Warrant for Town Meeting.

TO GEO. W. KNIGHT, a Constable in the Town of Scarborough:

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said Town of Scarborough, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House, in said Town of Scarborough, on Monday, the third (3d) day of March, A. D., 1902, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act upon the following articles:

- 1st. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- 2d. To choose a Clerk, Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of the Poor, Collector, Treasurer, Superintendent of Schools, Road Commissioner (or Commissioners), and all other necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
- 3d. To see if the town will grant and raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance and support of schools, the poor, repairs on roads and bridges, and to defray all other town charges.
- 4th. To see if the town will accept the reports of the several town officers.
- 5th. To see what compensation the town will give the Collector for the ensuing year.
- 6th. To see if the town will vote to charge interest on taxes remaining unpaid after a given time.

7th. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of one hundred and twenty-one dollars (\$121.00) to meet the deficiency in school-house repair and supply account for 1901.

8th. To see if the town will accept the road as laid out and straightened by the Selectmen from the Boston Maine R. R., Western Division, to Prout's Neck, to a point near the Southgate house, and raise a sum of money to pay the damage on same, on petition of Fred M. Newcomb and seventeen others.

9th. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1000.00) for the repairs of the road to Prout's Neck, below the Western Division of the Boston & Maine R. R., on petition of A. L. Googins and four others.

10th. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) to be expended on the Pine Point road from the Boston & Maine R. R., to Pine Point, the marsh road (so-called) on petition of A. L. Googins and four others.

11th. To see if the town will accept the private way as laid out by the Selectmen, from the Gorham road across the land of Peter Oleson to the land of Martin Anderson, and raise a sum of money to pay damage on same, on petition of Martin Anderson and six others.

12th. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for raising the Carrying-place bridge and road, on petition of Henry S. Jones and nine others.

13th. To see what action the town will take in regard to building a bridge across Old-house creek, on the turnpike, and raise a sum of money for the same.

14th. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Road Commissioner to make a contract with the Portland R. R. Co., to share the expense of building the bridge on the turnpike, across Old-house creek.

15th. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to clay or gravel Green Hill (so-called) on the Saccarappa road. (By request.)

16th. To see if the town will instruct the Municipal Officers to apply to the County Commissioners to designate the Saco and Portland road as a State road, under the provisions of Chapter 285 of the Laws of 1901. Also to see if the town will raise the sum of

two hundred dollars (\$200.00) to be expended for permanent improvements on said Saco and Portland road, under the provisions of said Act.

17th. To see what instructions the town will give the Selectmen in regard to the removal or re-location of any telegraph or telephone poles now illegally set in the highway of said town.

18th. To see if the town will vote to maintain a free high school at the Town Hall, for the ensuing year, and raise a sum of money for the same.

19th. To see what action the town will take in regard to breaking roads, and raise a sum of money for the same.

20th. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to purchase school books for the present year.

21st. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the decorating of soldiers' graves.

22d. So see if the town will vote to build some horse sheds for the use of the Town Officers, and raise the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for same.

23d. To see what action the town will take in regard to the digging of clams for the ensuing year, on petition of Martin S. Perry and six others.

24th. To see if the town will vote to accept the list of jurors as prepared by the Selectmen, Treasurer and Town Clerk.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be at the Town House on Saturday, the first (1st) day of March, A. D. 1902, from nine o'clock A. M., to four o'clock P. M., for the purpose of correcting the check list.

School Report.

To the Citizens of Scarboro:

In accordance with the requirements of law, the following report of the condition and progress of the schools of Scarboro for the year ending Feb. 10, 1902, is respectfully submitted.

Our schools continue to maintain their acknowledged good reputation, and during the past year a favorable degree of advancement is noticeable, both in the quality and quantity of work done.

With one or two exceptions, your committee have retained the same teachers throughout the year. These teachers have proved themselves well qualified and efficient, both in the governing and methods of instruction.

The general conduct of the pupils has been excellent, and the attendance during the year very good.

In many of the schools much has been done by the teachers, with the help of their pupils, to make the schoolrooms and yards more attractive. We believe this work is of great value and hope it will continue in the future. Experience has taught us that pleasant, comfortable and cheerful surroundings are important factors in forwarding the progress of our schools.

At the opening of the spring term last year, a course of study, prepared by the State Superintendent of Schools, was placed in each of our schools. This course of study is divided into five grades, allowing about two years for the work outlined in each grade, thus holding the pupil accountable for accomplishing a certain amount of work within a specified time. Many of the teachers have made a beginning of grading their classes with good results.

Of course the change cannot be complete in one year, but if teachers and all concerned will give this matter their active support, in a few years our schools will be as well graded as the city schools.

REPAIRS.

Thorough repairs have been made on the schoolhouse at Blue Point, making it a pleasant and comfortable building.

Our school buildings are generally in very good condition, with the exception of the house at Oak Hill, on which repairs should be made the coming year. The recitation room is becoming too small to accommodate the increasing attendance. The ceilings in some of the houses need to be whitened, and other repairs are necessary. As there is always more or less expense each year to keep the buildings in good condition, we respectfully recommend that a fair appropriation be made for this purpose every year.

TEXT BOOKS.

The Tarbell's Geography was placed in three of the schools last year and was received with much favor. At the beginning of the fall term, we completed the change; all of the common schools are now supplied with this book. Two changes have been made in books for the high school—the adoption of the Werner Arithmetic and Shaw's Book-keeping.

FREE HIGH SCHOOL.

The high school during the past year has been under the instruction of Walter R. Whitcomb, a graduate of Dartmouth; who came highly recommended. At each visit to the school, the pupils were found orderly and attentive, and making commendable progress in their work. Mr. Whitcomb's manner of having the important points of the lesson fully developed at the close of each recitation deserves much credit.

A piano has been purchased by the school, the money being raised by entertainments given by the pupils the past two years.

The spring and fall terms were twelve weeks each, the winter term seven, but would have continued two weeks longer, had not the teacher been unexpectedly called away. The average attendance has been good, and thorough work has been done throughout the year.

No subject is of greater importance than the relation of the public school to the life of the people, and from it we look to the boys and girls of to-day to come to manhood and womanhood better equipped for the duties of citizenship.

In conclusion, we are glad to acknowledge the generous interest which our townspeople have taken in their schools.

I wish to express my thanks to the people of the town, also to the teachers and school committee, for their hearty support and kindness during the year.
