To the Taxpayers of the Town of Westport:

In view of the fact that it is necessary to raise \$2,000.00 more than the above estimates for the ensuing year, we, the Selectmen of the Town of Westport, feel that an explanation is due the taxpayers.

The balance of a note incurred in 1934 is \$1,000.00. It is necessary at this town meeting to raise this amount as the bank refuses to carry this account further.

It is also imperative that the sum of \$952.99 be raised at this meeting to reimburse the City of Bath for money expended for the care of Parker Tarbox and wife. Medical and burial expenses of Mrs. Parker Tarbox are included in this amount.

It is therefore apparent that it will become necessary to raise the taxes for the year ensuing accordingly. We feel that unless something unforeseen develops during the ensuing year that the tax rate of 1937 can be decreased considerably.

IN GENERAL

It was a unanimous vote of the School Committee at the April 13, 1935 meeting to have a fall term of 15 weeks, closing Dec. 20th for a two weeks vacation. To have the winter term open Monday, Jan. 6, 1936 for a ten weeks session, closing Friday, March 13th. The spring vacation to be taken during the muddy season in March and perhaps a part of April. Your committee expects the spring term to open Monday, April 13 or a week later.

Mr. Herbert Cromwell resigned his position as driver of the conveyance car at the close of the spring term. A public notice was posted in conspicuous places asking for bids to convey the Center and South School pupils to the North School for the state year which opens in September and closes in June. Upon receiving three sealed bids. they were opened as advertised, at the August 3, 1935 meeting and the Superintendent was instructed to employ Walter Greenleaf under a signed contract, to convey these pupils to the North School for one year at \$15.00 per week.

We have tried to hold the school accounts within the resources as you will see, and not allow an over expended amount.

Some repairs on the schoolhouse are needed. The sill on the east side and the chimney need considerable attention. The water from the roof runs down the side of the building, back of the fascia board, rotting some of the clapboards near the gutter. This needs some attention too. The School Committee asks for \$50 to do this work.

The State Board of Health and Child Welfare has asked the town to appropriate an amount for health inspection. The common cold should not be lightly considered. It is responsible for more sick or semi-invalid days than any other disease. Its cause is a germ. There

are several organisms that have this distinction to their credit. The attack is not often made singly. A mixed infection is usually present. Prof. Wilson G. Smillie, Harvard University says: "Common colds are an infection, and are not due to cold weather and terrific winds." To prevent colds and their consequences is a matter of vital concern to every person. No one is immune. Keep the body resistance high. No cold is a simple affair. It may end in pneumonia or a permanent laming of the body in some other way. As one values good health and relative freedom from colds, so one should be solicitous to carry out faithfully the laws of personal hygiene essential to health, ever remembering that health is not obtained from a bottle, but results from obedience to the body's requirements for sunshine, rest, sleep, exercise, proper foods and fresh air.

Two eighth grade pupils received certificates of graduation during the community exercises given at the close of school last June. There were many visitors present. All voted it to be an excellent program.

The School Committee meetings have been held one each month. All have cooperated to make them successful. We appreciated the use of the school building for these meetings.

ART. 10—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the improvement of the section of State Aid Road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges, under the provisions of Sec. 3, Chap. 175, Public Laws of 1933.

ART. 11—To see what sum, if any, the town would recommend to take from the joint State Aid account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to the State Aid Roads built within the past five years, in accordance with the provisions of Chap. 271, Public Laws 1931.

ART. 22—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$952.99, to pay bills incurred by Parker Tarbox and wife.

ART. 23—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40.80 to pay a bill presented by C. E. A. Cromwell for ferrying fire apparatus, etc.

ART. 24—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to pay note due the First National Bank of Bath, incurred by the 1934 administration.
