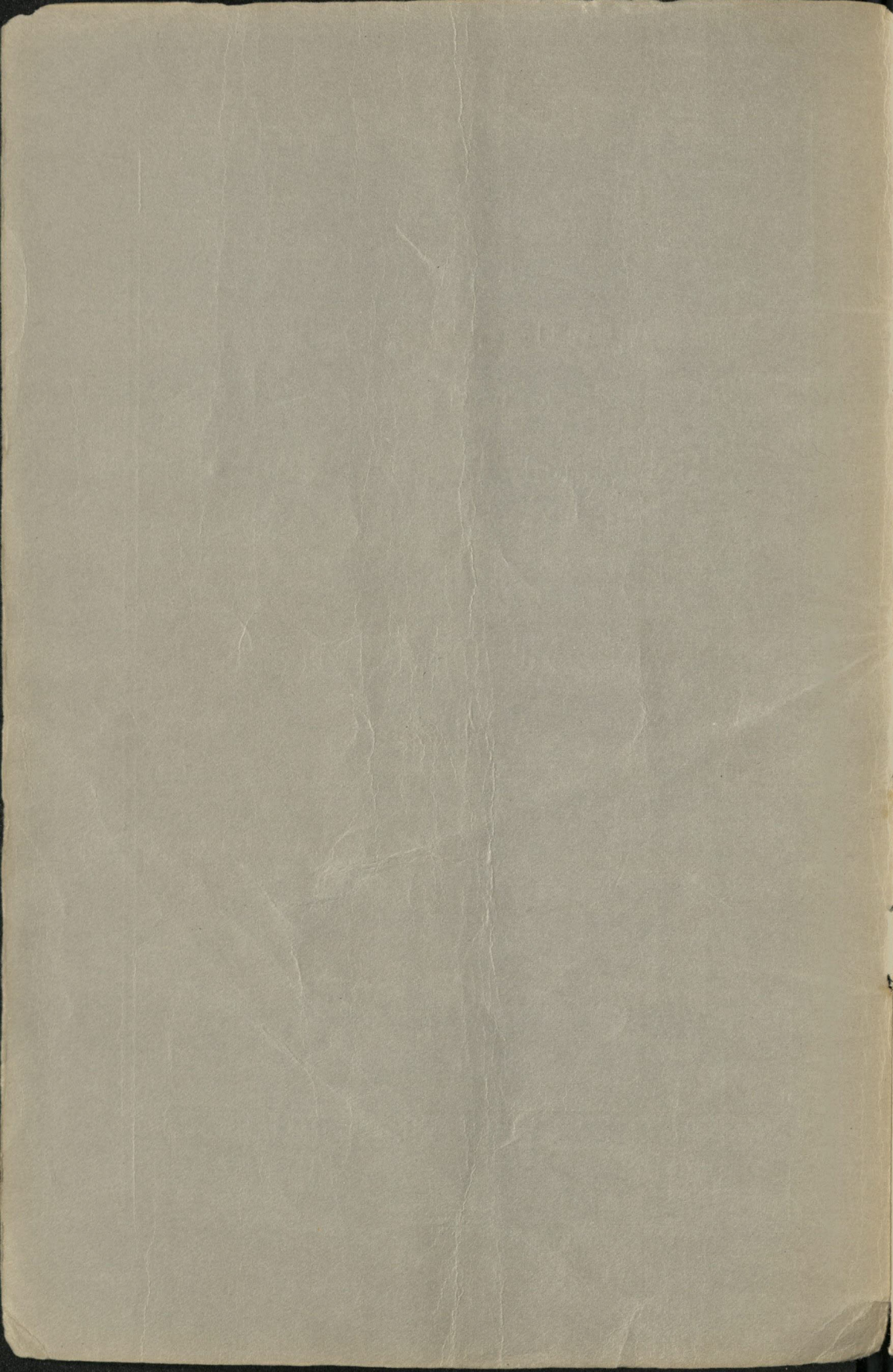

Warrant

*To Chas. A. Wood, a Constable in the Town of Orrington, in the
County of Penobscot,*

Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Orrington qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House in said town on Monday the thirteenth day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

First—To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Second—To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

Third—To act on report of the Selectmen.

Fourth—To act on the report of the Superintendent of Schools.

Fifth—To act on report of Board of Health.

Sixth—To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

Seventh—To grant and raise money for support of schools, the poor, the repair of roads and bridges, the repair of school houses and to defray all other town charges.

Eighth—To fix the compensation of collector of taxes.

Ninth—To see if the town will vote to have one or more road Commissioners and fix their compensation.

Tenth—To see if the town will appropriate a sum of money for Memorial purposes.

Eleventh—To see if the town will vote “yes” or “no,” on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State aid as provided in Section 20 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

Twelfth—To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$533.00 for the improvement of the section of State aid road as outlined in the report of State Highway Commission in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of the ways, highways and bridges, the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provision of Section 19 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

Thirteenth—To see what sum the town will raise for maintenance of State aid road.

Fourteenth—To see if the town will appropriate the sum of \$100 for repairing the Field’s Pond road with gravel to complete work commenced last year.

Fifteenth—To see if the town will raise or appropriate the sum of \$200 for carting gravel on the Dow road, work to be completed before July 1st.

Sixteenth—By petition of C. I. Dean and 15 other legal voters and tax payers of Orrington: To see if the town will accept a street as laid out near the residence of C. I. Dean in said Orrington running easterly by said Dean land to a cross street as laid out on a plan of said land known as Elm Hights recorded in Penobscot Registry of Deeds, said street to be known as McKinley Avenue.

Seventeenth—By request: To see if the town will locate and build a receiving tomb and raise money for same.

Eighteenth—To see if the town will authorize its Superintending School Committee to admit the Town of Bucksport to the school union already established with Eddington and Holden and to take all necessary action to maintain the union should either of the above towns withdraw from said union.

Nineteenth—To see if the town will vote to build a new school building at No. Orrington that will accommodate all pupils from Elm Hights to Orrington Corner and raise money for the same.

Twentieth—To see if the town will authorize its Superintending School Committee to sell the Goodale's school building or to make necessary repairs.

Twenty-first—To see if the town will accept the sum of one hundred dollars from Mrs. Nancy Smith, the interest to be used for the perpetual care of her burial lot in the Marstons Cemetery.

Twenty-second—To see if the town will accept the sum of two hundred dollars from Margaret M. Goodale, the interest to be used for the perpetual care of the Goodale Cemetery and Gen. G. A. Goodale's grandfather, father's and family lots in said cemetery.

Twenty-third—To see if the town will accept from Henry W. Wiswell the sum of one hundred dollars the income to be expended for the perpetual care of his grandfather's, and father's, and his own lots in the Marstons Cemetery.

Twenty-fourth—To see if the town will accept, from the estate of Otis Lawrence the sum of fifty dollars, the income to be expended for the perpetual care of the lot in Marston Cemetery when he is buried.

Twenty-fifth—To see what sum, if any, the town will pay the City of Bangor Fire Dept. for services rendered at fire at Orrington.

Twenty-sixth—(By request) To see if the town will vote to purchase fire apparatus and provide money for the same.

Twenty-seventh—To see if town will instruct its Treasurer to loan the credit of the town to defray town charges not to exceed \$1500, if necessary.

Twenty-eighth—To see if the town will accept the list of jurors as revised by the municipal officers.

Twenty-ninth—To see what action the town will take in regards to care and letting of the Town Hall.

The Selectmen will be in session for the purpose of revising the list of voters at nine o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.

Report of Superintending School Committee and Superintendent of Schools

To the Citizens of Orrington:

We have the pleasure of submitting our annual report of the school department of the town of Orrington for the year ending Feb. 19, 1916. The aim of this report is to show in a measure the condition of the schools and to discuss some of our educational problems.

The school work of the past year has been, without question, very successful from an educational standpoint.

The new courses introduced have proved to be all that we could justly expect, all things considered. The teachers have been deeply interested in this penmanship and music and their enthusiasm has been felt throughout the entire course. We have a good foundation started, all that we need is financial support to make it a success.

We have been fortunate in securing the services of efficient teachers, several remaining with us for the entire year, and their work demonstrates the fact that good teachers should be retained as long as possible; that efficient service is cheap at any price, while poor work is dear at any cost.

Again, we wish to suggest, for your consideration, a new building at North Orrington that would consolidate the northern section of the town. The old buildings are inadequate for our present needs. They are dangerous to the health of the children and teachers who are compelled to use them. Too great precaution cannot be exercised when health is the issue. Then too, it would be impossible to measure the increased efficiency of the school work under more modern conveniences. This alone is well worth your earnest consideration.

ATTENDANCE

The attendance during the year has been broken, especially is this true of the winter term. So many of the teachers and pupils were sick that the average attendance will be somewhat less than seventy per cent of the enrollment.

The problem of tardiness is still a "live issue" with school officials and teachers. We have tried everything within reason, but to no avail. After careful investigation, we are convinced that the parents are more at fault than are the children. These parents do not seem to realize what punctuality means to the school and their children. There are instances where such cases are necessary and these are excusable, but the majority of cases are pure negligence and entirely unnecessary. We appeal to the parents to assist us for they alone hold the key to the whole situation.

ADVANCED GRAMMAR OR JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL

We find some desire on the part of the citizens for an opportunity to give to the older pupils a chance to pursue advanced subjects without being away nights. This can be made possible and at a very small cost.

One of the unused school houses could be used to advantage. Pupils who have passed the seventh and eighth grades and those who have graduated could be offered work in advanced courses, as algebra, languages, agriculture, sciences, etc. The Orrington Cor. building would be centrally located for such a school.

SCHOOL LEAGUES

The school leagues have been doing their usual good work this year. They have contributed liberally towards the expenses of the music teacher. At a time when it seemed as though the undertaking of introducing music in our schools must be abandoned, because of lack of funds, the leagues came forward with the necessary support to carry it through.

Their earnest co-operation for this work is enough to convince us that they get a great deal of pleasure, as well as helpfulness, from these new courses.

They have purchased musical instruments, reference books, maps, etc.

TEACHERS' MEETING

During the year a meeting of the teachers and citizens was held at Orrington Cor. Mr. B. N. Allen, formerly an instructor in Castine Normal School, and an authority on the teaching of reading, gave a very helpful and instructive lecture on that very important subject. The teachers profited by this meeting and many of the practical suggestions given were put into daily use.

TEXT-BOOKS

The PROGRESSIVE ROAD TO READING series was introduced in the lower grades. The results were obvious from the start. Lack of funds prevented us from introducing the entire series which should be done as soon as possible.

The PALMER METHOD OF BUSINESS WRITING was also introduced and the old copy book system discarded. This should have been done long ago for it is one of the best changes we could have made. The children are enthused over the new system and are already showing a marked improvement in all of their penmanship.

We were fortunate in securing the services of Miss Fowler, to direct the work in penmanship and of Miss Homer for the music work. These teachers were popular with both the teachers and pupils and their co-operation brought out excellent results for the short time that they have had to devote to the work.

The best indications of a progressive school system are up-to-date text books in the hands of the pupils. No restrictions have been placed on the demands for new texts and the necessary supplies, consequently we are better supplied than ever before.

The changes most needed for the present is a basal text in reading for the grammar grades and a new Physiology and Hygiene series.

We have tried to place each school on a systematic basis. All the necessary supplies being dealt out by the teacher to the pupils, thus the pupils are taught economy.

Teachers are supplied with repair material and whenever a book needs repair it is carefully done and the life of the book prolonged.

We were pleased with the suggestion given us by some of the parents, in the purchase of text-books for the use of their children. The books were fresh and clean a strong point to consider. Books are helps. Children should be taught to use them intelligently. They need these books for reference when they get through school.

REPAIRS

Our school buildings are all in very good repair with the exception of the Pierce's and Snow's Cor. buildings.

We have placed banking boards around four of the buildings that needed them the most. The plan is to complete the work next year.

It has been costing about \$20.00 each year to brush-bank these school buildings. These bankings were very unsatisfactory. It will cost about twice the above amount to equip our buildings with good board bankings and if properly cared for each spring will last indefinitely, thus eliminating this extra expense each year.

SCHOOL PHYSICIAN

We have had occasion to use the school physician. While the cases were not of a very serious nature, yet his services were necessary. We cannot tell how soon a disease of a very serious nature may break out. A call in time may prevent an epidemic from spreading through our schools.

Since we have to pay only for services actually rendered, we can feel that it is money well spent.

We recommend an appropriation of \$25.00.

CONCLUSION

While we are deeply conscious of much that we would like to have done during the year for the improvement of our schools, that it has not been possible to accomplish, we feel assured that the work in general shows a degree of progress that compares very favorably with that of previous years.

In closing we desire to express our appreciation of the continual confidence and support, interest and co-operation shown by teachers and pupils in the discharge of our duties as superintendent and superintending school committee of your schools. Without this confidence, interest and co-operation success could hardly have been possible.

MUSIC REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Orrington:

The pleasure of introducing music in the public schools of Orrington was given me during the fall term. With the co-operation of the Superintendent and teachers we have accomplished much in this short time.

Of course it will be understood that it is much more difficult to systematize the work when there are so many grades in a room. I have felt that most of the time, this year, should be spent with the upper grades, for they should be able to understand and appreciate music to some extent when they get through school. I have by no means neglected the lower grades. I am greatly surprised and pleased with the results obtained without any special drill on my part.

A great deal depends on the amount and kind of drill work that the grade teacher is able to give daily. Many of the teachers know but little public school music, consequently our work is handicapped, but they all see the benefit and pleasure to the pupils and themselves and enter most heartily in the work.

Individual work is the best way to obtain results and we have started the work in a small way. Several sets of individual music slips were introduced and by their use excellent results were obtained.

We shall have to have more of these slips so that each school may have them. Books are now needed for the upper grades. They have done so well that they can now make good use of a text book.

All of the schools have purchased a collection of songs which can be used to advantage in their regular work.

I find but few monotones and most of these cases are caused by adenoids. I am unable to help them until the cause is removed.

At the close of the term I shall give a written examination, giving written work to all of the grades, and their work recorded on their rank cards.

The pupils have shown a great deal of interest and I would recommend that the parents co-operate with the teacher and myself in encouraging and urging the children to sing and talk about their music in the home.

We cannot make finished singers of all the children but they all can learn much about music which is really as important as the singing.

PENMANSHIP REPORT

To the Citizens and School Board:

On Sept. 16, 1915 a new system of Penmanship was introduced in the eight schools of Orrington. There are about one hundred twelve pupils in the class, from fourth grade to the ninth, inclusive. This system is the Palmer Method of Business Writing which is "a rapid, plain, unshaded, muscular movement" style of writing.

I taught a half-hour lesson in each school, every week, the teacher following up the lesson by daily drills.

A series of "exchanges" of papers proved inspiring and aroused a spirit of friendly emulation.

The work has been very interesting, the co-operation of the teachers perfect, and the energy and enthusiasm of the pupils highly satisfactory.
