WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING.

To George W. Knight, a Constable in the Town of Scarborough:
GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said Town of Scarborough, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House, in said Town of Scarborough, on Monday the second (2nd) day of March, A. D., 1903, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act upon the following articles:

- 1st. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- 2nd. To choose a Clerk, Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of the Poor, Collector, Treasurer, Superintendent of Schools, Road Commissioner, (or Commissioners) and all other necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
- 3d. To see if the town will grant and raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance and support of schools, the poor, repairs on roads and bridges, and to defray all other town charges.
- 4th. To see if the town will accept and adopt the reports of the several town officers.
- 5th. To see if the town will vote to charge interest on taxes remaining unpaid after a given time.
- 6th. To see what compensation the town will vote the Collector for the ensuing year.
- 7th. To see if the town will vote the sum of \$1,053.62, to meet the expense incurred by small pox.

8th. To see if the town will vote a sum of money to blast out a drain from George E. Gilman's to let the water down over the Jones Hill, so that it will not flow over the road.

9th. To see if the town will vote the sum of \$755.42 to meet the cost of bridges on turnpike.

10th. To see what action the town will take in regard to the building of the Leonard road "so called," as laid out by the County Commissioners, and raise money for the same.

11th. To see if the town will vote to instruct its municipal officers to borrow money, if it becomes necessary, during the year.

12th. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to build a building suitable for the stabling of horses, for the use of its municipal officers.

13th. To see if the town will vote a sum of money to reduce its town debt.

14th. To see if the town will vote to discontinue that part of the road laid out and straightened by the selectmen on the petition of Fred M. Newcomb and others, from the Boston & Maine Railroad, Western Division, to Prout's Neck, to a point near the Southgate House.

15th. To see if the town will vote to recind the vote passed at the last annual town meeting, accepting the road as laid out and straightened by the Selectmen, from the Boston & Maine Railroad, Western Division, to Prout's Neck, to a point near the Southgate House, and raising a sum to pay the damage on the same on petition of Fred M. Newcomb and others.

16th. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to finish grading at or on both sides of Nonesuch river on the State road.

17th. To see if the town will vote a sum of money to meet the expense of breaking roads.

18th. To see if the town will vote to maintain a High School the coming year, and raise money for the same.

19th. To see what action the town will take in regard to enlarging or rebuilding the Oak Hill schoolhouse, and raise money for the same.

20th. To see what action the town will take in regard to digging clams. (By request.)

21st. To see if the town will vote the sum of one hundred dollars, to be expended on the highway from None-such River Bridge to the house of Turner H. Knight. (By request.)

22nd. To see if the town will vote the sum of one hundred dollars to be expended on the highway from None-such river "on the Payne road" to the town line of South Portland. (By request.)

23rd. To see what action the town will take in regard to the collection of back taxes on the estate of John L. Best, for the years 1898-99-1900-01, amounting to \$202.23.

24th. To see if the town will vote a sum of money to buy 12 settees for the Town Hall.

25th. To see if the town will vote the sum of two hundred dollars (\$200,) to be expended on the State road.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be at the Town House on Saturday, the 28th day of February, A. D., 1903, from nine o'clock a. m., to four o'clock p. m., for the purpose of rectifying the check list.

SCHOOL REPORT.

To the Citizens of Scarboro:

In accordance with the requirements of law, the following report of the Public Schools of Scarboro for the year ending Feb. 10, 1903, is respectfully submitted:

In making this report we are glad to say that a steady and healthful progress in the school work has prevailed throughout the year, and an improvement can be seen in the standing of all the schools.

The teachers have been faithful and interested in their work, and have been able to show good results at the examination of their classes.

The scholars deserve praise for their diligent and honest study, which has helped to make the work of the year pleasant and successful.

The attendance has been good, although the Fall term at Dunstan was seriously affected by the prevalence of whooping cough.

At Scottows Hill the school opened for the Winter term, but owing to so many of the pupils having whooping

cough, only three attended, and the committee thought it advisable to close the school. A team was provided to transport those who could go to Dunstan to school.

We trust that all may be able to return to their school for the Spring term, for this school, although small in point of numbers, with the faithful teacher it has had the past two years, ranks among the best in town.

A pleasant feature that is of interest, is the study of Nature, which has received much attention in some of the schools. By this, the child is led to an earlier conception of God's handiwork, and to recognize in the trees, the plants and flowers as something created for his pleasure.

It is hoped that more of the parents will visit our schools and make themselves familiar with the work which is being done.

Parents wish to know how and by whom their children are being trained intellectually. This can be ascertained only by contact with the actual school life of the child, and by social contact with the teacher.

Through the efforts of the teacher and pupils of the Beech Ridge school, a flag has been purchased. A flag raising at the close of the Winter term was a most enjoyable occasion. The exercises by the children were very pleasing. A large number of citizens were in attendance.

Short addresses were made by many who were present.

An entertainment was given during the Winter term by the teacher and pupils of the Broad Turn school, the proceeds of which are to be used toward the purchase of an organ for the schoolroom.

School Improvement Leagues have been organized at Dunstan, North Scarboro, Scottows Hill and Oak Hill schools.

At Dunstan the members are working to get a fund, and will decide the next term what they will do with the money.

At North Scarboro a clock has been purchased for the schoolroom.

At Scottows Hill they have bought picture moulding for the room, paint for the library, a clock and flower seeds. They have also furnished a toilet table for the dressing room. With the money now on hand, they intend to buy a picture.

The pupils of Oak Hill have purchased a flag, and the past year their League has bought an organ, a clock, a large map of the United States and a picture of Longfellow. This League has received a gift of \$5 from Mr. S. D. Plummer, which is much appreciated, also a map of Maine from Master Robert Rideout.

While some gains have been made along this line, it is clear that a larger work is yet to be performed. It is hoped that the time is not distant when more of the people will enter upon the policy of aiding in the support of this work, which will result in cheerful schoolrooms, with pleasant and healthful surroundings.

REPAIRS.

The repairs on the different buildings have received proper attention the past year.

At Black Point the outside of the building was painted.

The walls of the rooms of the North Scarboro and Beech Ridge schools have been tinted and the ceilings whitened.

The roof of the building at North Scarboro was shingled.

Other necessary repairs have been made on all the houses.

The walls and ceiling of the building at Pine Point are much stained and need whitening.

Although most of the buildings are in very good condition, there will be many needful repairs the coming year.

The building at Oak Hill is in poor condition. This house was filled with pupils the past year; as there are many new ones to enter this year, additional accommodations are much needed.

TEXT BOOKS.

There has been no change made in the text books the past year.

Many new readers and arithmetics will be needed this year as those now in use are much worn. The Tarbell's geography has given entire satisfaction.
