High School. Summer term taught by Susie L. Thompson, assisted by Emma Perkins. Length of term, 10 weeks; whole number of pupils in attendance, 65; average attendance, 62; wages of teachers, \$15.00 and \$5.00 per week.

Fall and winter terms taught by Susie L. Thompson, assisted by Nell. Thwing. Length of term, 10 weeks; number of pupils in attendance during the fall term, 68; average attendance, 65; wages of teachers, \$15.00 and \$6.00 per week.

Winter term still in session.

Grammar School. Summer, fall and winter terms taught by Annie B. Crooker. Length of terms, 10 weeks each; wages \$8.00 per week; whole number of pupils in attendance in summer, 55; average attendance, 52. Whole number in attendance during fall term, 36; average attendance, 34.

Winter term still in session.

Intermediate School. Fall and winter terms taught by Hattie M. Leach. Length of terms 10 weeks each; wages, \$5.00 per week. Whole number of pupils in attendance in fall 38; average, 33.

Primary School. Summer, fall and winter terms taught by Emma A. Shurtleff. Length of terms 10 weeks each; wages, \$8.00 per week. Whole number of pupils in attendance in summer term, 72; average, 58; whole number in fall, 65; average, 57. Winter term still in session.

Though the improvement in the high school has not been so marked as in the lower grades, the committee feel that the corps of teachers in these schools have given so general satisfaction that there is no occasion for personal mention.

A new primary school-room must soon be provided to relieve Miss Shurtleff's room. Forty pupils of this grade are enough for any teacher to take charge of. To require her to seat seventy-five in fifty chairs, and obtain from each the same amount of individual work which she would have obtained had there been but forty, is expecting too much.

DISTRICT NO. 3 .- John W. Webber, Agent.

Whole number of scholars in the district, 37. Summer term taught by Hattie M. Leach. Length of term, 8 weeks; wages, excluding board, \$3.25; price of board per week, \$1.25; whole number of pupils in attendance, 22; average attendance 19 1-2.

Fall term taught by Grace A. Gilbert. Length of term, 8 weeks; wages, excluding board, \$3.25; price of board, \$1.50; number of pupils in attendance, 18; average attendance, 13 1-2.

Winter term taught by W. E. Lambard. Length of term, 10 weeks; wages, \$20.00 per month. Price of board per week, \$1.75; whole number of pupils in attendance, 13; average attendance 10.

Mr. Webber was very fortunate in the choice of his teachers. Miss Leach is an experienced teacher and has always obtained excellent reports; her success this term fully justifies the most flattering. Miss Gilbert was a zealous teacher and instilled into her scholars the same vivacious energy which she herself possessed. Her discipline was good and her method of instruction excellent. Mr. Lambard proved an excellent teacher; his order was first class, his instruction clear and concise, and every thing attempted by his classes was thoroughly accomplished.

DISTRICT NO. 4 .- N. B. Wheeler, Agent.

Whole number of scholars in the district, 21.

Summer term taught by Bertha H. Cushman. Length of term, 8 weeks; wages, \$2.00; board \$1.18; number of pupils in attendance, 14; average attendance, 12.

Winter term taught by B. B. Bickford. Length of term 8 weeks; wages of teacher, \$20.00 per month; board per week, \$1.25; number of pupils in attendance, 20; average attendance, 13.

Miss Cushman's scholars made good progress; but if she had been more careful about her discipline, her labors would have been far easier and the appearance of her school much better.

Mr. Bickford proved "the right man in the right place;" under his skillful management the school became quiet and orderly, and made rapid advancement in their studies.

DISTRICT NO. 5 .- E. L. Porter, Agent.

Number of scholars in the district, 28.

Summer and winter terms were taught by Etta A. Edgerly. No registers returned.

DISTRICT NO. 6 .- J. C. Howe, Agent.

Summer term taught by Miss Dora B. York. Whole number of pupils in attendance, 40; average attendance, 35; wages of teacher, \$4.75 per week.

Miss York labored faithfully for the best interest of her scholars and gave general satisfaction. It must be evident to even the most obstinate, that 40 small scholars are too many for one teacher to profitably have in charge.

Fall term taught by Miss Annie B. Fobes. Whole number of pupils in attendance, 37; average attendance, 32; wages of teacher, \$5.00 per week.

Miss Fobes possesses in a marked degree, the natural qualities of a good teacher; add to this her energy and thorough mastery of every detail in the school room, places her in the front rank of teachers.

Winter term taught by Wm. L. Bonney. Whole number of pupils in attendance, 37; wages of teacher, \$39.00 per month; length of school, 11 weeks. This school is still in session.

Mr. Bonney is perfectly at home in the school room, and unites energy with thoroughness. The school has made excellent progress under his management.

This district has been fortunate the past year in securing good teachers; but out of 82 scholars in the district, not one-half, have, at any one time, attended school. Scholars remaining out of school are apt to influence those who do attend, away. No teacher, however earnestly they may labor, or faithfully perform their duties, can entirely overcome the apathy and neglect of parents to send their scholars to school or the lack on the part of a neighborhood to furnish a suitable, comfortable and decent school house. The present school house, even if there was no other objection, will not, without crowding, seat one-half the scholars in the district. In our opinion, this school should be graded and a school house built in place of the present one with nearly twice the capacity.

DISTRICT NO. 7.- James Bumpus, Agent.

Whole number of scholars in the district, 11.

Summer term taught by Tena Millett. Length of term, 10 weeks; whole number of pupils in attendance, 7; average attendance, 6; wages of teacher, excluding board, \$2.00 per week; price of board per week, \$1.20.

Fall term taught by Lillie E. Shaw. Length of term, 10 weeks; number of pupils in attendance, 8; average attendance, 61-2; wages of teacher, excluding board, \$3.00 per week; price of board per week, \$1.00.

Both teachers labored faithfully for the advancement of their scholars, and gave excellent satisfaction to parents and pupils.

DISTRICT NO. 8 .- C. W. Shaw, Agent.

Summer term taught by Miss Ada J. Scribner. Length of term, six weeks; whole number of pupils in attendance, 8; average attendance, 7; wages of teacher, \$2.25 per week; price of board, \$1.35 per week. This was Miss Scribner's first experience as a teacher. We thought her rather young for the cares and duties of the school-room, but she labored diligently and the scholars made good advancement for so short a term.

Winter term taught by Miss Josie F. King. Length of term, 8 weeks; whole number of scholars 9; average attendance 9; wages of teacher, \$6.75 per week including board. Miss King is a teacher of large experience, is a thorough scholar, and her method of instruction is very good. She taught a good school.

DISTRICT NO. 9 .- George M. Atwood, Agent.

Grammar School.—Summer term taught by Miss Hattie A. Hooper. Length of term, 9 weeks; whole number of pupils, 24; average attendance, 20; wages of teacher, \$6.00 per week. Miss Hooper is not afraid to work for her pupils, doing much outside of the school-room. She is a teacher of considerable experience and ability and in this school she fully sustained her former reputation.

Fall term taught by Charles E. Dolley. Length of term, 10 weeks; whole number of scholars, 34; average attendance, 25; wages of teacher \$36.00 per month; price of board \$3.00 per week. Mr. Dolley seemed to strive faithfully to make the school a success, and the scholars who made equal effort made good advancement.

Winter term taught by Walter Bates Farr. Length of term, 8 weeks; whole number of scholars, 39; average attendance, 29,7–10; wages of teacher, \$48.00 per month. Mr. Farr has a peculiarly interesting way of conducting recitations and keeping the labors of the school-room from becoming monotonous. We should be pleased to have him labor with us again in some of the schools of this town. He taught a profitable school.

Primary School.—Summer term taught by Miss A.Louise Doe. Length of term, 7 weeks; whole number of scholars in attendance, 32; average attendance, 29; wages of teacher, \$6.00 per week.

Fall term taught by same teacher. Length of term, 10 weeks; whole number of scholars, 26; average number, 24; wages of teacher, \$7.00 per week.

Winter term taught by same teacher. Length of term, 8 weeks; whole number of scholars, 24; average number, 22; wages of teacher, \$7.00 per week. Miss Doe is

thorough and systematic in her work and we congratulate the district upon securing her services throughout the year.

DISTRICT NO. 10.-Frank A. Farrar, Agent.

Summer term taught by Miss Sadie Austin. Length of term, 10 weeks; whole number of scholars attending school, 30; average number, 27; wages of teacher, \$3.50 per week; price of board \$1.50 per week.

Fall term by same teacher. Length of term 10 weeks; whole number of scholars, 34; average attendance, 30; wages of teacher, \$4.00 per week; board \$1.50 per week. This was the third term that Miss Austin has taught in this district, which makes it evident that her labors here are appreciated. She had a pleasing way of instruction and the scholars under her charge made good progress.

Winter term taught by Austin P. Stearns. This school is still in session (February 1st) so we cannot give statistics. Mr. Stearns is laboring hard for the welfare of his school and we doubt not it will be a profitable term. Order of the school very good.

DISTRICT NO. 11.-J. S. Dudley, Agent.

There was no school during the summer in this district. Fall and winter terms taught by Miss Nellie E. Lucas. Whole number of pupils in attendance in fall, 10; average attendance, 8 1-2; wages of teacher, \$2.75 per week. Whole number of pupils in winter, 7; average attendance, 6 1-2; wages of teacher, \$3.25 per week. Miss Lucas is very attentive to the wants of her scholars, and labored faithfully for their advancement. The recitations were well conducted and the scholars showed good progress in their studies.

DISTRICT NO. 12.—C. S. Washburn, Agent.

Summer and fall terms taught by Miss Mabel C. Kidder. Whole number of pupils in attendance, summer term, 31; average attendance, 27; wages of teacher, \$4.00 per week. Whole number of pupils in attendance, fall term, 30; average attendance, 28; wages of teacher, \$4.50 per week. Miss Kidder is a thorough scholar and excellent instructor. We hope she will continue to favor us with her services as a teacher in this town.

Winter term taught by E. J. Records. Whole number of pupils in attendance, 33; average attendance, 21; wages of teacher, \$30.00 per month. This school is still in session.

DISTRICT NO. 13.-A. O. Corbett, Agent.

Summer term taught by Miss Stella A. Hemmingway. Length of term, 8 weeks; whole number of scholars, 9; average attendance, 8; wages of teacher \$2.50 per week; board, \$1.75 per week. This was Miss Hemmingway's first school, but she showed careful preparation,—labored faithfully and with good success.

Winter term taught by Miss Lilla A. Robbins. Length of term, 12 weeks; whole number of scholars, 10; average number, 9 8–10; wages of teacher, \$3.25 per week; board \$1.75 per week. Miss Robbins has taught in this district before with good success and the term this winter was equally profitable. We have had occasion in previous reports to make remarks about this school house, and again we would recommend that the district be combined with others or be provided with a new house at once.

DISTRICT NO. 14.-A. T. Maxim, Agent.

Summer term taught by Mrs. Bertha D. Bessey. Length of term, 4 weeks; whole number of scholars, 8; average attendance, 6; wages of teacher, \$1.17 per week; price of board, \$1.50 per week. This school was shortened by sickness and was only visited once by the committee.

Winter term taught by Geo. S. Royal. Length of term, 11 weeks; whole number of scholars, 9; average number, 82-3; wages of teacher, \$24.00 per month, including board.

This was Mr. Royal's first attempt at teaching; with more experience he will doubtless become a good teacher.

DISTRICT NO. 15 .- A. S. Thayer, Agent.

Summer term taught by Miss Mollie Shaw. Length of term, 6 weeks; whole number of scholars, 16; average attendance 14; wages of teacher, \$2.50 per week; price of board, \$1.80 per week.

Miss Shaw is a teacher with considerable life and tact in the school room. The school made good advancement under her instruction.

Winter term taught by H. E. Chase. Length of term, 10 weeks; whole number of scholars, 19; average attendance, 15 1-2; wages of teacher, \$25.00 per month.

This was a very pleasant school, and we think the scholars made good advancement.

DISTRICT NO. 16 .- A. D. Adams, Agent.

Summer term taught by Miss Lucy A. Andrews. Whole number of pupils in attendance, 19; average attendance, 16; wages of teacher, \$3.00 per week.

Miss Andrews has an easy and pleasant manner among her pupils. Her scholars were very quiet and studious, and their recitations excellent. We cheerfully recommend her to our agents.

Winter term taught by Rev. Seth Benson. Whole number of pupils in attendance, 20; average attendance, 18; wages of teacher, \$40.00 per month, including board.

Mr. Benson has taught between forty and fifty schools, served on the school board a number of years, and is too well known as a thorough and practical teacher to need comments from us.

DISTRICT NO. 17.-George Washburn, Agent.

Summer term taught by Miss Minnie C. Dean. Whole number of pupils in attendance, 9; average attendance 7 1-2; wages of teacher, \$2.00 per week.

Although this was Miss Dean's first term, she taught an excellent school. Some of her scholars deserve special mention for their recitations, which was a credit to themselves and teacher. We hope Miss Dean will continue to teach in this town.

Winter term taught by Mr. J. B. Chaffin. Whole number of pupils in attendance, 10; average attendance, 7 1-2; wages of teacher, \$24.00 per month.

Mr. Chaffin has taught school for many years. His academic experience in different States, as a teacher, is extensive;

his method of instruction plain and easily comprehended; at the same time, thorough and progressive. Mr. Chaffin is one of our best teachers.

DISTRICT NO. 18 .- Benton L. Swift, Agent.

Whole number of scholars in the district, 20.

Summer term taught by Bertha E. Whitman. Length of term, 5 weeks; whole number of pupils in attendance, 12; average attendance, 11 1-2; wages of teacher, excluding board, \$3.00 per week; price of board per week, \$1.50.

Winter term taught by C. H. Willis. Length of term, 10 weeks; whole number of pupils in attendance, 12; average attendance, 10 1-2; wages of teacher, excluding board, \$20.00 per month; price of board per week, \$2.00.

This school—though small—was the pleasantest of any it has yet been our good fortune to visit. The school room was always neat and tidy, the school quiet and orderly, the recitations carefully prepared and excellently recited.

DISTRICT NO. 19.-Adna Tuell, Agent.

Summer term taught by Miss Mabel Cushman. Whole number of pupils in attendance, 21; average attendance, 20; wages of teacher, \$3.00 per week.

Miss Cushman is active and and attentive to the duties of the school room. She taught a good school and gave general satisfaction.

Fall term taught by Miss Lorana A. Robbins. Whole number of pupils in attendance, 21, average attendance, 20. Wages of teacher, \$3.50 per week.

Miss Robbins is a good instructor and we regret she was not able to finish the term—on account of sickness in her family.

Winter term taught by Miss Annie B. Fobes. Whole number of pupils in attendance, 24, average attendance, 22. Wages of teacher, \$5.00 per week.

Miss Fobes is too well known in town as one of the very best of teachers, to require comments from us. We hope she will continue to teach for many years to come.

DISTRICT NO. 20 .- John D. Briggs, Agent.

There was but one school in this district the past year—taught by Miss Annie E. Robbins. Whole number of pupils in attendance, 12, average attendance, 10. Wages of teacher, \$2.75 per week. Under Miss Robbins's management the school made good progress.

In drawing our report to a close, we are again reminded of the responsibilities of agents, parents and teachers, and of districts in choosing their agents. Agents are often chosen without any regard to their adaptability to the work before them; and it sometimes seems as though their only thought of responsibility was to secure the most school (in length of term) for the least money and with the least trouble to themselves. Now no agent should accept the office who has not an interest in the welfare of the schools in his district. And, as the choosing of the teachers rests with him, great care should be exercised to secure the best that can be obtained, and do not let the cost of a good teacher stand in the way of hiring him. Six weeks of good school are better than ten of ordinary, or sixteen of very poor.

To parents we would say that, their agents having secured teachers, it is your duty to sustain them, to give them the friendly hand and encourage them. Try to make them realize that you are interested in them, and in the success of the school. And your teachers,—teaching, perhaps, for the paltry sum of \$2.00 per week,—do you realize the responsibility that rests upon you? In your hands, to a large degree, rests the future of our nation. Do you realize that the rising generation, to a great extent, will be what you make it? Are you qualified to take the responsibility?

In the coming year we hope that parents and teachers will labor more in unity, having only the welfare of the scholars in view, and having due charity for each other's imperfections, laying aside personal prejudices and trivial matters that are often allowed to creep in and ruin a school.
