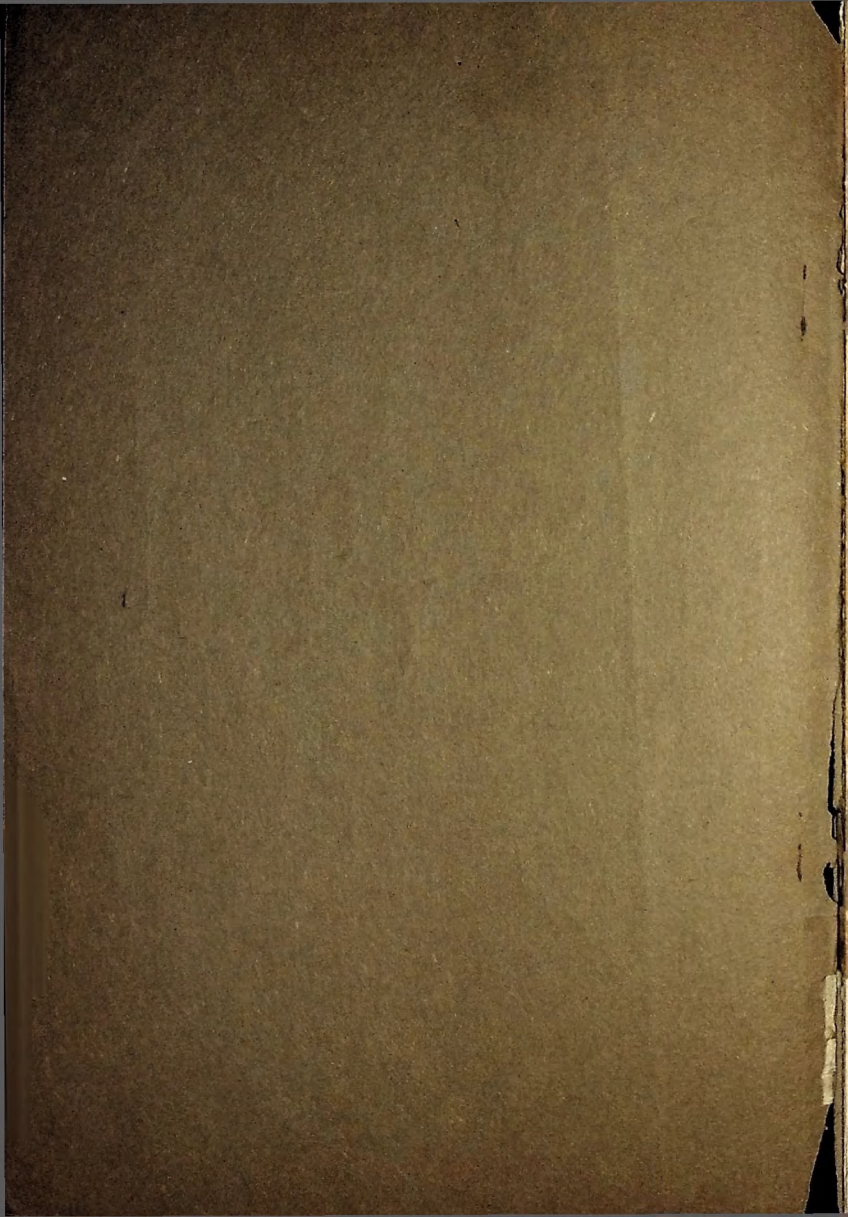

WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

*To George W. Knight, a Constable in the Town of
Scarboro: GREETING:*

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said Town of Scarboro, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House, in said Town of Scarboro, on Monday, the fifth (5) day of March, A. D. 1906, at ten (10) o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act upon the following articles:

- 1 To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- 2 To choose a Clerk, Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of the Poor, Collector, Treasurer, one member of School Board, Road Commissioner (or Commissioners) and all other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
- 3 To see if the town will grant and raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance and support of schools, schoolhouse repairs and supplies, text-books, the poor, repairs on roads and bridges, and to defray all other town charges.
- 4 To see if the town will accept and adopt the report of the several Town Officers.
- 5 To see if the town will vote to charge interest on taxes remaining unpaid after a given time.

6 To see what compensation the town will vote its Collector for the ensuing year.

7 To see if the town will instruct its municipal officers to borrow money, if necessary, during the year.

8 To see if the town will raise the sum of \$200 to shingle and repair the Town House.

9 To see if the town will raise the sum of \$75 to fence the new schoolhouse lot at Oak Hill.

10 To see if the town will raise the sum of \$2,000 to reduce its debt.

11 To see if the town will vote a sum of money to meet the expense of breaking roads.

12 To see if the town will vote the sum of \$1,000 to be expended on the Prouts' Neck road from Rocky Hill, so called, to Libby River Bridge, the same if granted, to be expended under the supervision of three interested persons to be appointed by the Selectmen. By request.

13 To see if the town will vote the sum of \$500 to buy gravel to be used on the Prouts' Neck road and instruct the Selectmen to buy to the best interest of the town.

14 To see if the town will vote to accept the following streets at Higgins' Beach viz. Bay View Avenue from Ocean Avenue to Pearl Street, Pearl Street to Greenwood Avenue, Greenwood Avenue to Ocean Avenue. Making about 65 rods in all and raise \$300 to gravel same. By request of J. B. Hutchinson.

15 To see what action the town will take in regard to sewers at Higgins' Beach. By request of J. B. Hutchinson.

16 To see if the town will raise the sum of \$325 to defray the expenses of a day and night Police at Prouts' Neck, on petition of Ira C. Foss and six others.

17 To see what action the town will take in regard to free transportation for High School pupils and raise money for same. By request.

18 To see if the town will raise the sum of \$200 for State road.

19 To see if the town will vote to maintain a free High School and raise money for same.

20 To see if the town will vote a sum of money to decorate soldiers' graves.

21 To see what action the town will take in regard to old schoolhouse at Oak Hill.

22 To see if the town will vote to grant and raise the sum of eighty dollars (\$80) annually for two hydrants to be located on the present line of the Biddeford & Saco Water Co. at Pine Point, the same to be located by the Board of Selectmen. By request.

23 To see if the town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 148 of the Public Laws of 1905 of the State of Maine, entitled "An act to amend Section 22 of Chapter 6 of the Revised Statutes, relating to regulation and conduct of elections", and which provides in substance that the voting shelves or compartments used at all elections shall be provided with wooden swing doors.

24 To see if the town will vote to buy new seats for the Beech Ridge schoolhouse and raise money for the same.

25 To see if the town will vote to rebuild the bridge over Red Brook near James L. Green's and raise money for same.

26 To see if the town will vote to rebuild the Beaver Brook Bridge on the Beech Ridge road and raise money for same.

27 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money not exceeding two hundred dollars (\$200) for the purpose of seeding in clams on unseeded flats and that the town shall issue permits to defray the amount raised. On petition of Albert C. Varney and forty-one others.

28 To see what action the town will take in regard to accepting and building a road from the Gorham road, so called, to land of Martin Anderson and raise money for same. By request of Martin Anderson and others.

29 To see if the town will vote the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150) to be expended on Beech Ridge road from the four corners at Mrs. Mayhews to or near the house of Nancy M. Libby. By request.

30 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) to be expended in repairing the Winnock Neck road.

31 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to be used in an effort to exterminate the Brown-tail Moth. By request of A. W. Gilman, commissioner.

32 To see if the town will vote to open drain on land of Hubbard Libby on Payne road near Scottow's Hill. By request.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be at the Town House, on Saturday, the third day of March, A. D. 1906, from nine o'clock A. M., until four o'clock P. M., for the purpose of correcting the check list.

SCHOOL REPORT.

To the Citizens of Scarborough:

In accordance with our State school law I submit the following report of the public schools of Scarborough for the year ending February 12, 1906.

The common schools throughout the town have had in the main, the same teachers in charge as in previous years, with few exceptions. They have all worked hard and have spared no pains in making the schools successful; they have succeeded in making their scholars interested.

I wish to make special mention of the schools at Blue Point, Beach Ridge, Black Point, Broad Turn and Grammar School at Oak Hill.

The primary grade at Oak Hill was taught by Miss Estelle Libby who gave good satisfaction and was much liked by nearly everybody in the section.

The Dunstan school was disturbed somewhat during the fall term on account of sickness of the the teacher, Miss Susie Pillsbury. She was getting her school in good working condition, when she had to resign her position. We secured a young man, Mr. Duran, to finish the term. This was Mr. Duran's first effort at teaching and was not as successful as we were in hopes. The winter term was taught by Miss Carrie F. Snow, who gave fine satisfaction. Miss Snow is a fine disciplinarian and instructor.

The North Scarboro school was in charge of Miss Snow for the spring and fall terms also, and the winter term was taught by Mr. Charles Raymond. Those who attended school regularly did fine work. In this school the parents should show a little more interest in school work, and by so doing give a better average.

The Libby school was taught by Miss Edna E. Libby. You all know with out further explanation what the results were; scholars did credit to themselves and to their teacher.

The school at Pleasant Hill was taught by Miss Dorothy Miller. She is the youngest teacher we have in town and has the ability of making a first-class instructor.

The Pine Point school was taught in the spring by Miss Helena Snow, who worked earnestly for the interest of the school. The fall and winter terms were taught by Miss Mary Berry of Buxton, and under her instruction the scholars did well.

Scottow's Hill school was in charge of Miss Mabel W. Guptill. This was Miss Guptill's first effort at teaching. She labored hard to maintain an interest in her school and was very successful.

It has been my aim during the year to impress upon the minds of the teachers and pupils, that *thorough work*

is the *one idea* to *carry through life*, and I am glad to say the majority of the teachers had learned this great lesson and practiced it in their schools.

The School Leagues of the town are in a prosperous condition. Let us encourage this part of the school work as it holds out many points of interest to the pupils, and causes them to take more interest in the school and to attend school more regularly. Interest in, and regularity to school, makes it successful.

BOOK ACCOUNT.

We have made but few changes and have bought only what books the law compels us to buy. Our schools are not well supplied with text-books. None of us would think of sending a man into our corn-field to hoe with only a hoe handle to work with, so we ought not to set our teachers at work in our schools with only book covers to teach from, and this is the case in some of our schools. You will see in the account which is to follow an overdraw, and why, because at our last annual meeting there was no money raised for school books, and we had no money in the treasury for that purpose. We must remember that books are constantly wearin' out, even with *best of care*, and let me say right here, that our school books are not only in bad condition from use, but many of them are many years behind the times. The town should appropriate at its annual meeting this year \$600 at least, for school books, and then a small appropriation each year will replace those that give out.
