WASHINGTON, Feb. 10.—After listening

to a report from M. Howell, president

of the National Temperance Society, the

Senate committee on education today, by a

unanimous vote, instructed Senator Wilson

of Iowa, to report favorably the bill

providing for the appointment of a commission

of five, all of whom shall be advocates of

total abstinence, to investigate the

alcoholic liquor traffic and its relations to

revenue and taxation and its general

economic, moral and scientific aspects in

connection with pauperism, crime, social

hygiene, health and the general welfare

of the people, and also to report on the

best means for the prevention of the

evil, and to report on the best means for

the enforcement of the laws against the

interference in the several States of the

Union.

This commission is

increasingly important and very rapidly

deprives the government of power to
