


# On Golden Pond Author Presents Water Quality Message by Esther J. Perne

'm lucky. I have a voice, I have a pulpit," says Ernest Thompson, author of "On Golden Pond" and more than 50 other plays and movies.

It is Thompson's 61st consecutive summer on Great Pond and he is the guest speaker at dinner for the Belgrade Regional а Conservation Alliance to raise funds to improve water quality.

Water quality Thompson understands first hand. In recent summers he doesn't come here for very long, he says, but long enough to hear and see and read about how the lakes are changing, are challenged with

gloeotrichia, phosphorus pollution, development, invasive aquatic plants. He remembers differently.

"There was an innocence in our childhood," Thompson describes of life on Great Pond. "We were left to our own devices. My mother taught us to share her confidence in

the lake."

In 1978 Thompson wove that life on Great Pond, with all its innocence and love and confidence, into an endearing play, "On Golden Pond." It captured his - and everyone else's - love for a place they keep coming back to year after year, if only in their minds. The play has been translated into almost thirty languages, has been performed in over forty countries.


In 1980, "On Golden Pond" was made into a movie, which won three Academy Awards and has become an all-time favorite among

viewers, a timeless classic, rich in sunsets, loons, mahogany speedboats, and concerns about nature.

In the original play, Thompson points out, the main character, Ethel Thayer, tells her childhood doll Elmer: "They say the lake is dying," - dying because of the development that has overcrowded the cove where she went to summer camp.

Twenty years later, "Another Summer," the musical version of "On Golden Pond" devotes several songs to this theme.

What is the message of "On Golden Pond?" Thompson asks. Love? Anger? Humor? "Personally, I think it's a little nature allegory," Thompson says.

Today, Ernest Thompson arrives in Belgrade Lakes by boat, docks at the new public "Docks to Doorways" docks where the future Conservation Resource Center will be located, walks to the Wooden Boat Showcase and BRCA dinner at The Village Inn, addresses an enthusiastic crowd of "On Golden Pond" and lake fans, and helps raise thousands of dollars for water quality.

His message? Golden Pond can return, human behavior can be re-programmed, the real problem is when we say "that's not our problem."

The audience is enthusiastic about him, totally understands his message. Is he preaching to the choir?

Of course, but the author of "On Golden Pond" advises that, like him, "You can raise your voices!"



Jelgrade's Old South Church Corporation **D**Meeting is the Tuesday after the 4th of July, usually at 7:30 pm. This year it was at 3 pm for a very special reason: The Secretary of State, Matthew Dunlap, presented the Old South Church Corporation with a 100 Year Certificate.

One hundred years ago the Boy Scouts of America and the Campfire Girls were founded. One hundred years ago 4.3% of the population



was over 65; the average age for men was 48.5 years, for women 51. The population was 92 million (it was 307 million in 2009). Divorce was 1 in 1,000. 72% of children attended school; 1/2 of them in a one-room school. The U.S. made half of all the manufactured products in the world.

In regard to his office, Dunlap described that the Secretary of State is a constitutional office founded in 1820. As the keeper of the records, the Secretary is charged with an eclectic series of duties, including auto registration. • The Maine Geological Survey is offering free water quality tests to homeowners with private wells in Belgrade, Monmouth, Mount Vernon, Waterville and West Gardiner during the 2010 summer as part of the MGS's ambient ground water quality program. The tests will examine the presence of natural chemical components in the water. This project is being done in collaboration with Columbia University and the U.S. Geological Survey and is part of a broader effort to understand the connection between geology and water quality, particularly in reference to naturally occurring arsenic in the

#### Androscoggin Riverlands State Park

• The first major state park developed in more than 25 years will be in the Lewiston-Auburn area. The Androscoggin Riverlands State Park comprises 2,588 acres of state-owned land along the Androscoggin River, including 2,258 acres along the west shore in Turner, and 330 acres along the east shore in Leeds. About 15 miles of multi-use trails and 8 miles of hiking trails already exist. ast week we described how Mother Nature protects water quality with forests and vegetated riparian (along the shore) buffers. This week we will talk about a few things that watershed residents can do to protect water quality while they are living near the lakes. The first is a program called LakeSmart, sponsored by Maine Department of Environmental Protection (DEP). Most of the lake associations in our watershed are participating in this program, which recognizes property owners who adopt lake-friendly practices on their properties. This program mimics Mother Nature's methods and focuses on stabilizing eroding areas, reducing the use of chemicals, diverting rainwater into vegetated areas, and minimizing lawns and other impervious areas. Properties are evaluated in four areas: driveways and parking areas; structures and septic systems; lawns, recreation areas and footpaths; and shorefront and beach areas. If the property passes in all four areas, the property is certified "LakeSmart" and the owner receives a "LakeSmart Award-Living Lightly on the Land for the Sake of Our Lake" sign to be displayed. Hopefully you have noticed some of these signs and now you understand the importance. If you would like to participate, please call our office at 495-6039 and we will put you in touch with the appropriate lake association screener to start the process. Landscaping and managing your property in an environmentally friendly manner through LakeSmart is one way to do your part in protecting your lake's water quality and have a low maintenance, great looking property. The program is not meant to be judgmental but rather is aimed at making incremental improvements and inspiring others. Even if you are not yet fully "LakeSmart," we can help you get there with advice, or perhaps a BRCA Youth Conservation Corps assist.

A couple of weeks ago, I attended the annual Maine Congress of Lake Associations (Maine COLA) annual conference at Colby College entitled



## Living Lightly on the Lake

by Peter Kallin "A Delicate Balance." The conference focused on ways to make our water quality sustainable and how to convert the knowledge gained by scientists studying the lakes into action to preserve and protect them. A key place where that will happen will be at the new Maine Lakes Resource Center being built in Belgrade Lakes (See "Docks to Doorways" lead article in this paper two weeks ago). In the meantime COLA has developed a list of things everyone can do to help the lakes. "The Lakers Dozen," is reproduced here with their permission. They have a lot of good information and links at their web site: (www.mainecola.org). Hopefully my columns so far have given you a good understanding of why all these recommendations are important.

#### A LAKER'S DOZEN

1. Always check your boat, trailer and equipment for plant fragments before you launch and after take-out to avoid spreading invasive plants from lake to lake.

2. Respect the Shoreland Zone Regulations. Before making any change on your property, check with your town office or Code Enforcement Officer to see what's permitted and what's not permitted in the shoreland zone - the area within 250 feet of lakes and 75 feet of streams.

Control storm water run-off from buildings, 3. paths, driveways and road. Check your property on a rainy day and fix run-off sites by planting vegetation or constructing swales to direct water flow away from the lake.

pipe, covered with a layer of plastic sheeting, or visit www.me.usda.nres.usda.gov.

4. Cultivate a wooded buffer beside the lake. Trees, shrubs, and grasses protect water quality by slowing rainwater and filtering out soil and pollutants before they end up in the lake.

5. Limit lawn size, mow less often and don't rake duff within 75 feet of shore.

Limit fertilizer, herbicide and pesticide use. 6. Long lasting residues in these products turn lakes green and harm aquatic life.

Don't stress your septic system. Inspect the 7. system yearly and pump the tank every 2-5 years. Systems 20 years of age and older should be inspected by a specialist. Use phosphorus-free cleaners and detergents. Stagger laundry loads. Minimize water use. Don't put toxics or grease down the drain.

8. Construct docks with lake-friendly materials. Choose cedar, cypress, plastic, or aluminum instead of wood which has been pressure-treated with arsenic.

9. Dogs, humans and boats should never be washed in the lake!

10. Observe headway speed within 200 feet of shore. Fast boating in shallow water disturbs fish habitat, stirs up sediment, and can erode the shoreline.

11. When it's time to replace a boat motor, choose a clean-burning 4-stroke engine.

12. Preserve wildlife habitat on land and underwater. Lake shallows and shorelands are home to many native species and serve as nurseries for their young.

13. Support your local lake association and Maine COLA.



## Expressions -

his July and August, area residents will be treated to a series of twelve, free performances by rising stars in the world of classical music. The second annual Atlantic Music Festival will be held at Colby College from July 12 to August 6.

According to its website, "[t]he Atlantic Music Festival simultaneously strives to be one of the leading music programs and the most inspiring summer music festival in the world. Every year, the AMF Institute committee seeks students and young artists who hold extraordinary talent and commitment to music."

The festival's founder and artistic director is Solbong Kim. A young composer of Korean ancestry, Kim had a vision: he wanted to provide a special opportunity for young classical musicians to make music with each other, for them to study with older and highly revered musicians, and for all the musicians, young and old, well established and just starting out, to play together in free public concerts. He imagined that the festival would create a closeknit and supportive community comprising the musicians themselves and the local residents who come to hear them perform.

To Kim, Colby College seemed the ideal site for the festival, with its idyllic and quiet campus, its proximity to cultural hubs, and Maine's perfect summer weather. In Waterville, Kim hoped to find — and did — a wonderfully kind and supportive public who would attend the festival's concerts and

whose enthusiasm would motivate and inspire the young artists.

The tuition-paying students at the festival are the best and brightest students from major conservatories. These young singers, instrumentalists, and composers come for two or four weeks of private lessons, coaching sessions, master classes, and performances. The heart of the festival, however, is its fellowship program. The fellows, the majority of whom are pursuing doctoral degrees, study and perform at the festival, while mentoring their younger colleagues. Unlike the students, fellows receive free tuition and housing.

Fellows are heard in festival performances as soloists, chamber musicians, and as members of the festival orchestra. The fellowship program is open to orchestral instrumentalists, guitarists, pianists, opera singers, one composer, one conductor, and one recording engineer, all between the ages of 18 and 34.

The festival draws participants from around the world. While two thirds of the students and fellows are from the United States, some come from as far away as Great Britain, Australia, France, Austria, China and Korea. The admissions process is very competitive. A mere 10% of those who applied this year were accepted.

All together, students, fellows, and faculty number around 60. The faculty comprises over twenty internationally acclaimed composers, performers, and teachers, including Grammy-nominated cellist Sharon Robinson and violinist Jaime Laredo, who will be featured as soloists at the festival's centerpiece concert on July 31.

The first performance will be held on Saturday, July 17. at 7:00 p.m. Although admission is free, festival organizers encourage concert-goers to reserve tickets on the festival's website.

Conservation Too -

t is time for me to offer up the 2010 article on com-Lposting. For some folks, the summer and fall is the time when they either do their composting or think about doing their composting. If you are still just thinking about it... IT IS TIME TO START! It is estimated that composting your household waste can cut your annual waste by nearly 80%.

To begin with the basics of composting - it is a mixture of nitrogen, carbon, oxygen and moisture. With the proper mix of these elements little critters will begin to digest all the material, generate heat while they are at it, and end up creating a marvelous material which gardeners refer to as "black gold". This compost is not only a precious soil amendment for gardeners and landscapers but it has been created by recycling materials that otherwise would have been in the waste stream. For technical guidance on making compost, and of the process itself and help with designs for a home made compost bin or compost pile we recommend checking the Maine cooperative extension service. http://www.umext.maine.edu/onlinepubs/htmpubs/1143.htm

So you may ask, "Where do I get nitrogen and carbon? Most of us can figure out how to get the oxygen and the moisture. An easy way to think of the nitrogen and carbon is to use a simple color code. Most green stuff has nitrogen and most brown stuff has carbon. Nitrogen comes from lawn clippings and food scraps. For your brown stuff focus on dry leaves, dead grass, stale bread products, paper napkins and the like. Avoid meat and oils. Depending on the type of compost system used; mix the nitrogen and carbon materials. Use more of the carbon material by volume. Keep the mixture stirred up so it has plenty of oxygen and keep it about as moist as a wrung out sponge. The compost mixture needs to be of sufficient size to begin its work. A good sized pile in a shady area will work. Many people use a compost bin or other container to keep the mixture together.

Sounds simple doesn't it? If you haven't done it before however, it takes some time to learn the method. Talk to a neighbor who composts. Don't over think it? Don't be in a hurry? People may try to sell you something that will "make compost in a few weeks". They may have been trying to sell you a guaranteed investment last year. It is best to use the entire season to make the compost. I suggest getting a compost thermometer in order to keep track of how hot the compost is getting. It should be above 95-100° in order to be working. It can get much hotter. Turn the mixture weekly.

Let me explain my system. I have a large compost bin that holds more than a cubic yard. I use lawn clip-

pings and food scraps for my nitrogen. I use junk mail and a pile of last fall's leaves for my carbon. For the past month my pile has been at 125-145°. Most household compost will not work that well but my pile is large enough to work very well. I've been making compost for years.

For those who do not want to build their own composter you can purchase free-standing composters. The 'Earth Machine' composter is a model that the Kennebec District sells. It helps promote composting as a good practice for soil and water conservation and protection.

The Kennebec 2010 edition of the Kennebec County Ag Map is now hot off the press. Look for a copy to find local farm stands and Farmers Markets and start eating food that was grown locally. Do your part to support local food production and all of its benefits. 





## Sunburned Fishermen and Vanishing Hula Poppers

Phil Goodwin from New Jersey caught this beautiful smallmouth bass on a baby zara spook last week. The heat kept some fish from biting, but not this one!

Teat waves are definitely not a fisherman's Lbest friend, but they sure make for terrific 4th of July party weather! Central Mainers struggled through record breaking heat last week that created some difficult fishing conditions, but offered pleasure boaters, tubers and water skiers absolutely dreamy conditions. I heard that so many people ran air conditioners and fans in the Lewiston/Auburn area that the electrical substation blew up! Now that's HOT!

So, what does this heat wave do to our local fishing? Well, surface water temperatures certainly rose into the high 70's, but that's not extreme for this time of year and we've found some thermocline layers on Great Pond that were 26 feet down, which is also normal for this time o f year. So all in all, I'd say this heart wave did nothing more than put some fishermen on ice for a few days and gave the fish a reprieve until the heat wave snaps.


It's true that bright & sunny days can put the fish down a bit. Add the high pressure system that settled over the Belgrade's and PRESTO you have a lot of hot and sunburned fishermen roaming around town with very few stories to tell. But anglers shouldn't become depressed. The fish are still in the lake and they have to feed at some point. Usually dusk is prime time during these conditions, especially if you are looking for largemouth bass because these fish will move into the shallows and search for food under the cover of darkness. The downside to this, of course, is everyone's nemesis, Mr. & Mrs. Mosquito. Twice during the last week we've been driven off the lake by skeeters, but not until we enjoyed some of the best fishing of the day! Seriously, is there anything more enjoyable than cruising a shoreline nice and quiet on a calm evening . . . casting your favorite top water lure over a weed bed. You can almost sense the strike is coming; although when it finally happens is still startles the stuffing out of me. Nowadays the market is flooded with top water lures. You can buy them in every shape and size and color imaginable and even some that are NOT imaginable. Here in the Belgrade's, if you ask any old timer or young gun, they'll tell you that you still can't beat a black jitterbug. I know what you are

thinking, "I have one of those somewhere" or "we use to fish those as kids". Well, they still work today and I still get a rush out of fishing one. The other day on Great Pond I was fishing with some friends staying at Bear Spring Camps and we decided to end the day going "Old School." Black Jitterbugs and Hula Poppers seriously. Well, the hula lasted about 4 casts before being unceremoniously snatched by a pike. I didn't even know they'd hit those, although I should have known better. By the way, the largemouth out in North Bay were pretty cooperative at dusk!

If you read last week's article I talked about shad on the Kennebec River. Unfortunately due to the wicked heat and the holiday theatrics, I never made it out there. But I'll do my best to get there this week and offer up some intel for anyone interested in chasing these amazing fish. In the meantime, I wish everyone tight lines!


