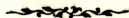

The school has been maintained this year under continued war conditions which has necessitated the closest cooperation of the Citizens, School Committee and the Superintendent.

The year ahead is also uncertain. The real problem will be to secure and retain a teacher for the school. During the past year the instruction has been satisfactory. The attitude of the pupils has been cheerful. They have progressed under the teaching of both Mrs. Stanley and Miss Wyman.

The various war activities such as the purchase of Defense Stamps and Bonds, as well as to various organizations, has been generous and I sincerely appreciate the support given to them.

Your school is one of the most Democratic Institutions of our Nation, and is the symbol of the aspiration of the community. The school's ultimate objective is to develop character and citizenship. The curricula offered is but one item.

I would ask the citizens to support the Health Program by appropriating the sum asked again this year required to promote dental service, immunization, and medical as-

sistance through the State Department of Health and Welfare.

I have enjoyed my work the past year and wish to express my appreciation to the Citizens of Westport for the support of the school. The cooperation of the School Committee has been instrumental in the successful maintenance of the school. The help of all other Town Officials is gratefully acknowledged.

PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE

We are now in the fourth year of a world-wide conflict—a conflict which means the loss of lives and of health to many of our loved ones. When we hear the appeal over the radio for more nurses to look after the youth of our country who, if not receiving nursing care, may pay the supreme sacrifice that we may continue to live in a democratic country, we feel very fortunate indeed that we are able to submit to you such a good report of the public health nursing service rendered to your town during the year 1944.

The following is a brief summary of the accomplishments.

Your public health nurse made six visits to your town. While in your community, one child health conference was held. Three children were protected against small-

pox and diphtheria. The public health nurse, a physician and a dental hygienist attended the conference.

The audiometer, a mechanical device for testing the hearing, was used in the schools.

Home visits were made on mothers of infants and pre-school children to interpret the health needs of their children.

Warrant for Town Meeting

To Walter E. Greenleaf, a Constable of the Town of Westport, in the County of Lincoln.

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Westport, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Town Hall in said town on Monday, the twelfth day of March, A. D. 1945, at 7:30 o'clock P. M., E. W. T., and then and there to act on the following articles, namely:—

Article 1—To choose a Moderator for said meeting.

Art. 2—To see if the town will vote to accept the report of the town officers, and the audit for the municipal year ending March 13, 1944.

Art. 3—To attend to and act upon the report of the Superintendent of Schools, and town account of Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of the Poor and Treasurer.

Art. 4—To choose all necessary officers for the year ensuing.

Art. 5—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools.

Art. 6—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the poor, repair of bridges, repair of highways and town buildings for the year ensuing.

Art. 7—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to pay officers, interest, abatements and insurance for the year ensuing.

Art. 8—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the salary of Superintendent of Schools for the year ensuing.

Art. 9—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for snow bills, State and County Tax, and contingent expenses for the year ensuing.

Art. 10—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for State Aid Road construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 229, Public Laws of 1937.

Art. 11—To see what sum of money, if any, the town will recommend to take from the Joint State Aid Account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to State Aid Roads built within the past five years in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 271, Public Laws of 1931.

Art. 12—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money and if so how much to be used for applying bituminous surface to the State Aid Road, beginning at the termination of the 1941 tarring program and extending in a southerly direction along the so-called state highway.

Art. 13—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of State Aid Highways for the ensuing year, within the limits of the town, under the provisions of Section 18 of the Public Laws of 1913.

Art. 14—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of Third Class Highway, as provided in Section 4, of Chapter 260 of the Public Laws of 1929, the least amount being \$175.00.

Art. 15—To see what action the town will take in regard to cutting bushes on Third Class and State Aid Highways, and raise and appropriate money for same.

Art. 16—To see what sum, if any, the town would recommend to take from the Third Class Apportionment for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to Third Class Roads, in excess of the requirements of Section 1, Chapter 207, Public Laws of 1939.

Art. 17—To see if the town will raise and appropriate \$10.00 for public health nursing in Westport. Said sum to be expended by the State Bureau of Health, for local service.

Art. 18—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8.00 to be spent for dental hygienist service in the Town of Westport under the direction of the State Bureau of Health and Welfare, in cooperation with local authorities.

Art. 19—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20.00 for the repairs of the North End School House.

Art. 20—To see if the town will vote to maintain the Westport School for the school year 1945 and 1946 and so authorize the Superintending School Committee the authority to maintain said school if the average enrollment falls below an average of 8 pupils. The Superintending School Committee recommends that said school be maintained.

Art. 21—To see what action the town will take in regards to flags and halyards for the school and raise and appropriate money for same.

Art. 22—To see whether or not the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 to be paid to the State of Maine Publicity Bureau to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 5, Section 82, of the Revised Statutes of Maine.

Art. 23—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40.00 to be used to pay the audit of the municipal year ending Feb. 17, 1945.

Art. 24—To authorize and empower _____ Town Treasurer and _____ successors in office, to sign, seal and execute in corporate name of the Inhabitants of the Town of Westport by _____ or _____ successors as Treasurer of said Town, all deeds, assignments, leases and other conveyances of town lands or buildings, and to do all acts connected and incidental thereto, under the direction of the Board of Selectmen.

Art. 25—To ratify any and all acts in the signing, sealing, execution and delivery of deeds, assignments and other conveyances of town lands or buildings by _____ Town Treasurer, heretofore signed, sealed, executed and delivered in the corporate name of the Inhabitants of the Town of Westport _____ by _____ as Treasurer.

Art. 26—To see what action the town will take in regards to Fire Wardens for the year ensuing.

Art. 27—To elect a Fire Inspector.

Art. 28—To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to hire, in anticipation of taxes, such sums of money as may be necessary for the year ensuing.

Art. 29—To see if the town will vote to set a date when taxes shall be payable and what interest shall be collected thereafter.

Art. 30—To see if the town will vote to continue membership in the Maine Municipal Association; and if the town does so vote, to authorize the officials to pay membership fee from contingent fund,

Art. 31—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be spent in repairing the pier at the ferry.

Art. 32—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be spent in repairing the float at the ferry.

Art. 33—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 to be used in clearing the Town Hall grounds.

Art. 34—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be used in erecting an outdoor Honor Roll Cabinet, name panels included, or take any action relative thereto.

Art. 35—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to purchase a Service Flag. Said flag to be placed in the Town Hall.

Art. 36—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the care of Veterans' Graves.

Art. 37—To see what action the town will take in regards to housing the fire equipment, and raise money for same.

Art. 38—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for cutting bushes on the town highways.

Art. 39—To see if the town will vote to hire a power shovel for road work for the year ensuing.

Art. 40—To see if the town will vote to set a wage scale for hand labor, trucks and teams.

Art. 41—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 to improve and repair the Old Post Office Road so-called.

Art. 42—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to be spent in cutting the bushes and repairing road from Harriman's to the Ida Greenleaf place.

Art. 43—To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to gravel the North End Road beginning at Tom Cromwell's field and continuing in a northerly direction toward Boellhoff's cottage.

Art. 44—To see what action the town will take in regards to the unexpended balance of the Hilton Mill Pond Road.

Art. 45—To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$80.00 for the repairs of the Thomas Hill Fill, so-called, the same being a special resolve from the State.

Art. 46—To see if the town will vote to reappropriate the sum of \$50.00 for Town Clerk's filing case.

Art. 47—To see what action the town will take in regards to snow removal for the year ensuing.

Art. 48—To see if the town will vote to have a telephone installed at the ferry and pay the monthly premium on same.

Art. 49—To see what action the town will take in regards to the Selectmen's report on the Wiscasset Ferry Account.
