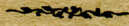

REPORT OF PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE—1942

Westport

After one year's participation in the World War, we are beginning to realize the great responsibility of individuals on the home front. Staple commodities may have to be rationed but let us strive against the rationing of right health attitudes and practices. It is our duty to back up our armed forces, and safeguard the future of our civilians at home. How? By carrying on a successful public health program in every community.

During the past year, Westport responded very well to the suggested immunization program planned in honor of Child Health Day. Fifteen children were protected against diphtheria and twenty were protected against smallpox.

The geographical location of Westport places a great responsibility on each individual. The scarcity of physicians as well as the distance from any physician makes it essential that each person be protected against every preventable disease.

Your public health nurse would like to help you plan clinics whereby your children may be protected against

diphtheria and smallpox; your young people and adults protected against typhoid fever; your infants against whooping cough.

Your public health nurse would like to help you plan for child health conferences, where your infants and pre-school children would be given a physical examination by a physician.

Your nurse is unable to do this by herself but her efforts, supported by the efforts of a well organized health committee, could accomplish a great deal.

As yet, Westport does not have such a committee but with the cooperation of the Superintendent of Schools, the health officer, interested parents and the nurse, it is hoped that such a committee will be organized shortly.

IN GENERAL

The school has been well managed by Mrs. Carrie Stanley. It has been maintained for thirty-three weeks town year and thirty-five week state school year when it closes in June. This three weeks beyond the minimum requirements equalizes the educational opportunities more fully for the children.

A Health Committee has been formed recently to further the cooperation with the Public Health Nurse. Mrs. Verlie Greenleaf acts as chairman and Mrs. Mary Greenleaf as secretary. Such a committee is most necessary to plan for child health conferences. Parents and interested citizens will I trust lend support to such an important program.

The dental program under the direction of Miss Florence Porter, Dental Hygienist, was conducted February 25, 1942. All of the children had a dental examination

and eleven were given a dental prophylaxis. Class room lessons were taught. On one afternoon parents gathered at the school and the dental hygienist discussed with the parents the value of this program.

The pupils and parents have contributed generously to worthy organizations. The war activities sponsored by the school have received the patriotic support of all. Doubtless the coming year will witness increased activities which the schools will be called upon to participate in.

May I express my appreciation to the School Committee, Town Officials and citizens who have worked together for the best interest of the children.

Warrant for Annual Town Meeting

To Fred I. Greenleaf, a constable in the Town of Westport, in the County of Lincoln,

GREETING:

Art. 4—To choose all necessary officers for the year ensuing.

Art. 5—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of schools.

Art. 6—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of the poor for the year ensuing.

Art. 7—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of bridges for the year ensuing.

Art. 8—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of town highways for the year ensuing.

Art. 9—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of town buildings for the year ensuing.

Art. 10—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for interest for the year ensuing.

Art. 11—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for abatements for the year ensuing.

Art. 12—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for insurance for the year ensuing.

Art. 13—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay town officers for the year ensuing.

Art. 14—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the salary of the Superintendent of schools.

Art. 15—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for snow bills for the year ensuing.

Art. 16—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for contingent expenses for the year ensuing.

Art. 17—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to pay the State and County tax for the year ensuing.

Art. 18—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$10.00 for public health nursing in Westport, said sum to be expended by the State Bureau of Health, for local services.

Art. 19—To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$5.33 to be spent for dental hygienist service in the Town of Westport under the direction of the State Bureau of Health and Welfare, in cooperation with local authorities.

Art. 20—To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to pay the audit for the municipal year of 1942.

Art. 21—To see if the town will vote to adopt Daylight Saving Time for the period specified by the State of Maine.

Art. 22—To see if the town will vote to set a date when taxes shall be payable and what interest shall be collected thereafter.

Art. 23—To authorize and empower _____ Town Treasurer and _____ successors in office to sign, seal, and execute in corporate name of the inhabitants of the Town of Westport by _____ or _____ successors in office as treasurer of said town, all deeds, assignments, leases and other conveyances of town lands or buildings and to do all acts connected and incidental thereto, under the direction of the Board of Selectmen.

Art. 24—To ratify any and all acts in the signing, sealing, execution and delivery of deeds, assignments, and other conveyances of town lands or buildings by _____ Town Treasurer, heretofore signed, sealed, executed, and delivered in the corporate name of the Inhabitants of the Town of Westport by _____ as Treasurer.

Art. 25—To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to hire, in anticipation of taxes, such sums of money as may be necessary for the year ensuing.

Art. 26—To see what action the town will take in regard to flags and halyards for the school, and raise money for same.

Art. 27—To elect a fire inspector.

Art. 28—To see what action the town will take in regard to fire wardens for the year ensuing.

Art. 29—To see what action the town will take in regard to rent and janitor service for the Town Hall for the year ensuing.

Art. 30—To see if the town will vote to continue membership in the Maine Municipal Association; and, if the town does

so vote, to authorize the officials to pay membership fee from contingent fund.

Art. 31—To see if the town will raise money to make the road from the main highway to the Harry W. Boyd Estate passable, the same being a town road and now impassable, \$300 being the sum estimated to make necessary repairs.

Art. 32—To see if the Town will vote to extend the fill at Mill Pond Bridge so called, and vote to raise the sum of \$300 for same.

Art. 33—To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$200 for gravel on the Fred Greenleaf Road.

Art. 34—To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$100 for the North End road beginning at the Eaton farmhouse and extended to the Bruce cottages, said sum of money for ditching and cutting bushes on said road.

Art. 35—To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$150 for cutting bushes on the Town highways.

Art. 36—To see if the Town will vote to raise \$50 to destroy Brown Tail moth nests on State Highway and third class roads.

Art. 37—To see if the Town will vote to raise \$150 for the Baker Road so called, \$100 for gravel, \$50 for grading and cutting bushes on same.

Art. 38—To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$200 for the upkeep of the Fowles Point Road, \$50 of that amount for grading, ditching and cutting bushes on same.

Art. 39—To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$200 to be used for gravel on the North End road from Robert Higgins to the Eaton Farm.
