## WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

---

*To George W. Knight, a constable in the Town of Scarborough:*

### GREETING:

In the name of the State Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said Town of Scarborough, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town house in said town of Scarborough on Monday the fourth (4th) day of March A. D. 1907, at ten (10) o'clock in the forenoon, then and there to act upon the following articles:

Art. 1st. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2nd. To choose a clerk, selectmen, assessors, overseers of the poor, collector, treasurer, one member of school board, road commissioner or commissioners and all other necessary Town officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 3rd. To see if the Town will grant and raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance and support of schools, schoolhouse repairs and supplies, text books and appliances, the poor, repairs on roads and bridges and to defray all other Town charges.

Art. 4th. To see if the Town will accept and adopt the report of the several Town officers.

Art. 5th. To see if the Town will vote to charge interest on taxes remaining unpaid after a given time.

Art. 6th. To see what compensation the Town will vote its collector for the ensuing year.

Art. 7th. To see if the Town will instruct its municipal officers to borrow money if necessary during the year.

Art. 8th. To see what action the town will take in regard to the property of the late William Temple.

Art. 9th. To see what action the Town will take in regard to free transportation of scholars, also free tuition. By request.

Art. 10th. To see if the Town will raise a sum of money to reduce its debt.

Art. 11th. To see if the Town will vote to maintain a free High school and raise money for same.

Art. 12th. To see if the Town will vote a sum of money to decorate soldiers' graves.

Art. 13th. To see if Town will vote to enlarge gravel pit at Beech Ridge and raise a sum of money for same. By request.

Art. 14th. To see if Town will grant and raise the sum of seventy-five (75) dollars to finish the road that was uncompleted last year on Beech Ridge near Mrs. Mayhews. By request.

Art. 15th. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of Five Hundred (500) dollars to build a gravel sidewalk from the B. & M. R. R. to a point near Henry Snow's, and repair road and sidewalk from B. & M. R. R. to B. A. Baker's.

Art. 16th. To see if Town will vote to raise the sum of Two Hundred (200) dollars to shape and gravel the

Holmes road from Saco line to the Broad Turn road. By request.

Art. 17th. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money for State road.

Art. 18th. To see if the Town will vote a sum of money to meet the expense of breaking roads.

Art. 19th. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of Five Hundred (500) dollars to buy a gravel pit somewhere in Black Point below the Western division of the B. & M. R. R. for the use of the Town. By request.

Art. 20th. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of One Thousand (1,000) dollars to be expended by the Road Commissioner for that section of the road leading from Scarboro Beach station B. & M. R. R. to Prouts Neck. By request.

Art. 21st. To see if the Town will raise the sum of Two Hundred (200) dollars to defray the expense of police at Prouts Neck. By request.

Art. 22nd. To see if the Town will instruct the selectmen to give a deed of the old schoolhouse lot at Oak Hill.

Art. 23rd. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following streets at Higgins Beach, viz.: Greenwood Avenue to Morning St., Morning St. to Bay View Avenue, Bay View Avenue to Pearl St., Ashton Avenue from Greenwood Avenue to Bay View Avenue, and raise a sum of money sufficient to make them passable. By request of J. P. Hutchinson.

Art. 24th. To see what action the Town will take in regard to a short sewer at Higgins Beach connecting with the main sewer on Ocean Avenue, which is the Town highway. By request of J. P. Hutchinson.

Art. 25th. To see if the Town will vote to widen the Turnpike road and raise a sum of money for same. By request.

Art. 26th. To see if the town will vote to accept the list of jurors as prepared by the Selectmen, Treasurer and Town Clerk.

The selectmen hereby give notice that they will be at the Town House on Saturday, the second day of March, 1907, from nine o'clock a. m. until four o'clock p. m. for the purpose of correcting the check list.

But few changes were made in the Spring terms from last year, but during the Fall and Winter terms quite a few changes occurred, not from lack of success but some of our old and respected teachers have retired from the field and taken up other duties and others resigned from their position, but the schools as a whole have made good advancement; and I am glad to say, the work done by the pupils

has been thorough and this is one of the great mottos of life. The teachers have all labored hard for the welfare of each school throughout the town, and with few exceptions the parents have worked hand in hand with the teachers.

The several School Leagues still keep up their interest in beautifying the school rooms and yards and making them more homelike. May this work continue, for as the twig is bent, so will it grow.

The town was very kind at our last annual meeting to raise the sum of \$600, for school books. Some thought this amount too much but as you will see in the Book Account, it took all we raised and a little more. Our schools are now well supplied with study material, and this is not only gratifying to pupils and teachers but the parents as well.

Books are things that are always wearing out, especially in the hands of small children, and we must raise a sum sufficient to maintain the repair. We ought to have maps and charts in our schools, for at present we have none. It will require about \$300 for this purpose, including books.

The High School for the past year has been taught by E. C. Megquire, except six weeks of the Spring term. Mr. Megquire is a man of wide experience, thorough in his work, and, a fine disciplinarian, that is the one thing of any school, for without it we can do nothing. All the pupils who have attended school regularly and tried, have learned well. This is the report of most the parents and I hope our present teacher may be retained. If so, it is very plain, our High School will soon be not only an equal, but ahead of many of our country High Schools.
