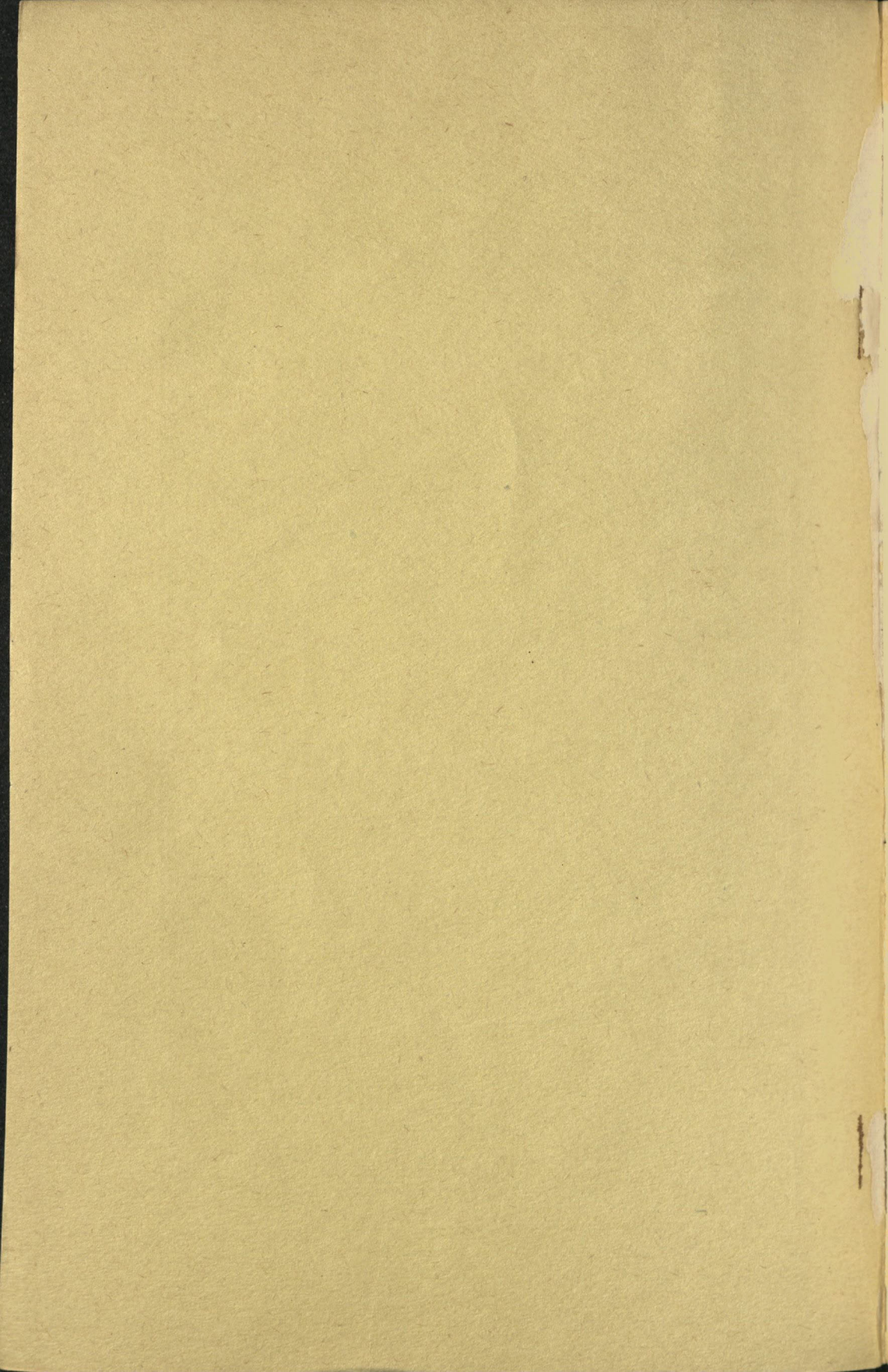

WARRANT.

To JOSIAH D. HINDS, a Constable of the town of Orrington, in the County of Penobscot.

GREETING :

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Orrington, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House in said town on Monday, the twelfth day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit :

First — To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Second — To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

Third — To act on the report of the Selectmen.

Fourth — To act on the report of the Superintendent of Schools.

Fifth — To act on the report of the Board of Health.

Sixth — To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year, including one or more Road Commissioners.

Seventh — To grant and raise money for the support of schools, the poor, the repairs of roads and bridges and repair of school houses and defray all other town charges.

Eighth — To fix the compensation of the Collector of Taxes.

Ninth — To fix the compensation of the Road Commissioner.

Tenth — To see if the town will vote to purchase land to enlarge Oak Hill Cemetery and raise money for the same.

Eleventh — To see if the town will vote to fence said Cemetery and raise money for same.

Twelfth — To see if the town will instruct the the Selectmen to straighten the line on the east side of said Cemetery and dispose of land not suitable for burial purposes.

Thirteenth — By Petition ; To see if the town will cause to be laid out and constructed a highway commencing at a point on the road leading from East Orrington to Brewers Pond before reaching the long hill and connecting with the town way now leading from Hymes landing, so called, on said pond to the Bucksport road.

Fourteenth — To see if the town will instruct its Treasurer to loan the credit of the town to defray town charges not to exceed \$1000.

Fifteenth — To see if the town will instruct its Road Commissioner to expend two hundred dollars of the road fund in carting gravel on the road leading from East Orrington to So. Brewer, the gravel to be given by C. A. Wood.

Sixteenth — To see if the town will instruct the Selectmen regarding the letting and care of Town Hall.

Seventeenth — To see if the town will vote to continue the School in No. 9.

Eighteenth — To hear the report of the special committee chosen at the last annual meeting to investigate the advisability of consolidating and grading our schools.

The Selectmen will be in session for the purpose of revising the list of voters at nine o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.

Eleven schools have been in session during the year with attendance shown by statistics at first of this report. Some schools have had fluctuations of attendance caused by families moving out or into the different localities. Especially is this true in Nos. 1 and 2. No. 7 school has been smaller because of the removal of the Gray children to No. 6 on account of having difficulty with their eyes from studying in No. 7 school-room in its present condition. The Committee and Superintendent have tried to deal wisely in this matter, thinking it best for the good of all to leave the town to decide what we ought to do with the E. Orrington school-house to make it hygienic in every particular, also to decide whether children shall be allowed to go from one school to another at the will of those having them in charge. This is one of the important school questions which is causing your committee trouble and should be settled once for all. The "Course of Study" printed in last year's report has been followed closely during *this* year in all of the schools, while in addition we have brought to the notice of many of our teachers the grade limits of "Bangor Schools," thus keeping in touch as much as possible with the standard work in this section. Monthly tests have been given and scholars ranked accordingly. We do not claim that the work is faultless, we know that the best work possible under present conditions must have many weaknesses, but we *do* claim that the work is *progressive* and

that it is leading up to the "System" which we are optimists enough to feel sure, will in time, come from our patient earnest work along these lines. You will notice how many of our boys and girls are taking advantage of tuition paid by the town to receive a higher education. They have gone from nearly all of the schools during the year, having been well drilled in the Town school for the work of the High School or Academy. I am very much pleased with their ranking in these schools, judging from the reports of Principals and Superintendents of the different schools to which they have gone. They speak well for our schools and our town, yet those who go out of town are a small proportion of the scholars who should receive higher education than the common school and could attend a High School if we can establish one in our town as a result of a system of "Graded Schools." This is the same story which I tell year after year but as it is one which I believe to be true I repeat it. We have expended our repair money where it was thought to be most needed. We purchased panelled shutters for the windows of the main room at E. Orrington, which regulates the light in the best possible manner and improves the room very much. The expense was more than was anticipated, thus lowering our funds appreciably. This school though few in numbers is a very interesting one as parents and children work together for the "school." In no other district do the parents by personal supervision show as much interest in the school work. They visit the school often, help cheerfully in all entertainments connected with it, and speak words of encouragement to the teacher and superintendent, for which I feel very grateful.

An active School Improvement League has been the source of many additions to the room, among which we notice a fine Dictionary and Holder, which is not only ornamental but is in constant use by the pupils. These Leagues are of great benefit to the schools, and we expect them to be established in all parts of the town in the coming year. Among the successes of the year we must include the No. 10 School

taught for the year by Miss Edith H. Gilmore who brought so much energy and zeal to her work that all were interested and worked for the general good of the school. Although one of our smallest schools, the results obtained were marvelous. First an Improvement League was established with parents and friends helpful and interested. With funds obtained through this Society a new flag was raised over the school house, a library of thirty volumes of standard literature bought, a book case with glass front furnished for the books and \$10 in the treasury. The pupils were taught carefully and were advanced accordingly. We feel satisfied with the work here. Orrington Center School re-established this year, kept up a good average as did most of the schools in spring and fall. The winter schools were broken by "measles" which so depopulated Nos. 1 and 9 that after five weeks, the attendance being so small, it was thought wise to close them for the term. Nos. 8 and 9 rank well in attendance. We find some of the best scholars in town in these two schools, considering their ages. They are to be highly commended for their punctual constant attendance and faithful work. New Grammars and Spellers were introduced this year which were much needed. The books are proving satisfactory, presenting the subjects treated in a plain, practical way. Like any new book a little time is needed for teacher and pupil to adjust themselves to "new methods of presenting old subjects" with the result that the last two terms show better work than did the spring one. Books are well worn in some cases, although as a rule the children are careful in handling them and when a book is lost or destroyed I find the parents ready and willing to pay for the book. We need some school-room maps. I should be very glad if the town would make an especial appropriation for this purpose. Discipline was mentioned last year as a necessary factor for the success of our schools. I can say at the close of this report that this subject has received the special attention of both teacher and Superintendent, and that better order has been maintained in all the schools through the year. Five teachers have re-

mained in the *same* school for the year, while four others have taught two consecutive terms in one school. We have been able to arrange for twenty-eight weeks of school instead of thirty which we hoped to have. Too many small schools is our difficulty.

As the schools grow smaller and smaller the question, what is the proper thing to do under the circumstances? presents itself to the committee. One thing, we cannot afford to do is to have cheaper teachers. Therefore the expenditure "per capita" for teaching is four or five times the amount formerly paid. The other plan is to *centralize* and unite the small weak schools. This has been the plan of Committee and Superintendent for some years. When the plan of centralization is followed the money spent to keep eleven school-houses in repair can be expended on five or six with good results. A better system of grading and a High School at home is another result of this plan. To quote Supt. John T. Richeson of the Ohio centralized schools, whose writings along this line I have been much interested in of late, "Education *at home* keeps the boys and girls in the country and away from the temptations of the larger village or city, at the time when they are most easily influenced. Why can we not give to them in the country as good schools as are afforded by villages or cities? Have we not the material to work with? Are they not more accustomed to work and work to a purpose than any other class of scholars? We cannot expect *too much* from our rural districts if we furnish the boys and girls with good schools and plenty of work to do and then give them the incentives.

I feel very certain that we shall surmount all obstacles to success when the time shall be ripe for action along this line of discussion. Hoping I shall not weary you by the constant urging in this matter and thanking all who have so kindly aided me in my year's work by suggestions for the good of the schools and encouraging words, I am
