

itting in a tree house, sleeping near the lake, fishing, boating, making friends (sometimes first best friends ever) and making memories that last for a lifetime. There are no better reasons for a celebration, a reunion, a reminiscing, and a look ahead.

Pine Tree Camp in Rome, on North Pond, is 65 years old this season, it is full swing into a major capital campaign that will replace an outdated (1950s) dining hall and three camper cabins this fall, and it is pulling together a history of staff and campers many of whose lives have changed course forever because of Pine Tree Camp.

Pine Tree Camp opened its doors at the 100acre, non-accessible former North Pond Club on July 2, 1945. Seventy-five Maine children with physical disabilities attended Pine Tree Camp that first summer. They stayed for eight weeks, participating in traditional camp activities while receiving intense therapy. Tuition was \$600.

Throughout the eight weeks someone wonderful carefully and artistically chronicled the entire experience in a scrapbook of daily activities, photographs, quotes, names, events, and drawings of stick figures who walked and talked and left a trail of memories every day of the way. Aside from annual group pictures and collages collected over the years that now hang in the new Welcome

Center at Pine Tree Camp, this one scrapbook is the only comprehensive historical document in the camp's possession....so far.

Today the 285-acre barrier-free facility welcomes 650 children and adults throughout the summer. Campers come for six full days of activities including swimming, fishing, kayaking, hiking, adaptive tennis, drama, arts and crafts and spending time in Maine's only accessible treehouse. A full medical staff is on-site and available 24/7 to ensure that campers, many of whom are medically fragile, are well-cared-for and safe. Traditional summer activities are adapted to meet the needs of each individual camper, many of whom return year after year. Tuition is \$1600 per week, and no one has ever been refused for

inability to pay.

Five years ago Pine Tree Camp started keeping detailed camper records. Four years ago it founded Camp Pine Cone, a day camp for kids

5-12. Two years ago it replaced a rustic arts and crafts building with a state-of-the art infirmary and Welcome Center. This year it is embarking on \$8 million in capital improvements.

This year, too, Pine Tree Camp is reaching out to reconnect with its thousands of former staff and campers and Pine Tree Society, the parent organization, has created an on-line form in which camp alumni can input information to be added to a directory.

Significantly, the 65th Anniversary Celebration on Sunday, August 8, 11 am-3 pm will provide a great beginning in historical reconstruction as all attendees - some of whom date to the 1950s - will be interviewed on camcorder, capturing and preserving history for a very special place. 

Large Woody Debris

Te have been talking lately about the benefits of vegetated buffers and some of the rules and regulations designed to protect the integrity of shoreland habitat. Recently, the EPA published the National Lakes Assessment (http://www.epa.gov/lakessurvey/). For this assessment, scientists did extensive sampling and assessment in 1000 of the nations nearly 50,000 lakes over 10 acres (about 3000 of which are in Maine). Overall Maine lakes scored very highly in this national assessment. One of the study objectives was to determine indicators that could be used to predict water quality and biological condition of the lakes. The study concluded that the greatest predictor of poor lake biology was poor lakeshore habitat including shoreline and nearshore vegetation, especially trees. This week, we will discuss some of the reasons for this and additional benefits provided by Mother Nature's Transpiring, Recyclable, Energy Efficient Stormwater System, or TREES for short. I got the original idea for this column from a phone call to my office from a woman who reported that a tree had fallen into the water along the edge of her property and was "creating a nuisance." She wanted to know what government agency she should call to have them come remove the tree

I told her that unless the tree was a safety hazard or a hazard to navigation, e.g., blocking a channel or access to her dock, the official recommendation from the state Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) and Division of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife (IFW) was to simply leave the tree in place to provide habitat for turtles, fish, and other aquatic organisms (see, e.g., http://www.maine.gov/dep/blwq/docstream/te am/riparian.htm). She told me that was the problem- there were so many turtles and fish around the tree that nuisance fishermen were now spending too much time fishing in "her" part of the lake. I explained that under Maine State law governing surface waters of great ponds (> 10 acres), the lakes belong to everyone and fishermen had every right to fish there although they should certainly display common courtesy and not intrude on anything on the shoreline.

Fisheries biologists and watershed managers refer to trees and large branches that fall into streams, rivers, and lakes as "large woody debris," or LWD for short. In small headwaters streams, this LWD provides important nutrients and habitat for aquatic insects that form the basis for the food chain in the stream. It also provides shelter for fish and helps form channels and pools that slow erosion and trap sediments, while helping to create turbulence that oxygenates the water. Many studies have directly correlated the amount of LWD with the number of fish in the stream. The more LWD, the more fish.

Along lakeshores, these downed trees act as critter magnets. Terrestrial insects such as ants and beetles will crawl out, often falling into the water and becoming fish food. Turtles will climb out of the lake and bask in the sun on the exposed branches. Fish such as bass and black crappie will take shelter in the shady structure provided by the submerged part of the tree and feast on the small minnows, crayfish, and other aquatic invertebrates that are attracted to the LWD. As the woman who called

me noted, LWD also attracts fishermen who understand the habitat value provided by this structure.

Less appreciated is the role that the downed trees play in protecting the shoreline by helping to dissipate wave (and even ice) action, just as a jetty helps protect the shore at the beach. Incoming waves will break over the tree and hit the shore with a lot less energy than along the unprotected shore. This is one reason you never see the BRCA youth Conservation Corps out rip-rapping natural shorelines.

Mother Nature considers LWD such an important component of her watershed design that she has a special corps of Busy, Eager, and Very Energetic Recyclers, or BEAVERS for short, who make it their life work to increase the amount of LWD in Maine streams, rivers, and lakes. Sometimes their actions are not fully appreciated, such as when they dam up culverts under roads or cut down trees you planted in the buffer in front of your camp, but they are very good at what they do. They create a lot of great fish habitat and create more wetlands every year than all the engineers and wetland scientists in the country combined. The bottom line? If a tree falls in the lake, unless it is a hazard, just leave it where it is and all the creatures in the lake will be much happier and the biological quality of the lake will be better in the long run.

The History of Maine's Kettle Ponds

The story of the kettle lakes of Maine and the important role they play in our ecology will be the subjects of a talk by distinguished geologist, Robert Thorson, on Thursday, August 12, 7-8:30pm, at The Ladd Center in Wayne.

Robert Thorson, a professor of geology at the University of Connecticut and an environmental columnist for the "Hartford Courant," is the author of "Beyond Walden: The Hidden History of America's Kettle Lakes and Ponds," "Stone by Stone," and "Exploring Stone Walls."

The formation of kettle ponds dates to 15,000 years ago when the Laurentide ice sheet began receding, leaving a string of "kettle" lakes and ponds from Cape Cod to the High Plains. Unlike the Great Lakes, classic kettles have no inlet or outlet but are natural wells fed by groundwater filtered by silica-rich, grit-free sand. Thousands of them dot the landscape, representing valuable ecological and spiritual oases, each unique in their own way.

Walden Pond, that icon of transcendentalism and environmentalism, was one such pond. Fictitious Lake Wobegon was another, exemplifying the mythic lake culture created by kettles in the last century.

Professor Thorson visits many such spots to explain how we cannot take them for granted. They are fragile ecosystems that are in constant tension with human overdevelopment. In essence "fossil icebergs" (the melted remnants of ice blocks), they are also repositories of ancient flora and fauna beneath the surface.

Kettles reveal an enormous amount about who we are and where we came from. Preserving them has never been more important.

Variable Milfoil – No Time to Let Down Our Guard

arlier this summer, Ryan Burton of the Cobbossee Watershed District discovered a suspicious plant sample around a dam (Dam 2) on Purgatory Stream in Litchfield, just below the Woodbury Pond dam (Dam 1), which is the main outlet for the Tacoma Lakes chain. On June 23, Karen Hahnel of the Maine DEP confirmed the worst fears - the plant sample was indeed nonnative variable milfoil (VM).

On July 12, Ryan, Karen and Bob Moore of the Friends of the Cobbossee Watershed began surveying from the Dam 2 area and continued upstream (towards Dam 1) until they could proceed no further due to the narrowing/depth of the stream. Though the physical characteristics of the stream made it unlikely that a fragment had come from further upstream, the close proximity to both Woodbury Pond and Cobbossee Lake made it particularly concerning and a full survey of the stream and the area around the Woodbury Dam (which adjoins a public boat launch) was scheduled.

On July 21, Tacoma Lakes Improvement Society (TLIS) members Diane Clay, Susie Wilding-Hartford and Sadie Hartford surveyed Woodbury

Pond between Dam 1 and the public boat launch and discovered no VM present. The area has been surveyed annually for several years by a combination of the TLIS and the Friends Youth Plant Patrol (YPP).

That same day, Friends AmeriCorps intern Whitney Grass and staff member Cameron Dufour surveyed the entire stream area from Dam 1 to the area where the infestation was discovered. After 2+ hours navigating the "stream" - ranging from a trickle in places to depths of 15' - no additional VM was found. Said Whitney, "Due to the terrain, this area probably hasn't seen a human being in decades, which also makes it highly unlikely that the infestation near Dam 2 resulted from a fragment coming from further upstream."

The cause? The infested area is not subject to boat traffic - could it be waterfowl, animal or an angler? Without knowing for sure, this discovery is another grim reminder as to how vulnerable our waters are. Signage has been placed at the site and a control plan is being discussed. Purgatory Stream flows in Cobbossee Stream, which does have a VM infestation.







Conservation Too -

few weeks back I told you a bit about the $oldsymbol{A}$ "LakeSmart" program. It is a voluntary program where shoreline landowners on some lakes have their property evaluated to review its impact on the lake water quality. The intent is to identify properties on the shorefront that exhibit "gold standard" practices to control erosion and phosphorus runoff. It is a demanding evaluation that sets a very high standard. Everyone who has a "LakeSmart" review, learns about what they can do to minimize their impact on their lake or pond. It's all about cleaner more healthy water conditions.

Landowners who meet the "LakeSmart" standard receive a "LakeSmart Award" sign which they can place on their property. People cruising by in their boat can see which properties meet those standards. It is hoped that these examples will be copied by others around the shoreline with the goal of improving water quality.

So... last week I did a review on Long Pond. The property and the owners exhibited many of the standards used by "LakeSmart". After spending some time with the couple and their grand daughters discussing how they used their property and had cared



for it over the years, I then spent time wandering around the property, clipboard in hand. I saw how those people's philosophy of land use, played out on the property itself. This was a case where they lived very gently upon their property. Over four decades of ownership it was rare that any trees had been cut. They had come to the conclusion that there was no need for any lawn. The path to the water was merely a line through the leaves where the wild blueberries didn't grow quite so thickly. The trees were thick enough that we had difficulty identifying a place to hang the "LakeSmart Award" sign so that it could be viewed from the water.



ow hard is it to catch a big northern pike L during the heat of the summer? Ask some local pike fishermen and they'll just grunt and shrug, maybe even roll their eyes at you. These are the guys you want to follow around, because most of the time they know exactly how to do it! When you get an honest, eye to eye reply that sounds something like, "oh, you can't catch big pike in the summer" or "didn't you know their teeth fall out this time of year?" - those folks are the ones you want to steer clear of. You have to understand, catching big summer pike is tricky and takes a lot of time and patience, but the rewards are totally worth the effort. Take a look at the photo of Bob Richter, who owns Belgrade 4-Season Cottages on Great Pond. Bob probably doesn't even know I'm putting this picture in the paper (which makes this article sneaky, devious and a lot of fun to write!). Bob is a quiet, reserved man who works hard taking care of his cottages along with his wife Laura, who I'm sure you've met at some point around town. She's what you'd call gregarious, one of those extraverted people that leave you standing there smiling from ear to ear even if you don't know why. But Bob is a fishermen, and along with his son Bob Jr. can really put some summer fish in the boat. As a matter of fact, the younger Bob just completed his Maine Guide fishing test and

Summer Pike Trolling and

Wacky Smallmouth Bass

is now a Registered Maine Guide! Way to go Bobby – I'm sure you are going to carry on the storied tradition of Belgrade Lakes guides for many years to come!

So how are people like the Richter boys catching big pike this time of year. The answer is twofold and quite simple: spend a lot of time on the water to learn the lake and troll the deep side of ledges and points. Northern Pike can show up anywhere, we all know that to be true. But the majority of big summer pike spend quality time hanging in deeper water ranging from 15 - 30feet and the islands dotting Great Pond are a perfect place to find these big critters. Trolling from 2.2 – 3 m.p.h with stick baits like the Original Floating Rapala in copper/black or silver/black or the Max Rap in flake purple ghost or flake silver are great choices when targeting pike. Both of these baits run true at higher speeds and both come in pike sizes ranging from 4 - 7 inches long. Trolling these baits off downriggers or with lead core line will keep the baits in the strike zone for long periods of time. If you'd rather troll spoons, then my personal favorites are the Williams Lure Companies Warblers. These spoons are wicked and have been working really well this summer. Personally I like the half & half mirror and the electric blue. You need to run them with a ball bearing snap swivel though because they really flutter and roll up your line. If you desire to cast, fishing at low light conditions is desirable, especially at dusk. The bite just seems to be better late in the evening. Casting large Bomber or Smithwick lures near deep water reed beds is a good idea and if it's windy, don't forget to bring some 1 oz+ sized spinner baits and some big inline spinners like the Mepps musky killer. Orange and Black has been a good color lately! Good luck.




