WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

*To George W. Knight, a Constable in the Town of
Scarboro: GREETING:*

In the Name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said Town of Scarboro, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House, in said Town of Scarboro, on Monday, the sixth (6) day of March, A. D. 1905, at ten (10) o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act upon the following articles:

- 1 To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- 2 To choose a Clerk, Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of the Poor, Collector, Treasurer, Superintendent of Schools, Road Commissioner (or Commissioners), and all other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- 3 To see if the Town will grant and raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance and support of schools, the poor, repair on roads and bridges, and to defray all other town charges.
- 4 To see if the Town will accept and adopt the report of the several Town Officers.
- 5 To see if the town will vote to charge interest on taxes remaining unpaid after a given time.
- 6 To see what compensation the town will vote its Collector for the ensuing year.

7 To see if the town will instruct its municipal officers to borrow money if necessary during the year.

8 To see what action the town will take in regard to finishing the new school house at Oak Hill, and raise a sum of money for same.

9 To see what action the town will take in regard to fencing school house lot at Oak Hill, and raise a sum of money for same.

10 To see what action the town will take in regard to finishing the new school house at Oak Hill, and raise a sum of money for same.

11 To see if the town will vote a sum of money to reduce its debt.

12 To see if the town will vote a sum of money to meet the expense of breaking roads

13 To see if the town will raise the sum of \$210.00 to pay the land damage as awarded by the selectmen, on the Beach Ridge road (so called), from the Westbrook town line to the Payne road.

14 To see if the town will raise \$1,000.00 to straighten, build and gravel that part of Black Point from rocky hill to near R. H. Seavey's. (By request.)

15 To see if the town will vote to locate and maintain a high school the coming year, and raise money for the same.

16 To see what action the town will take in regard to selling the timber on the town farm, on the north side of the road running through said farm.

17 To see what action the town will take in regard to re-running that part of the road laid out by the selectmen, from the Vinegar road (so called), to the Westbrook town

line, so as to make such road forty feet in width instead of fifty feet as laid out and accepted by the town, on petition of F. W. Butler and eight others.

18 To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to complete the purchase of the lot of land for the enlargement of Black Point cemetery, and turn it over to the trustees of said cemetery, on petition of Fred M. Newcomb and six others.

19 To see what action the town will take in regard to insuring the new school house at Oak Hill.

20 To see if the town will vote a sum of money to decorate soldiers' graves.

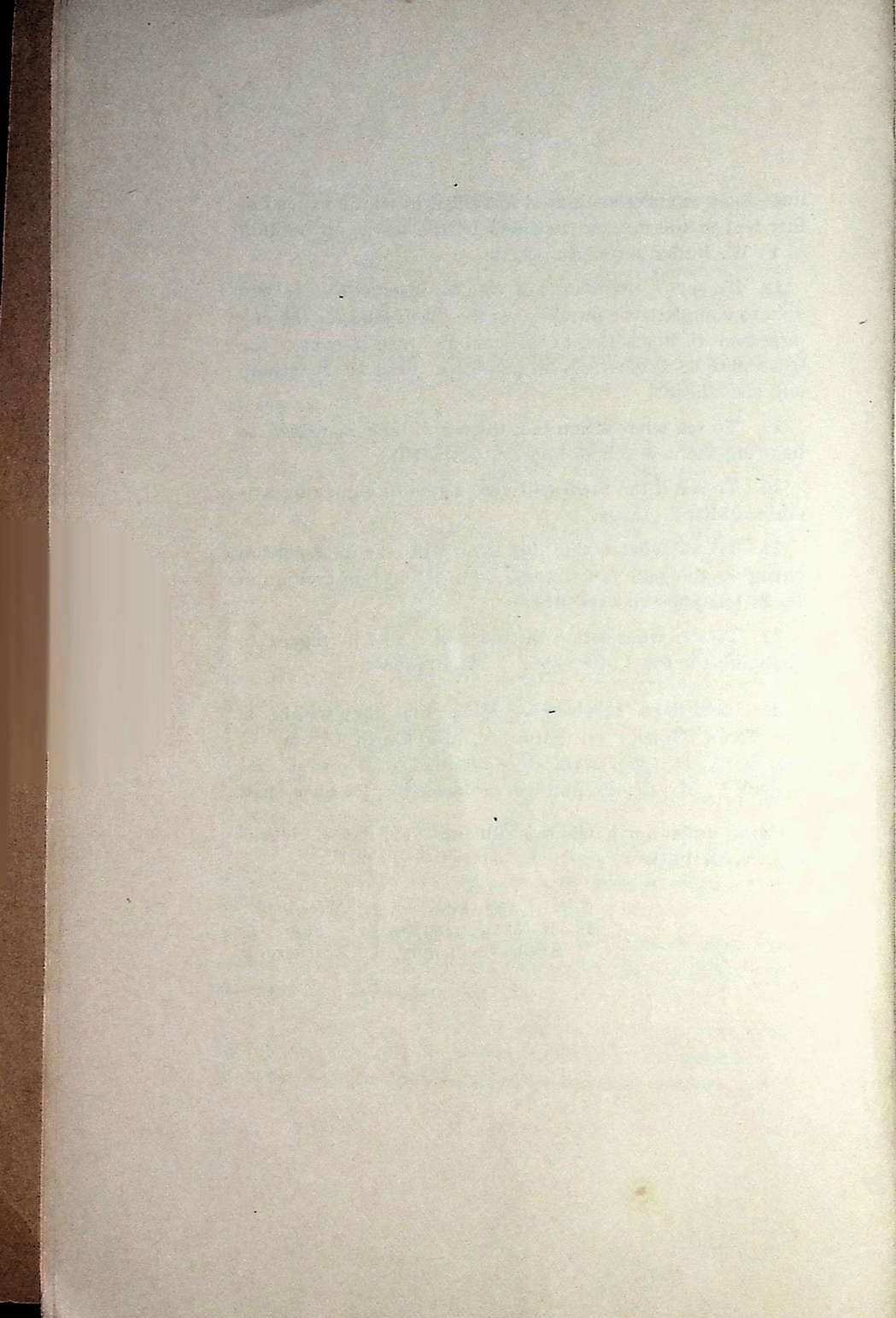
21 To see what action the town will take in regard to changing the poll tax from \$3.00 to \$2.00, on petition of R. B. Larrabee and six others.

22 To see what action the town will take in regard to changing the town attorneys. (By request.)

The lot is, for at least a portion of its area, low and wet, with poor facilities for draining; that the cost of filling in and grading the lot to a suitable height would be excessive, and that the location of the lot itself is undesirable, facing the north; precluding the building of a new schoolhouse facing the road, without exposing the interior to cold winds throughout the winter every time the doors are opened. In view of these facts, a location is desired and after careful consideration of all the locations in the vicinity, it was voted that the district residents desired to locate a lot, not to exceed one acre, on the land of F. A.

Mains, has no objection to the locating of a school building near his house.

For a school building, it is the sense of the district that a two-story building should be erected, not less than 35x55 feet on the ground, and two rooms provided on the lower floor for immediate use, the second story to be finished as there is need for additional accommodation or for the accommodation of the high school, if it is desired at any time to hold that school at a place other than the town hall. The estimated cost of such a building is about \$2,000. The present needs of the district call for the accommodation of about 70 scholars with a prospect of a continual increase for some years to come.

Therefore, the undersigned, as instructed by the district, would respectfully request that the school committee take the necessary steps and locate a new lot in accordance with the vote of the district, that the selectmen may have the necessary information for the calling of a town meeting, to see if the town will raise the necessary funds for purchasing the lot and erecting a new school building.

SCHOOL REPORT.

To the Citizens of Scarboro:

In accordance with the requirements of law, the following report of the Public Schools of Scarboro for the year ending February 15, 1905, is respectfully submitted.

The condition of our schools the past year has been mainly favorable. The home influences of the children are good. Most of the parents are eager for the advancement, and appreciative of the progress of their children.

Very few changes have been made in the teaching force. The teachers have given good satisfaction generally, and have worked faithfully for the welfare of their pupils.

The attendance was very good during the spring and fall terms but owing to the severe weather of the winter many of the pupils, especially the younger, were unable to attend regularly.

In glancing at the list of teachers and their work the past year we find Miss Roberts' school at Blue Point calls

for special mention both as to good work done and the regular attendance of pupils. Her work here as elsewhere has been distinguished by thoroughness and accuracy.

At North Scarboro, Miss Rosborough's school was orderly and progressive, and the recitations excellent.

The pupils at Beech Hill have made good progress in all subjects studied. The most improvement in writing was found at this school.

The lessons were well prepared and recitations very good at the Pine Point school. The work done in arithmetic here was among the best.

The Dunstan School has maintained its good standing under the charge of Miss Annie Meserve, who has the earnest cooperation of the parents in her school work.

Miss Susie Pillsbury did good work at the Scottow's Hill School and gave entire satisfaction.

The pupils of the Libby School did excellent work under the careful instruction of Miss Edna Libby, during the fall term, but owing to illness Miss Libby was given a leave of absence for the winter and the place was filled by the appointment of Miss Halé; her school was very small but those who attended were interested and did well.

Miss Gilman, Miss Harmon, Miss Moulton and Miss Blanche Libby were retained in the same schools where they had taught with success the previous year, and good, thorough work has been done by them throughout the year.

The Graduating Exercises of the Oak Hill Grammar School were held at the Town Hall, June 28, 1904, and diplomas were granted to the following pupils:

The School Leagues have done quite a good deal for the improvement of our schoolhouses and grounds, although, it has only a beginning with us, the value of the work is readily seen.

Reports from the teachers show us some of the work which has been done.

The League at Pine Point has purchased a large picture of Longfellow, have mounted thirty pictures for grouping and made a wall motto.

Blue Point has bought moulding for their room; frames for Mr. Stetson's picture and for two large pictures presented by Mr. and Mrs. Ruggles, and have \$18.00 on hand.

At Scottow's Hill they have added this year, a picture of Lincoln; twenty-five books for their school library and have been presented with a case for their books by Mr. H. L. Pillsbury.

The Black Point, Oak Hill and Beech Ridge schools have made some improvements, and each have quite a sum of money in their treasury.

At Broad Turn they have a handsome case for their books; at present have thirty volumes in their school library.

Dunstan school has a new dictionary; picture of Longfellow, for which Mrs. Pillsbury and Mrs. Moulton gave a nice frame.

Libby school has a new clock and money for a picture.

At North Scarboro they have purchased a stand for their dictionary, a large picture and a flag. A flag raising was held during the spring term which was largely attended. Mr. J. M. Libby presented the flag staff.

The desks have been varnished at the Beech Hill school, which is an addition to the looks of the room.

TEXT BOOKS.

No change has been made in books the past year.

Why the text book account was overdrawn is due to the fact that no money was raised for the purchase of school books at the last annual meeting.

With the best of care the books are constantly wearing out, and a fair appropriation should be made for this purpose each year.

REPAIRS.

The needed repairs have been made on all the school buildings.

Quite extensive repairs were made at the Pine Point and Libby schools.

As to the necessity of repairs we should be largely guided by the judgment of the committee having this mat-

ter in charge, whose duties afford them a better opportunity to judge of the wants and needs of the schools.

Concerning the new school house at Oak Hill, the question has been raised by many of our citizens, whether the town requires so large and expensive a building as is begun.

We recognize the fact that it appears like a great undertaking to build such a building as has been planned, and at first sight, an extravagant undertaking for the town and one that it cannot afford.

We believe in economy in the administration of public affairs, but do not believe it would be good economy to erect a building that would not meet the requirements of the town.

A schoolhouse is not built for a few years service, but to meet the demands of higher education for the next half century, perhaps longer.
