Scoping it out!

VERONA ISLAND — On Saturday, August 24th, the Bucks Mills Rod & Gun Club held a "sight-in" from 10 am. to 2 pm. at the firing range off West Side Drive on Verona Island that is being leased from Pen Bay.

In a phone interview, yesterday (8/28) President Bruce Ashmore said, "The purpose of the demonstration, which was open to the public, was to 'insure a clean shot when harvesting wildlife. All who attended had fun and when they left were much more accurate marksmen than when they first got there.'"

For those who may not be familiar with the event, the purpose behind sighting is to produce a more accurate shot. During the exercise, one person uses binoculars or a spotting scope on a tripod to actually see the holes on the target to help adjust the rifle. The adjustments are then made to the scope in fine steps called "clicks". Sometimes a click left or right will do the trick! At the range on Saturday, one target was 100 yards, another was 200 yards away. The purpose of the berm behind the target was to catch the shot in case it missed the target.

Council seat 'filled', but 3-1 vote improper

BUCKSPORT — A mid-meeting effort to fill a temporarily vacant seat on the Town Council turned into a comedy of errors and parliamentary missteps last Thursday (8/22).

After sometimes spirited exchanges about the wisdom of appointing someone who's running for the council to temporarily fill the opening, the councilors split 3-1 to give the seat to James R. Morrison.

Morrison, who is a regular attendee at the council sessions, was congratulated and the runner-up, Don White, also a regular, who was nominated by Councilor Mark Eastman, graciously declined.

However, the appointment - while unchallenged at the meeting - was voided the next day when it was brought to the town manager's attention that at least four votes are needed to make such a decision. According to the Town Charter, a majority vote is

needed to appoint a qualified individual to fill a vacant seat until the next election.

Morrison was backed by Councilors Peter Stewart, Daniel Ormsby and Paul Bissonnette. Eastman, who initially nominated White, voted against naming Morrison.

(Councilors Robert G. Carmichael Jr. and Paul Gauvin were absent, leaving only four councilors to vote.)

Bissonnette, who initially voiced repeated concerns about allowing anyone to serve temporarily if that person was running in the next election, ultimately folded. He joined the majority and voted for Morrison.

The vote was not listed on the agenda for the meeting, and, in fact, no vote was taken to place it on the agenda as is normally done when an issue surfaces.

The council is expected to take up the matter again at its first meeting in September.

Council contests draw 7 aspirants

BUCKSPORT — The Town Council looks like it's going to get more complicated, now that one councilor, Robert G. Carmichael Jr., has changed his mind about seeking re-election.

Carmichael, for a couple of months now has said he wouldn't seek re-election, on Friday (8/23) morning he took out nomination papers for another two-year stint.

If all of those who've taken out papers actually turn them in, there will be at least five going for the the two three-year vacancies.

At least another three are lining up for the sole two-year slot.

Alphabetically, those going for the three-year terms are: former town clerk Kathy L. Downes, political newcomer Matthew A. Paulauskas of 12 Mechanic Street, political novice Rachel Renee Paulauskas of 12 Mechanic Street, and former Councilor Joseph N.L. York of 262 Jacob Buck Pond Road. (Note: as of 8/28 press time, former Councilor Paul F. Rabs of 1264 Bucks Mills

Road had withdrawn his nomination papers.)

Eyeing the two-year term are Councilor Carmichael, of 24 Forsythe Avenue, political newcomer Joseph A. Davanzo of 7 Spring Street; and perennial council candidate James R. Morrison (see article above).

At mid-week, Matthew Paulauskas, Rachel R. Paulauskas, Downes and Morrison had returned completed - and accepted - nomination papers, assuring them of places on the Nov. 5 ballot.

While this is an off-year election without state and federal contests, local turnout in Bucksport could be bolstered by local referenda. One seeks approval to issue \$3 million in bonds for three years of intensive road repairs. The other seeks an as-yet unspecified amount to replace the municipal swimming pool, which had to be closed this year because of continuing extensive leaks.

Town Manager, Susan M. Lessard is hoping to have more concrete figures for the cost of the pool by the next Council meeting.

IN THE WORKS . . .

Weekly tidbits gleaned from local area news

CODE OFFICER — With over 20 years of mechanical engineering experience garnered at many businesses, including WBRC of Portland, Luke Chiavelli has begun his duties as Bucksport's full time code enforcement officer. He takes the place of Jeffrey Hammond who recently left to enjoy his retirement years.

In a phone conversation yesterday, (8/28) Chiavelli said he is still on an 'as needed' basis in the towns of Orland, Prospect and Verona Island.

He said he has resigned from Penobscot and Winterport and will still serve them, but only until they can find a replacement. He will give Bucksport priority he said.

According to Town Manager Susan M. Lessard, the position has a salary of \$50,000, and will be an annual re-appointment, as opposed to the 10 year contract held by Jeffrey Hammond.

NEEDS REFERENDUM— The \$3 million dollars intended to be spent over the next 3 years to repair Bucksport's roads was approved at last Thursday's (8/22) Council meeting. The question will be put on the November 5th ballot, along with two other referendum questions, because it involves more than the \$250,000 that is the threshold for public approval for an expenditure by the Town.

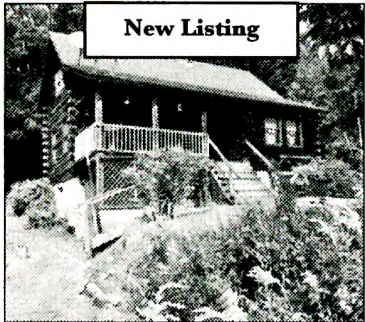

Doing this paper week after week, we don't always realize how important it is to our subscribers, readers and our community that we get an issue out, until something like what happened this week occurs.

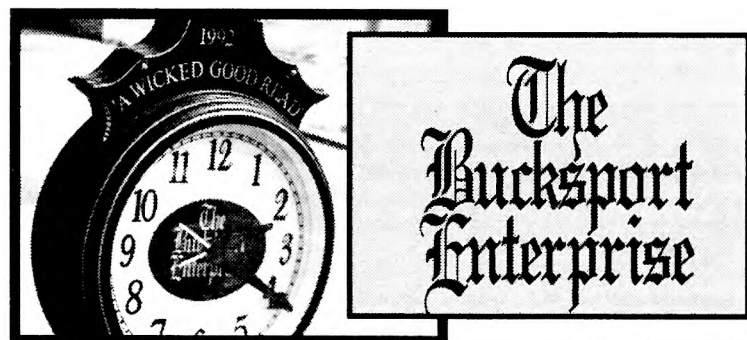
On Monday it appeared that due to a health issue, maybe we were not going to be able to get a paper out. We were so mistaken.

At the Miles Lane School, school hours are 8 a.m. to 2:35 p.m. Monday-Thursday and 8 a.m. to 1:35 p.m. on Fridays.

At the G. H. Jewett School, school hours are 8 a.m. to 2:40 p.m. Monday – Thursday and 8 a.m. to 1:40 p.m. on Fridays. Opening day for PreK/Headstart at the G. H. Jewett School is Monday, Sept. 9, 2019.

Those who need more information regarding PreK/Headstart, should call 469-2755.

Parents may register their child for school by either stopping in or calling the school's office at the Miles Lane School (469-6666) or the G. H. Jewett School (469-6644) between 8 a.m. and 3 p.m. to make an appointment.

Anyone registering a student, we will need the child's immunization record, an original birth certificate, photo ID of parent/guardian and two proofs of residency for the child to start school.

Information about transportation can be obtained from First Student Bus Co. at 469-7673.

MEALS : Lunch and breakfast will be available on the first day of school for all Miles Lane and Jewett School students.

Medications policy

All K-12 students in the RSU 25: Students who take any medications at school must update their medication form

(on a yearly basis before medication will be administered at school. Contact the appropriate school to obtain the form.

All prescription medications to be taken at school will need a note from the doctor who prescribed them. All medications must be brought to school by parents in the original container.

Students are not allowed to transport medications on the school bus.

Once a day medications should be given at home. When medications are given at school, only, a 14 day supply is allowed, per policy.

Medication forms are on our RSU 25 web site under "Forms".

In the event that a child may perhaps require "over-the-counter" medication (such as Tylenol or Advil), a parent signature is required before the medication can be administered.

School personnel no longer are allowed to take verbal permission for giving any medications to students at school.
