, this amount being necessary for the actual purchase and ownership of the extensive amount of material used annually. The sum of \$1947.22 has already been paid in and the venture must not be defaulted for the remaining \$500.

It should be borne in mind that Rockland's business section the past few Christmas seasons has been second to none in beauty. This decorative lighting was made possible by volunteer work by hundreds of persons, one of the city's classic examples of community effort. There is no question but that the festive street lighting has added greatly to the volume of business coming to local establishments.

The Chamber of Commerce is presently at an alarming crossroads in this matter of Christmas lighting. If the remaining \$500 is contributed by merchants and individuals, the project will be continued, though it is quite evident some changes in styling will have to be made due to the new street lighting system.

If loyal citizens do not contribute the necessary funds the only course left open to the Chamber will be to abandon the whole Christmas lighting project, due to lack of public interest, yet this same project has earned universal acclaim.

We must not fail our city in such an important matter over so trivial a sum. Make your neglected contribution today to the Christmas Lighting Fund.

ICELAND RECONSIDERS

The echo of tank guns in Hungary has reached many far-off parts of the world. Among them is Iceland. A few months ago a newly elected government in Reykjavik gave notice that it intended to cancel the agreement under which United States forces maintain an air and naval base on that island for the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

At that time Moscow appeared to be in a mellow mood. Also, the Soviet Union was buying more than a fourth of Iceland's fish, its major export product. These fish had suddenly been shut out of the British market and were nearly priced out of the American market. Active Communist propaganda made it easy to overlook that over one-sixth of the island's income for several years had come from the Reykjavik base.

Then came the booming from Budapest. Some Icelanders may have remembered that the Soviet Union now has become the second largest naval power in the world and that aggression is possible by sea as well as by land. Furthermore, United States officials began to recognize that something could be done for Iceland in the way of economic aid.

So in an exchange of notes with Washington the Reykjavik government has dropped its request that American troops leave the otherwise undefended country and has reinstituted the agreement drawn in 1951.

For a time there was some misgiving that the agreement would be replaced with a simple compact between Iceland and the United States, leaving out the Atlantic Alliance background. It is gratifying both from the standpoint of NATO strength and of Icelandic realism that the original understanding has been renewed.

Joe and I were passing the record shop the Saturday before Christmas. An amplifier was blaring, "O Come, All Ye Faithful."

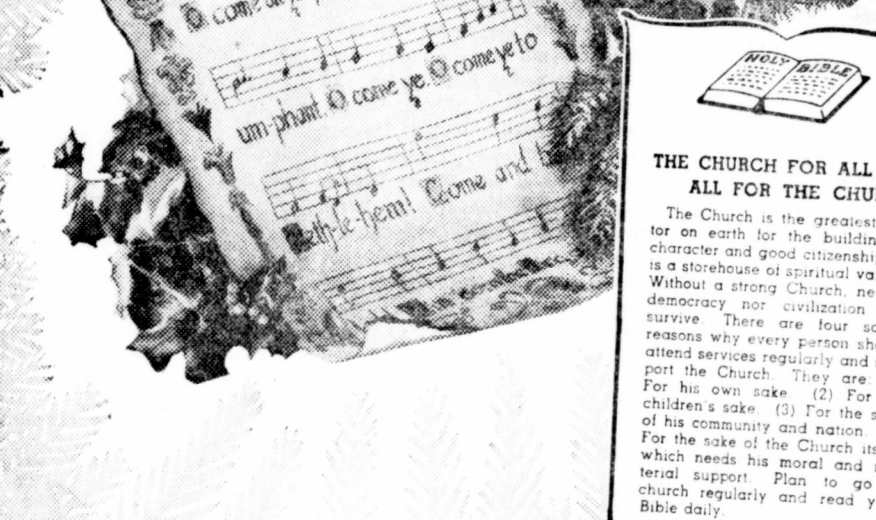

Coastal Area At Height Of Christmas Tree Season



Christmas trees for the homes of city dwellers are being selected, cut, bundled and shipped in great quantities these days. At the left in the pictures above, Arnold Robinson of Warren is shown bundling trees ready for shipment.



The task is a question of placing three trees together, wrestling them until the branches are compressed, and then tying them securely.

Thousands of bundles of Christmas trees bound for all sections of the Northeast area of the United States have been leaving Knox and Lincoln Counties these past weeks. Arnold Robinson of Warren, is one of the many cutters and shippers in the area which last year sent some 37,261 bundles of trees to

market to be third in the state in volume of trees. The counties also sent some 8,532 wreaths to decorate city homes for Christmas and 1226 boughs. Boughs are 50 pound bundles of fir boughs to be made into decorations. Knox-Lincoln counties were second in the state

in number of wreaths sent and third in the number of boughs. Eighty-three men are listed as having been responsible for the cutting and shipping of trees. Both the Knox-Lincoln Extension Service and the State Farm Forester have been intensifying their program of better Christmas tree

cutting. The program includes such things as thinning, pruning, weeding, quality in the bundle, and other management practices which will allow for a continuous cut over the years without decimating the stand. Growers interested in improving their stands of Christmas trees

may obtain a bulletin on the subject from County Agent Gil Jaeger, and may attend the field meetings on the problem. The next meeting is scheduled for Jan. 15. Both Jaeger and farm forester Robert Umberger are available to go over plantations to help instruct in better Christmas tree management.

Farmers who prefer a cash book will like the revisions in the No. 1 Extension Service farm account book which is now off the press and will soon be available in the Knox-Lincoln County Extension Office in Rockland.

Lew Clark, farm specialist and Gil Jaeger, county agent have discussed the changes with me and they believe that farmers will find the new No. 1 book much easier to use than the 1956 edition.

After issuing single account books for several years for the dairy and poultry industries respectively, a new system was set up last year which many think was an improvement. The old style account books were discontinued although there were a few copies left over and some farmers have continued with those through this year.

This year, however, all of us will be using the new system and the revision in the No. 1 book should make it very simple for farmers who have stuck to the old system to make the change.

The No. 1 book for last year was

an interesting attempt to combine both cash and charge expenses. The only trouble has been that it did not adapt itself too well to the U.S. income tax return, for those who wished to make returns on a cash basis.

In my mind the new No. 1 book is much simpler to handle. It is as the title on the front cover says, a daily record of cash receipts and expenses. Last year a number of printed headings were used. Almost all of those have been removed in the new book, so that the farmer can put in his own headings. But to make it a little easier gummied column headings will be available for each type of farm. Mr. Clark told me that these headings were then being printed and by now it is likely that some have come to the Rockland office.

I did say that all of us would be using the new system. However, for those who liked the last year's No. 1 book, there will be a few available for a short time. I would suggest that anyone wishing to continue with the 1956 No. 1 book had better get in touch with Mr. Jaeger at once and if they want to hold to this method it will be necessary to buy several copies. I don't know that there is any discount for the last year's books in quantity but it might be worth a try.

For those who will be using the system for the first time, I will say that there are four books to the system. Besides the cash record there is No. 2, five year inventory and depreciation schedule; No. 3, five year farm credit supplement; No. 3, social security

Mrs. Scarlott will start work at the library Dec. 17.

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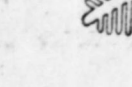
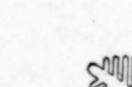
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
