Miss Juanita Seavey, a graduate of Gorham Normal School, 1941, came to us with good recommendations from the school. She taught the fall and winter terms.

As extensive repairs were made last year, both interior and exterior, little will need to be done this year.

The Health Program is vital, and aside from the Health Nurse and Clinics, the Dental Hygienist is a yearly visitor under Westport's dental program.

In these critical times we must remember the long-time battle for Democracy in the Schools. Wars today are total and fought by whole people. They are not fought by one generation alone, but demand sustained strength, generation after generation. In our schools are thirty million youths who are the tomorrow of America and the hope of Democracy.

In conclusion may I express my appreciation for the diligent support of your School Committee, who have served you well and without financial recompense, devoted to their task of serving society.

I desire to extend to you and the School Committee my gratitude for the constant support which you have given the cause of public education in America.

Warrant for Annual Town Meeting

To Fred I. Greenleaf, a constable in the Town of Westport,, in the County of Lincoln,

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required by law to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Westport qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town Hall in said Town of Westport, on Monday the 23rd day of March, A. D. 1942, at six o'clock P. M., Eastern War Time, and then and there to act on the following articles:

ARTICLE 1—To choose a Moderator for said meeting.

ART. 2—To see if the town will vote to accept the report of the Town Officers for the municipal year ending February 15, 1941.

ART. 3—To see if the town will vote to accept the report of the town officers for the municipal year ending February 21, 1942.

ART. 4—To choose all necessary officers for the year ensuing.

ART. 5—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of schools.

ART. 6—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the poor for the year ensuing.

ART. 7—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of bridges for the year ensuing.

ART. 8.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of town highways for the year ensuing.

ART. 9.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of town buildings for the year ensuing.

ART. 10.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for interest for the year ensuing.

ART. 11.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for abatements for the year ensuing.

ART. 12.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for insurance for the year ensuing.

ART. 13.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay town officers for year ensuing.

ART. 14.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the salary of the Superintendent of Schools.

ART. 15.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for snow bills for the year ensuing.

ART. 16.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for contingent expenses for the year ensuing.

ART. 17.—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to pay the State and County Tax for the year ensuing.

ART. 18.—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of Third Class Highway, or to be used in conjunction with the State apportionment for the construction of Third Class Roads, as provided in Sections 44 and 46, Chapter 28, R. S.,

1930, as amended by Section 4, of Chapter 229, P. L., 1937, and Section 1, of Chapter 215, P. L., 1941, the least amount being \$175.00.

ART. 19—To see what sum the town will raise and appropriate for State Aid Road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Chapter 213, Public Laws of 1941.

ART. 20—To see what sum, if any, the town would recommend to take from the joint State Aid account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to State Aid Roads, in excess of the requirements of Section 2, Chapter 132, P. L., 1935.

ART. 21—To see what sum, if any, the town would recommend to take from the Third Class apportionment for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to Third Class Roads, in excess of the requirements of Section 1, Chapter 207, P. L., 1939.

ART. 22—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 to straighten the hill on West Shore Road by Luretta Hodgdon's gate so-called.

ART. 23—To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$250 to start a fill at Mill Bridge so-called.

ART. 24—To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$150 to be used for applying gravel on the old Post Office Road, so-called.

ART. 25—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150 to be used for cutting bushes on Town Roads beginning at the N. C. Brooks line so-called and on other Town Roads as far as the money will go.

ART. 26—To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$200 to be used for applying gravel on the road between Robert Higgins' house and Eaton's farmhouse, this road being known as the North End Road.

ART. 27—To see if the town will raise and appropriate \$10.00 for public health nursing in Westport, said sum to be expended by the State Bureau of Health, for local service.

ART. 28—To see if the town will vote to elect a Citizens' Committee of three, to act in conjunction with the town officials in the clarification and settlement of any misunderstanding which might arise in the town, it being understood that such committee shall act in advisory capacity only.

ART. 29—To elect the Committee authorized in Article 28.

ART. 30—To see what sum of money the town will raise to be used for cutting bushes on the State Aid Highways and Third Class Highways.

ART. 31—To see whether or not the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25 for advertising our natural resources, advantages and attractions, under the provisions of Chapter 5, Section 82, of the Revised Statutes, said money to be expended through the State of Maine Publicity Bureau.

ART. 32—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$200 to be used on the Fowle Road so-called. \$150 of said sum to be used for applying gravel, the remaining \$50 to be used for grading and ditching.

ART. 33—To see if the town will vote to raise \$100 to be used for gravel on the North End Road, so-called, starting on the road north of the Eaton farm and continuing to the Bruce cottage at the end of the road.

ART. 34—To see if the town will vote to accept the raise in pay authorized by the State for workmen engaged in snow removal, said raise making pay for laborers and truck drivers .44 per hour, for sanding truck and snow removal (truck) per hour.

ART. 35—To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$5.33 to be spent for dental hygienist service in the Town of Westport under the direction of the State Bureau of Health and Welfare, in cooperation with local authorities.

ART. 36—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of State Aid Highways during the ensuing year, within the limits of the town, under the provisions of Sec. 18 of the P. L. 1913.

ART. 37—To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money and if so, how much, to be used for applying bituminous surface to the State Aid Road, beginning at the termination of the 1941 tarring program extending in a southerly direction along the so-called State Highway.

ART. 38—To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to pay the audit for the municipal year of 1941.

ART. 39—To see if the town will vote to adopt Daylight Saving Time for the period specified by the State of Maine.

ART. 40—To see if the town will vote to have a power loader for State Aid Road work.

ART. 41—To see what sum of money the town will raise for maintenance of Special State Aid Resolves, \$40 per \$1000 allocation being the amount required by State law.

ART. 42—To see if the town will vote to set a date when taxes shall be payable and what interest shall be collected thereafter.

ART. 43—To authorize and empower-----
-----Town Treasurer and----- successors
in office to sign, seal and execute in corporate name of
the inhabitants of the Town of Westport by-----
or----- successors as Treasurer of said town, all deeds,
assignments, leases and other conveyances of town
lands or buildings, and to do all acts connected and in-
cidental thereto, under the direction of the Board of
Selectmen.

ART. 44—To ratify any and all acts in the signing,
sealing, execution and delivery of deeds, assignments
and other conveyances of town lands or buildings by
-----Town Treasurer, heretofore signed,
sealed, executed and delivered in the corporate name of
the inhabitants of the Town of Westport-----
by----- as Treasurer.

ART. 45—To see if the town will authorize the Se-
lectmen and Treasurer to hire, in anticipation of taxes,
such sums of money as may be necessary for the year
ensuing.

ART. 46—To see what action the town will take in
regard to flags and halyards for the school, and raise
money for same.

ART. 47—To elect a Fire Inspector.

ART. 48—To see what action the town will take in
regard to rent and janitor service for the Town Hall
for the year ensuing.

ART. 49—To see what action the town will take in
regard to Fire Wardens for the year ensuing.

ART. 50—To see what sum of money the town will raise, if any, for the purpose of widening the West Shore Road to a minimum width of thirteen feet in the narrowest place and to see if in the future no more than nine-tenths of any sum of money appropriated for Road work be used for such purposes, the remaining one-tenth to be used in the late fall to fill in all ruts and pot-holes and to keep all water courses clear.

ART. 51—To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, and if so how much, to purchase and install Air Raid Warning equipment in places designated by the State Civilian Defense Co-ordinator.

ART. 52—To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, and if so how much, to be used for Civilian Defense.

ART. 53—To see if the town will vote to continue membership in the Maine Municipal Association and if the town does so vote, to authorize the officials to pay membership fee from Contingent Fund.

ART. 54—To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, and if so how much, to be used for up-keep of veterans' graves, as authorized in Chapter 24, Section 3, of Revised Statutes.

ART. 55—To see if the town will vote to raise the pay for town labor to a minimum of 50 cents per hour.

ART. 56—To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, and if so how much, to purchase a portable pump for fire fighting and 1500 feet of hose, this pump to be of such nature that it can be transported readily to any part of the town.

The Selectmen will be in session at the Town Hall in the Town of Westport on Monday, the 23rd day of

March, A. D. 1942, at 5:00 p. m. for the purpose of correcting the voting list.
